Subject: Evacuation of Bainbridge Island

The accompanying copy of a memorandum to Mr. Larry Hewes of the Farm Security Administration is self-explanatory.

1. It is requested that you arrange for participation of the Public Health Service and any other agencies under the supervision of the Federal Security Agency in the evacuation of Bainbridge Island.
2. Specifically, it is desired that the Public Health Service undertake full responsibility for the organization, equipping, staffing and establishment of a suitable medical examination and inoculation station at the induction point, to be organized by the Associated Federal agencies, presumably at the Bainbridge Island ferry landing.
3. It is further requested that specific provision be made for the care, hospitalization or other disposition of any persons among the Japanese residents on Bainbridge Island who require such attention, including all bed cases.
4. Further it is requested specifically that suitable provision be made for a registration system for such persons, including the issuance of suitable tags for identification of individuals, family units and property, such tag to bear a thumb print and a notation as to whether a medical examination has been performed.
5. It is requested that you or your representative attend the meeting referred to in Paragraph 5 of the copy of the memorandum to Mr. Larry I. Hewes.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. LARRY I. HEWES

SUBJECT: Bainbridge Island, restricted

1. Commanding General, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, desires to undertake the immediate forced evacuation of all Japanese now resident on Bainbridge Island, Puget Sound, State of Washington. The statistics showing the number of families and the occupations of each are attached in Exhibit A.
2. You will note from the accompanying exhibit that there are several families engaged in agricultural pursuits. It is requested that you take whatever action is necessary to provide necessary staff and procedure for the handling and disposition of all agricultural property, including live stock owned or controlled by Japanese on Bainbridge Island, within the limits of the authority assigned you previously by General DeWitt.
3. It is proposed that an evacuation order will be posted not later than Wednesday, March 25, 1942. It is proposed that all Japanese will be evacuated within five days from the date of posting of evacuation order. During this interim it is further proposed that all Japanese will be required to pass through a general service office established on the Island, presumably at the ferryboat landing, and that during this period none of such persons will be allowed to leave except by special permission of military authorities. Decision as to who may leave during this period will be up to the Commanding General, Northwest Sector, and will be permitted only in the most exceptional cases.
4. Captain Truman R. Young will be in Seattle at the Olympic Hotel commencing Saturday, March 21, 1942, where either you or your representative in that region may reach him.
5. It is requested that you or your representative be present to attend a joint conference of the interested agencies to be held in Seattle on Monday, March 23, 1942. For the time and place of the meeting, get in touch with Captain Young.

Subject: Evacuation of Bainbridge Island

1. The accompanying copies of memorandum to Mr. Larry Howes and Mr. Richard Neustadt are self-explanatory.
2. It is requested that your organization participate fully in the proposed evacuation of Bainbridge Island.
3. Specifically, it is requested with respect to your function that you undertake full responsibility for the necessary staffing and organization of the general service induction center to be established, presumably at the Bainbridge Island ferry landing, and that you also undertake full responsibility for the following:
 - a. Acquisition of suitable warehouse space for the storage of personal property which evacuees cannot otherwise dispose of, such storage to be at the sole risk of the owners and to include only the more substantial household items, such as ice boxes, pianos, heavy dining room, living room, bed room and kitchen furniture. Cooking utensils and other small items must be crated, packed and plainly marked. Bric-a-brac will not be accepted. It is possible that such warehouse space may be available on Bainbridge Island. It should be low cost.
 - b. Provision of suitable civilian guards to protect the storage against possible pillage or other direct action.
 - c. Suitable impounding space for automobiles, trucks, tractors and other mobile farm implements should be provided, presumably on Bainbridge Island; and an impounding system established to include the filing of title certificates, the collection of distributor blocks and hiring of the necessary guards.
4. As the evacuation will be hasty, the application of your "special block property" would seem to be appropriate in the majority of instances. The staff provided should be capable of rendering rapid service in view of the speed of the proposed program.
5. If, in your judgment it is necessary, arrangements should be made for guarding any property left behind on the Island - not warehoused - against direct action or pillage. Primarily this is

the responsibility of the local authorities.

6. It is requested that you or your representative attend the meeting referred to in Paragraph 5 of the copy of the memorandum to Mr. Larry I. Hewes.


SUBJECT: Japanese Population of Bainbridge Island

1. The 1940 Census reported 281 Japanese as living on Bainbridge Island. They were distributed by precincts as shown in the table below. This table also gives the number of aliens and citizens, the number of heads of households (equal to the number of families) by nativity of the head, and the number of Japanese farm operators.
2. These figures may exceed the number of Japanese now on the island. No recent local count is available in our office for the island but figures given me for Kitsap county (including Bainbridge Island) for February, 1942 show a loss of more than one-third in the number of Japanese in that county: a reduction of from 345 in April, 1940, to 197 in February, 1942.
3. A map showing the location of the island's precincts is given below.

MEMORANDUM FOR COMMANDING GENERAL NORTHWEST SECTOR:

SUBJECT: Evacuation, Bainbridge Island

Commanding General, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, directs: That the following outline memoranda covering the proposed evacuation of Bainbridge Island be submitted for information and guidance:

1. The accompanying copies of memoranda to Messrs. Larry Hewes, R. M. Neustadt and William M. Hale, are self-explanatory.
2. Captain Truman R. Young, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, will be in the Northwest Sector, Saturday, March 21, 1942, representing the Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division.
3. The Commanding General Northwest Sector will be responsible for the following: a) General supervision of the evacuation and coordination of the local services to be rendered by the civilian agencies concerned. Such coordination and service to be within the general policy directed in the accompanying memoranda, and as announced from time to time by the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army. b) Posting and distribution of the evacuation orders. Evacuation orders and instructions in printed form will be furnished except as to supply and movement of the evacuees, which will be prepared and distributed by you. c) Furnishing all necessary guards, security patrols, including the guard enroute from Bainbridge Island to destination. This does not include any responsibility for guarding personal property so long as civil authorities can maintain order. d) Enforcement and compliance with evacuation orders refer to the following: 1. Aliens failing to comply will be immediately apprehended and turned over to the Immigration Authorities for detention. 2. As to citizens failing to comply, warrants should be issued for their arrest for violation of the penal statute enacted this week by the Congress, making it a crime for failing to comply with the order of Commanding General in a military area.
4. The G-4 Division, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, is responsible for making the necessary arrangements for transportation from Bainbridge Island to point of destination.
5. Commanding General of the Northwest Sector is responsible for the collection of evacuees and their organization and movement transportation furnished by Headquarters of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army.

6. Direct communication by the Commanding General Northwest Sector and Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army is authorized for the purpose of concluding any necessary arrangement.

7. Please acknowledge receipt of this memorandum and advise of action taken verbally, with confirmation in writing.

In the evacuation of Bainbridge Island and in all subsequent evacuations, the Federal Security Agency and the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco are authorized and directed to establish and employ the following procedure in handling the storage of household goods of evacuees:

1. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is charged with the responsibility of obtaining suitable storage space together with sufficient staff to handle the warehousing of the household goods.
2. The Federal Reserve Bank is charged with responsibility of arranging in any way that it sees fit for the guarding of such warehouses and of any property not warehoused, pending its liquidation.
3. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco is charged with the responsibility of entering into contracts for the removal of household goods to be stored to the warehouse.
4. The Federal Security Agency is charged with the responsibility of registering evacuees when they appear at the Civil Control Office. Each evacuee will be provided with a number for identification purposes.
5. The Federal Security Agency is charged with the responsibility of obtaining from the evacuee a list of the household effects which he desires to have stored. The number assigned to the evacuee should be placed upon this list and the list should be delivered to the representative of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco present in the Civil Control Office.
6. The Federal Security Agency is charged with the responsibility of delivering to the evacuee identification tags to be placed upon his household goods. Each tag shall bear the number assigned to the evacuee.
7. The Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, after using the list of household goods furnished by the Federal Security Agency in moving the furniture into storage, shall deliver that list to the

representative of the War Relocation Authority present in the Civil Control Office.

8. The War Relocation Authority will be charged with the responsibility of moving such household effects from storage to the resettlement area in which the evacuee is ultimately established.

MEMORANDUM

1. Two areas in the vicinity of Terminal Island, Los Angeles County, California, will be evacuated of all Japanese persons, both alien and non-alien, during the period of March 31, 1942 to April 5, 1942.

2. The Federal Security Agency will be responsible for the establishment and administration of a civil control station within each of the designated areas. The FSA is authorized to call upon the Office of Emergency Management and other agencies as may be necessary to facilitate organization of these stations.

3. All agencies concerned will contact the Los Angeles representative of the Federal Security Agency for additional information on matters pertaining to the evacuation.

4. The exclusion order will be dated Monday, March 30, 1942, and will direct that evacuation be completed by noon, Sunday, April 5, 1942. A responsible member of each family, and each individual living alone, affected by the order, will report to the proper Civil Control Station mentioned in paragraph 2 above, between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M., either Tuesday, March 31 or Wednesday, April 1, 1942.

5. Evacuation to Assembly Center at Santa Anita will be accomplished as follows:

Friday, April 3, 1942 - 500 from each Civil Control Station
Saturday, April 4, 1942 - 500 " " " " "
Sunday, April 5, 1942 - remainder of evacuees in affected areas.

6. It is contemplated that approximately 3,000 persons will be evacuated pursuant to the foregoing.

7. Medical examinations will be conducted at the Assembly Center at Santa Anita. A medical officer from the U. S. Public Health Service, however, will be available at each Civil Control Station during the period of registration and evacuation to attend invalid and other exceptional cases.

8. Evacuees will be permitted to proceed to the assembly area by private automobile in supervised groups. Provision will be made to completely register such automobiles at the Civil Control Station, including all data necessary for a possible subsequent transfer of title. Parking facilities with appropriate guards will be provided at the Assembly Center by agencies concerned where such vehicles will be immobilized.

MEMORANDUM.

1. The family groups and individuals as described in Exclusion Order No. 3, this headquarters, dated March 30, 1942, will be evacuated from their present abodes and transported to the Manzanar Reception Center during the period March 30, 1942 - April 2, 1942.
2. The Federal Security Agency will be responsible for the organization and administration of a Civil Control Station at 707 South Spring Street, Los Angeles, California, for the purpose of processing the evacuees. The FSA is authorized to call upon the office of Emergency Management and other agencies as may be needed to establish this station, and will deal directly with those so contacted.
3. The order effecting this evacuation will direct that processing of evacuees will start at 8:00 A.M., Monday, March 30, 1942, and that all persons evacuated under the provisions of the order will be excluded from Military Area No. 1 after 12 o'clock noon, P.W.T., April 2, 1942.
4. Movement of the evacuees to the Manzanar Reception Center will be accomplished as follows:

Wednesday, April 1, 1942 - 1000 evacuees
Thursday, April 2, 1942 - Remainder of evacuees
affected by the order.
5. Approximately 2000 persons will be evacuated pursuant to the foregoing.
6. Medical examinations will be given all evacuees, before their departure for the reception center, under the supervision of the U.S. Public Health Service.
7. Private transportation to the reception center will not be utilized. All evacuees will be transported to the Manzanar Reception Center as scheduled in paragraph 4 above, and will be furnished a box lunch for the noon meal enroute.
8. Any evacuee, unable to obtain transportation to the starting point on the day of departure for the reception center, will be furnished at the time of processing at the Civil Control Station, a street

car ticket to be used for such transportation.

9. For any additional information relative to this memorandum apply to Evacuation Operations Division, Planning Unit, Room 470, Hotel Whitcomb, San Francisco, California, Phone KLondike 2-2611.

MEMORANDUM: EVACUATION PROJECT NO. 4.

1. All Japanese persons, both alien and non-alien, in an area in San Diego County, California, including the entire City of San Diego, will be evacuated to the Manzanar Reception Center during the period April 2, 1942 - April 8, 1942.

2. The Federal Security Agency will be responsible for the establishment, organization and administration of a Civil Control Station in the area to be evacuated, for the purpose of processing those persons to be evacuated from that area. The Federal Security Agency will deal directly with the Office of Emergency Management, and other agencies as may be needed in the establishment and operation of this station.

3. Civilian Exclusion Order No. 4 will provide for the evacuation. This order will direct evacuees concerned to report to the Civil Control Station for processing between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. on April 2 and 3, 1942, and that all persons evacuated under the provisions of the order will be excluded from Military Area No. 1, after 12:00 o'clock noon, P.W.T., April 8, 1942.

4. Approximately 1000 persons will be evacuated in this movement. The actual transportation of these evacuees to the Manzanar Reception Center will be accomplished primarily by rail on Wednesday, April 8, 1942. Private transportation to the reception center will not be utilized. Travel to the reception center should be performed during daylight hours if practicable and should be completed prior to 4:00 P.M. on the day of travel. The Federal Security Agency will provide appropriate social welfare services and medical aid for and during the movement.

5. All evacuees in this movement will be furnished a noon-day meal while enroute to the reception center. In order to permit the making of proper arrangements by the army procuring authority, for the serving of suitable meals, bearing in mind the number of infants and children to be included in the movement, the representative of the Federal Security Agency at the Civil Control Station will inform the Quartermaster, Presidio of San Francisco, by telephone, (San Francisco, West 6111 - Local 2240), at least 24 hours prior to travel, of the total number of evacuees to be

furnished meals, with a specific statement as to the number of infants and children included in that total.

6. Medical examinations will be given all evacuees, before their departure for the reception center, under the supervision of the U. S. Public Health Service.

7. Distribution of this memorandum is made to the Special Agent in Charge, Federal Bureau of Investigation, San Francisco Office (Mr. Nat L. Pieper). It is requested that he notify all other Special Agents in Charge concerned, with the request that state and local police be informed as promptly as practicable by them.

1. All Japanese persons, both alien and non-alien, in the area generally along the western and northern San Francisco waterfront, will be evacuated to the Manzanar Reception Center during the period April 2, 1942 to April 7, 1942.

2. The Federal Security Agency will be responsible for the establishment, organization and administration of a Civil Control Station at 1701 Van Ness Avenue, San Francisco, California, for the purpose of processing those persons to be evacuated from that area. The Federal Security Agency will deal directly with the Office of Emergency Management, and other agencies as may be needed in the establishment and operation of this station.

3. Civilian Exclusion Order No. 5 will provide for the evacuation. This order will direct evacuees concerned to report to the Civil Control Station for processing between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 p.m. on April 2 and 3, 1942, and that all persons evacuated under the provisions of the order will be excluded from Military Area No. 1 after 12:00 o'clock, Noon, Pacific War Time, April 7, 1942.

4. Approximately 1000 persons will be evacuated in this movement. The actual transportation of these evacuees to the Manzanar Reception Center will be accomplished primarily by rail on Tuesday, April 7, 1942. Private transportation to the reception center will not be utilized. Travel to the reception center should be performed during the daylight hours, if practicable, and should be completed prior to 4:00 p.m. on the day of travel. The Federal Security Agency will provide appropriate social welfare services and medical aid for and during the movement.

5. All evacuees in this movement will be furnished a noon-day meal while enroute to the reception center. In order to permit the making of proper arrangements by the Army procuring authority for the serving of suitable meals, bearing in mind the number of infants and children to be included in the movement, the representative of the Federal Security Agency at the Civil Control Station will inform the Quartermaster, Presidio of San Francisco, by telephone (San Francisco, WEst-6111, local 2240) at least 24 hours prior to travel, of the total number of evacuees to be furnished meals, with a specific statement as to the number of infants and children included in that total.



1. It is planned to evacuate to the Santa Anita Assembly Center, during the period April 7-14, 1942, all persons of Japanese ancestry, both aliens and non-aliens, who reside within the limits of two (2) areas in Los Angeles County, State of California, described as follows:

(a) Restricted Area No. 1

All that portion of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, lying generally south of the east-west line established by Manchester Avenue, and Manchester Avenue extended, and lying generally west of the north-south line established by Western Avenue, excepting therefrom all that area from which persons of Japanese ancestry, both aliens and non-aliens have been excluded heretofore by order of this Headquarters.

(b) Restricted Area No. 2

All that portion of the County of Los Angeles, State of California bounded on the south by Artesia Street, on the southeast and east by the Los Angeles County boundary line, on the north by Whittier Boulevard, and on the west by Atlantic Boulevard.

2. Approximately 2,500 persons involved in this evacuation, will be transported in accordance with the following tentative schedule:

Monday April 13, 1942 - 625 from each area.

Tuesday April 14, 1942 - 625 from each area.

3. For the purpose of processing evacuees, the Federal Security Agency will establish, organize, and operate a Civil Control Station in each of the above areas located at:

Restricted Area No. 1

4311 - 147th Street
Los Angeles (Lawndale), Calif.

Restricted Area No. 2

112 So. Paramount Blvd.
Downey, California

4. The Federal Security Agency is authorized to deal directly with the office of Emergency Management and other Federal agencies as may be needed in the establishment and operation of these stations, and the civil agencies serving same will in addition to their prescribed functions, be prepared to assist the Commanding General, Southern California Sector in his general supervision over evacuation in that sector.


5. Civilian Exclusion Order No. 6, this Headquarters, with accompanying instructions, will provide for the evacuation. A responsible member of each family, and each individual living alone affected by the order, will be directed to report to the proper Civil Control Station for processing between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. on April 8, 1942, or between the same hours on April 9, 1942. M. and 5:00 P.M. on Monday, April 27, 1942, or between the same hours on Tuesday, April 28, 1942. The order will direct that all persons of Japanese ancestry, both alien and non-alien, affected by such order, will be excluded from Military Area No. 1 from and after 12 o'clock Noon, P.W.T., Sunday, May 3, 1942.

6. Medical examinations will be conducted at the Turlock Assembly Center after arrival of evacuees. Medical aid for and during the processing, and for and during travel, will be provided by the Federal Security Agency. A Physician will be available at the Civil Control Station during the period of registration and processing to attend invalid and other exceptional cases.

7. Under this project, evacuees will be permitted to use their private automobiles in supervised groups, as transportation to the Turlock Assembly Center. All such private Automobiles will first have been registered with the representatives of

SUBJECT: Transfer of Japanese from Wartime Civil Control
Administration Assembly Centers to War Relocation
Authority Relocation Centers.

TO: All Sector Commanders.

1. The following instructions will be used as a guide for the movement of Japanese evacuees from the Assembly Centers in which they are now located to War Relocation Centers.

2. Letter, this headquarters, May 23, 1942, subject as above, to the Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, copy of which is inclosed herewith, directs that arrangements be made for such movements. The details of each movement will be prescribed in a numbered Transfer Order which will set forth the date, approximate number of evacuees to be moved, the Assembly Center involved and the destination.

3. In connection with these movements the Sector Commander concerned will furnish such military personnel as may be necessary in connection with the transportation of the evacuees. This personnel will include a Sector Transportation Officer, Train Commander, and sufficient military personnel to insure the safe conduct of the evacuees from the Assembly Center to the Relocation Center.

4. The rail or bus transportation necessary to move the evacuees and baggage under the provisions of each Transfer Order will be arranged for by the Rail Transportation Officer, Fourth Army in accordance with requests forwarded to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, by the Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division, Western Defense Command and Fourth Army. Close liaison will be maintained between the Sector Transportation Officer and the Rail Transportation Officer, Fourth Army, to insure in advance that an adequate amount of rail or bus equipment will be on hand at the time of each projected movement. The Sector Transportation Officer will, when so requested by the Rail Transportation Officer, Fourth Army, arrange locally for the required rail or bus equipment. In cases where it is necessary to move individuals by ambulance, such transportation will be provided by the United States Public Health Service. In no instance will an evacuee be permitted to travel from an Assembly Center to a Relocation Center in his or her own conveyance.

5. The United States Public Health Service will select the doctors and nurses to accompany train or bus movement as medical attendants, and

will forward the names of such attendants, other than evacuees, in writing to the Transportation Officer, Evacuation Operations Division, Wartime Civil Control Administration, so as to arrive thereat not less than forty-eight hours prior to each movement. If return transportation to the Assembly Center is desired for medical attendants, such fact will be definitely stated in the case of each person concerned.

6. It is contemplated that approximately 500 evacuees will be moved each day under the provisions of each Transfer Order and that once started, movement will continue on successive days until the Assembly Center has been cleared of evacuees. In each instance, however, a small group of evacuees will remain behind for the purpose of closing the Assembly Center.

7. All movements will be coordinated between the Rail Transportation Officer, Fourth Army, and the Sector Transportation Officer concerned, so that evacuees will arrive at their destination as early in the day as is practicable in order to insure proper settlement in the Relocation Center prior to darkness. Sector Commanders will designate specifically a train Commander for each train transporting evacuees from an Assembly Center in his sector to a War Relocation Center. Similarly, an Officer in Charge will be specifically designated for all bus movements. In general, bus movements will not extend over a period of more than ten hours, and all buses in each movement will be directed to make rest stops approximately every two hours at suitable locations where toilet facilities are available.

8. When more than two meals are required en route between an Assembly Center and a War Relocation Center, dining cars will be included in the train equipment by the Rail Transportation Officer, Fourth Army, and all meals will be served therein. For those moves involving only one or two meals, lunches will be provided for the evacuees by the manager of the Assembly Center concerned.

9. In each movement the evacuees will be permitted to take with them, on the same train, only such personal effects and bedding as will be required by them en route or immediately upon arrival at the Relocation Center. Two baggage cars, each of approximately 3000 cubic feet capacity, will be provided for each train of 500 evacuees and the amount of personal effects must be limited to that which can be transported in these two cars.

10. Excess baggage, as reported in paragraph 14 d. below, will be sent to the Relocation Center by freight. Assembly Center managers will be responsible that all baggage is properly tagged, suitably packaged, and ready for shipment at the proper time. In any case where crating is necessary, the Center managers will see that it is properly accomplished. All excess baggage will be released to the common carriers by the Assembly Center managers at the lowest released valuation. When practicable, these freight movements will be by van, but whether by van or rail, the Center managers must furnish the necessary details for loading each conveyance.

11. Sector Commanders will inform other Sector Commanders concerned whenever the routes of a movement of evacuees from their sector to a War Relocation Center requires the crossing of, or movement into another sector. This action is designed to obviate tactical complications and the possibility of rail or highway congestion.

12. The Assembly Center manager concerned will prepare, in quadruplicate, a list of all evacuees to depart on a given train. Each individual on the list will be indicated by name and family case number assigned at the Civil Control Station and indicated on the Social Data Registration form. At the bottom of each train list there will be a form substantially as follows:

"I acknowledge that all evacuees listed above entrained
on _____, 1942, at _____ M.

Assembly Center Manager

Train Commander

I acknowledge that all of the evacuees listed above arrived
at _____ Relocation Center _____, 1942, at _____ M.

War Relocation Center Director

Train Commander

13. Each evacuee will be checked into the train. The Train Commander and the Assembly Center manager will each sign the appropriate form on all four copies of each train list, and three copies will be retained by the Train Commander. Upon arrival at the destination the Train Commander and the director of the Relocation Center will check the evacuees into the Relocation Center. The Relocation Center director and the Train Commander will then execute the appropriate form on each copy of the train list and one copy of each train list will be delivered to the Relocation Center director. The original of such list duly endorsed as noted above will be forwarded by the Sector Commander to the Wartime Civil Control Administration, 1231 Market Street, San Francisco, California, within seventy-two hours after the arrival of the evacuees concerned at the Relocation Center. The remaining copy will be retained by the Sector Commander.

14. The Assembly Center manager concerned will make the following reports by the most expeditious means to the Wartime Civil Control Administration, 1231 Market Street, San Francisco, California, so that each such report will arrive thereat not later than the time indicated.


- a. At least three days prior to each departure date, a statement showing the number of full fares, half fares, and infants for whom transportation will be required for each day of movement. In this connection, children from five to twelve years of age inclusive will be counted as half fares. This count will not include those individuals reported under b. below.
- b. At least three days prior to each departure date, a statement showing the number of persons who, because of their age, state of health, physical condition or other reason, will require tourist sleeper accommodations. This information will be obtained from the United States Public Health Service, and will be finally supported by a certificate as described in paragraph 14 f. below. It is contemplated that such persons will be moved in a tourist sleeper attached to each train.
- c. At least three days in advance of each movement of evacuees from the Assembly Center, a statement to the effect that the amount of personal baggage to be carried by the evacuees on that train will not exceed that which can be transported in the two baggage cars provided under the provision of paragraph 9 above.
- d. At least three days prior to the initial movement under any Transfer Order, a statement as to the amount of freight, other than personal baggage referred to in c. above, that it will be necessary to transport on each day of movement. This report will indicate the daily cubic footage of freight involved. Conveyances for the transportation of freight will normally be spotted the day prior to each movement, however, where the shipments are not heavy, sufficient accommodations for several days may be spotted and loaded ahead of the scheduled movement of the evacuees.
- e. Upon departure of each group of evacuees, a statement indicating the exact number of evacuees who departed.
- f. Upon the departure of each group of evacuees, a certificate obtained from and signed by an officer of the United States Public Health Service, stating that the tourist sleeper accommodations as furnished were necessary, and listing the names of the evacuees so transported, together with the reasons therefor in each individual case.

15. At the time of departure, the Train Commander concerned will make the following reports by the most expeditious means to the Director of the Relocation Center at the destination:

- a. A statement showing the number of adults, children, and infants who actually departed from the Assembly Center. This report is made so that appropriate steps may be taken for the immediate unloading of baggage upon its arrival at the Relocation Center. In all cases of freight shipments this report will be made by the Assembly Center manager.

16. All units of the Wartime Civil Control Administration have been directed to conform to the applicable provisions of this communication.

TO: Assistant Chief of Staff, Civil Affairs Division,
Western Defense Command and Fourth Army

1. You are directed and authorized to make all necessary arrangements for transfer of evacuees from Assembly Centers under jurisdiction of this Headquarters to War Relocation Authority Relocation Centers at such time as facilities become available at relocation centers.

2. Citing this letter as authority, you are directed to issue such orders to agencies concerned as may be necessary to arrange for the directed transfers, including the transportation of evacuees and such evacuee impedimenta as they have in use at assembly centers.

3. In effecting the transfer of evacuees to relocation centers, you are authorized to call on Sector Commanders to furnish such military assistance, including escort, as may be necessary. Sector Commanders will determine the size of the escort.

4. You are further authorized to obligate such funds in an allotted status to this Headquarters as are necessary to effect the transfers directed above.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

This will reply to your letter of September 8, 1942 (File SD 390.1115A/1068) transmitting the request of the Japanese Government for information concerning whether since the commencement of hostilities the United States Government has protected needy Japanese in the United States, and inquiring particularly as to indemnity to those obliged to leave the military area on the West Coast.

All Japanese evacuated from West Coast military areas have been provided with food, housing, medical care, hospitalization, and clothing if necessary, since their removal. These items have been provided for both needy and others, without charge, except that Japanese voluntarily leaving relocation centers to accept employment on a temporary basis have been required to make a modest payment for the support of dependents left in these centers. Acceptance of such outside work has been completely voluntary.

No property of individuals has been confiscated. Consequently, no question of indemnity is involved. On the other hand, inasmuch as the Japanese are precluded by military orders from entering the West Coast Military areas and are consequently unable to handle their property personally, the Government has provided the service of managing property for them according to their instructions. Income from the lease, sale, or operation of property is deposited to their accounts or turned over to them for their use.

For your further information, in the early stages of the evacuation program the Federal Reserve Bank and the Farm Security Administration were in position to provide immediate services to protect the property interests of the Japanese. However, as the program has matured, and as an increasing number of Japanese have been moved from the Assembly Centers to the Relocation Centers, it has appeared desirable for the War Relocation Authority to take over the function of property management. Accordingly, we now have in our San Francisco office a division whose function it is to look after this property according to the instructions of the owners, to safeguard their interests, and to make the revenue therefrom subject to their order, either for current use or investment.

Should you desire further information concerning protection of interests of Japanese in the care of the War Relocation Authority we shall be glad to provide it.
