Teachers Please read first.

1. IT frequently come to my attention that teachers fail to read the bulletin to classes. All Core teachers must be certain to read the bulletin to all their classes. Other teacher should be sure that the pupils are aware of importance of their classes. A good deal of confusion presists because occasionally pupils donot know what has been announced.

2. I have received only 3 or four indications of where you wish to have your cabinets placed. It will be assumed that they should go where originally requested by me, unless I have orders today to the contrary in writting.

3. It will be the teachers responsibilty to un hook the safety door upon arriving at school and hook them at 5:0'clock. This is a routine, it seems, make a special effort to develope. Please make it a must be among the things for you tondo.

4. There will be no staff meeting Saturday or Monday.

Pupils


1. Fire doors or safety doors are to be used only for exit in case of emergency and never at all for entering a room. They should remain u unlocked all during the school day. They will be locked at 5'oclock and unlocked when the teacher arrives in the morning.

2. Until notice all pupils must bring a written exuse from home signed by a parent or guardain. For any absences even for one period this exused must be signed by the Code teacher and all other teacher whose classes were missed. All pupils who return after absences with out such exuses will be brought to the principals' office.

For absences of 3 days or nover a docters certificate is required in addition to the excuse by the parent, Docters certificate may be obtained by the hospital only this year since the dispensary is closed. This is requiredby the project health authorities. This is reasonable since nobody should be absence from classes unless they are ill and should be ill at long without contacting the hospital. If hospital is contacted then the certificate is easy to get. No-body is excussed from this requirement because of any belief they may have about illness. It is a social responsibility all must meet for the same of the health of the community.

Too many one period cuts are occurring. We are keeping a record of each pupils absence and pupils who persists in doing this will be dropped from the courses even if they have the exuse and will not

permit to enroll to other coureses. One cannot expect to receive credit for classes which they do not attend.



3. Library Regulation.

The Library will be opened Tuesday, September 7th. The following regulation are put into this year:

1. Books placed on reserve shelves behind the charging desk can be checked out for one period or for over night use. The fine for reserve books is five cents per period, 40 cents per day. This restriction is regidly enforced to protect pupils who plan to use reserve material at any certain period ofnthe day.
2. All books on open shelves out in the room can be checked out for seven days. The fine for such books when overdue is one cent per day.
3. The faculty conference room can be used by pupils only when arranged by the teacher.
4. Magazines and books are to be returned to shelves.
5. No pupil will be admitted to the library- study hall after the tardy bell rings without a written admit slip from his teacher.

The library is for students who wish to do library work. The social hall is provided for those who wish to talk, visit, knit, play games, or engage in any other activities be sides study. We do not intendto waste our library's time in getting after pupils who dont attempt to do anything at the library besides study quietly. It is to use and every pupil to observe this distinction and keep the library as an ideal place to study and to observe the very simple regulations listed above. If the librarian sees that students are not cooperating we will close the library until you can arrange to keep the right kind of order there. You have the social hall and you should use it. The library is for study only.

4. The dead line for enrolling in Hunt High School this semester is Monday, September 13th. Please tell your friends that unless they are here at this time they will not be permitted to enroll. There are only a few as far as we know. A letter will be sent to these but you might be able to keep the friend out of trouble.

ALL SPECIAL SUBJECT TEACHERS READ SUCH ITEMS TO THEIR CLASSES AS PERTAINED TO THOSE CLASSES.

2. We have been asked to give to the Outside Employment a list of boys who wish to work on the harvest outside of the project and whether they wish to go to the labor camp at Hazelton or at Paul. All Core teachers please get the names of such boys and their choice and have the list in the principal's office by the end of school Friday. Please get a similar list of girls without, however, any indication as to choice of labor camp.

PUPILS

1. Beginning on Monday of this week pupils began to propel rocks against the wall in the social hall. Even though they may have been striking the base board this can not be permitted. Therefore, the social hall has been closed until your student representatives can make arrangements to see that such thoughtless practices do not occur.

2. Passes to Twin Falls or other near by places will not be granted to high school students unless approved by the Core teacher and the Principal. Approval of these passes must be arranged in advance.

3. Excuses for all absences must be presented upon returning to classes. If we are to maintain suitable standards there are only three excuses which may be accepted. (1) illness of person involved, (2) a death in immediate family, (3) an absence arranged for in advance and approved by Core teacher and Principal.

In some states the third excuse is not permitted by law, therefore, we are being more lenient than we would have to be. All requests to tend to project business such as Leaves and Furloughs, the hospital and the like should be arranged for in advance at the high school and thus would come under this third classification. We are establishing these more exacting attendance rules to overcome the major weakness in our high school.

3. OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT DURING HARVEST

There was some discussion of this question, and Mr. Light telephoned to ask Mr. Beeson and Mr. Folsom to come to the meeting. Mr. Beeson came and answered questions. The following is a summary of the discussion and embodies Mr. Beeson's answers to questions.

The War Food Administration, the United States Employment Service, and the War Relocation Authority are the main agencies set up to ensure fair treatment all the way around. These agencies cooperate with the County Agent, who is the leader here.

Wages are set and plans made to provide fair pay for everyone in whatever circumstances he may work, but it is impossible to avoid some private bargaining. If an employer refuses to pay at the rate agreed upon, nothing can be done unless it is in writing.

As to employer-employee relationships, Mr. Beeson said that one of the worst things is starting on a job and then quitting without speaking to the employer. A worker should not quit without due cause and due notice. Young workers should be taught not to go to an employer and make a demand, but rather, to state their grievance and ask if an adjustment is possible. This should be done before the situation becomes unbearable.

Asked if the Government would back up the boys if a farmer refused to keep his contract, Mr. Beeson said: "I think the Government representatives will do their best; but generally there are two sides. Sometimes another man will offer a group more than they are receiving on a certain job, and they will quit without oneword of warning, even after a week's work. Then they are afraid to ask for their unpaid wages and come to me for help, saying, 'The Mexicans do the same thing.' From the standpoint of the Public, our people are not in the same position as the Mexicans. We are interested that our people do better. They have a great responsibility; their behavior definitely helps or hinders the Government in its relocation program. Every time something unpleasant occurs, public acceptance declines.

As to housing, Mr. Beeson said the camps are supervised. There may sometimes be overloading in some feature--showers or toilets. Eating houses are very strictly supervised.

Nursing service is available in the camps; when necessary, patients are taken to a doctor. Accidents while at work are covered by a cooperative, agricultural workers' insurance fund.

Mr. Beeson thinks that accidents will be few this year, as most of the work will be in potatoes, not beets. Acreage in beets this year is only 41% of what it was last. Any able-bodied person can work in potatoes and earn a very substantial wage, from \$6 to \$15 a day.

Mr. Beeson did not know whether there would be opportunities for work in the canneries, for instance at Caldwell. But in the seed houses at Hazelton, they want 100 women to sort seed, 55¢ an hour.

Last year there were men's camps, women's camps, and mixed camps. In the main, conduct was better in the mixed camps than in either of the other two. There was more social life and better supervision. Sometimes a group of girls chaperoned by one of their mothers will take a job. This makes an excellent arrangement, and we like to place such groups on farms. They work much better than boys and cooperate well in the division of wages.

Students should be led to feel that getting wages is secondary; that the first consideration is doing a fine job and helping supply needed food. It is important to let the War Food Administration know how much help we can supply. Mr. Light replied that his secretary is compiling lists now. Mr. Beeson said that 95% of the people now outside are getting along very well.

Asked as to the minimum age requirement, Mr. Beeson said that there is none. A boy or girl may go out to work with parents,

older brother or sister, close relative, or recognized guardian. He can go with even a sixteen-year-old brother. Mr. Light will give Mr. Beeson a list of workers with their ages.

Regarding the desire of some boys to work for their last year's employer, Mr. Beeson said that that would doubtless often be the case; officials will be glad to help them if they know the facts. He would prefer to see people go to the camp; then the farmers will come to the camp and face to face hire their workers. If people go to a farmer, it must be arranged before they leave here, because they will live in the farmer's house. People working in Burley will be housed at Paul. There will be absolutely no commuting. Mr. Beeson hopes that apartments here will be held for workers until harvest is over.

Students who do not wish to go outside to work in the harvest may work on the Project on a volunteer basis. The normal place for them is outside. No matter what difficulties they may face there, that is best.

LENGTH OF HARVEST VACATION

It was suggested that a minimum length of three weeks be set, with students "on call" after that, all to return to school at the same time. Mr. Beeson did not approve; said that it would necessitate a longer vacation, as 25% of the students would be needed for a longer time; it would result in keeping out people out of the best jobs. Mr. Light asked if we could get cooperation to keep the pupils from signing up for successive jobs and staying out indefinitely. Mr. Beeson replied that when the potatoes are finished, there will be enough labor to take care of the beets.

2. We can also take pride in the fact that approximately 300 Hunt High School students gave vital assistance in the harvesting of crops outside the project. We hope that you will bear in mind that except for such occasions as harvest vacation, the best possible way in which high school students can contribute to the winning of the war, and what is more important, to the winning of the peace afterward is by doing a first class job in school. It is up to each and everyone of us, faculty and students alike, to prepare ourselves to handle intelligently the many difficult problems there are before us. To do so in a democratic manner demands that every person considers all problems as his problems, that he be intelligently informed about them, and that he be ready to take action to help in their solution whenever the opportunity presents itself.

3. All changes in programs must originate with the core teacher. Such changes must be held to a minimum. If a student's schedule interferes with his present work assignment, he should indicate on the program change, those hours which must be kept free for work. It is important that the student follow his present program until notice of change is returned by the Guidance Office to the core teacher.

4. Students who were employed previously to harvest vacation and wish to resume their former jobs, should get guidance slips at the Guidance Office to take to the Placement Office, before being assigned.

5. Students who wish jobs should inform their core teachers of their interest. As soon as requisitions for workers are received, the core teachers will be notified so that they can refer students to the Guidance Office. Students are asked not to come to the Guidance Office asking for jobs. They should see their core teachers instead.

1. There is a great deal of 12" x 18" newsprint. If this is not used gradually, we will ultimately come to the point where we will have to use it exclusively and that will not be very pleasant. Please watch for opportunities to use this large size paper. It can be folded if you do not wish to cut it. It should not be wasted, however.

2. I wish to review the method of issuing grades recently adopted by the faculty. Report card blanks will be placed in the hands of the pupils on Wednesday of this week. On Thursday and Friday, the teachers in all classes will consult with each individual pupil during class time and enter his grade upon the blank which he will carry with him. (The grade, the number of days absent, and the teacher's name should all be written in their proper places.)

You may not get to all your pupils on Thursday. Those whom you miss on Thursday will keep their report card blanks and bring them back to you on Friday, at which time you should plan to complete the process.

3. Core teachers should issue the large envelopes for report cards. Additional envelopes may be obtained in the Principal's office.

4. Core teachers, please explain the report card process to all pupils. Report cards should be signed and returned by Tuesday, December 14.

5. Core teachers may recommend additional pupils to eat in our Dining Hall at noon. Teachers of vocational courses may do the same. They should be taken from those living in the five end blocks of the project, as was done originally.

Students:

1. There seems to be some misunderstanding concerning certain school rules. We have established just as few rules as possible and a moment will enable any student to see the necessity and value of those we do have.

Talking in the library

It should be clear that if all people talked in the library even a little bit, their noise would be far too great for effective work and study. The rule has always been, as it is in every library, there should be no talking that is not absolutely necessary for getting books or other library materials from the librarian. Student officers are not free to discuss school problems. No person is entitled in this crowded and difficult situation to discuss anything no matter how important it may seem.

Smoking on the school grounds

The faculty has discussed the question of smoking quite at length and has established the rule that smoking will not be permitted on the school ground. Some boys have declared that they know of no such rules. This has been discussed in previous bulletins and should be understood by all.

While we have no hope of preventing all boys or girls from smoking by this rule we wish to maintain that atmosphere in the school which will discourage this practice. Whether or not you yourself smoke, you should be willing to cooperate in maintaining the proper school atmosphere in this respect as well as

others.

While dictating this bulletin I received word that a still burning cigarette was found in the wast basket in the boys toilet. This illustrates the kind of carelessness that can result. Such carelessness is inexcusable for any reason.

Taking of equipment and supplies

Lately there has been difficulty in some classes because equipment and supplies have been taken from the rooms. There was even the danger that one course would have to be discontinued unless the equipment was replaced. Pencils, papers, compasses, protractors, paint brushes, paint, erasers, chalk and all the other things I have not named, are for the use of all of you and your teachers, in school only. War time changes make it difficult to get adequate supplies and equipment. Your cooperation is needed more even than ordinary in this respect. Do not be careless and walk out of the room with a drawing pencil in your hand and do not let others do so either.

2. The watch belonging to Mr. Cutkosky has not been found. A reward has been offered at equal to its cash value. Mr. Cutkosky attaches a very high sentimental value to it, however and is most anxious to have it returned.
3. The maintenance crew is replacing the broken panels in the dining hall and the painting crew has received its orders to paint the interior. This will make the interior of our dining hall and kitchen better than most any other in the project because of the lining it has. It is up to all of us to see that it remains in good condition.

1. The boys, with the help of Mr. Roth are attempting to organize a baseball team and perhaps track and other activities. As has been discussed many times before with various groups, this can be done here only if it has no influence on the school schedule or other aspects of the school organization.

This means that no pupil's program may be changed to enable him to play baseball or practice. This includes both changes of periods and changes of classes. If certain boys wish to play on the team, then the baseball squad shall arrange its practice periods so as to suit the present school schedule of these boys. This might mean that the team will have to practice after supper and on Saturdays. It might also mean that members of the squad will have to practice at different times during the week and all together on Saturdays or in the evenings. This does not mean that we do not like to have baseball teams or other teams. It does mean that we consider that other school activities are just as important as varsity athletics but we do not propose to have varsity athletics determined any part of the school schedule.

We consider also that Mr. Roth's time shall be devoted mainly to the Health and Physical Education Program and that his activities with the varsity program are secondary and shall be proportioned only according to the number of students involved in the varsity program. That is, if there are 60 boys on the varsity teams and the total of 600 in the school then only one tenths of his time shall be devoted to the boys on the varsity team. The fairness of this division should be apparent to all especially when it is recognized that the boys who are capable of making the varsity squad need this training less than do other boys who are less physically fit. Mr. Roth has discussed this policy with me and is in full agreement with it because he realizes the importance of emphasizing physical fitness for all.

2. The Student Council has passed the following resolutions which has been approved by the faculty (this approval of the faculty is called for by the Student Body Constitution which says that the Principal and the two faculty representatives have the power of veto and we choose to exercise this power only upon the basis of full faculty discussion and vote.)

A. Tardiness

1. That all students entering after the final ringing of the second bell will be considered tardy in all cases except the following:
 - a. When a student has been unavoidably detained and is able to present a legitimate written excuse.
 - b. That three unexcused tardinesses will result in one unexcused absence.

2. Absentism

a. That all absences without proper excuse from home or the Nurses Aide in charge will be considered unexcused.

b. That for each unexcused absence after the first three in each grading period, the pupil's grade shall be reduced one step; e.g., from A to A-; C+ to C or the like.

3. Right of Appeal

a. That any student has the right of appeal when he feels that he has been unjustly recorded absent or tardy.

b. That the teacher involved in each case shall have the final authority to make the individual adjustments.

3. Clubs

The Student Activities Committee has referred the question of the club schedule to the Council which has decided that the old schedule shall be reenstated. That is, school clubs will be divided into two groups which will meet on alternate weeks. This schedule will be published.

Group 1 clubs will meet tomorrow Tuesday, Apr. 4 and the period this time will be 8th period. The following clubs are in group 1 and will meet in the room designated; Thespians-5-AB; Chess Club-7-EF; Spanish-4-CD; Art-8-EF; Home Economics-1-EF.

Wednesday is open for the scheduling of student council meetings, committee meetings, class council meetings, and the like. All such meetings should be scheduled on this day. No exception will be made except at the special request of the faculty sponsor of the club, vlass, or other organization concerned.
