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THE CONSTITUTION OF TRI-STATE HIGH SCHOOL  
AS AMENDED JUNE 2, 1943

Preface

The student body government of the Tri-State High School is built upon the principles of democracy. This means that every student is considered an important part of the school community, is entitled to all the privileges in that community, and must assume all the responsibilities common to a citizen in a democratic organization. The student government itself is founded upon a constitution, drawn up by duly constituted representatives of students, and ratified by a majority of the voters. It is administered by popularly elected officers, and may be amended by democratic methods and procedures. In brief, it is meant to be a government in which every member of the school cooperates to the highest degree for the benefit of the greatest number.

Preamble

We, the students of Tri-State High School, in order to promote the welfare of the Student Body and the school, to provide a democratic organization for conducting student activities with proper regard for the legally constituted authority which we recognize, and to provide experience in civic affairs while directing student body activities, do ordain and establish this constitution for the Tule Lake War Relocation Project at Newell, California.

Article 1.--Name

- Section 1. This association shall be known as the Student Body of the Tri-State High School.
- Section 2. The adopted colors shall be Blue and Gold.
- Section 3. The symbol of the Student Body shall be a Golden Eagle.

Article 2.--Membership and Suffrage

- Section 1. All regularly enrolled students, teachers, and all members of the staff of this High School shall belong to the Student Body Organization.
- Section 2. Membership shall be of two (2) types:
1. Regular membership shall be extended to all regularly enrolled students who shall have all rights, duties, and privileges provided by this constitution.
  2. Honorary membership shall be extended to all teachers and administrators, members of the office staff, and custodians who shall have all rights, duties and privileges provided by this constitution except the right to vote.

Article 3.--Legislative and Executive Dept.

- Section 1. All legislative powers herein shall be vested in the Executive Committee of the Tri-State High School.



Section 2. All measures (except money raising and expending measures) may originate in the Executive Committee, from the Student Forum, from the Student Body, or from the administrative or teaching staff, and shall be considered passed upon receiving a majority vote of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. A majority of the membership of the Executive Committee shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

Section 4. The presiding officer of the Executive Committee shall be the president of the Student Body.

Section 5. The Executive Committee by a two-thirds ( $2/3$ ) vote, and with the approval of the Student Body Advisor, shall have power to formulate the by-laws necessary to carry out the provisions of this constitution.

Section 6. The Executive Committee shall have the power of making all rules and regulations necessary for the transaction of its business.

Section 7. The Executive Committee shall consist of the following: president of the Student Body, Boys' and girls' vice president of the Student Body, secretary of the Student Body, Commissioner of Finance, Commissioner of Publicity, Commissioner of Social Affairs, Commissioner of Publications, Commissioner of Music, Dramatics, and Debate, Commissioner of Boys' Affairs, Commissioner of Girls' Affairs, Commissioner of Cooperatives, and Head Yell Leader.

#### Article 4.--Liaison Department

Section 1. The Liaison Department shall be known as the Student Forum.

Section 2. The members of the Student Forum shall consist of the following: Boys' Vice-president who shall act as chairman, presidents of all classes, one representative from each Home Room, the assistant yell leaders, and one representative from each student organization so desiring representation.

Section 3. The powers and duties of the Student Forum shall be as follows:

1. It shall meet with the Executive Committee whenever legislation is in progress.

2. It shall act as an advisory and discussion group only, interpreting and representing student sentiment to the Executive Committee.

3. Its members shall represent their respective groups; shall report the actions of the Student Forum and the Executive Committee together with the reasons for such actions to their respective groups at the next meeting of the group. It shall declare the wishes of their respective groups to the Executive Committee in regard to all questions under consideration, and shall introduce in the Executive Committee such measures as the group or any member or members thereof desire them to.

4. The Student Forum should hold open meetings for the purpose of providing an all student discussion meeting whenever the need is felt, or if a petition is presented to the Student Body faculty advisor containing fifty (50) signatures.

5. If any member of the Student Forum fails to attend three (3) successive meetings, unless excused by the Faculty Advisor or the Principal, his office shall automatically be declared vacant and another member elected.



6. One-fourth of the members of the Student Forum may demand a meeting of the Executive Committee at any time.
7. One-fifth of the members of the Student Forum may demand a roll call vote of the Executive Committee at any time.
8. Prior to yearly elections, or in case of a mid-year vacancy, it shall be the responsibility of the Student Forum to see that all qualified persons are nominated for offices on the Executive Committee.

#### Article 5.--Judicial Dept.

- Section 1. The judicial department shall consist of a supreme court.
- Section 2. The supreme court shall consist of the Comm. of Boys' Affairs, Comm. of Girls' Affairs, Boys' vice-principal, Girls' vice-principal, and a chief justice appointed by the student body president.
- Section 3. The chief justice shall preside over the court.
- Section 4. The purposes of the supreme court shall be: (1) to interpret the constitution, and (2) to pass judgment upon student offenders.

#### Article 6.--Election of Officers

- Section 1. The following will be the procedure for the election of members of the Executive Committee.
- A. Any member of the student body who would be of senior standing during his term of office may become a candidate for an Executive Committee office by conforming to the following procedure:
1. He must obtain the written approval of a Qualifications Board which will consist of the Student Body president, Boys' vice-president, Girls' vice-president, Principal, Boys' vice-principal, Girls' vice-principal, and the Student Body advisor. To obtain this approval, he must submit to the Qualifications Board not later than the second day before the formal nomination the following:
    - (a) Two written recommendations from teachers in different departments for his candidacy.
    - (b) The written recommendation from the faculty advisor of the office for which he is a candidate.
    - (c) A petition issued by the principal's office and signed by not more than 75 nor less than 50 students who are members of the Student Body (who hold Student Body cards), each student listing his S.B. card number after his name. By issuing the petition form to the candidate, the principal's office certifies that the student is eligible for the office specified in the petition according to Article 1 of the By-laws of this constitution. No member of the Student Body may sign the nominating petition of more than one candidate for each office. It shall be the duty of the secretary to check for such duplications.
    - (d) A written statement from the advisor of the student body that he has successfully passed an examination on the Tri-State High School Constitution.



(e) In case of the Comm. of Cooperatives, he must present evidence of having satisfactory knowledge of "Co-operatives, their principles, and structures".

2. Make formal public announcement of his candidacy at least three (3) weeks before the election.

B. Any candidate who receives a majority of the votes cast for any office shall be declared elected to that office. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes, the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be candidates at a run-off election. After the run-off election, if a tie exists, some impartial method of chance, to be selected by the principal, will be used to determine the winner of the election.

C. Election of officers in the Executive Committee shall be held on Thursday, two weeks before the end of the school year. In case a run-off election is necessary, it shall be held on the Tuesday following the regular election.

D. All names shall be placed on the ballot in strictly alphabetical order under the respective office for which the person is candidate.

E. A vacancy in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee until such office can be properly filled by vote of the Student Body. A special election to fill such offices shall be called within two weeks after the office becomes vacant, unless a regular election is to be held within four weeks or the term of office expires in four weeks. In the above case, declaration of candidacy at least three days before election shall be sufficient to entitle said person's name to be placed on the ballot, provided that he has the approval of the Qualifications Board.

F. Person elected Head Yell Leader shall appoint two Assistant Yell Leaders.

G. The officers shall hold office for one school year unless removed for due cause.

Section 2. The following will be the procedure for the election of the Student Forum:

A. Class presidents shall be elected before the end of the school year preceeding the term of office.

B. Home room representatives and student organization representatives shall be elected by their respective groups within the first two weeks after school begins, and at the beginning of each quarter should members of the Home Room or administration of the student organization change.

C. The Assistant Yell Leaders will be appointed as prescribed in Article 6, Section I-F.

Section 3. Further procedure for election of officers shall be prescribed at a later date and added to the By-laws of this constitution.

Section 4. For the first general election after the ratification of this constitution, the phrases "end of the school year" and "beginning of the school year" will be interpreted to mean "end of first quarter, 1942 and "beginning of second quarter, 1942-43".

#### Article 7.--Finance Committee

Section 1. There shall be a standing committee known as the finance committee.



Section 2. The members of this committee shall be the Comm. of Finance, Boys' and Girls' vice-president, 2 students (one boy and one girl) appointed by the president of the Student Body with the approval of the Student Body Advisor, and the student body advisor.

Section 3. This committee shall have the power to make all rules necessary for the transaction of its business.

Section 4. The committee shall draw up and prepare a budget estimating the collection and disbursement of student body funds for the current school year and present such estimate to the Executive Committee for its approval.

Section 5. Any expenditure in addition to those provided for in the budget must first be approved by the Finance Committee and then approved by the Executive Committee.

#### Article 8.--Enumerated Rights

The rights of initiative, referendum, and recall shall be vested in the student body.

#### Article 9.--School Morale

Section 1. There shall be a rally committee.

Section 2. This committee shall consist of twenty boys known as the Tri V's, and twenty girls known as the Tri V-ette's.

Section 3. This committee shall be appointed by the Head Yell Leader, the Commissioner of Boys' Affairs, and the Commissioner of Girls' Affairs.

Section 4. The Head Yell Leader shall act as chairman of the rally committee, and the Commissioners of Boys' and Girls' Affairs shall act as sub-chairmen.

Section 5. The two assistant yell leaders will automatically be members of the rally committee.

Section 6. The duty of this committee shall be to assist the student administration in promoting matters of student morale.

Section 7. There shall be an honorary organization known as the Knights whose purpose will be to encourage student morale and school pride.

1. Membership in this organization will be based upon outstanding service to the school.

2. Honorary appointment to this organization will be made by the Qualifications Board once yearly.

3. Charter members of this organization are the members of the temporary Student Council which acted as the Student governing board before the ratification of this constitution.

#### Article 10.--Source of Power

As the principal is directly responsible for the welfare of the school, it is expressly understood that all student powers herein set forth are delegated by him and may be revoked at his request at any time. By virtue of his office he is an ex-officio member of all committees and shall be vested with veto power.



Article 11.--Amendment

Section 1. Proposed amendments to this constitution shall be made in writing and filed with the secretary of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Any amendment to become a part of this constitution must be passed by a two-thirds ( $\frac{2}{3}$ ) vote of the Executive Committee. It must then receive a majority vote of the student body and have the endorsement of the principal. The student body shall vote upon the amendment at a general election called for that purpose not sooner than one week nor more than two weeks after the passing of the amendment by the Executive Committee; unless a regular general election is scheduled within three weeks; in such case the proposed amendment shall be placed on the ballot at said election.

Article 12.--Ratification and Transition

Section 1. This constitution shall take effect immediately following its ratification.

Section 2. This constitution shall be declared ratified when approved by a majority vote at a student body election.

Article 13.--Faculty Advisors

Section 1. The faculty advisor for student body government shall be consulted in decisions, or questions pertaining to school affairs. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, and he (or his representative) shall be in attendance at all student government meetings.

Section 2. There shall be a faculty advisor appointed by the principal for each commissioner and for each class.

BY-LAWS TO THE STUDENT BODY CONSTITUTION

Article 1.--Qualifications

Section 1. The general qualifications for all offices designated in this constitution shall be as follows:

1. An individual will not be eligible if he is to be graduated during the term of office.
2. No person shall hold more than one office in the Student Government.
3. All offices shall be open to members of either sex, unless otherwise indicated.
4. The person shall have a scholastic standing of at least "C" average for the year preceding and during his term of office. (This qualification may in a special case be altered by the principal)
5. The person shall have passed an examination on the school constitution prior to the election.

Section 2. The specific qualifications for all offices designated in this constitution shall be as follows:

1. The president, vice-presidents, secretary, head yell leader, and all commissioners shall be seniors at the time of the beginning of their term of office.



2. No person shall be a candidate to the office of Head Yeli Leader until he has demonstrated his ability to the student body before the election.
3. In order to be Comm. of Publications, a person must have served on either a school paper or an annual for at least one year and have on file in the principal's office a written recommendation from the faculty advisor of publications. This Qualification may be amended according to a written request from the faculty advisor of Publications in specific cases.
4. A candidate for the office of Comm. of Social Affairs must have served on at least one social affairs committee previous to his candidacy and must have proved himself trustworthy and capable of carrying out the duties of such an office.
5. Each home room representative and student organization representative shall be a member of the group he represents.
6. A candidate for the office of Comm. of Boys' Affairs must have proven his ability of leadership and must have approval of Boys' Counselor as to his candidacy.
7. A candidate for office of Comm. of Girls' Affairs must have proven her ability of leadership and must have the approval of Girls' Counselor as to her candidacy.

## Article 2.--Duties of Officers

### Section 1. The powers and duties of the president shall be as follows:

1. He shall preside over all meetings of the Executive Committee and the Student Body.
2. He may call extraordinary meetings of the Executive Committee and shall notify all members of the committee of the call.
3. He shall vote in the Executive Committee in case of a tie.
4. He shall appoint, with the approval of the Executive Committee and the principal, all committees and officers not otherwise provided for.
5. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.
6. He shall perform such other duties as may become necessary or as may devolve upon him by virtue of his office.
7. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

### Section 2. The powers and duties of the Boys' vice-president shall be as follows:

1. He shall assume the powers and duties of the president in case of the president's absence or inability or, in case of the permanent vacancy of the office of president, shall become president.
2. He shall have general supervision of all elections. It shall be his privilege to appoint all committees necessary for the satisfactory performance of this duty.
3. He shall be a member of the finance committee.
4. He shall be the chairman of the Student Forum.
5. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.



Section 3. The powers and duties of the Girls' vice-president shall be as follows:

1. She shall act as school historian.
2. She shall be a member of the finance committee.
3. She shall act as official hostess for the school.
4. She shall act in a liaison capacity between the Student Body and the administrative and teaching staff at all social affairs.
5. She shall be responsible for all student announcements.
6. She shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of her term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in her department during her term of office.

Section 4. The powers and duties of the secretary shall be as follows:

1. He shall keep complete, accurate, and permanent written record of all proceedings of the meetings of the Executive Committee, the Student Forum, the finance committee and general assemblies of the student body. He shall file copies of this record with the principal, the comm. of finance, and the faculty advisor of the student body. He shall post a copy of this record in a conspicuous place before the first period of the third school day following each meeting.
2. He shall carry on all correspondence of the Student Body within the colony, and if the correspondence is to go outside the colony it must be with the consent of the principal and the signature of the Project Director.
3. He shall keep a file of all organizations, their charters, and their constitutions and shall keep the file up to date.
4. He shall keep the by-laws up to date.
5. He shall keep a roll call vote on all questions involving the expenditure of money and changes in the by-laws and shall place such vote in the minutes, including those which are posted.
6. He shall deliver the reports made by the officers of the preceding year to their successors, who shall file them in their portfolios for future reference.
7. He may appoint an assistant, but will be responsible for all acts of such an assistant.

Section 5. The duties and powers of the Comm. of Finance shall be as follows:

1. He shall be chairman of the Finance Committee and shall call meetings thereof.
2. He shall be ex-officio member of all committees in which finances are involved.
3. He shall help to compile a yearly budget, as outlined under Article 7, Section 4 of this Constitution.
4. He shall compile, with the assistance of the student body advisor, a monthly report on any student body activities in which money is involved, and present it to the Executive Committee.
5. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 6. The powers and duties of the Head Yell Leader shall be as follows:

1. He shall be chairman of the rally committee and shall call meetings thereof.
2. He shall, in conjunction with the Commissioners of Boys' and Girls' Affairs, appoint the members of the rally committee with the approval of the student council.



3. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 7. The powers and duties of the Comm. of Boys' Affairs shall be as follows:

1. He shall be president of the Boys' League and shall call meetings thereof.

2. He shall, in conjunction with the Head Yell Leader and the Comm. of Girls' Affairs, appoint the members of the rally committee with the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall serve as a sub-chairman of the rally committee.

3. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 8. The duties and powers of the Commissioner of Girls' Affairs shall be as follows:

1. She shall be president of the Girls' League and shall call meetings thereof.

2. She shall, in conjunction with the Head Yell Leader and the Comm. of Boys' Affairs, appoint the members of the rally committee with the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall serve as a sub-chairman of the rally committee.

3. She shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of her term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during her term of office.

Section 9. The duties and powers of the Comm. of Publicity shall be as follows:

1. He shall advertise and arrange for advertising all student activities and shall see that all advertising is properly coordinated.

2. He shall have the right to appoint such committees as he deems necessary to carry out his duties.

3. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 10. The duties and powers of the Comm. of Publications shall be as follows:

1. He shall be the editor of the school paper.

2. He shall have the right to appoint such committees as he deems necessary to carry out his duties.

3. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 11. The duties and powers of the Comm. of Music, Dramatics, and Debate shall be as follows:

1. He shall have charge of all student productions, and it shall be his duty to co-ordinate the work of all departments in arranging and giving them.

2. He shall have the right to appoint such assistants as he deems necessary to carry out his duties.

3. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.



Section 12. The powers and duties of the Comm. of Social Affairs shall be as follows:

1. He shall be chairman of the Social Affairs Committee and shall call meetings thereof. This committee shall consist of one representative from each class elected by that class, and the Comm. of Social Affairs.
2. He shall have charge of all social affairs sponsored by the student body.
3. He shall have the right to appoint such committees as he deems necessary to carry out his duties.
4. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 13. The powers and duties of the Comm. of Cooperatives shall be as follows:

1. He shall act as president of the Student Cooperative.
2. He shall call and conduct all meetings.
3. He shall coordinate all activities for the smooth running of the store.
4. He shall act as an ex-officio member of all committees.
5. He shall work with other directors for the most efficient running of the organization.
6. He shall perform such other duties as shall be deemed necessary by the Board of Directors.
7. He shall file with the secretary a written report at the end of his term containing a complete account of the activities undertaken in his department during his term of office.

Section 14. The Home Room Representatives and the Student Organization representatives shall represent their respective groups on the Student Forum, shall report the actions of the Student Forum and the Executive Committee together with the reasons for such actions to their respective groups on the following day, shall declare the wishes of their respective groups in the Student Forum in regard to questions under consideration, and shall introduce in the Student Forum such measures as their groups or any member or members thereof desire them to.

Section 15. Any and all of the officers listed above shall perform such additional duties as are delegated to them by the Executive Committee.

### Article 3.--Executive Committee

Section 1. The rights, privileges, and duties of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

1. All members of the Executive Committee shall have equal voting rights unless this right is restricted by some other clause of the constitution.
2. If any member of the Executive Committee fails to attend three (3) successive meetings, unless excused by the faculty advisor or the principal, his office shall automatically be declared vacant and another member elected.
3. The Executive Committee shall hold meetings at least once a month while school is in session, at a time and place to be announced at least 24 hours before the meeting.



4. It shall have power to make all rules necessary for the transaction of its business and to elect out of its own membership any officers found necessary who are not already provided for.

5. The general duties of the Executive Committee shall be to promote the general welfare and usefulness of the student body and to serve as a clearinghouse for proposed improvements, suggestions and complaints.

Section 2. The Comm. of Boys' Affairs will be the president of the Boys' League. The organization of the Boys' League will be established at a later date. Such proposed organization will be prepared by the first Comm. of Boys' Affairs, approved by the Executive Committee and the faculty advisor, and added to the by-laws of the constitution.

Section 3. The Comm. of Girls' Affairs will be the president of the Girls' League. The organization of the Girls' League will be established at a later date. Such proposed organization will be prepared by the first Comm. of Girls' Affairs, approved by the Executive Committee and the faculty advisor, and added to the by-laws of the constitution.

#### Article 4.--Procedure for Initiative, Referendum, and Recall

Section 1. Upon petitions signed by fifteen percent of the official enrollment of the high school, a special election shall be called for a vote on the proposal contained in the initiative petitions.

Section 2. In case the student body does not approve of legislation passed by the Executive Committee or of legislation in the process of being passed, they may demand an election to decide the matter upon presenting petitions signed by fifteen per cent of the official enrollment of the high school.

Section 3. Should a student body officer's conduct in his office be such as to cause the general student body to question his fitness to hold office for the full term, a special election to determine the latter shall be called when twenty-five per cent of the official enrollment of the school petitions for the election. The recall shall be governed by the student body general election procedure.

#### Article 5.--Interpretation

No portion of this constitution shall in any way conflict with any other portion thereof.

#### Article 6.--Control of Finances

Section 1. Activity cards: Student activity cards shall be issued to members of the student body for the purpose of raising money for student activities.

1. Activity cards will be issued for one school year at the price of \$ .10.

2. For anyone who cannot afford the purchase of an activity card, he may obtain one by establishing his financial status with the Boys' or Girls' vice-principal, and earning the price of the card by working for the school.



3. Special arrangements may be made for the payment of the activity cards with the Boys' or Girls' vice-principal.

4. An activity card will entitle the holder to participate in student body activities without cost.

(a) Should the attendance of any student activity be limited, a "first come, first serve" policy will be followed. Student activity card holders will receive preference over non-activity card holders.

5. An activity card will entitle the holders to a subscription of the school paper.

Section 2. Should the student body treasury be low in funds, a charge may be made with activity card not to exceed an amount to cover actual expenditure for that activity.

Section 3. Any money raising activities concerning the teaching departments of the school, such as the drama or music departments, do not come under the jurisdiction of the Student Body.



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE TRI STATE CONSTITUTION

Article 6, Section 1, C which reads,

"Elections of officers in the Executive Committee shall be held on Thursday, 2 weeks before the end of the school year."

shall be changed to read,

"Elections of officers in the Executive Committee shall be held on Thursday, 2 weeks before the end of the semester."

Article 6, Section 1, G which reads,

"The officers shall hold office for one school year unless removed for due cause,

shall be changed to read,

"The officers shall hold office for one semester unless removed for due cause."

Arguments for:

1. It provides opportunities for other Senior students to take part in leadership training.
2. It gives the mid-term graduates a chance to be members of the Student Body Council.
3. One year term is too long a period for holding any kind of office.
4. New activities will be introduced with the new officers.

Arguments against:

1. It is not fair to officers who ran for office with the understanding of holding their offices for one school year, because they won't have the opportunity to show their ability in handling the activities which they have carefully planned for the school year.
2. The student body is just getting organized, and it would be an advantage to have trained student body officers instead of new ones.

minutes of Student Council

December 15, 1942

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Edward Yoshikawa.

The roll was taken, and the minutes were corrected and approved.

The class election was discussed.

Mr. Starmer stated that a new course, "Principles Of Leadership Training", would be offered next quarter. This course would be held one day and if necessary, two days a week during the fifth period. It is a requirement for the Executive Committee, and also the Student Forum. The Juniors are preferred for the course because they will run for offices next year.

Under new business, the Student Body election was discussed. Tom Dijk, Boys' Vice President, is in charge with Miss Hartwig, a Problem Of Democracy teacher, as the supervisor. The test for the nominees would be held on December 23, Wednesday, but it was decided to let it go until the beginning of the next quarter.

The nominations would be closed on Friday, December 18.

The coedession for the Jamboree was brought up, and George Hiroga is the chairman who is the representative from the Tri State High School.

A letter was to be sent to Mr. Wilder suggesting to have bulletins somewhere on 6615, where all official announcements would appear, by an unanimous vote of the Student Council because the majority of the students fail to hear the bulletin.

The initial legislative meeting of the Student Forum and the Executive Council of Tri-State High School was called to order by the student body President, Edward Yoshikawa.

Mr. Garret Starmer, advisor of the Executive Council explained the duties of the Student Forum and how it correlated with the Executive Council.

He announced that the patrol had selected "Tri-State Angels" as the name of the group and selected La Verne Kurahara as their Chief Commissioner. The duties, he stated, would be to enforce all laws made by the Executive Council, to check student passes, and to control traffic around the school grounds. The patrol composed of twenty boys and ten girls will go on duty beginning Monday morning, February 8. The formal vote for the approval by the Executive Council was unanimous.

The progress of the committee in charge of the "Hello Day" festivity was made by the chairman, Molly Yasutake. It was explained that the purpose of this event sponsored by the journalism class was to further student friendships. She announced that the Executive Council members and the class presidents and vice-presidents would work in conjunction with the class. The latter had been asked to select their respective symbols and colors for the name tags of the students. The committee chairmen were announced as follows: Tag Committee--Ellen Hasegawa, Mary Ito; Dance--Tom Tsugawa, Bob Hayashida; Talent show--class talent; Rally--Michiko Takahashi; Publicity--Marvin Uratsu. The formal vote of approval was unanimous.

Commissioner of Finance, Miyuki Inouye presented her finance report. She also announced that 1000 student activity cards would be ready for distribution next week and another 1000 the week following. The vote in accepting the terms as given was unanimous.

Girls' Vice-President, Peggy Yamamoto, reported that a hostess committee would soon be formed.

Commissioner of Social Affairs, Paul Ohmura, reported that a public address system obtained without charge had been secured for the proposed student body dance on February 19, but the dining



Commissioner of Girls' Affairs, Hisako Marahara announced that the plans for a Girls' League are being planned. She stated that the league possibly would be composed of members interested in various sport activities.

Chairman of the Scholarship Society, Andrew Sugiyama, reported that this society is being organized under the California Scholarship Federation. He announced that the application forms for prospective members would be planned soon.

A motion was made by the Boys' Vice-President, George Katagiri, that the defacing of walls and smoking on the school grounds during school hours be prohibited. Mr. Starmer stated that California laws state that no smoking is allowed on the school grounds at any time. The motion was restated by Paul Ohmura to state that the defacing of walls and smoking on the school grounds at any time would be prohibited. The motion was seconded and carried.

The meeting was turned over to Mr. Garret Starmer who emphasized that the student body must uphold its independent rights by carrying out or enforcing laws which the students make.

He announced that the members of the newly formed "Tri-State Angels" would be sworn into service Friday, February 12 at 4:30 P.M. in 901. He also stated that at that time, the government of the school would officially be presented to the student body councils by the principal, Mr. Floyd Wilder.

All business having been completed a motion was made to adjourn the meeting at 5:15 P.M.. The motion was seconded and carried.

April 5, 1943

The meeting was commenced with Miss Dickinson, head of public relations, giving her committee report for the open house which is tentatively scheduled for April 14. The following were suggestions submitted by her committee:

1. The student body take a part in the planning of the program.
2. Home rooms, but preferably English classes, should have each student write a letter home to his parents inviting them to the open house. The letter will be accompanied with his daily schedule so that the parent will know the whereabouts of his child at all times.
3. Officers of the Student Body Association act as guides and as interpreters, if necessary.
4. The program should include music and very short speeches. An introductory speech in Japanese was suggested.
5. Publicity and invitation through the Tulean Dispatch.
6. The suggestion was made that in non-spectacular classes, short simple sentences be written on the blackboard in both English and Japanese giving the aims and objectives of the class.
7. Club activities should in some way be represented-- demonstrations of their own, or participating in something in keeping with what they are doing.
8. Open house will begin about 7:00 or 7:30, ending about 9:00 or 9:30. There is no definite time on when it is to end.

It was moved and seconded that the above suggestions be accepted.

Suggestions for class room activities were:

1. Display of notebooks, scrapbooks, or any work done by the students.
2. A suggestion was made that diagnostic tests be exhibited, but a conclusion was reached that this was not the place for it.
3. Parents should receive a honest answer about their child's work.

The second part of the meeting was spent in discussing how room space and teachers can be saved. Mrs. Jaderquist suggested the possibility of core classes staying in one room until 12:00 without any interruption. The afternoon classes will be devoted to their electives; thus, the class will be leaving for their electives at the same time. The core room teachers will then be free to be assigned to study halls. This suggestion will be brought back to the core room teachers by Mrs. Ferguson.

Because of the shortage of assistant teachers, it was suggested that 7th and 8th grade teachers take over the P.E. for their



own group. In order to have an more effective program in P.E., it was suggested that we have games in which everyone can participate. Also, to have more calisthenics.

Due to the small number of students enrolled in clubs, it was decided that the 4th period will meet 5th period, and visa versa. Those not in a club will be dismissed to go home.

Mrs. Ferguson suggested that we add geography to next quarter's subject as very few students knew the geography of the U. S. This was unanimously accepted.

The Student Forum meeting of Tri-State High School was called to order by the Boys' Vice-President, George Katagiri.

Minutes of the previous Forum meeting and that of February 5, 1943 were read and approved.

Roll call was taken. Of the 105 members, 44 were accounted present.

The meeting was turned over to Mr. Starmer who stressed the importance of representation in the Forum meetings as this was the way in which the student body members were contacted. Additional announcements were made regarding future student body activities.

1. The carnival is definitely under way for Friday, April 23, with the clubs who are to handle the concessions receiving a 25% profit and the remaining 75% going toward the school annual fund.
2. A humorous lyric is to be printed in the student announcer each day for the purpose of building up enthusiasm for the carnival.
3. The proposed yearbook was described to contain the following:
  - (a). 20 pages of senior photos
  - (b). 20 pages of club, class, and campus shots
  - (c). 20 pages of informative reading materialThe orders are to be taken at the carnival.
4. Plans are also underway to promote exchange assemblies with schools in the outlying towns of Tulelake Project. Drama presentation, debate, and sport contests were some of those suggested.

He also announced that an open house for parents and friends is to be held during the evening of Wednesday, April 14 with all classes and clubs participating in the exhibits or demonstrations.

All representatives were urged to bring up any school problems which they desired.

Commissioner of Boys' Affairs, Conrad Kurahara, announced that the Boys' League would not be formed until next quarter as the present five times a week first aid program would conflict with the schedule until May. He also announced that a track meet would be held on or about the first of May.

Regarding the carnival dance, Mr. Starmer suggested that at present the wood shop of the new school buildings would be available and as an alternative three dining halls centered around block 66 may be secured through the Parent-Teachers' Association.

It was suggested by Mr. Starmer that the Leadership Training class submit a concession. Commissioner of Social Affairs, Paul Ohmura suggested a food concession at the dance. Mr. Starmer suggested that a movie short starring the members of the class can be produced with his camera. Members were asked to consider the suggestions.

The President announced that the election of the Girls' Vice President to succeed Peggy Yamamoto who is leaving the project would be conducted under the Boys' Vice-President, George Katagiri.

The approval of the student body on a proposed amendment will be made also.

A vote was taken among the Leadership Training class members as to the choice of Senior graduation announcements. The announcement receiving the highest vote was number 520.

All business having been completed the meeting was adjourned.

Chiz Ishida, dance bids chairman announced that 110 bids are to be sold. Commissioner of Social Affairs, Paul Ohmura stated that a hall near the school grounds would be secured.

The meeting was temporarily adjourned.

April 20, 1943

Vote was taken among the members of the Leadership Training class as to the choice of a band for the carnival. The 'Downbeats' was the result of the poll.

To organize a systematic carnival program, the president appointed Hisako Narahara to be the chairman.

Ruth Nishikawa, Concession Control Chairman stated that the deadline for the entries had been extended until Friday, April 23. She also announced that the number of concessions number approximately 45.

Chizuko Ishida was appointed by the president, to fulfill the duties of the Girls' Vice-president until the election date, April 30.

Mr. Starmer suggested to the Finance Commissioner that the bank account should be open at the Bank of America, under the Student Body and not under the individual classes at the present time.

The program of the Kanaka costume day was discussed and several suggestions were made. A motion was made by Roy Ota in that all student body members should at least wear a lei or other Hawaiian accessories in observing the costume day on April 30. The motion was seconded and carried.

It was suggested that a form of punishment with the Tri-State Angels as enforcers, be placed upon persons not observing the rule such as a jail sentence. The president appointed Roy Ota as the chairman of the committee to head the Costume Day program. Advance finance for the costume activities was requested by Roy Ota.

It was decided by the Leadership Training class that the members would sponsor a concession which would sell leis during the carnival. The president appointed Margaret Norimatsu in the planning of this concession.

The suggestion of filming a movie short of the Leadership Training class was dropped due to the lack of time.

April 21, 1943

Commissioner of Publicity, Hiroshi Nakanishi stated that the Girls' Drill team are to tour through the camp on April 30 with two members from each concessions.

Roy Ota announced that the enforcers who are to establish the ruling to student body members on wearing a costume or part of a Hawaiian costume on the costume day are to be LaVerne Kurahara and his Tri-State Angel posse. The chairman stated that he had appointed June Uyetake to make the badges for the enforcers. He also stated that the announcement of this observance would be made Monday in the Student Announcer.

Margaret Norimatsu announced that her initial committee meeting would be held on Thursday, April 22, in room 3-A.

Mr. Starmer stated that Mr. Ramey had suggested that coupons be used in the concessions instead of cash. It was explained that co-op script would not be accepted, thus the coupons may be bought prior to the date of the carnival with cash which will also make the handling of cash in the booths unnecessary.

Mr. Starmer also suggested that action be taken on the price control as some of the prices which the booths offered were much too high resulting in a possible loss of profit.

Rose Kinoshita was appointed by the president to look into the matter further.

Temporary Girls' Vice-president, Chizuko Ishida announced that the Executive Council and a committee of three boys and three girls are to serve on the host and hostess committee.

Roy Ota, chairman of the Kanaka Costume Day program requested that the judging of the prize costumes and the selection of the prizes be turned over to the program chairman, Hisako Narahara.

Commissioner of Finance, Miyuki Inouye requested that all officers submit the amount of money each officer would need for his work.

All business having been completed, the meeting was adjourned,

The Executive Council meeting of Tri-State High School was called to order by the president, Edward Yoshikawa.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Starnes urged everyone to emphasize the advertising of the carnival to the colonists as many concessions had been entered to facilitate everyone. He also announced that the Co-op is giving a discount on all purchases which are made through the project Co-op.

Program chairman, Hisako Harahara announced that the program of the day would commence at 2:00 P.M., Friday, April 30. She stated that the concessions are to be open to the public from 2:00 P.M. until 10:00 P.M. while the dance is to be held from 7:30 to 11:00 P.M. It was suggested by the president to publicize the program schedule and the sketch of the rooms to be used by the concession sponsors. Margaret Horimatsu, chairman of the lei committee announced that the 150 leis would be sold at 15 cents each.

After much discussion of whether to use coupons instead of cash, a vote was taken among the following alternatives:

1. the use of coupons only
2. the use of cash only
3. the use of cash and coupons

The majority vote was in favor of the coupon only system.

Ted Nakanishi was appointed by the president to be in charge of distributing the coupons to the student body.

The meeting was adjourned temporarily.

April 26, 1943  
1:15 P.M.

Nobie Kodama, editor of the yearbook reported that the staff is to plan a large year book if the tentative price is set at \$1.50.

Michiko Takahashi, Head Yell leader stated that 16 girls and one boy had submitted entries for membership in the rally committee.

Mr. Ramey suggested that in carrying out the coupon only system, it would lessen responsibility of handling money in the booths and selling the carnival coupons beforehand would stimulate the students into the carnival spirit. He suggested that 10,000 coupons, an average of 5 coupons per person in the student body, would be sufficient. If this amount is sold, there would be an intake of \$500, he stated. And he also stated that a charge of 90¢ would be made on each roll of coupons.

Boys' Vice-president, George Katagiri announced that two candidates are to be recognized for the office of Girls' Vice-president, namely, Connie Tamura, and Molly Yasutake.

The meeting was adjourned, temporarily.

Mobie Kodang, Commissioner of Publication announced that Molly Yasutake had been appointed to the position of the yearbook editor and Andrew Sugiyama as the associate editor.

All business having been completed, the meeting was adjourned.

2. Tentatively, the book is to be of a heavy cloth cover with a plastic bindings.

3. She emphasized that members who have interest and not necessarily experience are being urged to become staff members. Additional recommendations are to be made by the various teachers. The initial meeting of the interested group is to be held on Thursday, May 6, at room 4-B from 7:15 P.M.

4. It was also decided that a publicity chairman would be appointed to publicize the yearbook sale.

5. A business manager is to be appointed from each class to assist Miyuki Inouye, Business manager of the Yearbook. In this way, the sale of the yearbook would be more extensive.

6. If there should be a lack in funds, donations will be asked of the co-op and possibly the colonists.

7. In taking senior class pictures, the senior will be assessed 50¢ for two poses. In other words, a charge of 50¢ will be made to each senior who submits his picture to the annual. Additional assessments are to be made for more.

8. In regards to group pictures for the yearbook, she stated that no charge will be made to the individual in the group picture, however, the expense needed will be covered by persons who will buy additional pictures at 40¢ each.

9. It was announced that permission had been granted by Dr. Jacoby to take campus snap shots by Mr. Starmer and Riley O'Suga.

10. It was suggested by the council that the theme and the name of the initial annual should be correlated.

Commissioner of Finance, Miyuki Inouye, stated that thus far 213 annuals had been sold.

It was announced that there would be a executive council and student Forum meeting, Thursday, May 6, in 901 from 4:35 P.M. Mr. Starmer suggested that the following be brought up at the meeting.

Mr. Starmer stated that since student government meetings have been permitted to meet ~~ing~~, during the day the next Forum meeting can be called during the first period, the next meeting during the second period, and so on.

Hisako Narahara, chairman of the "Tolo Dance" which is tentatively set for May 21 stated that 100 bids are to be issued to holders of student body cards. After much discussion, it was suggested by the council members to admit holders of student body cards free of charge.

The Executive Council meeting of Tri-State High School was called to order by the president, Edward Yoshikawa.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

In order that the council members may be come acquainted with the plan of a proposed student co-op store, Mr. Noboru Honda, Information Director, and Mr. Ed Kitazumi, Ward IV Co-op leader were introduced by the president, to discuss the various problems regarding such a plan.

As the project co-op and Tri-State High School is not too familiar with the proposed plan Mr. Honda suggested that various periodicals and books should be read in a research as well as corresponding with Amache Senior high school group regarding details of their student co-op store. A brief resume of the questions and answers were as follows:

1. The amount of capital needed for established the store depends upon the membership.
2. The policy to be used would be the 'people's store or the 'sharing of profits'.
3. In Mr. Kitazumi's opinion he believed that the operation of the store would be of practical knowledge as well as a business enterprise.
4. To the question of what the opinion of the parent's would be in selling materials of luxury nature, Mr. Kitazumi stated that he could not represent their opinion fully, but he and Mr. Honda <sup>believe</sup> that only school supplies should be handled at the beginning and the materials of the luxury nature could be handled later, with the consent of the project co-op who would be responsible for the school co-op.
5. Mr. Honda stated that the profit received from goods sold to non-members would be returned to the student co-op. This profit could be placed in a reserve fund such as the education fund or used to cover income tax.
6. To the question of whether this reserve fund could be used in building up a capitalistic enterprise, in other words, would be used in establishing other organizations, Mr. Honda replied that if there should be such a case, that fund would be invested in co-op credit union.
7. Mr. Kitazumi suggested that the council should work in conjunction with the Education committee of the local co-op. He stated that if the council could decide on whether such an enterprise should be established, a research could be made with the help of the Mr. Nagai, who has been appointed to study this proposed plan, the Board of Directors, and the Education committee.
8. After much discussion, a motion was made by Miyuki Inouye to endeavor forming a student co-op store within the school. The motion was seconded and carried.
9. The president suggested that this project be under the commercial department of the high school. The suggestion was approved and Conrad Kurahara was appointed to act as the liason officer between the council and the department.

10. It was also suggested that the junior class members be given more responsibility as they would be the leaders for the following term.

For announcements, Michiko Takahashi, Head Yell Leader, reported that the rally assembly would be held on Friday, May 14 during the second period instead of Wednesday.

George Katagiri, Boys' Vice-president, announced that the Student Forum would meet for its monthly meeting on Thursday, May 13 at 701 during the second period.

Miyuki Inouye, Commissioner of Finance reported that 300 annuals had been sold as of this date.

In publicizing the year book theme contest it was suggested that a stunt showing the scale of the sale on a thermometer be displayed.

Meeting was temporarily adjourned.

May 12, 1943

Mr. Starmer made an announcement in regards to a student forum on the topic of "Why You and I are Still Here" at Recreation Hall 2508 on the evening of May 12, from 6:30 P.M. with Mrs. Marian Reith as the guest speaker.

Molly Yasutake was asked to preside at the Student Forum meeting due to the illness of the Boys' Vice-President, George Katagiri.

Commissioner of Publication, Nobie Kodama announced that a fee could not be placed upon non-members who wished to buy the "Tri-Stater" as requested by the school administration personnel. However, this policy will stimulate student body card sales, Mr. Starmer stated.

Proposed amendments of the constitution recommended by the Boys' Vice-president and Mr. Starmer were discussed, but was declared incomplete as yet.

George Katagiri also suggested that discipline be enforced by the Angels in the school assemblies.

The tentative program for the remaining term was read and discussed.

The meeting was temporarily adjourned.

Mr. Starmer stated that the constitution should be amended before the appointment of the Commissioner of Co-op pro-ter

In amending the constitution for this office, it was suggested that the qualifications be established by the present student co-op committee. Mr. Starmer stated that the foundation of the student cooperative enterprise should be set before the end of this term.

The joint Executive Council and Student Forum meeting was called to order by the student body president, Edward Yoshikawa.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The following commissioners' and committee reports were given:

I. Nobie Kodama, Commissioner of Publication

She announced that the paper this week would be distributed to the home room representatives at 7111-D. All were requested to bring an accurate list of those students possessing a student activity card.

All home room and club representatives were also asked to submit any news of their class or club activities. Junior high school members were especially urged to do so due to the insufficient amount of news from their department. More volunteers were requested to work on the senior edition of the Tri-Stater.

II. George Katagiri, Boys' Vice-president

Sample copies of the proposed amendments to the Tri-State H.S. constitution were distributed to all members present.

Each amendment was read and discussed. The following instructions were given regarding the method by which the vote would be held on June 2, 1943.

1. The school wide vote on the proposed amendments to the constitution would be held on Wednesday, June 2, during the second period.
2. The voting will be conducted in 'Indian Style' by the home room representatives.
3. However, before the voting, each representative is to read and discuss each amendment.
4. After the votes are tallied the home room number is to be placed at the top of the ballot sheet and the sheet is to be taken to room 3-A.

III. Conrad Kurshara, Commissioner of Boys' Affairs and chairman of the Student Co-op committee.

He reported that Tri-State High School would organize a student co-op store on the school campus. For this purpose a committee has been selected, he stated, with the following students as the members: John Kanda, senior, Mary Golshi, junior, Masako Okada, junior, and Miss Masako Manji as their advisor. Several meetings have been held he announced, with the project co-op representatives.

A commissioner of Co-op would be included in the next student body council, but for the remainder of the term a Commissioner of Co-op pro tem is to be appointed by the president.

In regards to the Boys' League, Conrad announced that the league had been formed with two representatives from each period class --one each for track and softball. Thus far the purpose of this club would be that of service for the Physical education department such as constructing high jump stiles or organizing baseball teams. The officers, he announced, are president, Commissioner of Boys' Affairs, Vice-president, Ted Tsukiji, and Secretary, George Goto. Meetings are to be held every Thursday after school in 17-B, he concluded.



He stressed that the numbers of the student body cards would be used in the drawing of the ten prizes tomorrow, so all are asked to bring their student activity cards in order to receive a prize.

VI. Miyuki Inoue, Commissioner of Finance

The pictures are to be taken by the Comart Studio of Klamath Falls instead of Mr. Frost. The senior pictures are to be taken commencing next Wednesday, June 2. The girls were requested to wear no makeup while the boys were asked to put on powder while the picture is being taken. The schedule is to be posted soon. She also announced that the yearbook name had been chosen to be the "Aquila" the Latin derivation of the word, eagle, and the "Guiding Eagle" as the theme of the book.

To David Katagiri's question, there is to be no fee for taking club pictures. All clubs registered at the school office are eligible to have their pictures in the yearbook. The executive council meeting of Tri-State High School was called to order by the president, Edward Yoshikawa.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and corrected. STUDENT ACTIVITIES MEETING

May 11, 1943

Mr. Starmer called the meeting to order and stated the main purpose of the meeting - to plan toward the establishment of a closer unity between the commissioners and their sponsors, and thus to departmentalize each commissioner's office for the purpose of increased and more efficient operation.

Suggestions for accomplishing this were called for.

Mrs. Jaderquist stressed the point that all ideas should be initiated by the students, the sponsors only to act as counsellor, general overseer and consultant.

Mr. Cheek felt that because that the commissioners are so inexperienced, they need the guidance of their teacher sponsor to the point of his being general manager. He believed the student management idea to be excellent in theory, but unsound in practice under the prevailing conditions.

This was admitted to be true in some cases because of the commissioner's lack of experience; however, it was agreed that the commissioners should be inspired, pushed, and in general made to take the responsibility and to assume the initiative.

Mr. Starmer stressed that the sponsor and commissioner should work evermore closely, forming a department with a staff of its own. He suggested that since the sponsor might be more easily found, communications to the commissioner regarding his department might be routed through the sponsor.

The idea was approved by the commissioners present at the meeting.

Being generally agreed that more cooperation is needed between commissioner and sponsor, it was moved, seconded, and carried that each commissioner should meet with his sponsor at least once a week during a specified period.

It was suggested that each sponsor have a copy of his commissioner's daily program so that he will know where to contact him at any time of day. Likewise the commissioner should know the schedule of his sponsor.

It was announced by Mr. Starmer that in order to plan any activity, the event would have to be approved by the administrative council at least one week in advance of the event. A calendar will be posted behind Miyo Narita's desk



where all approved events will be listed. Activities for which administrative permission is necessary will include any activity involving a room assignment, take school time, or affect the student body in any way. All other events should appear on the calendar as well to prevent conflicts. These non-permission events should be scheduled through Mr. Ramey.

It was announced that by administrative council decision every second Thursday of the month, second period will be scheduled a regular Student Forum meeting, and that every last Thursday of the month first period, there would be scheduled a regular combined meeting of the student executive committee and the Student Forum.

The fact that the announcer had not been always read by teachers was advanced by Mr. Starmer as being one possible reason for information not going to students.

It was decided that each sponsor and commissioner should together work out a program of all activities for the remainder of the quarter. One copy of this to be presented by the commissioner at the commissioner's meeting on Monday, June 17.

The <sup>the</sup> meeting was declared adjourned by the chairman.

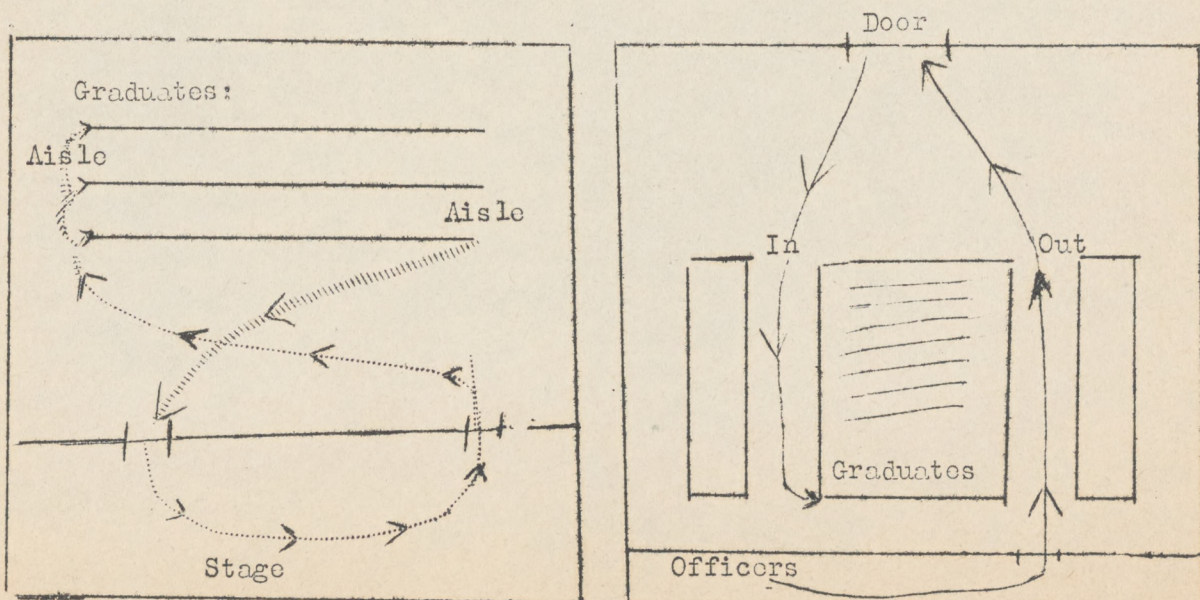

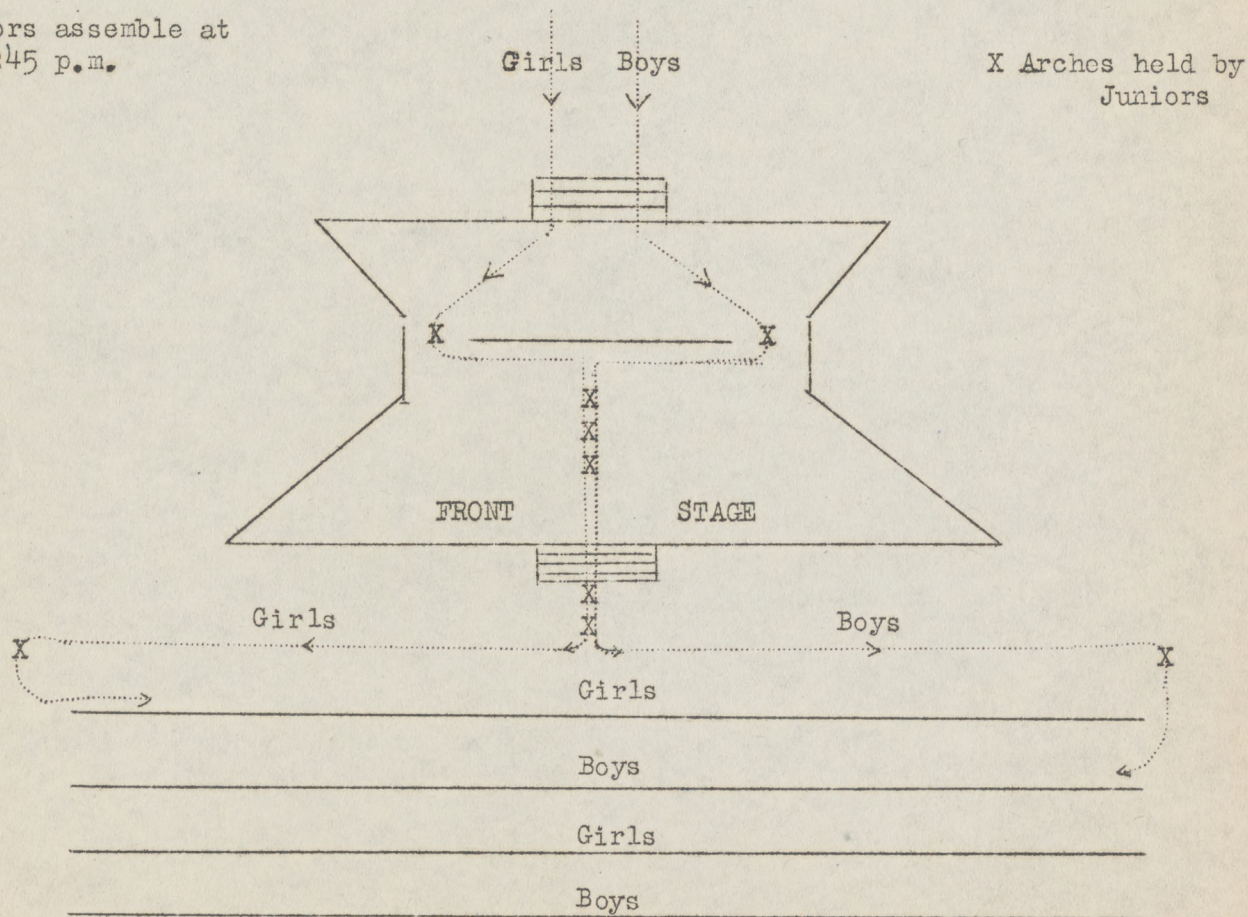

    - B. You should study the "Program of Studies" to decide which course you wish to follow, or if you have already begun a course, study the requirements for graduation.
      1. Check the courses on the program of studies that you have taken in another high school previously, with one check (✓).  
(If the course that you have taken has a different name than the one appearing on this program, yet the course description is the practically the same, check it anyway.)
      2. Print any course that you have taken and which does not appear on the program of study; under the year in which you earned the credit.
      3. Double check (✓✓) the course and subjects which you wish to take this year.
      4. Place zeros in front of the subjects you plan to take before you graduate, but not this year. Usually these will be included in the next year's program, but there may be exceptions. (Be sure to study the high school graduation requirements closely to make sure that you have met them.)
- Two programs should be made out, so you will have a permanent record for your handbook.
- III. With your program of studies and your handbook, proceed to the next room, where an instructor or an assistant teacher will check your program of study; (~~Be sure that you have followed directions for II above~~), answer questions, and fill in your schedule. (Boys will go to one side of the room and girls will go to the other side.)
- IV. After your schedule has been approved:  
    Boys will proceed to Mr. Walker's office for final approval of schedule.  
    Girls will proceed to Mrs. Jaderquist's office for final approval of schedule.
- V. You will proceed to the final checker, who will retain your schedule and one copy of your program of studies.
- VI. You have finished your first registration at Tule Lake Project High School, and should watch the "Tulean Dispatch" for the opening day of school.

## Article I Name

The name of this club shall be the Tri-State Thespians

## Article II----Object

Article 1  
Name

The name of this organization shall be known as the "Tri-State Hi-Y."

Article 2  
Purpose

The purpose of the Hi-Y will be to build the school morale, to be of service to the school and community, and to build high standards of character in line with the Hi-Y platform of clean living, clean speech, clean athletics, and clean scholarship.

Article 3  
Membership

Section 1. Any applicant must have at least two thirds vote of the members in order to be accepted.

Section 2. The membership fee shall be 25¢ semi-annually.

Section 3. At no time shall the membership of the club exceed 25 members.

Section 4. All members must register with the National Hi-Y Movement.

Section 5. All members must be of the senior and junior year with favorable scholarship.

Section 6. All applicants must present a recommendation signed by seven full-time teachers.

Section 7. The time and procedure for election of new members will be decided by the membership committee.

Section 8. In case of disorderly conduct or not abiding with the Hi-Y platform, a member may be excluded from the organization by a four-fifth (4/5) vote of the membership.

Article 4  
Officers

Section 1. Any regularly enrolled member may hold any office providing he will not graduate during his term of office.

Section 2. The officers shall be a president, vice president,

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secretary, treasurer, and parliamentarian.

Section 3. The officers and the chairman of committees shall compose the executive committee, which shall have general direction of the affairs of the organization.

Section 4. The leader shall be an ex-officio member and sit in at all meetings.

## Article 5 Duties of Officers

Section 1. The duties of the president shall be as follows:

- a. He shall preside over all regular and special business meetings.
- b. He shall appoint all committees that he deems necessary.
- c. He shall represent the organization at any time.
- d. He shall serve on the board of directors.
- e. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.
- f. He shall be chairman of the Service Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the vice-president.

- a. He shall preside over all meetings at which time the president is absent.
- b. If the office of president is vacated, the vice-president shall become president for the remainder of the term.
- c. He shall be the chairman of the program committee.

Section 3. The duties of the secretary:

- a. He shall record the minutes of all meetings and other activities.

## Article 6 Elections and Meetings

Section 1. The president shall appoint a nominating committee of three members, who, after consulting with the leader shall make and announce nominations for all officers not later than two weeks previous to the election. Two sets of high-grade nominations shall be presented for election.

Section 2. Other nominations may be made by the members by submitting to the nominating committee, one week before election, a petition signed by ten members.

Section 3. The election of officers shall be held by secret ballot at the semi-annual business meeting held the last meeting in December and June before graduation.

Section 4. Special meetings may be called by the president or on the written request of one third of the members.

Section 5. Three fifths of the membership shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. The responsibilities of the Board of Directors shall be the general supervision of all activities of this organization, and the preparing and forwarding of an annual report upon the request of the Area or International Headquarters of the Movement.
