November 12, 1943:

District Scouters meeting at Headquarters. Chairmen of District Committee chosen. Body approves Senior Scouts move to volunteer for work in the Sugar Beets. Reference: Minutes

November 13, 1943:

Cub Scouts of Troop 177C volunteer as runners in distributing notices for residents to call for their confiscated books and goods being returned from this Headquarters under supervision of the Report Office and the Police Department.

November 14, 1943:

Special District Scouters meeting with Executive Mr. Glinkman. Special guest present in the form of Mr. Brigham, former scout leader from another area. First orders for material and equipment placed with Mr. Glinkman. New troop numbers assigned and selected. Reference: Minutes

Nine Scouts of Troops 177 and 179 volunteer as runners in distributing notices for residents to call for their confiscated books and goods being returned from this Headquarters under supervision of the Report Office and the Police Department.

November 15, 1943:

Eleven Scouts and two leaders reported for work in the Beet Fields on Sunday morning. Disappointed to find no contractors in need of laborers. Boys compensated with a permit to leave the Center for a short hike to Granada.

November 16, 1943:

Terazo Ogata added to staff as quartermaster.

November 17, 1943:

Nine Scouts of Troops 177 and 180 volunteer, etc. (Refer above)

II. EXECUTIVE MEETS WITH SCOUT LEADERS

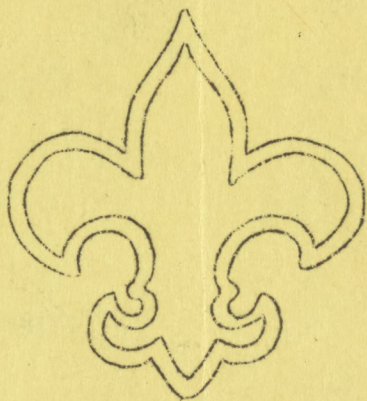



MANCOS CCC CAMP REPORT

It is my belief that the trip to Mancos was not only enjoyable but, at the same time, very educational to the Scouts who attended. It has left a deep impression upon them which will help build their character and morale more firmly during their stay here in the Center. Usually, such travel by truck over 500 miles of road is extremely tiresome but it seems to me that all the boys enjoyed the trip, due to the fact that they had spent such a long time in one place without any change or excitement of any sort.

We arrived about 7 p.m. the same day in Wolf Head Camp where we stayed overnight. Many of the older people could not sleep because of the cold but the Scouts slept well and felt rested the next morning. About 6 p.m. of the following day we arrived in Mancos. We looked over the CCC Camp where the work of tearing down buildings was the main reason for our making the trip. That night all the leaders gathered to discuss and make working arrangements so that the work would be done in an efficient manner.

The bugle sounded "Reveille" the next morning at 5:45 a.m., according to the rule we had made, but since the boys

were not accustomed to getting up so early we had a little trouble arousing them. After that first morning the boys were up right after the bugle sounded.

The second bugle call at 6:15 a.m. was the signal for the Scouts to assemble for the flag raising ceremony, which was held every morning. It was a most impressive and colorful sight to see every boy in uniform lined up in box formation around the camp flag pole stand, and standing at attention while the bugles echoed from mountain to mountain and across the surrounding camp as the flag was raised. I saw tears in the eyes of some of the Scouts, and never before had I, myself, experienced such deep emotion. It was not only inspiring to us but to the people of Mancos, many of whom came down to the camp to see what was going on, and who left with a deep impression regarding the ceremony. At 5:15 p.m. the group again gathered, and the flag was lowered. The ceremony of raising and lowering the flag was repeated every day during our stay in Mancos.

Since the National Park is closed all day Sunday, we decided to work all that day, and took Monday off to visit the famous Mesa Verde National Park. We divided the crew on to four trucks and started out at 6:30 a.m., arriving two hours later at the Park where the U. S. Officers are

stationed at the summit of the mountain. About 9 a.m., with one of the officers as guide, we started on a sight-seeing trip around the park. We saw such interesting sights as the ancient habitations of the Indians who used to live there, the Sun Temple, the Imperial Castle, and the relics preserved in the Museum in the park. The view of the park did not surprise us very much as we have seen many National Parks in California, but everyone took a great deal of interest in the buildings that the Indians had built themselves and lived there with their families many years ago. It seems to me that their ability to originate such houses without any tools or plans is very remarkable.

The museum had a wonderful collection of items but we did not have much time, and so were unable to inspect everything carefully and study them, even though I learned much that day concerning mankind's development.

Taking everything into consideration, everyone greatly enjoyed the trip to Mancos, Colorado and back. I feel that the trip was a fine experience for the Scouts from an educational viewpoint as well as building them up physically, and hope we may go again some time in the near future.

It is customary for the Committee on Advancement to delegate examinations in special subjects to men who, on account of expert knowledge, are especially fitted to conduct the test covering the technical points involved in the examination.

The purpose of these examinations is not to secure mere technical compliance with the requirements but rather to ascertain the Scout's general knowledge of the subject as a result of his own application and study. In other words, practical knowledge rather than mere book knowledge is what is desired.

It is not within the province of the Counselor to add or take away from the requirements for any test as stated in the HANDBOOK FOR BOYS.



SAFETY

To obtain this Merit Badge, a Scout must:

1. Submit evidence of having satisfactorily done one of the following:

(a) Made a safety inspection of his home and premises, listed conditions which might prove dangerous, and taken practical measures to remedy at least two such conditions; or

(b) Actively shared in the safety work in school over a period of at least ten weeks and at all times done his best by example and attitude to interest his schoolmates in safety activities; or

(c) Built cabinet for the safe and proper storage of medicines and poisons; or kitchen cabinet for storage of lye, "lysol," ammonia, etc.; or suitable play pen for the baby, stairs for children, or safety rail for cellar stairs with painted white stripes on lowest step; or built and filled sandbox for slippery walks; or recommended a needed safety device for home or Troop and when approved by Counselor, made such device. . .

2. Demonstrate how he would make himself visible while walking on the road at night; explain on which side of the road he should walk, day or night, and why.

3. Demonstrate with a modern gun:

(a) The direction in which he should point the muzzle when picking it up and tell why;*

(b) Other safety precautions which should always be taken to avoid accident when handling a gun or passing it to another person, and tell why. ✓

4. Demonstrate, with a full size axe, the correct way to carry it safely; ✓

(b) Demonstrate how to handle, carry, and store safely different kinds of farm tools such as scythe, sickle, and pitch fork, or sharp edged tools about the home or shop.

SAFETY
(cont'd)

5. Demonstrate (a) with another boy, what action he would take, and tell why, in the following situation:

Some children have been playing with fire; the clothing of one becomes ignited;

(b) With two other boys, method he would use, (1) with a 20-foot rope, and (2) with a board, to rescue a fourth boy who had broken through the ice;

(c) How he would save himself if he had broken through the ice, and there were no help in sight.

6. Submit and comment on newspaper accounts which he has gathered within a period of the past six months describing at least three different kinds of accidents due to any of the following causes: Hitch hiking; (b) stealing rides on automobiles or street cars; (c) Crossing streets or highway; (d) Reckless driving; (e) Failure to observe a traffic law.

7. Explain, in discussion with his Counselor, or dramatize with members of his Patrol; what he considers the main safety hazards involved in modern transportation, industry, recreation, and in the home, indicating general ways in which they should be met, including also ways for dealing with specific problems as:

(a) Escaping gas; (b) wire dangling from electric line; (c) safe storage and use of gasoline; (d) running engine in closed garage; (e) three ways of turning in fire alarm; citing best local method and giving exact location of nearest fire alarm to his home or place of employment; (f) appearance of blasting caps, their use, and precautions against untimely explosion.

*NOTE: This Requirement must be waived when it involves conflict with local or state law relating to ownership and use of firearms. In all other cases evidence must be produced that all practice and the test have been conducted under a range officer whose appointment has been approved by the Local or National Council. (This Requirement does not necessitate Scout's supplying gun.)

GIRL SCOUTS

1. Correspondence

Correspondence on organizing Girl Scout troops should be directed to the Field Division, Girl Scouts, Inc., 155 East 44th Street, New York, New York.

2. Organization

When a request is received a packet of organization material will then be sent. This packet includes the pamphlet, "How to Start a Girl Scout Troop," which the prospective leader should study carefully, and the proper forms for registering the leader, assistant leader, the troop committee members, and the girls themselves. We suggest the following steps for the organization of troops at the relocation centers:

1. That these troops follow the procedures outlined for the organization of lone Girl Scout troops in any community insofar as this is possible. (See "How to Start a Girl Scout Troop".)
2. That, as in a "lone troop" in other communities, a troop committee of from three to five adults who would be interested in helping the leaders in sharing with them the responsibility for the Girl Scout troop should be registered at national headquarters, this troop committee to be appointed or selected by the Chief of Community Services at the center. If possible, that the Chief of Community Services or one of his assistants serve as a member of the committee.
3. That this troop committee with the help of the Chief of Community Services secure leaders meeting our usual requirements: leaders should be over twenty-one years of age - assistant leaders over eighteen years of age - and be interested in working with girls between the ages of seven and eighteen. Separate troops are organized for the different age levels. (Brownie Scouts are from seven to nine years of age, Intermediate Girl Scouts from ten to fourteen, and Senior Girl Scouts from fifteen to eighteen.)
4. That the leader apply for a temporary commission as a Girl Scout leader. She does this by filling out the leader's application form supplied by Girl Scout national headquarters and forwarding it to Girl Scouts, Inc., with her fifty-cent membership fee. This application should bear the signature of the Chief of Community Services of the center, or his assistant, indicating approval of the selection.
5. That the leaders may meet with the Girl Scout troop but do not receive full commissions as leaders until after the troop registers.

3. Membership Dues

The leaders and girls will be expected to pay their membership fees of fifty cents each. (We understand that it may take from one to three months for the girls to collect their fifty-cent membership fees, but in the meantime the troop can continue to hold meetings.) Membership certificates will be sent to girls, leaders, and troop committee members when the whole group registers.

Because the leaders and Girl Scouts in these centers may have very little money to spend on literature and equipment, the national office will supply each center where there is a demand for Girl Scouting with a copy of the Correspondence Course for lone troop leaders. This course may be used by one or more leaders depending upon the number of troops. Headquarters will also supply the leaders with a copy of the Girl Scout Handbook for Brownie or Intermediate age and the Senior Girl Scout program pamphlet.

5. Direct Supervision and Assistance Available

The Field Division of Girl Scouts, Inc. maintains a counseling service for all "lone troops". Leaders of "lone troops" may write to this division for help and advice.

BOY SCOUTS

(An agreement between the Boy Scouts of America and the WRA has been in force since June 15, 1942. The following is taken from that agreement, rearranged, and supplemented to make it comparable to arrangements with other agencies.)

1. Correspondence

The Boy Scouts are prepared to assist Boy Scout troops which wish to organize within the projects. Correspondence should be addressed to Mr. Raymond O. Hanson, Regional Scout Executive, 437 South Hill Street, Los Angeles, California, in regard to troop organization and supervision.

The Boy Scouts provide programs for boys 12 years of age to about 18. A younger program includes also boys 9-12.

2. Organization

(A) Scouting in each War Relocation Project shall be organized and operated according to the District Plan, as set forth in the Local Council Constitution and By Laws, each project comprising one or more Districts of the Local Council in whose territory the same is located.

(B) The Local Council involved in each case shall give definite supervision to the District through a member of its staff or a special Field Commissioner, who will maintain contact with the District Commissioners and other Scouters. He shall also maintain contact with the Project Director, and the degree to which the various phases of the program may be carried out will be subject to the latter's approval, and the cooperation of the elective body charged with the responsibility for promotion of all types of activity within the Project.

(C) Transfers shall be arranged on the regular basis from Troops of which boys were formerly Scouts to Troops formed in the Projects in which they are now located.

3. Materials

4. Membership Dues

The annual membership dues are 50¢ a member and are sent in to the national headquarters when the troop registers.

The Troop Budget Plan should be urged as a basis of financing all new troops, with a view to solving the problem of boys who are unable to take care of their registration fees in full at one time, due to lack of opportunities for earning money.

5. Direct Supervision and Assistance

Requests for assistance should be sent in the first place to the regional office and then to the local council designated by the region to carry the responsibility.

The National Council will cooperate with the Local Councils assigned to supervise Scouting activities in War Relocation Projects, through its Inter-Racial Service and the Regional Staff.

At the time of Council visitations on the part of members of the Regional Staff, they shall give special attention to these Projects until they are in full operation.

Further plans for the promotion and conduct of Scouting activities in the War Relocation Projects are to be submitted to the Home Office for approval, as needs for more intensive and extensive development of the program may arise, or when special problems may develop in conferences between the Regional Offices and the War Relocation Authority.

2. Organization of Groups:

The Camp Fire is an organization prepared to organize clubs of six to twenty girls from eight years of age to about eighteen in three programs, one for girls eight or nine, the chief program for girls ten to about sixteen, and an older girls program for senior high school and junior college age. The program includes a wide variety of educational and recreational activities described in the "Book of the Camp Fire Girls" (50¢).

Club leaders are trained by a program from the national office. A correspondence course for leaders is available in communities having no professional worker and could be used in the projects.

A committee of adults called a local council acts as sponsor and administers the program. These local councils are related to a District council and to the National council.

3. Materials:

Materials recommended for the following development of the program include:

"The Guardian", a monthly publication which goes to all leaders. This contains program suggestions, hints on leadership, and general news.

"The Library of the Seven Crafts," price \$4.45. This should be ordered from the Camp Fire Outfitting Company, 197 Greene Street, New York, New York. This is a selection of short books on crafts, nature, Camp Fire symbolism, etc.

"The Book of the Camp Fire Girls", price 50 cents. This should be ordered from the Camp Fire Outfitting Company. This gives the complete list of activities and Camp Fire program.

4. Membership Dues:

National dues are \$1.00 per girl and \$1.00 for each group. For girls under ten national dues are 50¢. (Any change in these fees for groups within W.R.A. will be given consideration as special need arises.)

5. Direct Supervision and Assistance Available:

Field workers can visit the projects upon request of the Chief of Community Services.
