SELF GOVERNMENT PLAN PROPOSED FOR CENTER CHILDREN ENJOY RECREATION ELECTED BODY TO DEAL WITH CIVIC PROBLEMS

Under the leadership of a 40-member staff, some 250 nisei and sansei children ranging from five to eleven attend classes held in the recreation hall. Among the nisei teachers, there are many college graduates.

Starting at 9 a.m., the youngsters assemble to pledge allegiance to the flag and sing the "Star Spangled Banner."

Then the group divides into four divisions: 5-6, 7-8, 9-10, and 11 and over. In these groups, the children are taught hygiene, handicraft, sewing, folk dancing, and various games.

Hours are from 9-11 and 2-4 on week-days with only a morning session on Saturdays.

Residents of the Santa Anita Assembly Center will be able to participate in self-government in the near future as soon as a proposed plan for such a program has been authorized. A tentative constitution and by-laws have been drawn up and are now awaiting official approval.

Under this self-governing plan, all internal legislative and judicial problems involving their welfare will be adjusted by the residents themselves through duly elected representatives. Questions involving broad administrative policies will be referred to the administrative liaison office of the center.

The Santa Anita Assembly Center is composed of seven districts, each of which in turn, is divided into seven sections. Each section, numbering 400 residents, will elect a sectional representative. These 49 sectional representatives will elect seven councilmen. These councilmen will elect one of their members as chairman of the Santa Anita Government House.

Complete details will be made available immediately upon receipt of proper authorization to inaugurate this program of democratic government in-

PROTECT YOUR HEALTH, WELFARE

Regulations for camp health and sanitation were issued yesterday by Fred A. Exner, utility officer.

Regulations:

1. Leave buckets, mops, brooms, and wringers in toilets. These are for the purpose of keeping toilets clean. If you need a broom and bucket request same through Information Center. If you

want clean toilets and showers you must co-operate.

2. Don't use toilet paper to wipe your hands. We are rationed on toilet paper.

3. Don't use buckets for night stools and then empty buckets into trash cans.

4. Use trash can to put waste paper in. This can will be emptied each day.

5. Don't use light sockets for stoves, heaters, etc. The lines will only carry enough electricity for the light. If you use a stove or heating iron, you will throw all your neighbors into darkness for the balance of the night. We do not have enough electricians to keep replacing fuses.

JOB ASSIGNMENTS AT CENTER NUMBER 1886 SINCE APRIL 4

A total of 1886 employment assignments have been made to Center residents since April 4, 1942, according to Lewis Horn, head of the personnel record section.

"It is not necessary for anyone to make an application for a job because we have made a field survey at which time occupational classifications were taken," Horn said.

"These classifications are on file in the Personnel Section. When we receive a request from any division for employees, we immediately pull occupational cards from the file and select the person to be assigned.

"Through this method everyone is given an equal opportunity for work."

Horn announced that there is a need for professional plumbers, electricians, carpenters, cooks, and nurses. Matrons for the main-

tenance of toilets are also being sought as well as typewriter repairmen and registered pharmacists.

"Under no circumstances is anyone to go to work unless a work order is issued by the personnel office," he added.

SIGN-UP STARTS TOMORROW FOR MEN 45-65

More than 1000 men between the ages of 45 and 64 are expected to register under the Selective Service Act in the local center, sign-up starting tomorrow.

The place of registration has been changed to Barrack 21, Avenue A, according to information from the administrative offices.

Hours for the registration will be from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday through Monday.

Although most of the registrants are expected to be issei, all male persons born on or after April 28, 1877, and on or before February 16, 1897, must conform with registration regulations.

In order to facilitate the registration procedure issei who are affected are requested to bring their alien registration cards.

A staff of approximately 20 Center residents will assist in the registration. Translators will be provided for those unable to understand English.

HOURS LISTED FOR TYPHOID INOCULATION

The morning hours from 8 to 11 are being reserved for second and third typhoid injections as they fall regularly, Dr. Norman Kobayashi, physician-in-charge of the Center hospital announced today.

It will be necessary for workers to obtain excuses for getting their shots at these hours.

Clinic is held from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. for giving medical and surgical attention to those who are ill.

Now inductees shall be inoculated from 2 to 5 on the afternoon following the day of their arrival at the Center.

Since the medical personnel is short staffed, Dr. Kobayashi added, more efficient service will be possible if the general public will cooperate and observe these hours.

Lieut. K. L. Dazoy, who is to be replaced next week by Lieut. H. A. Tedhunter, said that many articles, which are not displayed, are available to Center customers.

Mrs. Josie Ikeda of the drug department disclosed that all baby necessities including baby's camphorated oil and Johnson's baby powder are now available.

Also for laundry use are soaps in bar and chips starch, Purex, and clothespins.

Among the food supplies are canned vegetable juices, fresh oranges and apples, peanuts, and varieties of bakery goods.

Locks have been ordered and are due to arrive in a few days. Girls were asked to name their preference for a less expensive line of cosmetics by Mrs. Ikeda.

SEVENTH CENTER BABY BORN

Mrs. Tsuyo Honda, resident of the Santa Anita center, gave birth to a baby girl at the Los Angeles General hospital Tuesday.

Little Miss Honda has the distinction of being the "lucky seventh" among babies born to Center residents.

WAREHOUSE OPERATIONS TOLD

"The Supply and Warehouse division has been working long hours in order that the residents of this Center might have the proper facilities for sleeping, as well as for the maintenance of their homes," stated W. H. Barber, superintendent of this department.

In a statement made to the PACEMAKER yesterday Barber expressed his appreciation to members of his division for the "splendid

co-operation" he is receiving.

"It has been a revelation to me to see the manner in which they are taking hold and their willingness to work long hours for the comfort of the other residents of this Center.

"To cite an example, one day 50 boys in this Center volunteered to work at night on short notice and they, believe it or not, unloaded 300 tons of mer-

chandise. That is, I believe, a record for the other Centers to shoot at."

The new warehouse on the infield is 925 feet long by 125 feet wide and has approximately 135,000 square feet of storage space.

There are approximately 40,000 blankets, 16,000 cots, and 18,000 mattresses in the Center as well as large supplies of brooms and buckets, according to Warehouse Superintendent Barber.

WARNING ON CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Aliens who have neglected to notify proper authorities of their change of address were warned today that a severe penalty is attached to any violation of this order.

This was stressed by Shigekazu Sakaguchi who has volunteered his help to anyone requesting it.

The Alien Registration Act, 1940, requires all alien residents of the United States to report any change of address within five days of such change.

Many persons at Santa Anita are still delinquent, according to the Alien Registration headquarters.

Those who have neglected to file notices are subject to fines and/or imprisonment.

POSTAL RULES ISSUED

To facilitate the distribution of mail in the Center, the Post Office today released rules and regulations which will go into effect immediately.

Center residents are requested to include in their return address the following: full name, district, barrack, unit, and avenue, and should be finished with Santa Anita Assembly Center, Arcadia, California.

It is the plan of the Center Post Office to establish one substation in each district for general delivery of mail for residents of that district.

Hours for the Post Office are 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily except Sunday. The main Post Office south of the Grandstand closes at 12 noon on Saturday.

Incoming mail arrives twice daily, morning mail at 9 a.m. and afternoon mail at 2:30 p.m. Outgoing mail will be dispatched three times daily, 8

REGISTRATION OF MEN 45-64 AT SANTA ANITA TOTALS 760

NUMBER OF JAPANESE SIGNED FALLS SHORT OF ESTIMATES

A total of 760 persons were registered at the Santa Anita Assembly Center registration headquarters under the Selective Training and Service Act during the three-day period ending last night, it was disclosed today.

800 ATTEND SONGFEST

With more than 800 persons attending, the Center's first community sing was held last night in the Recreation hall.

Song leaders for the evening were Frank Ono and Yoshinobu Kojimoto, while the accompanist was Grace Imamoto.

Special numbers included a vocal solo by Dorothy Takii and instrumental selections by Francis Ikeyoye and Yukio Miyamoto. The program was headed by John T. Saito.

Of the total number, 690 were Japanese residents of this Center while 70 were Caucasian registrants who are members of the administration staff.

The registration of all men between the ages of 45 and 64 at this Center was in conjunction with the nation-wide sign-up of available manpower.

As was to be expected, most of the registrants at Santa Anita were issei, but all male persons born on or after April 28, 1877, and on or before February 16, 1897, were required to register.

Assisting in the registration was a staff of Center residents headed by James S. Yoshinobu. Interpreters were provided for those unable to understand English.

The number of men between 45 and 64 registered fell short of most estimated figures.

REGULATIONS ANNOUNCED FOR PACKAGE DELIVERY

Those receiving packages at this Center were requested this morning by Guy E. Wilkinson of the Public Relations office to observe certain requirements closely in order to guarantee safe and rapid delivery of parcels.

In regards to C.O.D. packages by freight or express, Wilkinson requested in an interview with the press that this practice be stopped immediately.

Those expecting packages were asked to instruct their friends and vendors to send all C.O.D. packages by parcel post. Have packages addressed as completely as first-class mail. (See Post office story on page one.) The Post office will then hold packages until called for.

TWO TWILIGHT TILTS ON TAP

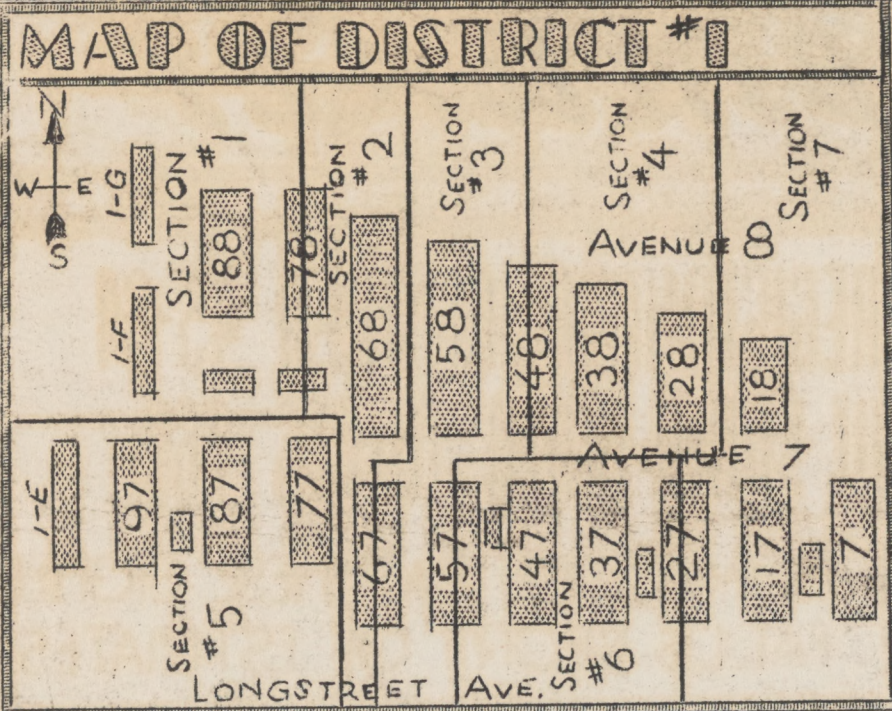

a.m., 12:30 p.m., and 3 p.m., from the district offices to the main Center Post Office.

Mail is to be distributed by general delivery only. Center residents are required to call for their mail within 10 days since all unclaimed mail after that time are returned to the senders as stipulated by postal regulations.

To avoid errors adults are asked to call for their own mail and discontinue the practice of sending children. Only mail addressed to members of his immediate family will be given to any individual. Failure to conform to this regulation is a federal offense, punishable by fine or imprisonment.

Nameless mail matter will be posted on the bulletin boards.

Since there is no provision for special delivery service in the Center, such mail must be called for at the district offices.

All second class matter such as magazines and newspapers are not forwardable to new address without additional postage. Subscribers should notify their publishers and old Post Offices of their changes of

address.

Change of address forms may be obtained at the district offices.

Forms for aliens to inform Washington of their changes of address may be secured at the same offices.

Persons receiving parcel post matter will be notified and should call for them at the main Center Post Office. All packages and parcels are subject to inspection by postal and police inspectors.

Stamps and postal supplies can be purchased only at the main Center office.

Postage rates are listed in the adjoining column.

the protection of the residents here since the delivery men will not wait at the Baldwin Avenue gate until the receiver is located and pays for his packages."

It was stressed that as far as possible, all packages should be sent parcel post instead of by common carrier as this will guarantee them the full protection of the United States postal service.

"Another problem," added Wilkinson, "is in regard to crates of fruits and other foods being delivered at the Baldwin Avenue gate. Many are sent without proper identification. Fruits in open containers have been sent, and left with only verbal orders as to whom they should go. Obviously, this causes difficulty in tracing ownership."

A few days ago, he reported, six packages were sent here for one person and only one package carried the name. Because of such careless practices, he requested that all packages be properly secured and that name and address be clearly attached to each package.

All packages, except for C.O.D., will be received at the Baldwin Avenue gate from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. These goods are then taken to the Police station. Unless the packages are securely wrapped and addressed, loss or damage to goods may occur in transit.

These packages will be kept at the Police station and every effort made to notify the receiver as soon as possible. Those having packages awaiting them are

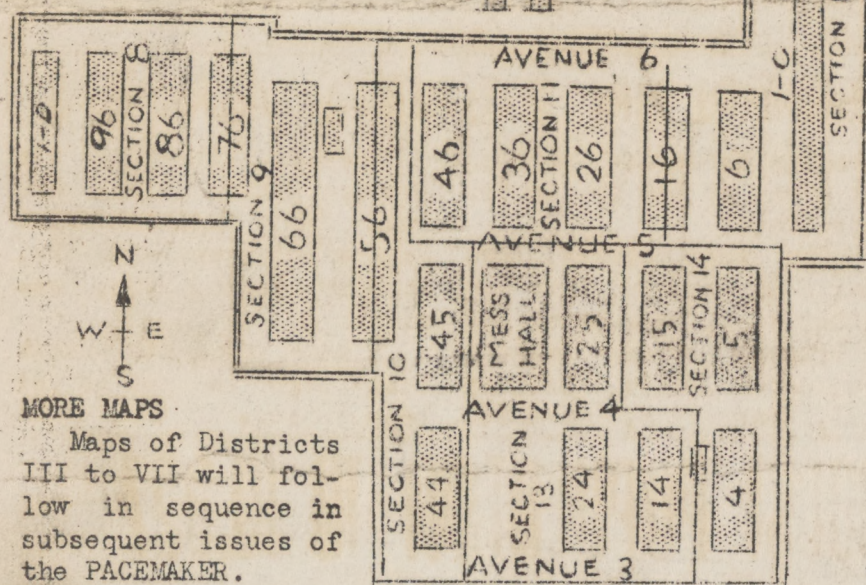

FOOT BATHS CHLORINATED TO COMBAT ATHLETE'S FOOT

Chlorination of foot baths which began Wednesday, Theodore K. Ryan, Center sanitarian, said today was to combat athlete's foot.

"Jim Arima of the Center Sanitary Corps has been assigned the responsibility of chlorinating the foot baths, eating utensils, and other sanitary facilities in general use," he explained.

"The foot baths at the entrance to each shower stall is for the prevention of athlete's foot," Ryan added. "They should be used by everyone entering and leaving the showers, in order to keep the disease under control. This is particularly important where so many people are using the showers."

USE OF ELECTRICITY CLARIFIED

Unofficial blackouts are uncalled for at Santa Anita, officers of the Utility section today reported after being deluged with calls filed through the Information office from many barracks reporting electric lights that have burned out.

The reason for this condition, they said, is that the electrical system throughout the Center provides for only one 40-watt globe to each room. This is absolutely the maximum carrying load.

Upon checking requests for service, the Utility section found that the reasons why fuses were blown out were due to changing of existing globes and replacing them with larger ones, and to the use of electrical appliances such as those listed in the following paragraph.

In a special bulletin issued over the signa-

ture of H.R. Amory, manager of the Center, it was asked that the use of all electric heaters, irons, stoves, boilers, heating pads, and curling irons be discontinued at once.

The Utility section will refuse to replace blown out fuses between 5 p.m. and 8 a.m.

A large community laundry is located west of the Grandstand with ample space for 100 tubs, two ironing

rooms with 100 boards, and more than 30,000 feet of clothesline. No washing or ironing is allowed in the barracks.

"It shall be the responsibility of each resident," the bulletin stated, "to become familiar with these regulations and to cooperate in every detail."

A reason for the request not to wash in the barracks was that water dumped in residential areas creates a nuisance.

Personnel office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The office is located in the west wing of the Grandstand building.

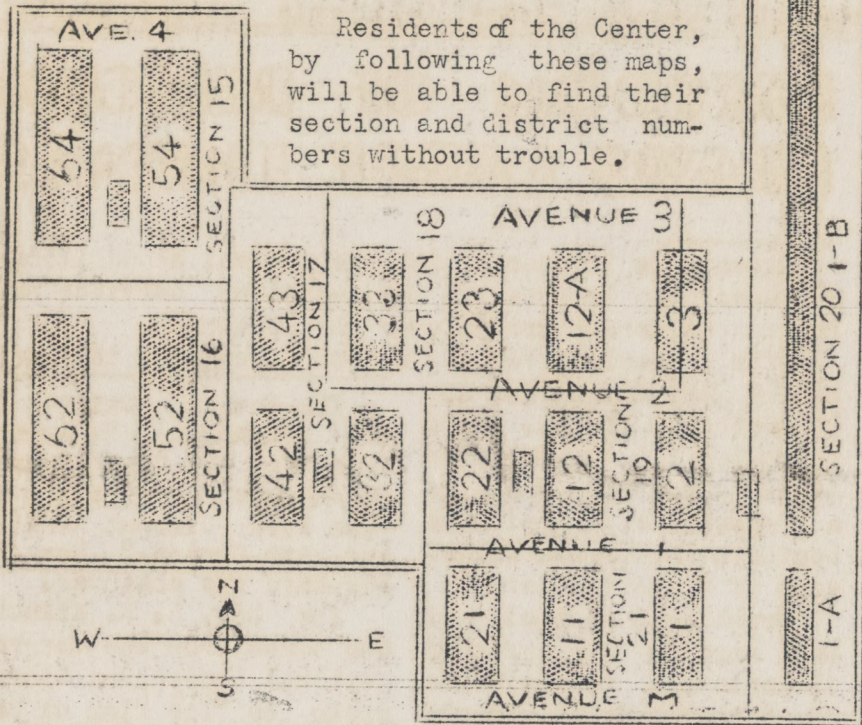

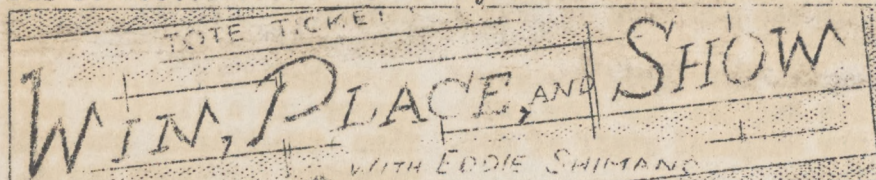

Church services this Sunday will highlight the "Mother" theme.

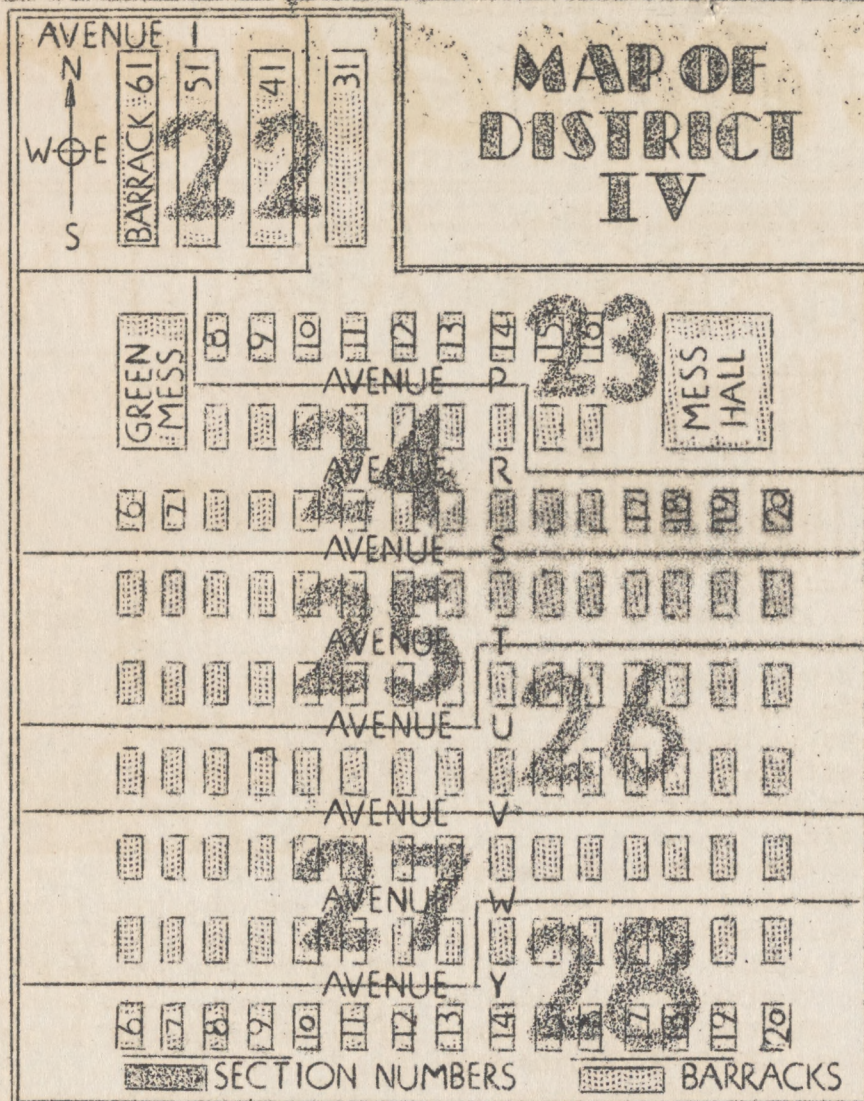
Catholic children will receive holy Communion with spiritual offering. They will assist at mass and the rituals conducted by Father Swift of Maryknoll.

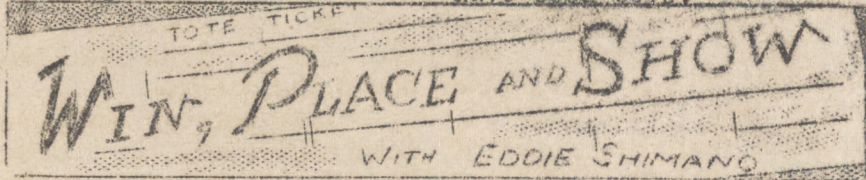
WHAT! NO GIRLS YET?

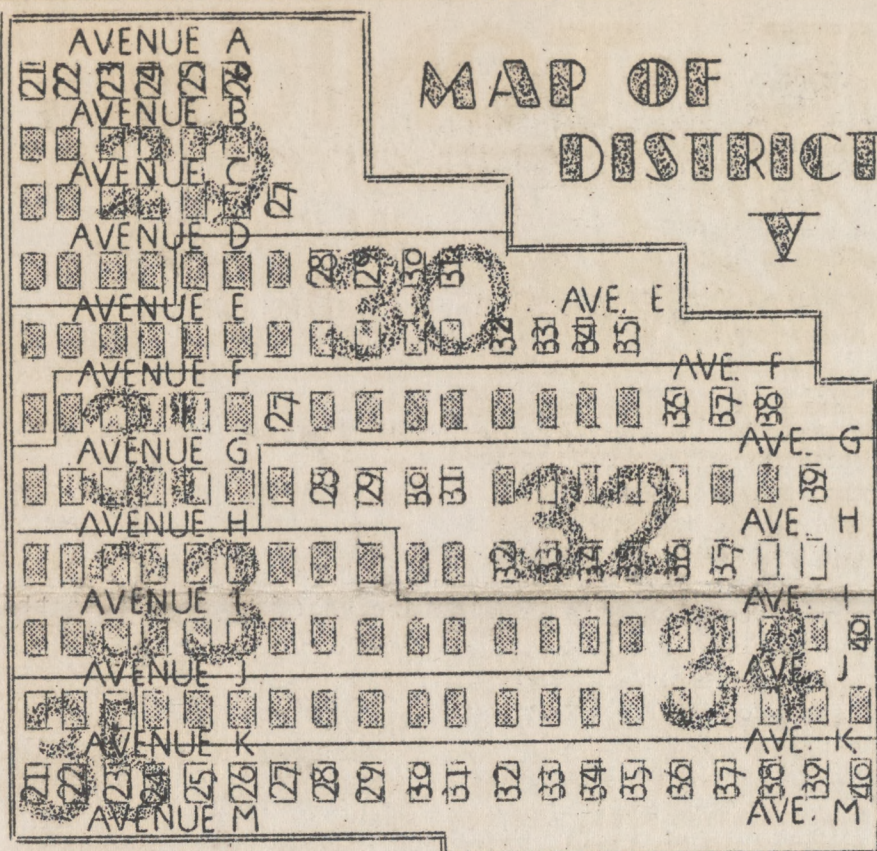

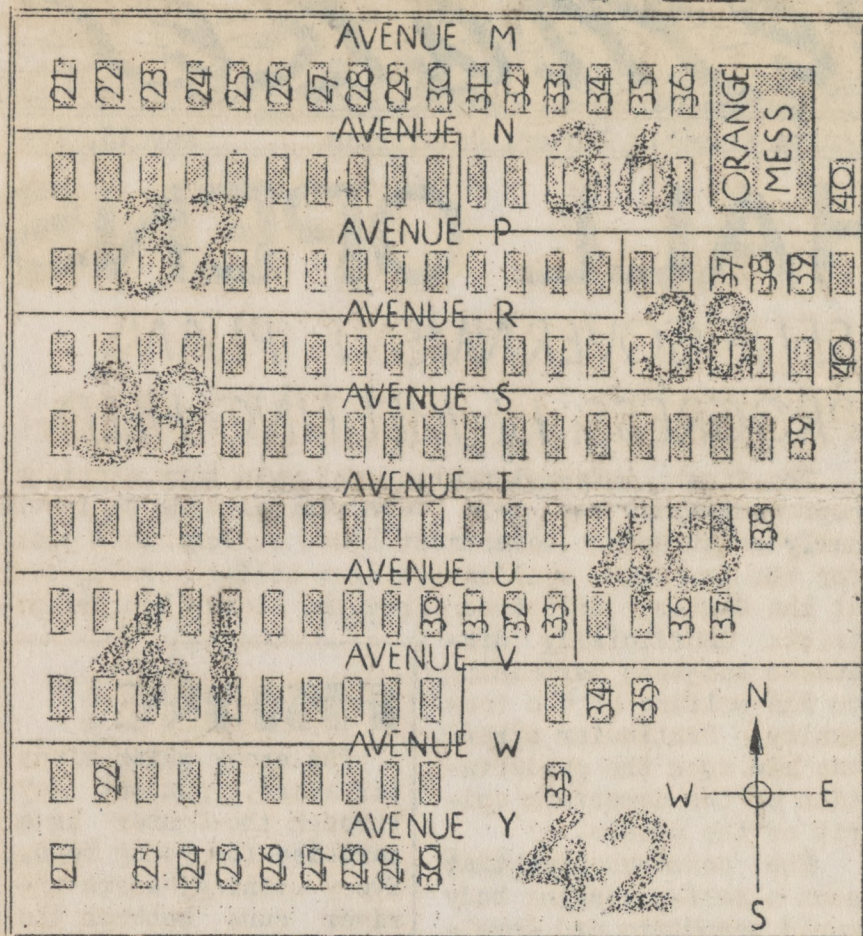

REGULATIONS ON FOOD, APPLIANCES CLARIFIED BABIES, ELDERLY, ILL PEOPLE TO GET SPECIAL DIETS SOON

FIRST AID

Immediate first aid treatment of minor injuries on the scene of the accident will be an actuality soon.

Red Cross classes will open registration for all interested persons today and tomorrow, according to Shig Hashii of the Adult Activities division.

Dick Kunishima will function as instructor.

A registration desk has been set up in the Recreation hall.

ROSTERS MUST BE COMPLETE

Rosters of all Twilight league softball teams must be complete by Thursday afternoon, 2 p.m., warned Sam Minami, supervisor of men's athletics, today.

Neither additions nor changes may be made after that date, Minami added. Any names appearing on the scoresheet which are not listed in the roster, will cause the game to be forfeited.

Managers whose addresses have been changed by the partitioning of houses should report the change.

Recent bulletins relative to food and electrical appliances in the barracks were clarified today in a statement to the PACEMAKER made by H. Russell Amory, Center manager.

"It has been learned that there are large quantities of foodstuffs spread among the barracks and it is not the desire of the management to cause any hardship either through monetary loss by individuals or through curtailment of necessary diets for babies or elderly persons," Amory said.

"Therefore, residents within certain limitations will be given until June 15 to consume canned goods on hand or arrange for their disposal through sale, shipment outside, or storage.

"As to hot plates in the barracks, all must be relinquished by tonight except where families include children from two to ten years of age or elderly persons requiring special diets. In such cases, one hot plate per family may be retained temporarily until special feeding plans which have been under way for some time are operating.

"Commencing today, feeding of infants up to two years of age has been assumed by the medical staff of our health section. Our 30 infant feeding stations are now supplied with a complete line of cereals, strained vegetables and chopped vegetables. Smaller infants receive milk, orange juice, and formulas prepared at the hospital by trained dieticians and supplied to the milk stations.

"In this connection, it is urged that each baby up to two years of age be registered at the nearest infant feeding station. Mothers should feed infants at specified times. Information on all problems of feeding may be obtained from the trained attendants at the milk stations.

"Very soon, a special diet prepared by our hospital staff will be served at the mess halls for children from two to ten and for (Continued on page 3)

Even Manzanar admits that what we got in the stables here ain't hay!

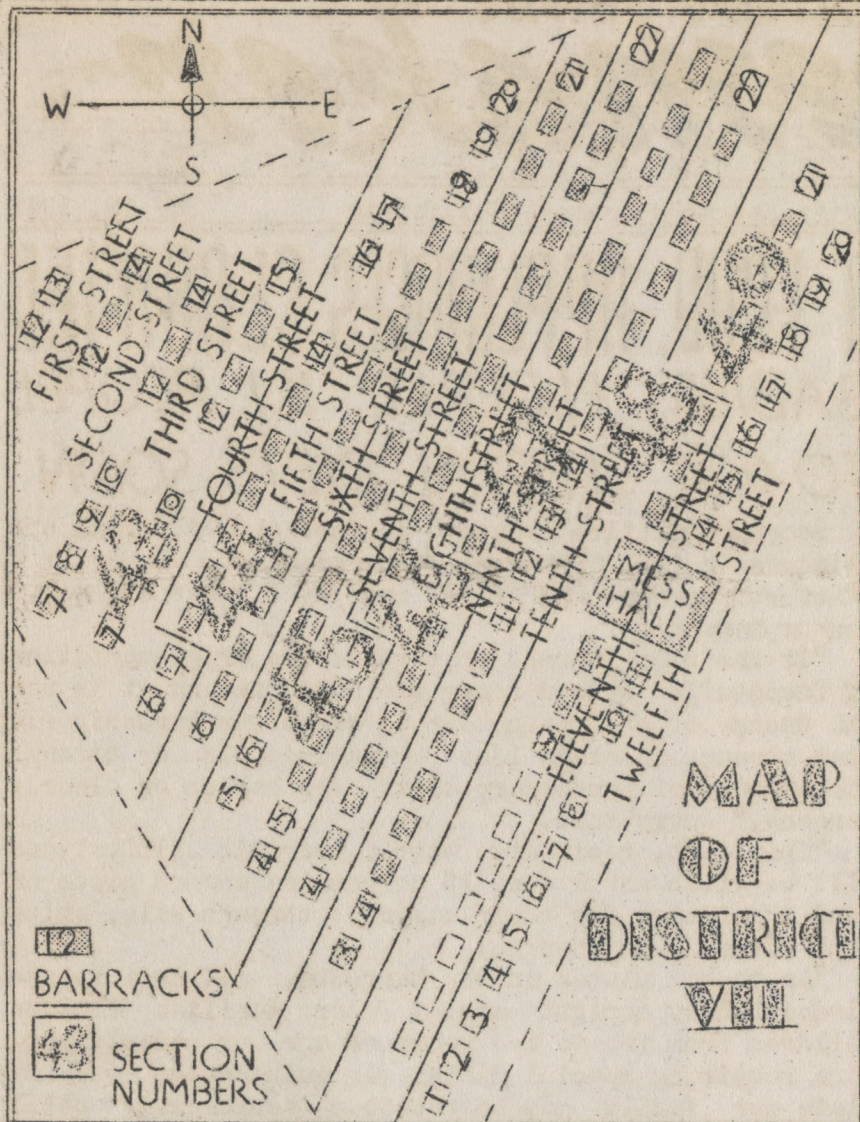
He wants to be a friend of everybody at Santa Anita. Where he came from before isn't important, he says, even if he knew (which he doesn't) because whether

Also a separate kitchen will be added at a centrally located mess hall where special diets as prescribed by the doctors will be given for persons suffering from allergy, stomach ulcers, asthma, and other ailments. This kitchen will be manned by cooks trained at the hospital.

"Incidentally," Amory concluded, "the problem of supplying hot water at various locations for bathing of infants has been met. Hereafter, hot water for this purpose only will be available at the rear of all mess halls during hours when meals are not being served."

WCCA REPRESENTATIVES SAYS MORALE OF PEOPLE IN CENTERS UNBROKEN

"I am amazed at the morale of the Japanese in the centers," said H. A. R. Carleton, WCCA representative, speaking at the second meeting of voluntary sectional representatives in the Government house Wednesday afternoon.

Brewster assured the representatives that special kitchens will be set up for children and medical cases.

The meeting opened with an invocation by the Rev. John Yamazaki, Jr. Masao Igasaki was chairman.

The present canteen between Barracks 26 and 36 will be closed at 12 noon tomorrow and will reopen Monday at 10 a.m. as Canteen No. 1.

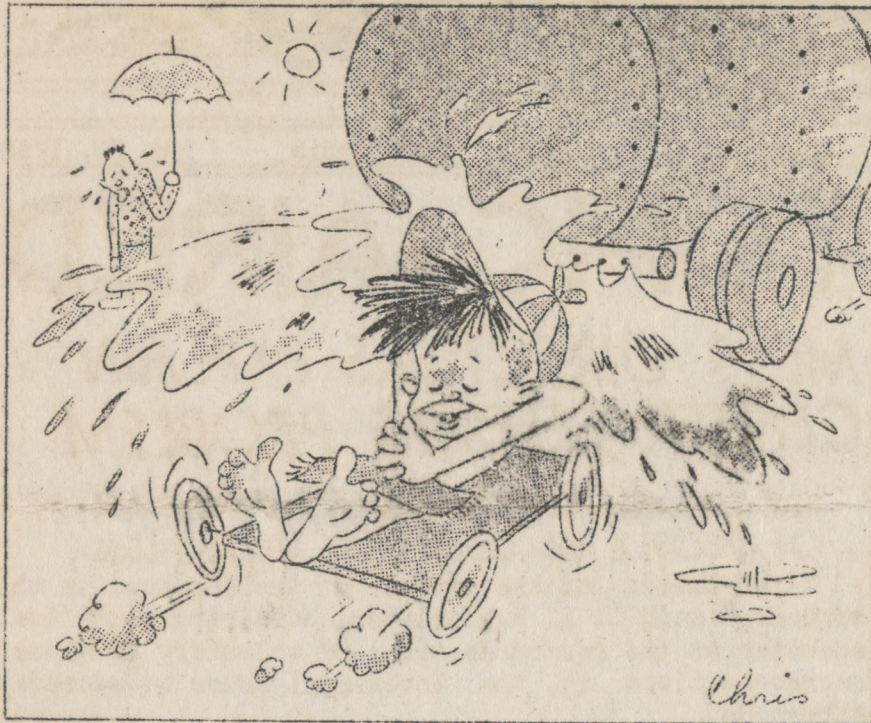
There will be no canteen service from 12 noon tomorrow until Monday morning.

Asked what he was going to do with it, he said, "When the fish grows big enough, I'm going to put it back in the creek, so it can hatch some more young ones."

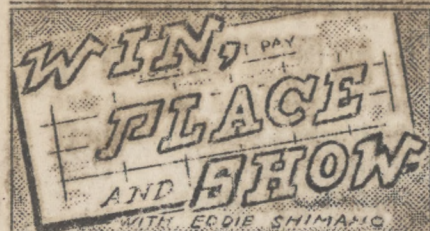
FOUR GENERATIONS OF U.S. CITIZENS IN ONE FAMILY

The first family to step off the train on Santa Anita soil was met by the PACE-MAKER reporter.

Miyako, one of the five members of the Osakada fam-

ily from Mountain View, had much to say about herself, the trip, and the impressions she gathered upon her arrival here.

"Parting from our farm and my friends at San Jose State college was in itself a hard thing, but now that I'm here among such congenial surroundings, I'm quite confident that a new and better life awaits me," she said.

The people of the town

of San Jose were notified of their evacuation and destination last Saturday. They left there by train at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

"The seventeen hours of train ride was tiring but my fatigue vanished when I sighted these mountains," Miyako exclaimed.

"I don't know what the others thought, but I mistook it for the Sierra and thought myself to be in Manzanar."--by Haru Dazai.

A resolution, condemning gambling in the Center, drawn up by the ministers was approved by the council and presented to the Center manager.

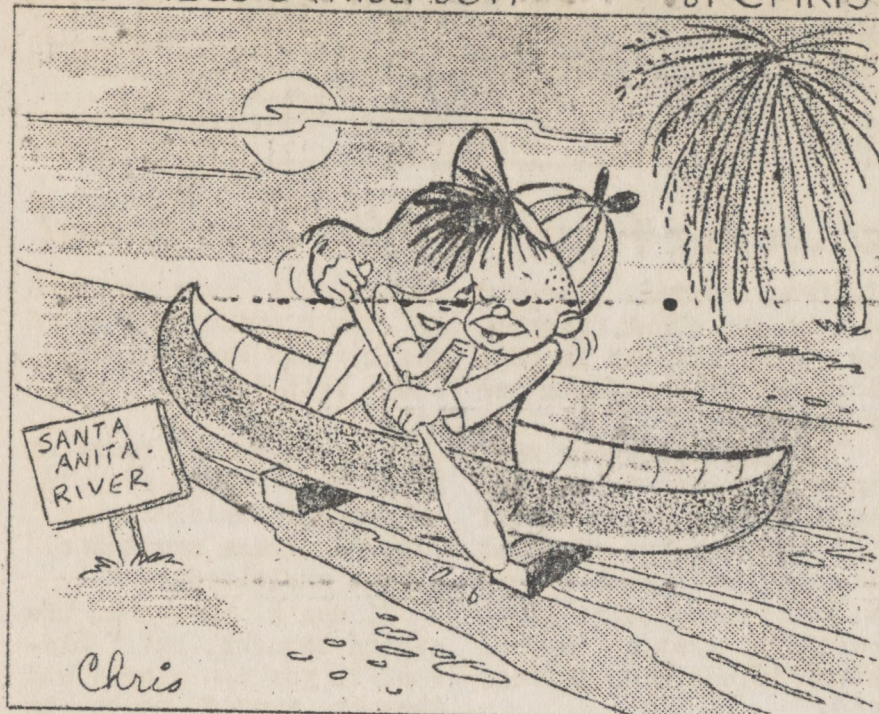
A program for the sale of Minute Men War Bonds and Stamps by a volunteer crew to the residents of this Center was explained by Mr. Humphrey of Arcadia.

2. All requests for home calls by telephone from the Information centers be reserved to cover conditions of dire emergency only.

3. In fairness to the sick who have properly requested and are waiting in turn for visits, the doctor on call must not be intercepted or "hi-jacked" for other calls because of convenience.

"No deserving home call has been or ever will be refused," Dr. Kobayashi stated, "but it is a matter of daily record that over 60% of the calls made to date must frankly be classified as 'not necessary'."

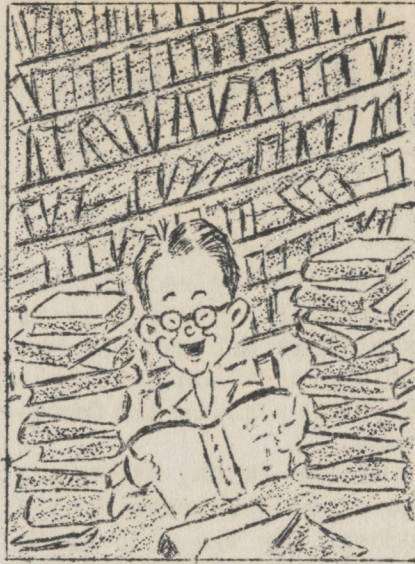
Library Gets More Books

Girl Trio To Sing On Music Hour

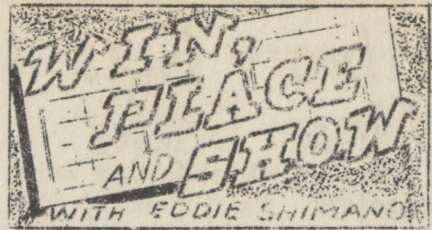
The men's glee club and a trio of girl vocalists make their debut on the music appreciation hour Sunday, 6:30 p.m., in the Grandstand.

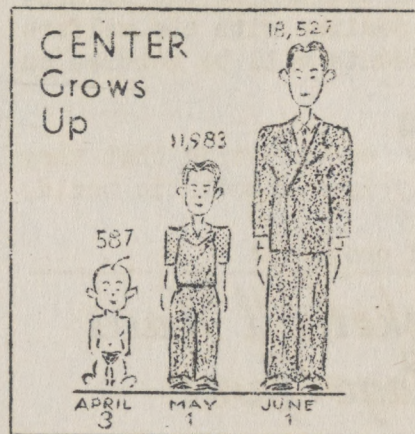

This Constitution is the keystone to a democratic way of life.

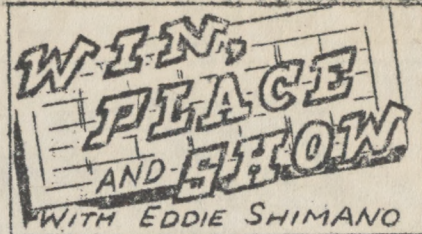

Editorial

Pacemaker, Leader in Democracy

"The greatest single morale-builder in the Center" is the consensus of the readers of the four-page semi-weekly PACEMAKER.

And impartial critics outside the Center heap further honors on the paper by judging it the leader of all center publications.

The PACEMAKER first appeared on April 18 with a circulation of 1800. Today's issue, seven weeks later, with a circulation of 5000, is read by almost four times that number of Center residents.

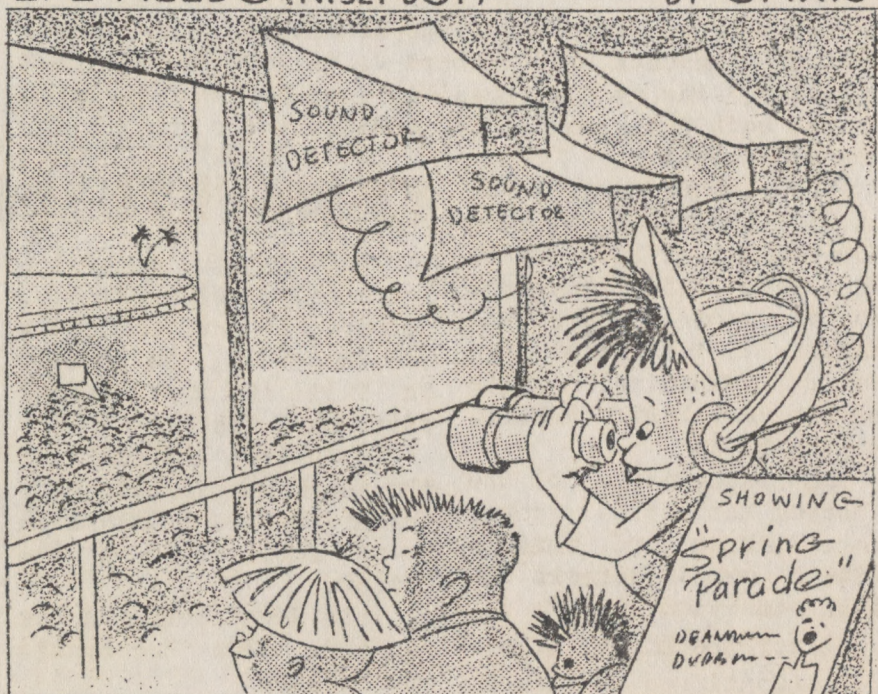

Charter To Be Used as Model FIRST ELECTION SLATED FOR FRIDAY

Problems common to any community arose with the growth of Santa Anita to a full-size town. To meet this situation, a conference of legally trained men was called to set up a people's government.

A constitution was drafted with the emphasis on the "welfare and well-being" of the residents and sent to the Regional WCCA office in San Francisco where it was approved. It is also to be used in other Assembly centers.

On May 13, the first meeting of voluntary sectional representatives was held in the Government house to formulate plans for the immediate realization of a self-government body.

This Friday, residents of the Center who are 21 years or over, will go to the polls to elect sectional candidates to the Self-Assembly.

Once this government is set in motion it will have the task of maintaining the high morale of the people, spokesmen said.

Through this program of self-government of the people, these spokesmen added, a much desired cohesive and well-coordinated working understanding between the Santa Anita Center management and the residents may be achieved.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

SELF GOVERNMENT ASSEMBLY OF THE SANTA ANITA ASSEMBLY CENTER

Preamble

We, the residents of the Santa Anita Assembly Center, in order to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States, to foster and spread the true spirit of Americanism, to build the character of our people morally and spiritually on American Ideals, and to promote the welfare and aid in the development of the residents in this Assembly Center, do hereby ordain and establish this Constitution for the Santa Anita Assembly Center, located at Arcadia, in the County of Los Angeles, State of California.

Constitution

Article I: Name and Purpose

Section 1. The name of this Body shall be known as the Santa Anita Assembly Center Self-Government Assembly.

Section 2. The purpose of this Assembly shall be to promote in every way the interest of the United States Government

at the Santa Anita Assembly Center and to assist and cooperate in all of the governmental plans and to promote the welfare and well-being of the residents in the Santa Anita Assembly Center.

Article II: Membership

Section 1. The membership of this Assembly shall be composed of all residents of the Santa Anita Assembly Center.

Section 2. The voting membership of

this Assembly shall be composed of all residents who have reached their twenty-first year. There shall be no assessment of initiation or membership fees.

Article III: Self-Government Council

Section 1. There shall be a Self-Government Council for the Assembly composed of seven (7) Sectional Representatives from each District, who shall be elected by the duly qualified voters in their respective sections.

Section 2. The seven (7) Sectional Representatives from each District shall elect one of their number as the Councilman for their respective districts. The Councilman shall devote full time in carrying out the duties of his office.

Section 3. The Officers of the Self-Government Council shall be a Chairman and a Vice Chairman. These officers shall be elected from and by the seven (7) District Councilmen.

Section 4. The Self-Government Council shall appoint a Secretary and a Custodian of Property. An Administrative Representative of Management shall act as an observer and an ex-officio member of the Council.

Section 5. The Councilmen shall be elected by the Sectional Representatives at the regular Quarterly Meeting of this Self-Government Council in June, September, December, and March.

Section 6. The offices of this Council shall be located in the Government House with adequate office facilities which shall be provided by the Executive Management of the Santa Anita Assembly Center.

Article IV: Duties of Offices

Section 1. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Assembly and of the Self-Government Council. The Chairman of the Council shall maintain a close contact, through Representatives of the Center Manager, with all Governmental Authorities in carrying out of their orders and in perpetuating the policies and procedures of the United States Government and to promote the welfare and well-being of the residents.

Section 2. In the absence or dis-

ability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the office of Chairman.

Section 3. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Assembly and of the Council, which shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of the members of the Assembly. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Committee of Admissions, and shall act as its secretary. He shall notify members of their elections; keep

a roll of members; issue notices of all meetings of the Council called as herein-after provided; conduct correspondence; have the custody of records; and perform such other duties as may be required by the Council.

Section 4. The Custodian of Property shall keep the records of all property belonging or assigned to the Council. These records shall at all times be open to the inspection of the Council and as required the Secretary shall make reports in writing as to the quantity and condition of the property.

Article V: Meetings

Section 1. The Self-Government Council shall meet for the transaction of business on Wednesday of each week and at such other stated time as shall be prescribed by the rules of the Council. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Chairman or by any three (3) Councilmen. The Secretary of the Council shall make a weekly report of the proceedings of the Council through the Administrative Representative to the

Section 5. The District Councilman shall act as a spokesman for his respective District on all matters pertaining to the general welfare and well-being of the residents of his District. He shall act as a liaison officer between the Self-Government Council and Executive Management of the Santa Anita Assembly Center.

Section 6. The Sectional Representative shall act as a spokesman for his respective Section. He shall also act as a liaison officer between the Self-Government Council and the residents of his section.

Manager of the Santa Anita Assembly Center.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Council shall be called by the Council or upon petition of ten (10) Sectional Representatives of the Santa Anita Assembly Center in writing or by the Executive Committee, who shall give the Representatives notice of such meeting at least twenty-four hours before the time of such meeting.

Article VI: Committees

Section 1. The Council at its first meeting after the regular Quarterly Meeting shall appoint an Executive Committee of three (3) members of the Council and the Secretary of the Council who shall be an ex-officio member of this Committee. The members of this Committee shall hold office for three (3) months or until their successors are appointed and are qualified by the Management.

Section 2. The Council shall appoint other standing committees such as the Committee on Public Affairs, the Housing

Committee, the Judicial Committee, the Agricultural Committee, the Social, Educational, Religious, and Recreational Committee, and all other committees as necessary.

Section 3. No Committee shall have the power to commit the Self-Government Council to any policy or opinion as to the public affairs or policies of the Self-Government Council or the Executive Management of the Santa Anita Assembly Center or of the United States Government.

Article VII: Quorum

Section 1. Two-thirds (2/3) of the Representatives of the Santa Anita Self-

Government Council shall constitute a quorum.

Article VIII: Elections

Section 1. The elections for Sectional Representatives shall be held on the third (3rd) Tuesday of the month prior to the beginning of the new Quarterly term.

Section 2. A Nominating Committee of three (3) qualified voters in each District shall be appointed by the seven (7)

Sectional Representatives of each respective District. This Nominating Committee shall submit names of candidates ten (10) days prior to the Election date.

Section 3. The plurality of the votes cast shall constitute Election.

Article IX: Amendments

Section 1. This constitution may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the Council by a two-thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of the Representatives present, provided notice of such proposed amendment with a copy thereof has been

posted at public places not less than ten (10) days in advance of such meetings, together with a notice of the time and place of the meetings at which such proposed action is to be taken.

By-laws

Article I: Robert's Rules of Order

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Orders shall govern all deliberations of this Council in all cases where it does not conflict with a standing rule of this Council.

Section 2. Any rule or order may be suspended temporarily by a majority vote

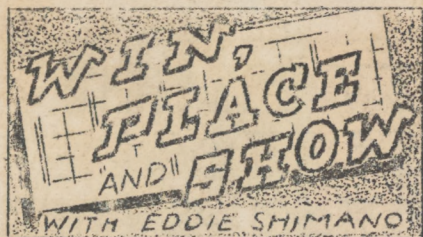
of the Council.

Section 3. One-fifth (1-5) of the Members present calling for ayes and noes upon any question, they shall be taken, and when taken, shall be recorded on the minutes.

Article II: Amendments

Section 1. These By-laws may be amended

by a majority vote of the Members present.

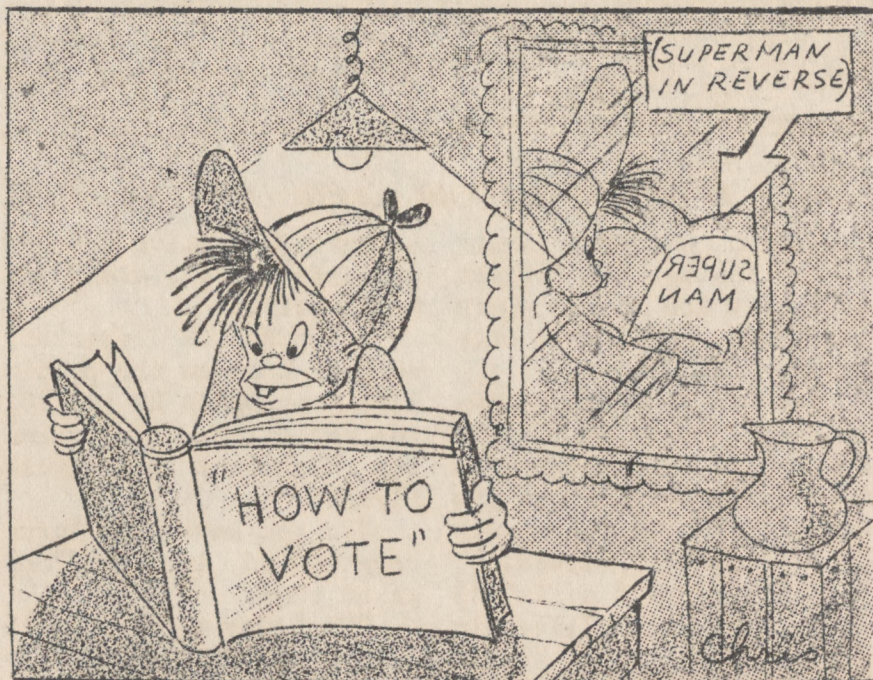

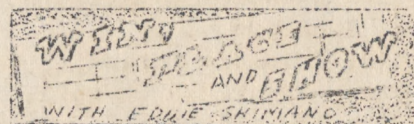
