The items marked with a (*) are to be read to all the pupils and the whole bulletin is to be posted.

Registration and related problems

- *1. All pupils have been instructed to report to their counselors at nine o'clock to receive their schedules. When this process is completed they are to start a fifteen minute period schedule for the balance of the morning to report to their other teachers, to receive preliminary instructions, and to give the teachers an opportunity to check their class lists. The time of these periods will be made known by some kind of a "gong."
- *2. When counselors finish handing out the programs of all of their pupils and have made all the necessary announcements, they are to send a "runner" to the Guidance Office with a written note indicating the fact. When all of them have reported, the gong will be "rung" announcing the beginning of the short schedule. Thereafter a gong will be "rung" at the end of each short period and again at the beginning of the next one. All pupils are to be in their next classes by the time the second gong is "rung."
- *3. All pupils are to report to their physical education classes just outside of the Principal's Office (7 - A,B). This will continue until the physical education department becomes established in the east end of the recreation hall (15).
- *4. All program changes will be made at a later time, due to the need for concentrating on the problems of those who may have no program at all. The time for making such changes will be announced as soon as it is possible to make them. Pupils should continue with the schedules they have until they are able to complete the changes they desire.

Supplies

1. Supplies may be obtained in the Principal's office on Monday afternoon. (Bldg. 7, Apt. B.)
2. Paper should be supplied to pupils for all work in class. Judgment should be exercised to determine whether paper should be supplied the pupils for work out of school. They may obtain paper in the study hall when it is established. It will have to be the policy of the school to use both sides of all paper when more than one page is required. Hand out only the minimum number of pieces required for the task at hand.
3. Pencils should be provided those who do not have their own. Teachers should maintain a supply for the room suitably marked so they may be identified and returned when the borrower is finished with them.

1. Have each pupil fill out the work experience questionnaire.

1. Pupils who have not yet filled out work experience questionnaires should fill them out. These questionnaires should be handed in to the Guidance Office as soon as possible. If an additional supply of blanks is needed, call at the Guidance Office.
2. Pupils who have been working on the Project should be on the job rather than in school. If there are any attending classes, they should be sent back to work. Arrangements will be made for them to attend school as soon as possible. It would be a good idea to explain the reason for this.
3. Fifteen year old boys may work delivering newspapers. Those who are already delivering papers should keep their jobs until other arrangements can be made.
4. On rainy days pupils who have Physical Education in the first or fifth period should stay home, arriving at school in time for their next regular class. Do not come for study halls either.

3. Please write out a list of your building needs and turn them in to the office. We cannot promise to fulfill them at once, but we cannot do anything about them if they are not made known in a systematic manner. Please attend to this carefully.
4. Until further notice all master copies for materials to be duplicated will have to be made by teachers, student teachers, or teacher's assistants. This is made necessary by the large amount of other kinds of work required by the Guidance and other offices. If these master copies are brought in in advance, the office will attempt to run them.

No more students will be in any part of Recreation Hall 23 unless they have business there. The offices there are the Guidance Office in the west end; the offices of the Night School Principal, Curriculum Adviser, and Director of Student Teachers in the middle section; and the health and physical education office in the east end.

2. The Student Council has done an excellent job of organizing the first high school party. There will be dancing and various concessions as listed on the schedule, and it has been arranged to serve refreshments including ice cream, hot dogs, a cold drink, and the like. These refreshments may be purchased at a reduced price, which is very nearly at cost. This is a special arrangement made by Community Enterprises with the student body in return for their services in making arrangements and serving the food.

The Community Enterprises is going to give the green stamps to the student body based on the total sales made; thus the student body treasury will have a small start.

3. The Christmas season is upon us and the spirit of giving is in the air. This year, however, for many reasons it is necessary for everybody to curtail expenses, and in order to avoid hurting anyone's feelings, the faculty has agreed that none of its members will provide individual treats for any of their classes and that there will be no collection of funds from among pupils for this purpose.

The whole school faculties have agreed that they will provide a school fund for certain purchases relative to the Christmas season. The elementary school has already done this and it is being used for some treats for the little tots. The high school faculty has agreed that for more mature boys and girls this is not so essential, although we would be happy to do it under normal circumstances.

In this same connection it seems reasonable to adopt the policy that as far as the school is concerned that there be no exchanging of gifts among teachers, pupils, teacher's assistants, student teachers, and administrative or staff personnel. We are not intending to say that we shall not give presents to our friends outside of school, but rather that because of the present stringent circumstances, we should not expect to receive or give gifts to other people in the school just because they happen to be associated with you in your activities.

2. Students are asked to pay particular attention to the notice from the Internal Securities Division regarding the junior safety patrols at the elementary schools. Students in this school decided not to have a junior safety patrol largely because they thought it was too childish. It is up to us now to show that we are sufficiently grown up to recognize the responsibility that the junior safety patrol members are taking and cooperate with them 100 per cent. This means that you shall follow their orders at all intersections where they have charge just as adults in a community are required to do.
3. The student body Constitution Council is undertaking to make regulations concerning the conduct of pupils in the study hall-library. Until such time as they complete their work in this respect and establish measures to enforce their regulations, all students will cooperate with the librarians in charge. Miss Yasuko Tsuboi, Miss Alice Togo, and part of the time, Miss Marguerite Okamura, have full authority to make any request of any student and they should expect to receive prompt and courteous response. 2. A typing pool is being established in the administrative area to work evenings. This pool will do all routine typing that can be turned over to them without special supervision. All teachers having Rex-o-graphing, mimeographing, or typing to be done including copying of lessons from books, work books, pamphlets, and the like should get this material in to the Principal's office Tuesday of the week before they want to use them. 1. Due to a misunderstanding between the Recreation Department and the Principal, it was announced in the previous bulletin that Recreation Hall 21 would be open to students during the second, third, sixth, and seventh periods each day beginning at once. This arrangement has been made, but the recreation hall is not ready to be opened. It is expected that it will be opened some time this week, at which time an announcement will be made.

Due to the heavy demand for rooms during these periods, there are none available for use as recreation or lounging rooms. We are therefore leaving it up to you to maintain the quietest possible study hall. The first, fourth, fifth, and eighth periods, however, should be maintained completely quiet. Those who have no studying to do or who do not wish to read quietly should not come to the study hall at all.

If you wish to wait for any of your friends before going home at the end of the morning or afternoon, you should either wait outside or make up your minds to spend that period reading or studying. There is no other way in which we can have an adequate library or study hall during these periods and if we are to have the kind of school I know we all desire, we must maintain our library-study hall in the best possible manner.

2. After we have had time to organize a sufficient number of clubs and other activities, an activity period will be inaugurated. The faculty has approved a plan whereby one period each Wednesday will be lengthened and turned over to groups of students who wish to promote some club or other organization. Due to the fact that there are not enough clubs of this kind to occupy the time and attention of a sufficient number of students, we will not have one this week.
3. There will be an open meeting fourth period today in room 5-E,F of the International Club for all those who are free, including ninth and tenth graders.
4. Adopting a constitution is a vitally important task and the students must realize this. All the core classes should discuss it thoroughly and come to a definite conclusion and have reasons for any disapproval they may have so the representatives may present them at the meeting. The Council will meet fifth and sixth period in room 11-E,F on Wednesday, January 13. This change in meeting time will avoid in cutting into the first two periods again. We should make every effort to utilize this valuable visual aid in our teaching. Pupils presenting reports can make effective use of it.

There is a possibility that at 10:30 we will join with the elementary school faculty and have a demonstration of the use of the above-mentioned Delineascope.

1. New furniture constructed especially for the school has been installed in the mathematics department. This is the furniture that we are to use permanently. It is not as rugged as the dining hall tables. They will show pencil marks much more plainly, slivers can be chipped off the plywood of which they are constructed, the joints can be worked loose more easily than they should be, but it is all we have and it will be all we will get. It is necessary, therefore, that every pupil in the school help to preserve it, not only to keep from knocking them to pieces, but to keep the surface nice and clean and in good condition. It will require care, thought, and consideration on the part of every pupil. Visitors in schools are always shocked if the furniture is badly marked up or otherwise damaged. Don't let any visitor think that we are not able to care for our property intelligently.

2. The social hall is showing signs of damage. Somebody has punched holes in the ceiling. If high school students are responsible for this, there is nothing else for us to do but to lock it and keep you out. We do not want to lock it. We want to make it a good social hall; we want to provide it with reading material, games, and perhaps some other things that you will really like. Don't permit a few careless and thoughtless people to deprive you of this place for you to spend your spare time.

The social hall is being locked at the noon hour to keep out the people who are not students. The janitors have been instructed to unlock the door at 1:20. It is wise for you not to get to school before this time.

3. I have seen some pupils smoking cigarettes in the social hall. This will not be tolerated. I have asked student monitors to see that this be stopped. If you can't cooperate with them and stop it, this will be another reason for closing the social hall. I know that the vast majority of you want to maintain high standards in this school as we do. It is up to you to see to it that a few do not spoil the standards of your school.

4. Petitions for candidates for certain student body offices have been denied by the faculty largely because the pupils concerned seemed to be too unreliable. This unreliability was displayed by their very poor attendance at school. We feel that students who cannot come to school regularly, even though conditions in the school aren't as good as they ought to be, are not to be relied upon to conduct student body affairs. There are numerous others, not candidates for student body offices, who have been cutting classes quite frequently. We are taking steps to find out specifically who they are and they will be dropped from the classes they have been cutting and their credits denied them. In some instances such as physical education, they will not be granted a diploma until they have completed these credits.

5. There will be a meeting of the Wolverine Club on Friday, March 5, during third period in the P.E. office. Officers will be elected at this meeting, so all members are requested to be on time.
6. The Sophomore Constitution Council will meet Wednesday during eighth period in 5-E,F.
7. The mechanical drawing classes will begin meeting Wednesday afternoon at the usual periods. All boys who were enrolled in these classes should report even if they had decided to drop them. Very good equipment has been purchased and is now ready for use. This class is now the best equipped class in the school. Those who still wish to drop out should report to Mr. Briggs to do so. Do not assume that you have cleared yourself just because you decided not to remain in the class.

1. Services to the armed forces - \$40,400,000; Disaster Relief - \$2,500,000, Civilian War Aid - \$1,900,000, Foreign War Relief - \$3,800,00, these are only a few of the many great services rendered by the American Red Cross.
2. There will be a Red Cross drive sponsored by the Hunt Hi-Y on Thursday and Friday, March 11 and 12. The full cooperation of everyone in this school is requested. Just 10 cents apiece will bring in \$130 from this school alone, so let's all pitch in and get above and beyond quota!
3. There will be a senior class representatives meeting on Wednesday, during eighth period in 9-E, F.
4. The boxing classes will be disbanded until further notice. All boys who were enrolled in the classes should report to the regular P. E. classes.
5. To the Students of Hunt High School:

Thank you for your cooperation in the recent fire drill.

There was no confusion and the school was evacuated in approximately four minutes, which is very good for the first drill.

We do not want to stress the importance of time too much at present. The main purpose now is to evacuate this block in an orderly manner. If this is perfected, the block will be emptied so fast in the least possible time.

The principal's trouble was the fire signal, which was not heard in all the class rooms. We hope to overcome this obstacle soon.

In the evacuation of the block there was no disorder, however in the return to the rooms there was quite a bit of running. The danger from falling is as great in returning as in going. Please, in the future, refrain from running.

Chief Yeager and Mr. Light commented upon the excellent way the students cooperated in making the fire drill a success. Let's keep up the good work and live up to their highest expectations!!

6. It has been reported that some students who have enlisted in the Army have dropped their courses and stopped coming to school. Lieut. Arnold assured us that it would be quite possi-

- b ble for any high school seniors to finish this semester before induction, therefore the school made no provisions for granting credits to enlistees who drop before the end of the semester.
- c It will be assumed that those who stop coming to classes do not wish to receive their credits and they will be denied.
7. It is the policy of the high school faculty and the administration that students who are in the senior class and who attend a full year at Hung High School shall receive their diplomas from this institution. It was further agreed that students who are ready to graduate at the end of the fall semester will be permitted to do so either by diploma from this institution or by transferring their records to their previous school to receive the diploma there, provided the arrangements have been made with the former school. Very considerable discussion was given to this question and we feel that in the interests of all the students in the high school this is much the better policy.
8. It has come to our attention that students who have done a lot of hard work and have taken a lot of responsibility in organizing and conducting students affairs have become unpopular in the eyes of unthinking students. We have worked with these student leaders; we know that they have worked very hard, that they have been greatly concerned about having every student represented honestly and effectively, that they have done their best to get the Hunt High School student organizations off to a good start on a high level. I wish to caution the student body to select its officers on the basis of their personal integrity and their ability to do a good job rather than on the basis of their personal popularity. The election of government officials on the basis of their broad smile and hearty handshake and good fellowship is far too prevalent in and United States and the world in general, and we are very anxious that students in this high school learn how to select their elected officers on a sounder basis.
9. The social will be closed during eighth period today because of the assembly rehearsal.
10. Representatives of the student body met during fifth period on Monday and formulated plans for supervising the social hall, for repairing damages done, and for its more effective use. For permanent regulation it recommended that the student court and a staff of officers to enforce its regulations. It further recommended that a collection of funds from all core classes be taken in order to pay for the panels of cello-tex which were damaged and that the students replace them when they are purchased. It further recommended that at a later time a committee be appointed to organize various school activities, dances, skits, community sings, and the like in the social hall.

In order that the social hall may be made available to students at the earliest possible moment, it accepted the offer of the Wolverines Club, permitting them to patrol the social hall, enforce the regulations which follow, and conduct court hear-

ings and impose sentences upon offenders.

These six simple rules were established as a guide to students in helping to make the social hall a pleasant place to be for all high school students. It was the committee's opinion that every person in the school was responsible for the observation of these simple rules and that it is every person's duty to remind any of his friends who may be violating them not to do so.

The social hall will be open under these conditions today and until such time when it will become necessary to close it again. We hope this will never be the case.

1. This fall semester ends Friday, March 19. Due to the shortage of paper among other things, report cards will not be ready to be issued at this time.
2. Teachers will inform pupils whether or not they have received credit in the courses they are enrolled. If credit has been granted, there is nothing for the pupil to do but wait until report cards come out. If credit has not been earned, the pupils should consult with their core teachers at once and discuss any readjustment of schedules that may be necessary.
3. If a readjustment in schedule is necessary, it should be done by the same procedure that has been followed all semester in changing programs. In other words it will not be a reregistration but a change of program for each person who needs it.
4. Pupils who have no readjustments to make in their programs will continue with their school programs just as they are at present.
5. All students who have attended high school for four years and accumulated thirty-two or more credits, may graduate at this time provided they have fulfilled all the course requirements. We have made arrangements for some to have their credits transferred to their former schools and obtain their diplomas from there. Those who have not been able to make such arrangements may graduate from here at this time. We will issue an official letter stating that graduation has been granted, but the actual diploma will not be available until sometime later.
6. Students who do not fit under any of the above-stated policies may receive consideration of their problems by applying to their core teachers for special consideration. These applications should be made in writing in all cases.
7. Red Cross solicitors will visit all the core class Wednesday and Thursday, March 17 and 18. They will receive your donations and present you with your tags and posters at that time.
8. There will be a meeting for all Senior Class Representatives on Tuesday, March 16, during eighth period in room 9-E,F.
9. The following memorandum was received recently and speaks for itself.
TO: Mr. V. K. Barron, Associate Chief of Internal Security
FROM: Tad Muraoka, Supervisor of Junior Safety Patrol
RE: Dangerous practices among students, particularly of junior and senior high school, going to and from school which should be corrected.

"Students of Jr.-Sr. High School are beginning to get careless again about walking on the left-hand side of the highway and obeying requests of Junior patrolmen. Also the practice of boys standing on the road in large groups and hitching rides on the back of trucks is beginning to get out of hand. Many of the boys stand in the middle of the highway forcing trucks to stop and then hopping on the back or even worse, they hop on the back of moving trucks and also ride on the running board and outside the stakes on the trucks. This afternoon, I also observed a group of boys standing on one side of the road and when a truck stopped on the other side, they just ran and hopped on disregarding the fact that trucks coming on the side where they were standing were almost on top of them. Also, a patrol officer saw a boy try to hop on the back of a moving truck the other day and fall off. Luckily he wasn't injured but it might happen soon. We hope these dangerous practices will be corrected.

When you hear all these practices lumped together and read they sound very very bad. This is certainly not a record of which pupils of Hunt High School can be proud. I am sure that you will want to take appropriate action to stop it.

1. Please take particular pains to promote good sound safety education in connection with the memorandum to Mr. Barron. Inasmuch as such practices are common among our high school students, you can't spend too much time on safety education at this time.

2. There will be a short meeting of the appointed staff on Saturday at 8:15 in room 5-A,B. The sole purpose of this meeting will be to elect delegates to the state convention of the Idaho Education Association. You should be giving thought to the delegates you want to select. You are entitled to three and they will be elected from the total elementary and high school faculties at large. Transportation will be provided and leave of absence will not be required, but delegates will have to pay for their own food and lodging. This should probably be taken into account when candidates are nominated.
3. We have been requested to demand a doctor's excuse for all pupils who have been absent three days or more in succession. This should be done by every teacher. 1. The May Day program scheduled for tomorrow will require the full cooperation of every student in school to make it a success. Your interest and courtesy toward those who are putting on the performances and your full attendance are necessary if this is to be a pattern by which we can model future activities of this nature.

2. For the work on clearing farm land Monday afternoon as requested by Mr. Stafford, everyone is urged to wear old clothes or clothes suitable for work.

Each core class will organize itself into a work group. Each work group will be assigned a certain strip and will be provided with one pitchfork and at least one grubbing hoe for digging out the stubborn pieces of sagebrush. A student foreman should be appointed to each group. His responsibility will be to see that all the pieces of sage brush in the strip are picked up and placed on piles for burning. One official "burner" should be appointed for each group. After the first fires are lighted, he will carry fires on the pitchfork from the burning piles to the piles that have been made ready for burning. The core class groups will line up across the field and will move back together so that all the burning is kept in a row and thus no group will be placed in such a position that the wind will blow the flames towards it. There should also be a timekeeper appointed for each group who will keep a record of who is there. These appointments should be made in core classes today and Monday morning if necessary. On May 31 the committee appointed to consider the problem of excessive use of Japanese language and other forms of behaviour which irritate the people in Twin Falls, met. Those present were:

After some discussion, it was agreed that all possible channels should be used in an educational campaign designed to reach all groups on the Project, Japanese-Americans in F.C.A. camps and others relocated in this area, and the Kiwanis Club and other public groups in Twin Falls.

The committee agreed at this meeting to submit the problem to a representative group of residents and ask them to express their attitudes and formulate plans of their own, which members of the staff committee would carry out insofar as the recommendations fell into the scope of their departments.

On June 3 a group of residents were called together to discuss the problem. They were as follows:

This group deliberated for an hour and a half, and the consensus of opinion was that:

1. Everybody on the Project should be encouraged by every means possible to use the English language wherever they are.
2. That Japanese-Americans of all ages should make a definite effort to avoid doing any of the things which might tend to irritate the residents of any community in which they might find themselves.
3. That efforts should be made to develop attitudes favorable to this policy and to offer suggestions and even instructions as to what is proper behaviour for them to follow.

4. That in the cases of people unable to speak English adequately, that they at least use as much English as possible in their conversation.

The following specific suggestions were made, which may be divided into two categories:

1. Things to be done within the Project and to be started by the agencies concerned at once.
 - a. To make posters illustrating the need for special efforts to be considerate of residents of communities into which evacuees may go.
 - b. To use the Irrigator, both English and Japanese sections, to urge proper behaviour and attitudes. It is suggested that cartoons, editorials, articles, anecdotes, and all forms of appeal be used.
 - c. That each person going out on day passes be handed a small reminder at the time he receives his pass, of what is expected of him. This reminder will be written in both English and Japanese.
 - d. That those going out on longer leaves be given more extensive suggestions, as is already being done.
 - e. That the youth of the community be encouraged to speak English to Issei and at the same time to work toward changing the attitudes of the Issei which make it difficult for the youth to do this.
 - f. To conduct a campaign in the Irrigator and through other channels, urging Project residents to learn to speak the English language more effectively. It was reported in this connection that there are thirteen or fourteen classes in the English language enrolling approximately 200 people at the present time.
 - g. That the Japanese programs such as the "shibai" have injected into them certain amounts of English, both in the form of translations of announcements and in the program items themselves. It was further suggested that in these entertainments there might be dramatizations of the problems which arise.
 - h. That the church officials take occasion to ~~the~~ development of desirable attitudes and understanding in their congregations.
 - i. That an effort be made to lead Issei to drop the attitude that it is impolite to speak to one another in English. This attitude is based upon the difficulty involved in communicating their thoughts properly with one another in the English language.
 - j. That these campaigns be not pressed too vigorously.
 - k. To have the block managers make statements repeatedly concerning this problem in the dining halls, perhaps to do so once a week.

- l. That the use of English in the canteens be encouraged.
- m. To announce to Project residents that four homes in Twin Falls are open to them, and to provide their addresses.

2. ~~Suggestions for~~ Things to be done outside the Project through the Project Director and other proper channels.
 - a. To communicate to the Kiwanis Club and other public clubs in Twin Falls the wish of the people of this Project to improve their relationships with them and an indication of what is being done here to bring this about.
 - b. To transmit this problem and suggestions for overcoming it to all Japanese Americans residing in this vicinity, including those in the F.C.A. camp especially.
 - c. To attempt to arrange for a place in Twin Falls where Project residents can go and rest during the rather long day which many of them have on their shopping tours. In this connection it was suggested that one or more of the churches might provide such a place in their social rooms; that the skating rink be opened up during the day time to the general public including Project residents; that the churches and schools have young peoples groups as well as adults go to these places in order that they may make contacts and become acquainted with Project residents while there.
 - d. It was suggested that ministers in Choshone be contacted with a view to providing a place for people to go while waiting for the train. The churches and the park were suggested as places. The Project residents should be informed of the availability of the park and where it is located.

2. The dental examination which is getting under way is for the purpose of research. The United States Public Health Service has sent out one of its senior dental officers to gather information about the number of fillings and cavities in people's teeth so that science may know better how to prevent this rather serious ailment. Dr. Klein stated that even before the war there were not more than one-fifth enough dentists and dental equipment in this country to handle all the cavities there are. During the war, of course, because the Army takes so many dentists, there are still fewer available to the public. It has been shown that in some unknown manner certain peoples do not have cavities or decayed teeth. It is the purpose of the United States Health Service to use the people in the reeducation centers to try to find out what causes decay and how to prevent it. It is a very worthy research project and we sincerely request your full cooperation. I am sure that you do not mind being guinea pigs for such a worthy project.
3. The Wolverine Club will meet Wednesday at the beginning of third period in the P.E. office. Please be prompt.
4. With the coming of better weather and activity on the farm and other places, there has been cutting of classes. We are Students who persist in this practice will fail in their courses. The outstanding things accomplished here are the result of what the students themselves have done despite a good many limitations, discomforts, and other handicaps.

Students will report to school at 10:00 and the following schedule will be run in the morning:

In the afternoon pupils will return at 2:00 and meet their afternoon classes according to the following schedule:

At these times report cards will be handed out and other items of business will be completed. If, for any reason, pupils cannot make their classes on Friday, they should arrange to have their friends pick up their report cards or leave a self-addressed stamped envelope at the Principal's office.

Pupils who have work to make up should make arrangements with their teachers to do so at this time. If the period is too short for such arrangements, certain teachers may be seen after the schedule is completed.

2. School will open again on Monday, August 23. All students are expected to be there at that time, there being no exceptions to this requirement. There are plenty of jobs outside for three or four weeks, and high school students are expected to take these jobs rather than those of a longer duration. We are being very firm in this requirement because we expect to have a harvest vacation sometime in October, as is expected in other high schools, in southern Idaho. Furthermore, it is important that our time schedule be in step with the time schedule of other school, so when students wish to be relocated, they will not find themselves far behind their new classmates in their courses. This is a very important requirement that we must meet. It should be pointed out that it is not advisable for students to stay out during the fall semester and enter in January because our school

is organized on the year basis rather than a semester basis. There are very few courses that can be entered at all in January and even in those cases it is quite unsatisfactory to do so.

1. We have received the following memo from Mr. Yeager. We suggest that you observe it very carefully.
"I would like to suggest that the coal boxes in school rooms not be used for waste paper baskets. I believe it would be advisable to put all waste paper in the stoves and burn it at least once a day so as not to allow a large amount to accumulate in the stoves."

Bulletin To Teachers

The program change procedure which is now in operation has not proved to be satisfactory. It is too cumbersome and slow and there is a tendency for bottleneck to develop for all concerned. Therefore, beginning today we are going to change the procedure. However, the change will not be a radical one for it is basically a return to the "drop" and "add" slip system which we were using prior to the inaugurating the present procedure. There will, however, be a number of change in this old procedure in order to correct some of the weaknesses which it had. The most serious of these weaknesses was that you did not always get these slips.

From the time they receive this notice, core teachers will follow the new procedures in changing programs.

Many pupils have not yet returned the signed copies of the program change form. Rather than waiting for these to come in, we will notify the teachers involved in the program changes which have already been started by using the drop and add slip system. A certain amount of duplication may be expected to result from this.

Changes of program made necessary by a part-time job will be made in this office as will also changes that are necessary because of adding a new class, dividing a class, or changing the period of a class. Other program changes will originate with the core teachers. If the program change starts with the core teacher or in this office, in order to make it possible for a pupil to take a part-time job the procedure is as follows:

1. Counsel with the pupil regarding the desirability of the change.
2. When a decision to make the program change is reached: Fill out one copy of the application for program change form.
3. Have the pupil bring it to the Guidance Office during a free period.
4. We will give the pupil a copy of the "Class Card" for each subject and teacher involved in the change with instructions to present them to the teacher concerned. If the pupil is to be dropped, record the time he withdrew from your class. The date on the slip should be used.

If the pupil presents a "Class Card" indicating he should be enrolled in your class, add his name to your class list using the date on the "Class Card" as the time of entry. Teachers should not admit any student to their classes from this time on without one of these "Class Cards". Later the Guidance Office will send a second copy of the "Class Card" to teachers concerned. This is done in order to confirm the change and to provide a means of checking pupils who have failed to present their "Class Cards" as instructed. If when you receive a slip from us, the pupil has not yet presented the "Class Card" for entry into your class, add the pupils name to your class roll and note on the back of the "Class Card" that the pupil has not yet appeared and return the slip to us. If the pupil has not presented a "Class Card" indicating withdrawal merely drop his name from your roll as of the date on the slip. We will deliver the "Class Card" to you in a special envelope. This envelope will be placed in your box in the Principal's Office. It should be returned to us without delay. "Class Cards" are to be returned to us. Please place them in this envelope.

When we have finished with application for program forms we will send them to the Attendance clerk who will make the necessary changes on the registration card which they have in their files. If a program change involves a change in core teachers the "old" core teacher will forward the pupils folder and information as to his class standing and attendance to the "new" core teacher.

4. In a previous bulletin we had announced that the constitution in its final form would be mimeographed and placed in the hands of all students and teachers one week before a vote is taken.
