E-Z SORT ANALYSIS OF PERSONS LEAVING CENTERS ON INDEFINITE LEAVE

Instructions for Completing E-Z Sort Cards

The necessary information will be entered on the E-Z Sort cards at the same time that the Departure and Admission Advices are matched against the Master File of IBM cards--that is, current information will be posted on the Master File IBM cards and the E-Z Sort card completed as part of the same process. The advantages of such a procedure are twofold: (1) All the advices for a given person will be studied in order to add current information to the Master File card; it will save time to enter this information on the E-Z Sort card at the same time; and (2) Since the basic data for the E-Z Sort card will come from the IBM card and the other data will come from the advices, the most convenient time to complete the E-Z Sort card is when these two Source Files are matched.

A. When to Make an E-Z Sort Card

1. Make an E-Z Sort card for each departure from a relocation center on indefinite leave and for each change of status from any type of leave to indefinite leave.
2. Any admission to a relocation center from indefinite leave is to be posted on the E-Z Sort card made from the departure or change of status which was the original source of that indefinite leave.

B. Enter Name, Sex, Age, and Family Number on the top line of the E-Z Sort card in the allotted spaces. This information can be obtained from the Advices.

C. Basic Data from IBM Cards.

The basic data for the E-Z Sort card will be copied directly from the IBM cards in code. Opposite Items 1-9 on the E-Z Sort card are indicated the column numbers on the IBM card which give the desired basic data; in the space opposite the items and the column numbers, enter the codes in red pencil exactly as they are printed at the top of the IBM card in the indicated columns.

1. For Item 4, sex-marital status, enter the code from Col. 45 on the IBM card twice on the E-Z Sort card--in the boxes allotted to Items 4a and 4b.
2. For Item 9, in addition to the code, enter the Last Permanent Address printed in ink on the IBM card.

D. Data from Advices

Item 10. Source of Indefinite Leave

1. If the person left a relocation center on indefinite leave directly, check "departure."
2. If the person did not leave a relocation center directly on indefinite

leave, but left on another kind of leave and has since changed his status to indefinite leave, check "change of status from" and enter the type of leave the person had at the time of the change of status to indefinite leave as one of the following:

- b. "Unrev." refers to unrevised Advices; "rev." refers to revised Advices. Information from the revised Advices is more complete and includes a new type of leave--intermediate leave--for the first time. For these reasons we have separate codes for information from revised and unrevised advices.

Item 11. Type of Indefinite Leave

- a. Enter the type of indefinite leave as given on the Advice. Use the following abbreviations for the listed categories:

The types of indefinite leave, as listed above, exactly agree with the kind of indefinite leave on the revised Departure Advice with one exception--Employment, type of work unknown. This classification has been added in order to include departures on indefinite leave for employment from unrevised Advices where the type of work is not given.

Item 12. Relocation Center

Enter the name of the Relocation Center as given on the Advice in the upper left corner. Abbreviate as follows:

Item 13. Date of Indefinite Leave

Enter the date given on the Advice in the upper right corner. Use the following type of abbreviation:

For May 6, 1943, enter 5 / 6 / 43.

Item 14. Citizenship

Enter citizenship as given on the Advice--print "citizen" for persons checked citizen; print "alien" for persons checked alien.

Item 15. Admission

Enter "Adm" and the name of the center admitted to for all persons for whom there is an Admission Advice (dated after the Departure Advice) indicating they have returned to the center from the indefinite leave described on the Departure Advice and the E-Z Sort card.

If there is no Admission Advice indicating a return to the center from the indefinite leave described on the Departure Advice and E-Z Sort card, enter a check (✓) in the lower left corner of the box for this item.

Item 16. Date of Admission

Enter the date on the Admission Advice; if there is no Admission Advice, do not enter anything in this space.

Item 17. Address at Destination

Enter the destination address as given on the Departure Advice. If the address at destination is not given, leave the space blank. The address should be queried and entered in this space when correct information is obtained from the center concerned.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CODING INDEFINITE LEAVE E-Z SORT CARDS

Items 1-9, Basic Data from the IBM cards, on the Indefinite Leave E-Z Sort cards are already coded - the codes were entered directly from the punched IBM Master File cards.

All codes must be entered in red pencil in the column assigned to "code".

Item 10. Source of Indefinite Leave

Enter the two-letter code as given on the code sheet for the indicated Source of Indefinite Leave.

Item 11. Type of Indefinite Leave

Enter the two-letter code as given on the code sheet for the indicated type of Indefinite Leave.

Item 12. Relocation Center

Enter the two-letter code as given on the code sheet for the indicated center.

Item 13. Date of Indefinite Leave

The month and year will be coded. Enter the code for the month, which corresponds to the number of the month. Directly under the month enter the code for the year, which corresponds with the last digit of the year.

Item 14. Citizenship

Enter "C" if the person is a citizen; enter "A" if the person is an alien.

Item 15. Admission

Enter "A" if the person has returned to a center - in this case "Adm" and the abbreviation for the center will appear in this item. Enter "N" if the person has not returned to a center - in

this case there will be a check in the lower left-hand corner of the box allotted to this item.

Item 16. Date of Admission

Enter "--" if the person has not returned to the center. If the person has returned, code the date of return exactly as done for Item 13, Date of Indefinite Leave.

Item 17. Address at Destination

This item will be coded separately from the rest of the E-Z Sort card as follows:

1. Sort the E-Z Sort cards into State of Destination; assign a given state to one person to code.
2. Use the "Rand McNally Pocket Map" for each state to enter the name of the county in red pencil for each address in that state.
3. Enter the 2 digit code for state; directly under this code enter the 2 digit code for the county using the Code for Counties by States for the United States.
4. The principal city code will be entered after the cards have been coded, punched, and sorted.
