Assemblies

The assembly programs are planned to occur once a week throughout the school year. Due to the inability thus far to use the new auditorium, it is necessary to hold assemblies in the study hall (mess hall) which seats only half the student body. Therefore it is necessary to present the same programs to two different groups. The assembly period is 30 minutes in length and the student body consists of approximately 300 during each assembly period.

It was thought that well planned assembly programs would accomplish at least four different good results;

- I. Develop an "esprit de corps" in the student body.
- II. Provide an opportunity for the students to meet and hear those who should visit the center from the "Outside" world.
- III. Provide an opportunity to carry on school business especially as it pertained to clubs, organizations, special drives and projects and the school student council.
- IV. Provide outlet for the talent to be found in the school, such as musical, dramatics, artistic, public speaking, etc.....

I

It was felt that the fact of assembling together would do something toward developing class, school, and center spirit. Community singing and student body participation in the singing is a school spirit builder.

II

Through-out the year we have had many very prominent visitors in all works of life. Inasmuch as the students were more or less "shut in" from the outside world--it was deemed highly desirable to have as many of these visitors as possible to appear before the assembly in one capacity or another. This has been good. It has done the students good to meet and hear these people and to get a cosmopolitan view of America from outstanding people from various sections of the United States, away from which most of them had never traveled.

It was also good from the standpoint of introducing these American students of Japanese ancestry to the people who never before had come into close contact with this minority group. It was good public relations.

III

The assembly period provides fine opportunity to make amendments, conduct drives of one kind and another, and to carry on projects of a

school wide and center wide nature. At most of the assemblies the chairman of the Student Council presides and takes charge--thus giving the students a real taste of Democracy in action.

IV

Besides providing an opportunity for club presidents, the chairman of the student council and others to make amendments and attend to school business "on the floor" before the whole student body--it also furnishes an audience for certain talent groups. Glee clubs sing, plays are given, dramatizations of schools and community life are given by the various clubs and hobby groups presenting their specialty. The value of such public appearances to the students who participate does not have to be defended here.

In conclusion, it may be said that student participation guided by the various teachers was the slogan of the assembly program. Many shared and cooperated in planning and executing the programs--another practical lesson in a living democracy.

WAR BOND AND STAMP DRIVE
Rohwer High School

Three jeeps costing \$3505.95 were contributed to the United States Armed Forces by the schools at the Rohwer Relocation Center, as they closed their first Center-wide War Bond and Stamp drive on December 3.

Sponsored by the National Honor Society of Rohwer High School, the three-week campaign opened on November 15, with the goal set at one jeep costing \$1165. By November 29, the goal was passed with the sales recorded at \$2507.95. Exceeding the goal by over 200%, the campaign closed with the grand total of \$3505.95 worth of War Bonds and Stamps sold by the students.

Of the total sum, \$2481.75 was sold through the Senior high school; \$1012.70 through the Junior high school; and \$11.50 through the Westside elementary school.

ROHWER CENTER HIGH SCHOOL P. T. A.

Parents of Rohwer Center saw the great need of an organization to set up a program of parent-teacher work in this community to concentrate upon the social welfare of our young people of school age.

With this task on their hands, the High School P. T. A. was started on January, 1943. Mr. Matsuzawa as the first president strove to develop through proper parental guidance a mental and a spiritual education for a better community.

Two hundred members were determined to set up a program to unify the home and the school for the welfare of our children. Since evacuation, the problem of students attitudes had become larger and larger, and it was realized that the only way to overcome this situation was through the unity of the home and the school. The need was seen to change the mental attitude of our young people toward life. Most of this term was used in setting up a program.

In March 20, 1943 the P. T. A. awarded two fountain pens to the outstanding boy and girl of the graduating class.

From September, 1943 through September 1944, the following officers served president, Mrs. Hirahara, vice president, Mrs. Tsutsui next vice president, Mrs. Nakamichi, Japanese secretary, Mrs. Kobayashi, English secretary, Mrs. Kaneda, Mrs. Utsumi, Treasurer, Mrs. Tabuchi, corresponding secretary.

Evacuation had left us with a group of neurotic children who

did not care whether they went to school or not. The parents saw the great need of stressing a moral, spiritual and character building program.

Through fine educational speeches at every monthly meeting, the parents learned the value of unity and cooperation with the schools. Membership had increased to three hundred and over during the year, and every parent was enthusiastic to contribute his viewpoint for discussion. Since our life in the center was not normal, the problems became bigger and bigger.

Throughout the year, we have tried to be of some use to the community and following is some of the work we have been doing in the center.

We saw a great need to put a roof on all the porches in the school for the rainy season. Senior High P.T.A. requisitioned to have lumber to build these. The parents came on Sunday and volunteered to do the carpenter work. Block 35 High School and Block 31 Junior High School and both grammar schools were finished.

The students wanted an annual, but without any funds they did not know how to start. P. T. A. took over a booth to sell food to help raise this fund. \$50.00 was donated to the annual fund.

Twenty-two medals were given to the National Honor Society students of the graduating of January 19, 1943.
May, 19, 1944

The fathers planted trees around the school yard to beautify the grounds during summer vacation.

A flagpole was made by the fathers to be put up in the high school ground.

A lawn was planted all around the block to help beautify the grounds.

Eight silver eversharps were given to the National Honor Society students for graduates of January 19, 1944.

The P. T. A. of Senior High sponsored sending about one hundred boys to help pick fruit in Michigan. We sent them outside to help for defence from July to September during summer vacation.

With the opening of the schools in the Rohwer Relocation Center, four Parent-Teachers' Association were organized on March 18, 1943.

In the month of April, 1943, the first P.T.A. of the Junior High School held its meeting. Statistics showed that there were 450 children enrolled in school with 340 separate families in the center.

The charter members of the Junior High School P.T.A. were Mr. Bledsoe, (the principal of the Junior High School) Mr. Sakakura, Mr. Iguchi, Mrs. Ishida, Mrs. Kobayashi, and Miss Ihara. The purpose of this term was toward organizing the P. T. A. for membership drive.

The new cabinet members were elected on October 12, 1943. Although the first and the following meetings took place in the School Auditorium (Mess Hall), the one held on November 16, 1943, met in the mess hall at Block 19. This was American Education month and Dr. Nat Griswold, former Adult Education Supervisor, spoke on the topic "Education" with Mr. Lloyd Shingu as his translator. A movie relating to this topic was shown to a group of 149 members present, which was one of the largest attendance ever held.

A tea was given to celebrate the New Year on January 1944. Mr. Cole and his 22 piece brass band from the High School were kind enough to perform for this occasion.

After the general business meeting, a tea was held honoring February graduating class at which time Mr. Bledsoe presented to each member of the Honor Society (28), a certificate from the P.T.A. Mr. Trice addressed the members mainly to tell the parents that the method of teaching in the center was being conducted just as it is "outside" this camp. There were a few selections by the Glee Club and also a tap dance number for entertainment.

On March 14, 1944, Mr. Bledsoe thanked the members for sending him a sympathy card upon his mother's death. Miss Mary Finch, (present Junior High School Social Studies Teacher), gave a talk in Japanese about her stay in Japan.

There was no meeting in May on account of Mr. Bledsee's joining the Navy. The parents presented to Mr. Bledsee a souvenir, and a card of appreciation was received from him.

Each meeting thus far was well attended, and the member of the cabinet have established a creditable record for their work.

The first meeting of the new semester was held on October 17, 1944. New officers were elected. The aim and purpose for this term will be to improve the organization, and to preserve the work already established.

EASTSIDE ELEMENTARY P.T.A.

The first meeting of the Eastside Elementary School P. T. A. was called to order by our elementary school principal, Mr. Merrill H. Ziegler, on April 13, 1943 at the Junior High School Study Hall at which time the first Elementary school P. T. A. was organized composed of 17 blocks in the Eastside district; blocks 1,2,3,4, 13, 14, 15, 17, 17, 19, 20, 27, 28, 29, 32, 41 and 42 with approximately 250 families representing this school district.

Our P. T. A. met once a month for a short business meeting after which a program was presented from the grade school class or a speaker from the center staff of doctors, teachers or the appointed personnel member. We have had center talents perform during the course of years in our P. T. A. work. We have also attempted to get better acquainted with teachers and parents by having groups according to the grade level discussing child problems.

To keep the interest alive we have had block representatives to notify the parents in the different blocks of the meetings and the kind of meetings. The monthly meetings were held on the second Tuesday of every month at 3:30 p.m., without fail. The center paper, as well as the school teachers and pupils also made note of these meetings. The teachers and pupils had great deal of interest for there was a banner prize to be presented to the room that had the most parents representing their class or grade represented in attendance. The Banner was purchased by the P. T. A. from our small fund which was collected at about 5 cents from each family who had children enrolled in the elementary school. The color of the banner was in school colors, blue and white the size was 10 1/2 inches by 15 inches. Any class having the banner 3 successive times would be eligible to keep it permanently. The First Grade was the first winner, and the Second Grade was the winner for the second month and etc. To this date it is still being circulated from class to class each month.

The P. T. A. has participated in many center activities in helping to promote better Community life, among which were the following:

1. To help build porch roofs for all the school buildings in cooperation with all the P. T. A. groups.
2. Placing of the childrens playground equipment which was donated to the center children by the 442nd Combat Team of Camp Shelby, Mississippi.
3. Cooperating with all health programs in the center.
4. Observance of all educational Red Letter Days, such as, American Education Week, Music Week, Book Week, etc.
5. Study Groups are being organized to help understand the children's problems, programs in play and health and extra curricular activities for adults as well as children, trying to help build the prestige and morale of each individual to better prepare himself for the Post War World.

EASTSIDE ELEMENTARY P.T.A.

Up until October of 1944 we have had separate Eastside and Westside Elementary school P. T. A. meeting with officers of each being different, but due to the reorganization of our school district the P. T. A. group thought it best to have a combined P. T. A. group; and so on November 17, 1944 the first joint all Elementary School P. T. A. was organized. Our plans for the future are many in helping and cooperating with our school, community and nation to better prepare individuals for the future.

The school year of 1944-45 began with the Eastside and Westside Elementary P. T. A. groups combined into one and meeting on the second Monday night of each month under the leadership of the following cabinet members;

The Westside Elementary P. T. A. followed a program similar to that of the Eastside. The minutes of the meeting were taken in Japanese and in English. The minutes of the Westside P. T. A. were not available.

1. Parent and Teacher Acquaintance

The open house not only showed the exhibition put up by students, but it also was a chance for teachers to meet the parents directly through the students, at which time they were able to discuss and understand individuals.

2. Show Student Progress;

To parents, their children never seem to grow up nor to become capable of taking responsibility. Therefore, when students have Open House annually, they can show their progress during the course of the year. This keeps the parents aware of the fact that their children are growing up with the right kind of education.

3. Student responsibilities;

These open houses are remembered to be one of the big activities of the school year. Each student bears some responsibility in this affair. Each and everyone of the students has one or more exhibits on display. Students are also given individual duties to perform during the Open House. Such as acting as ushers, registrars, interpreters, keeping things in order, etc.

The past two exhibits were given by class subjects. Each teacher had his students do whatever they were learning or interest in line with the subject.

It's hard to say that certain class had the best exhibits, because the registration record shows that visitors had enjoyed and were amazed on many occasions at the proficiency of the work exhibited in every department.
