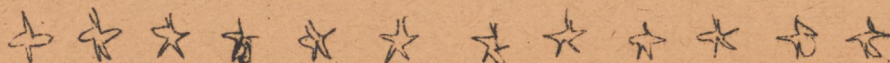
Their only 2 losses were to Blks. 17 and 16.
