AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL DIVISION

Land preparation, including clean-up work, plowing, and bedding was begun about the middle of February. Priorities to purchase needed equipment had not been received and there was only a limited amount of second-hand equipment available.

Approximately 65 acres have been disced and 20 acres bedded, ready for planting. Irish potato planting was started on the last day of February, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ acres were planted.

This division has experienced considerable difficulty in securing necessary labor to carry out work plans. Most of the available cleared land lies 8 miles from the Center, and time lost in assembling and transporting labor to and from work has materially reduced efficiency of crews engaged in farm labor. We have also had difficulty in securing men to drive mules to 2-horse plows.

During the month there was considerable rock-salt deposited in the edible garbage, which is being fed to swine, and this has caused considerable death loss in this enterprise. This has been corrected, and treatment is being given the balance of the hogs to counter-act the condition. Plans for starting slaughtering hogs have been put off until the above trouble has been brought under control.

Fertilizer, both mixed and nitrate of soda, has been secured and we will be in position to use fairly heavy applications in order to boost production as much as possible.

NARRATIVE REPORT ON THE AGRICULTURE DIVISION
FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL

The entire division, other than those engaged with care and slaughter of livestock and sawmill operation, devoted itself to the producing of food during the month of April. Shortage of available labor made it impossible to maintain crews in clearing and woodcutting as was hoped could be done.

Due to the lateness of general planting getting underway, crops such as lettuce, English peas, and some others were curtailed somewhat and more seasonal plantings were being made.

Most of the farm equipment, other than the disc harrows, were received during the month and land preparation is going on at a more accelerated pace than before. Another seasonal planting will require much less time and labor because the land is being cleared up now and this operation will not have to be repeated to this extent again.

After a very wet March, we have had a month with very little rain, and in fact, need some moisture soon if the setting out of plants such as tomato, sweet potato, pepper, egg plant, etc., is carried on successfully.

28,372 pounds of pork were slaughtered during the month. This came at a very opportune time, since it was about impossible to buy meat in any quantity on the open market.

Engineers are preparing plans for poultry houses which will be submitted in the near future. It is hoped this project can get underway by early fall.

The one sawmill which operated, produced 55,000 board feet of rough lumber. About 15,000 feet of this was very thin ($\frac{1}{2}$ ") boards which were used to manufacture flats for plant production. Without the mill, it would have been almost impossible to have bought this material. Several thousand feet of the above material were sold to the Rowher Camp.

In addition to the plantings being made by the division, there are countless more gardens in each and every block. These range from 5' x 10' to 20' x 40'. Most of them are irrigated by carrying water in buckets, and are doing very well.

Monthly Report

Administrative Reports for October, 1943

SUMMARY

All operations at this center during October were affected by a campaign to complete leave clearance hearings and various arrangements for solving the winter fuel problem.

The Hearing Board was increased early in October to a total of 14 members and by the end of the month 130 hearings had been completed, approved, and transferred to Washington. These 14 persons devoted probably 50 per cent of their time to this work, and practically full time for the month was required of 14 secretaries.

The wood program got well under way and no crisis such as that experienced last winter can be expected. Woodcutting again was put on the block basis, whereby all physically able men, not excused as key personnel, go to the woods two days each week to represent their individual blocks. This program obviously slowed down operations in all divisions, but with ~~the~~ a few more weeks of good weather this winter's wood supply will be in the blocks about the time the large-scale cutting was begun last fall.

A Van type semi-trailer, carrying 40 men to cut wood in line with this program, overturned on the deep elm road. One of the 40 died some ten days later in a Little Rock hospital; three others with serious injuries are showing steady improvement.

Unseasonal frost on October 15 killed all crops subject to frost and necessitated an early cutting of sweet potato vines, which caused a 25 per cent reduction in that anticipated yield. Green vegetables are being harvested in sufficient quantities and will last from 8 to 10 more weeks. Land clearing has gotten underway in preparation for next year's agriculture. The hog feeding enterprise continued to improve and slaughter was pushed up to 1500 pounds per day.

Schools opened October 4, for the 1943-44 term with a total enrollment of 2,051. Staff changes showed 5 appointive and 22 evacuee additions, one appointive and five evacuee resignations, and nine appointive vacancies. The Adult Education Program secured the services of a skilled automotive mechanics' instructor and effort is being made to recruit two commercial head teachers.

A reduction in the number of public assistance grants was effected by a thorough investigation of month to month recipients.

Relocation pictures were shown according to schedule, two of the series being shown to a total of some 1800 persons, mostly adults.

Under inspired evacuee leadership the center U.S.O. Program reached laudible propositions during October. That organization secured better quarters, wider cooperation, and more complete acceptance. More than 1,000 Japanese-American servicemen have registered as guests.

A welcome program sponsored by the Community Activities Section accomplished evident results in making new transferees from Tule Lake better satisfied with their new homes.

No Internal Security problems of any consequence developed. Arrangements were made with the state of Louisiana to care of delinquent boys from this center at a Monroe Training School. *Jon*

The Permanent Community Council/^{charter} submitted to the residents in English and Japanese was unanimously approved. An election for new representatives was called for November 13. Nominations were turned in. More than twelve ~~of~~ ^{of} whom were ineligible to serve. Each name was checked by the Executive Secretary of the Council and referred to the Project Attorney for approval. Residents of the center showed considerable interest in their ratification and nominating. Several evacuees have expressed the opinion that relocation has definitely lowered the standard of persons eligible for council membership. The administrative personnel does not agree with this opinion. It has been noted that men released from internment are leaders and fully capable of replacing the ability which has been lost through relocation.

During October 89 persons left the center on indefinite leave; 59 seasonal leave; 209 on short-term leave. Most of those leaving were skilled, professional, or technical workers. The job offers during the month were definitely better.

Vernon Kennedy of the Kansas City area with his staff and Harold Choate of the Denver area spent one week each at this center. Their visit was considered an experiment to determine the value of such procedure. They held meetings every night with various groups and were unanimous in their approval of first-hand contact with the residents. Their interest was general relocation more than specific problems within the areas. Six private recruiters visited the center and ~~experience~~ ^{their} here was entirely satisfactory and none left without securing the labor he required.

Monthly Report, November, 1943 - Reports Office Summary

November was Paul A. Taylor's last month at the project. In his last weekly report to the Director he wrote, "I honestly believe that the project as a whole is in better condition than it has ever been at any time since its establishment. Morale of appointed personnel and evacuees I believe is at an all-time high." No one, I believe, would argue with this opinion.

November was a large month in many ways: the big drainage ditch was completed; the fuel problem for the winter was licked to all practical purposes; the Relocation Guidance Committee, the nucleus for future relocation planning, became strong in leadership, public acceptance, and in acceptance of its responsibilities; the Internal Security Section was re-organized and inspired with esprit de corps; the permanent community council became a fact.

The first meeting of the council was held November 17, a few days after 77 per cent of the eligible voters elected eighteen issei and fifteen nisei to its membership. By the end of the month nine council committees had been organized. They and the council were functioning and were definitely accepted by the residents.

A large leave hearing board continued its activities and 213 leave dockets were forwarded to Washington.

During the month 109 persons left on indefinite leave and seventeen returned to the center from various leave classifications.

The Operations Division completed work on the center garage and continued construction of bridges and the center auditorium.

The center's U.S.O. organization continued to show gratifying progress. It moved into larger quarters and filed application for recognition by the national organization following a visit by two national representatives.

This center during the entire month had an acting relocation program supervisor who was also responsible for the employment section. In the latter connection a detailed schedule of evacuee labor for the quarter, calling for 2300 positions, was forwarded to Washington.

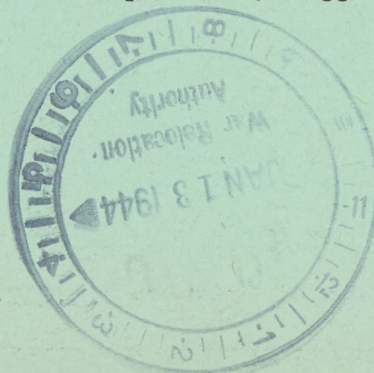

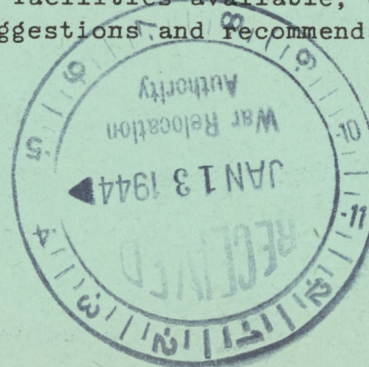
