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CONSTITUTION
OF
THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF
CANAL HIGH SCHOOL

Rivers, Arizona

PREAMBLE

We, the Associated Students of Canal High School, in order to provide for Student government, promote school spirit, secure greater cooperation between faculty and students, serve efficiently our community and to inculcate the ideals of Americanism, do hereby establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I

Name, Colors, Motto, and Emblem

Section I. This organization shall be known as the Associated Students of Canal High School.

Section II. The colors of this organization shall be blue and gold.

Section III. The Motto: Enter to learn; go forth to serve.

Section IV. The emblem of this organization shall be "Golden Bears."

ARTICLE II

Membership

The Associated Students of Canal High School shall be comprised of all registered students.

ARTICLE III

Student Body Officers

Section I. The officers of the Associated Students shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Chairman of Publications, Yell Leader, and a Sergeant-at-Arms.

Section II. Qualification. All officers of the Associated Students shall be regular registered students and the President shall be a senior during his term in office. If the President resigns and the Vice President becomes President, the above requirement is void.

Section III. Duties. The President shall:

- (a) Preside over all student body meetings.
- (b) Be chairman of the Student Council.
- (c) Vote only in case of a tie.
- (d) Have power to call special meetings.

The Vice President shall:

- (a) Assume all duties of the President in his absence and become the President upon his resignation.
- (b) Be social chairman and have supervision of the Freshmen Assembly as stated in Article V of the By-laws.

The Secretary shall:

- (a) Take minutes of all Student Body and Student Council meetings.
- (b) Attend to all Student Body and Student Council correspondence.

The Treasurer shall:

- (a) Take charge of all student funds with the help of the auditor who shall be a member of the faculty.
- (b) The auditor must countersign all outgoing checks and counter-indorse all incoming checks.

The Chairmen of Publications shall:

- (a) Appoint his committee with the help of the advisor.
- (b) With his committee, appoint the editor of the annual and school paper and approve the staff of both.
- (c) Look after the welfare of all school publications and be Publicity Chairmen.
- (d) Work in accordance with the Student Body Treasurer.

The Yell Leader shall:

- (a) Choose two students who shall be his assistants during his term in office.
- (b) Lead yells and songs at school rallies and school games.

The Sergeant-at-Arms shall:

- (a) Keep order at all Student Body and Student Council meetings.
- (b) Select a committee, and with his committee, take charge of all social welfare, such as, letters of sympathy, congratulations, etc.

Section IV. Terms. Each officer shall hold his office for two semesters.

Section V. Meetings. The meetings shall be called by the President when deemed necessary.

ARTICLE IV

Student Council

Section I. Membership. The Student Council shall be comprised of all Student Body officers, all Class Presidents, and one representative from each class. This group shall select two faculty members to be its advisors.

Section II. Duties. The duties of the Student Council shall be:

- (a) Transact student business.
- (b) Have jurisdiction over all student activities.
- (c) Approve student financial affairs.
- (d) Check the petitions nominating Student Body Officers.
- (e) Approve the declination of the candidates for Student Body Offices by 2/3 majority.
- (f) Approve petitions for amendments to the constitution.
- (g) Approve the resignations of Student Body Officers by a 2/3 majority.
- (h) Appoint officers to fill in vacancies of the Student Body Offices, with the exception of the Student Body President, within ten days.
- (i) Approve all school awards.

Section III. Terms. The Members of the Student Council shall serve for two semesters.

Section IV. Meetings. The Student Council shall hold regular meetings every Tuesday and special meetings when necessary. A quorum must be present in order to transact business.

ARTICLE V

Class Officers

Section I. The class officers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Yell Leader, and a Class Representative.

Section II. Duties. The President shall:

- (a) Preside over all class meeting.
- (b) Have power to call special meeting.
- (c) Be a member of the Student Council.

The Vice President shall:

- (a) Assume all duties of the President in his absence.
- (b) Be social chairman.

The Secretary shall:

- (a) Take minutes of all class meetings.
- (b) Attend to all class correspondence.

The Treasurer shall:

- (a) Attend to all class finances.
- (b) Give reports when asked.

The Yell Leader shall lead all class yells, songs, and rallies.

The Class Representative shall:

- (a) Represent the class to the Student Council.
- (b) Give reports concerning the class when asked by the Class President.

Section III. Terms. Each officer shall hold his office for two semesters.

ARTICLE VI

Elections

Section I. Secret ballots shall be used; the candidate receiving the majority vote in the final election is elected. In case of a tie, a re-election between those who are tied will be held. A student may be a candidate for only one office of an organization. If he is nominated for more than one office, he must choose one from them.

Section II. The procedure of the Student Body election shall be as follows:

- (a) During the fifth week before the dismissal of school, petitions containing a minimum of thirty signatures shall be submitted to the Student Council.
- (b) During the fourth week, the Student Council shall announce the candidates and a primary election shall be held. The persons receiving the two highest number of votes will be candidates in the final election.
- (c) During the third week, campaign speeches shall be made and the final election shall be held.

1943 election shall be held as follows:

- (a) After the adoption of this constitution, petitions may be submitted to the High School Office.
- (b) The office shall announce the candidates and the election date.

Section III. The procedure of the class election shall be as follows:

- (a) The election must be held by the end of the second week of school.
- (b) Nominations shall be made from the floor at the class meeting.

ARTICLE VII

Finance

1. All organization funds are to be banked with Auditor who shall in turn bank the separate funds at a down-town bank in one account.

2. All treasurers will deposit funds with the Auditor on the day on which they are collected, or the following day.

3. The Auditor will give each treasurer a receipt for all funds deposited.

4. The Auditor shall keep accurate accounts of all separate funds and prepare monthly statements for each group.

5. Student organizations shall prepare a budget and file this budget with the Auditor after it has been approved by the organization's advisor.

6. Each organization advisor shall approve all expenditures before they are made. Requests for funds from the Auditor will be granted if signed by the advisor and the treasurer of the group, if such group has sufficient funds in the bank account.

7. Each organization shall keep accurate accounts of their collections and payments, such accounts to be audited once a semester.

8. The Auditor shall be a member of the faculty appointed by the Principal.

9. If there are not sufficient funds in the Student Body Treasury. Athletic awards shall not be issued.

ARTICLE VIII

Organizations

The procedure of forming an organization shall be:

- (a) Obtain a minimum of ten signatures on a petition.
- (b) Obtain a sponsor.
- (c) Write and submit a constitution to the Student Council.

After the approval of the Student Council, it becomes an official organization of the school.

ARTICLE IX

Nothing in this Constitution shall conflict in any way with regulations of the War Relocation Authority or any orders of its executives.

ARTICLE X

Amendments

The procedure of amending this constitution shall be as follows:

- (a) A petition containing signatures of one third of the entire Student Body shall be submitted to the Student Council.
- (b) This petition must be approved by two-thirds of the Student Council.

If the petition is approved, the constitution shall be amended.

BY LAWS

ARTICLE I

Quorum

A quorum shall be two-thirds of the membership of an entire body.

ARTICLE II

Boys Athletics

Section I. Boys shall earn their awards by the following methods:

- (a) In football, basketball, and baseball, the player shall compete in one-half or more of all league games. The only exception to this method shall be in the case of pitchers and catchers on the baseball team. Their awards shall be determined by the Student Council with the advice of the Coach.
- (b) Track awards shall be given to all members who have placed either first, second, third, or fourth in tri-way league meets.
- (c) Manager's awards shall be determined by the Student Council with the advice of the coach.
- (d) In cases of injuries, the athlete may receive his letter at the request of the coach and the approval of the Student Council.

Section II. The following types of awards shall be given to the members who have earned them by the methods stated in Section I:

- (a) A six inch chenille drop block "C" shall be awarded to the members of the varsity team.
- (b) A five inch chenille drop block "C" shall be awarded to the members of the B class team.
- (c) A chenille "C" within a six inch diamond shall be awarded to the members of the C class team.
- (d) Boys athletic letters shall be a gold letter upon a blue background.
- (e) Yell leaders letter shall be a six inch chenille drop block "C", with a blue megaphone across the middle.
- (f) Managers letters shall be the same as all athletic letter's, the size according to the class they manage, with the word "MGR" engraved in blue on the upper middle part of the "C".

Section III. All Athletic awards shall be issued after each season. The varsity members shall receive only one letter during his entire school career. A new letter will be issued in exchange for an injured one with the approval of the Student Council.

The B and C. class members shall receive only one B or C letter. They shall receive new letters when they advance in class.

Emblems shall be awarded to members of athletic teams who have earned them by the same method in which they have earned their letters.

Section IV. All students participating in school athletics must abide by the Arizona State inter-scholastic rulings.

ARTICLE III

Girls Athletics

Section I. The girls' major sports are volleyball, speedball, baseball, basketball, and hiking.

Section II. The girls shall earn their awards by the following methods:

- (a) If a player plays the majority of the class's major sport game, she shall receive 100 points.
- (b) For individual sports such as badminton, ping-pong, and tennis, they shall receive points by the "Ladder System."
 - For first place, 100 points
 - For second place, 75 points
 - For third place, 50 points
 - For fourth place, 25 points

Section III. The following types of awards shall be given to the members who have earned them as stated in Section II:

- (a) When a player makes 250 points, she shall become a member of the Girls Athletic Association.
- (b) When a player makes 500 points, a four inch felt numeral shall be awarded.
- (c) When a player makes 1000 points, a five inch felt block letter shall be awarded.
- (d) When a player makes 1600 points, a five inch chenille drop block letter, the colors same as the boys' shall be awarded.

ARTICLE IV

Publication

Section I. Annual. The editor shall appoint his staff which shall consist of an assistant editor, literary editor, boy's athletic editor, girl's athletic editor, art editor, class editor, calendar editor, organization editor, senior activities editor, a head typist, and a mimeographer.

Section II. School paper. The editor of the school paper shall appoint a staff which shall consist of an assistant editor, sports editor, art editor, activities editor, a head typist, and a mimeographer.

ARTICLE V

Initiation

There shall be no freshmen initiation, but they must present an assembly to the student body under the supervision of the Student Body Vice President.

ARTICLE VI

Ratification

This Constitution, in order to be adopted, must be approved by two-thirds of both the Constitutional Convention and the Student Body respectively.

SUMMARY ON EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Extra-curricular activities carried on in Canal High School require expenditures of a considerable amount of money, much of which must be raised in the community as there is no provision to supply these needs from WRA funds.

We are attaching herewith an outline of these various organizations with a brief description of the activities carried on by each. Also each organization has set up a budget for the coming year and is required to keep its expenditures within the budgetary allowance unless special permission to exceed the budget is granted by the Student Council.

Each organization has set up a maximum of \$20.00 for social expenses. This is the limit that they are allowed to spend for this purpose; however, all socials are self-supporting and the community at large is never asked to contribute toward this expense. Students who attend these functions pay a small charge (not over 15 cents) which takes care of refreshments, etc.

One activity requiring considerable subsidy is the publication of the year book. This book costs approximately \$1500. The 1943-44 statement discloses sources of revenue and expenditures. The present budget calls for a subsidy of \$450.00.

The student body budget estimate for the present year is \$480. \$30 of this is for social expense which will be collected from those participating, leaving about \$450 to be raised in the community.

The high school students have just concluded putting on a carnival which showed a net profit of \$588.91. As the total subsidy by all extra-curricular activities amounts to \$1404.00, there will be a balance of \$815.09 needed to finance the school for the present year. The students of the high school will undertake to raise this money through shows, class plays, entertainments at which admission is charged and possibly another carnival. We hope to be able to avoid having to put on another carnival as this is quite a burden of work for the student body and assisting organizations. The high school respectfully petitions community organizations to give consideration to their financial needs and will appreciate any assistance that may be provided.

EXPLANATION FOR SOCIALS AND SPECIAL FUNDS

In the case of all clubs, the Special Funds shall be raised by individual assessment as the expenditures represent individual emblems or pins or if the case may be, the Special Funds may be paid by the 10% profit made at the carnival.

Social Funds shall be raised by the sale of tickets except where funds are available as a result of the 10% net profit earned at the carnival. In the case of invited guests, funds may be taken from the treasury or by assessments or dues to pay for their admission ticket.

CANAL HIGH SCHOOL YEARBOOK, "THE RIVULET"

The Canal High School yearbook, "The Rivulet", is issued at the end of each school year. This book is published by the students of Canal High School and is primarily a pictorial review of the year.

The publication of the school annual cannot be subsidized by the WRA. The students have made various plans to raise enough money to finance this publication.

QUILL AND SCROLL

The Quill and Scroll is an international honorary society for high school journalists and our local chapter is made up of staff members of the three principal publications of the year; the Hi-Tide, our high school newspaper; the Rivulet, our annual; and the Bear Trails, our high school handbook.

ORDER OF BUSINESS EFFICIENCY

A national organization sponsored by the Business Education World, New York.

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be "Order of Business Efficiency."

Article II. Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be: (1) to uphold the standard of efficiency in every activity of school life; (2) to be of service to the school and community whenever possible; (3) to foster the spirit of friendship and good will between the businessmen of the community and the school.

Article III. Membership

Section I. The membership shall consist of students of commercial subjects who have participated in the Business Education World project service and have earned senior Certificates of Achievement in one or more of the following classification: bookkeeping, business fundamentals, business personality, business letter writing, and transcription.

Section II. There shall be four classes of membership, namely:

- (1) Active members--students currently enrolled in school.
- (2) Alumni members--students who have been members of the organization but are no longer enrolled in school.
- (3) Honorary members--those who have been elected to membership because of their interests in the purposes of the organization and their willingness to support its activities.
- (4) Sponsors--(a) faculty sponsors, and (b) businessmen and members of the community who are in sympathy with the purposes of the organization and whose assistance and support are of value to the organization.

Article IV. Pin

The official insignia of the organization shall be the O.B.E. pin, which may be purchased through the Business Education World.

Article V. Meetings

Section I. The annual business meeting for the election of the officers shall be held May 10,.

Section II. The organization shall hold meetings at such time and place as shall be designated by ~~the~~ group.

Article VI. Officers

Section I. The officers of the organization shall be president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

Section II. The term of office for all officers shall be for one school year.

Article VII. Committee

Section I. The president shall appoint such committees as may be deemed necessary to carry on the various activities of the organization.

Section II. The standing committees of the organization shall be: program, social, membership, service, and publicity.

Section III. The officers of the organization and the chairman of each standing committee shall comprise the Executive Board.

Article VIII. Rules of Order

The Parliamentary (by Cora Welles Trow) shall govern all proceedings.

Article IX. Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any meeting of the organization by a majority vote, provided the amendment was presented in written form to the Executive Board and read to the members at the meeting immediately preceding the voting.

BYLAWS

Membership

1. Any student who is a holder of a senior Certificates of Achievement awarded by the Business Education World is eligible for membership in this organization.

2. Rights. Active members have equal suffrage rights. Alumni members may vote only within their own group if they are organized as a separate group.

3. Suspension. Upon complaint of dishonorable or unprofessional conduct, members may be expelled by the unanimous decision of the Executive Board.

Meetings

1. At the annual business meeting, a nominating committee, appointed by the president, shall submit names for officers for the coming year. The president shall submit a report of the year's work.

2. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of two-thirds of the active membership.

Officers

1. The president shall preside at all meetings, shall be an ex-officio member of all committees appointed, shall be chairman of the Executive Board, and shall perform all such duties as are incident to his office and that are properly required of him.

2. The vice-president, in the absence of the president, shall exercise all the functions of the president, and be vested with all his powers.

3. The secretary, on instructions from the president, shall give written notice of all meetings to members, shall have charge of all papers of the organization, and shall keep a record of the minutes and attendance of all business meetings.

4. The treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the organization and shall keep the accounts of the organization in a book provided for that purpose.

5. Officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and shall serve for one year. The candidate receiving a majority of votes for any office shall be considered elected.

Committees

1. The Executive Board shall have general direction of the organization and shall have the power to transact all ordinary business and to authorize all payments.

2. The Program Committee shall provide an interesting and helpful program for every regular meeting.

3. The Social Committee shall have charge of the social activities of the organization.

4. The membership Committee shall pass upon the eligibility of proposed members.

5. The Service Committee shall see that all members of the organization have opportunities for service to the school and to the community, and it shall see that members who have undertaken service duties perform them to the best of their ability.

6. The Publicity Committee shall have charge of the advertising and publicity of the organization.

Amendments

All amendments to the bylaws shall be subject to the same provisions as those regulating the Constitution.

LOCAL CONSTITUTION OF CANAL CHAPTER
OF RIVERS, ARIZONA
FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

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Article I -- Name and Purposes

Section A. The name of this organization shall be the "Canal Chapter of Rivers, Arizona--Future Farmers of America." Members are hereinafter referred to as "Future Farmers of America" and the letters "F.F.A." may be used to designate the chapter, its activities, or members thereof.

Section B. The purposes for which this chapter is formed are as follows:

1. To develop competent, aggressive, rural, and agricultural leadership.
2. To create and nurture a love of country life.
3. To strengthen the confidence of farm boys and young men in themselves and their work.
4. To create more interest in the intelligent choice of farming occupations.
5. To encourage members in the development of individual farming programs and establishment in farming.
6. To encourage members to improve the farm home and its surroundings.
7. To participate in worthy undertakings for the improvement of agriculture.
8. To develop character, train for useful citizenship, and foster patriotism.
9. To participate in cooperative effort.
10. To encourage and practice thrift.
11. To encourage improvement in scholarship.
12. To provide and encourage the development of organized rural recreational activities.

Article II -- Organization

Section A. The Canal Chapter of Rivers--F.F.A. ^{may become} ~~is~~ a chartered local unit of the Arizona Association of F.F.A. which is chartered by the national organization of Future Farmers of America.

Section B. This chapter accepts in full the provisions in the constitution and by-laws of the Arizona Association of F.F.A. as well as those of the national organization of Future Farmers of America, (if and when accepted by these organizations.)

Article III -- Membership

Section A. Membership in this chapter shall be of three kinds: (1) Active; (2) Associate; and (3) Honorary, as defined by the national F.F.A. constitution.

Section B. The regular work of this chapter shall be carried on by the active membership.

Section C. Honorary membership in this chapter shall be limited to the Honorary Future Farmer Degree.

Section D. Active members in good standing may vote on all business brought before the chapter. An active member shall be considered in good standing when:

1. He attends local chapter meetings with reasonable regularity.
2. He shows an interest in, and takes part in the affairs of the chapter.
3. He pays his dues regularly.

Section E. Names of applicants for membership shall be filed with the membership committee.

ARTICLE IV--Emblems

Section A. The emblem of the F. F. A. shall be the emblem for the chapter.

Section B. Emblems used by the members shall be uniform and those obtained from concerns officially designated by the national organization F.F.A.

ARTICLE V -- Membership Degrees and Privileges

Section A. There shall be two grades of active membership in this chapter. These grades are: (1) The Green Hand Degree, and (2) The Future Farmer Degree.

All "Green Hands" are entitled to wear the regulation bronze emblem pin. All members holding the Degree of Future Farmer are entitled to wear the silver emblem degree pin.

Section B. Green Hand Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

1. Be regularly enrolled in a class in vocational agriculture and have satisfactory and acceptable plans to participate in our program of supervised farming.
2. Be familiar with the purposes of the F.F.A. and the program of work of the local chapter.
3. Recite from memory the Creed of the Future Farmers of America.
4. Receive a majority vote of the members present at a regular meeting of the chapter.

Section C. Future Farmer Degree. Minimum qualifications for election:

1. Must have held the Degree of Green Hand for at least one year immediately preceding election to the Degree of Future Farmer and have a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the local chapter.
2. Must have satisfactorily completed at least one year of instruction in vocational agriculture, cooperate in the operation of our improved supervised farming program, and be regularly enrolled in a vocational agriculture class.

3. Be familiar with the purposes and programs of work of the State association and national organization.
4. Be familiar with the provisions of the constitution of the local chapter.
5. Be familiar with parliamentary procedure.
6. Be able to lead a group discussion for fifteen minutes.
7. Must have earned by his own efforts from his full cooperation of the proposed supervised farming program as set up by the local chapter,, which would be equivalent, for the boy to an investment of \$25.00.
8. Receive a majority vote of the members present at a regular local chapter meeting.

Section D. Special committees shall review the qualifications of members and make recommendations to the chapter concerning degree advancement.

ARTICLE VI -- Officers

Section A. The officers of the chapter shall be as follows: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter, Watch Dog and Adviser. The Adviser shall be the teacher of vocational agriculture in the school where the chapter is located. Officers shall perform the usual duties of their respective offices.

Section B. Officers shall be elected (semi-annually or) annually by a majority vote of the members present at a regular chapter meeting.

Section C. The officers of the chapter together with the chairmen in charge of the major sections of the annual program of work shall constitute the Chapter Executive Committee. This Executive Committee shall have full power to act as necessary for the chapter in accordance with actions taken at chapter meetings and various regulations or by-laws adopted from time to time.

Section D. Honorary members shall not vote nor shall they hold any office in the chapter except that of Adviser.

Section E. Chapter officers must hold the Degree of Future Farmer.

ARTICLE VII -- Meetings

Section A. Regular chapter meetings shall be held at least once a month during the school year and once a month during the remaining months of the year at such time and place as is designated by the chapter executive committee. Special meetings may be called at any time.

Section B. Two delegates shall be elected annually from the active membership to represent the chapter at the State convention. Other delegates may be named as necessary in order to have proper representation at various other F.F.A. meetings within the State.

Section C. A majority of the active members listed on the secretary's membership roll shall constitute a quorum, and a quorum must be present at any meeting at which business is transacted or a vote taken committing the chapter to any proposal or action.

ARTICLE VIII -- Dues

- Section A. Local dues in this chapter shall be fixed annually by a majority vote of the active members.
- Section B. Full local, State and national dues shall be paid by all active members.
- Section C. No member shall be considered as active and in good standing unless he pays full local, State and national F.F. A. dues.

ARTICLE IX -- Amendments

- Section A. This constitution may be amended or changed at any regular chapter meeting by a two-thirds vote of the active members present providing it is not in conflict with the State Association constitution or that of the national organization of F.F.A.
- Section B. By-laws may be adopted to fit the needs of the chapter at any regular chapter meeting by a two-thirds vote of the active members present providing such by-laws conflict in no way with the constitution and by-laws of either the State Association or the national organization.

Canal High School is now housed in six barracks in the west half of Block 13, plus the Ironing room and the Laundry, small buildings in the center of the Block. The Mess Hall is also used for high school classes. The kitchen is used for Home Economics classes and the dining room for social and large group meetings. The Mess Hall is in demand for community gathering, party, entertainment, etc., there almost every night. It is used by the Buddhist Church on Sundays.

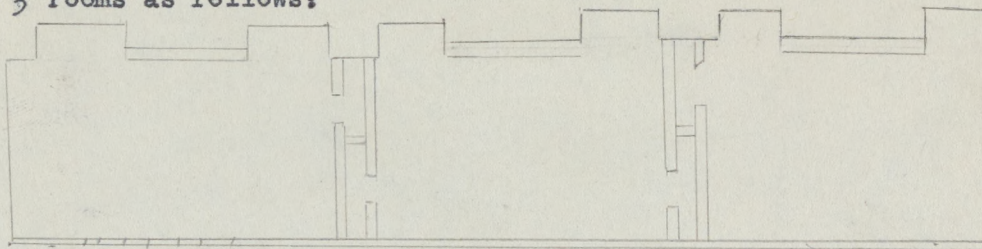
The present plant is inadequate. All rooms are crowded and in continuous use. Also, lack of tables and seats are a problem. All now in use have been built in the project - most of them in the School Shop.

All rooms lack teacher's desks, closet room & shelving. All have rough floors with open cracks and knot holes, with the exception of the Mess Hall and the Ironing and Laundry rooms which have concrete floors. None are finished inside, neither the walls nor ceiling. All doors are ill fitting, made of 6" T & G boards with barn door type of hardware. The method of locking is with padlocks of which we have an inadequate number.

However; if finished and altered, with the addition of few buildings the present school plant can be made to serve during the duration.

The revised plan for school building, which is, we are advised approved, calls for an auditorium-gymnasium 50 x 106', a Science building 20 x 170', a Home Economics building 20 x 170' and a Shop 20 x 80'. These buildings are to be constructed west across the Fire Break from the present building.

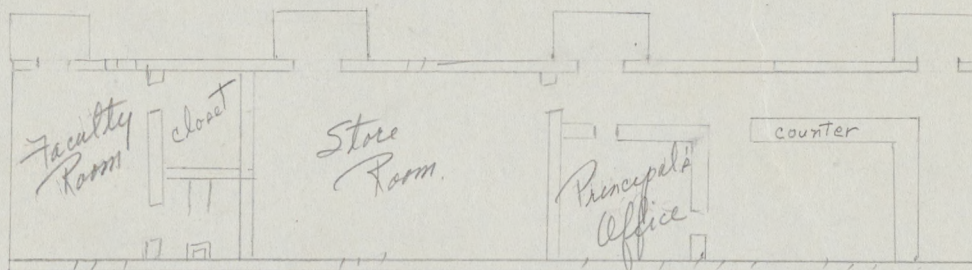
To permit meeting minimum requirements, alterations should be made in the buildings as follows: The typical class room should be $1/3$ instead of $1/4$ of a Barrack. Each building to be used for classes should be divided into 3 rooms as follows:



The end doors should be closed, two doors as illustrated put on the south side in each room; double partition which will provide closets constructed illustrated with black boards illustrated in solid blue. All windows put on north side, which would involve doubling sliding windows now installed, leaving a mullion of about 2' between each double sliding window. South windows should be eliminated. Black boards and Bulletin Boards shown on south side and partitions, 25' Black board and 15' Bulletin board for each room. One wall in each room may be utilized for shelves and open lockers for student use. Each door should have a 4 x 6' porch. Walls and ceilings should be covered with sheetrock with ceilings painted oyster white, walls buff, non glare flat. Windows should be provided with shades. Floors should be covered with Masterpave. Doors with master-keyed locks should be provided for each room. Drinking fountains should be placed at the east end of all buildings, with platform and roof over the fountain. Narrow transom should be put above outside doors to provide cross ventilation.

Gongs for outside should be provided.

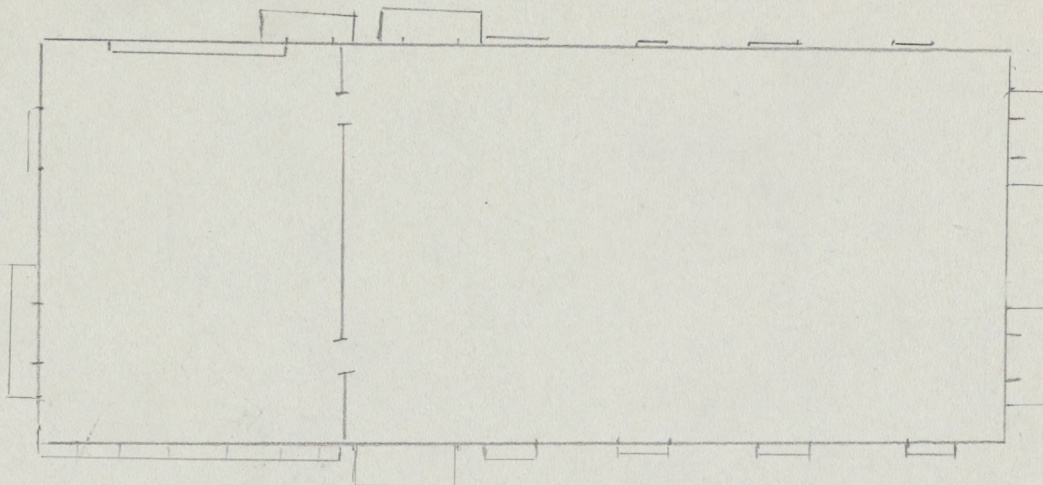
Barracks #9, 10, 12, 13, and 14 should be altered as described above, Barrack #11 should be designed to provide the administrative office, janitor supply room, school supply room, and teachers' rest rooms as follows:



The library - Study Hall should be removed to the present Mess Hall dining room which is large enough to accomodate all students needing to study which is not true of present library. Shelves for books should be built and the present evaporative cooler installed there. All rooms should be wired for 4 ceiling lights in each room, lights to be housed in diffusion globe.

The kitchen in the Mess Hall should be altered as illustrated in the accompanying sketch, which also illustrates the proposed Library - Study Hall. The kitchen room to be used as a school museum where projects from all departments may be kept on display. Wall cases, tables and if possi-

ble, glass display counters may be installed. This room should be equipped with seats and used as a projection room for classes using motion pictures, slide projections, etc. Windows should be equipped with blackout shades to darken room for this purpose. The present stove and sinks should be revised.



The Library - Study Hall windows may be left as they are. Shelves may be built around the room under the windows.

Above suggestion alternations are all predicated on the supposition that additional buildings as planned will be completed and equipped. The auditorium-gymnasium should have a stage equipped with foot-lights, stage curtain scenery, etc. Also, the locker rooms for the boys and girls should be equipped with clothing lockers, basket type, showers, lavatories, and toilets. Adequate lighting for the large floor should be provided. The shop should be wired for use of power machinery now on project. The 170' buildings is not all needed for Home Economics uses and the north-west room could be used for a lumber supply and finishing room.

The Home Economics room should have adequate sinks, stove, pantry, dining room tables, chairs, etc. as well as regular class room equipment. Outlets for 24 sewing machines should be provided.

The science building should provide sinks for the laboratories, lockers for acids, equipment, etc., in addition to regular class room furniture.

Additional seats and tables are needed for the entire school. These can be built in the school shop if lumber can be provided for that purpose.

SUBJECT: Report of Building Requirements at the Gila River Relocation Center

As a result of a recent order by the War Production Board, construction of elementary school buildings on all projects has been eliminated. This action has necessitated a re-survey of the uses made of buildings on projects as well as future building needs. This survey has attempted to discover what present uses are being made of buildings for schools, housing, recreation, and other purposes in order to determine what alterations and additions are necessary for the more efficient functioning of the school program. This survey was suggested in a letter from Mr. Dillon Myer to all project directors, dated March 8, 1943

In view of this action taken by the War Production Board, it becomes necessary to convert existing barracks into school buildings. During the past year these barracks have been used for schools under conditions which scarcely meet minimum standards in regard to space requirements, lighting, heating and sanitation. In order to utilize these buildings properly and have them meet acceptable educational standards, certain modification and additions are necessary. Most of the materials for these alterations must have the approval of the War Production Board. This survey will afford preliminary information necessary to secure such approval. Before complete action can be taken by the Board, PD-200 forms should be prepared and submitted. This should be done at the earliest possible moment.

In each of the two camps, high school buildings are to be constructed according to modified plans already approved. These plans call for the construction of an auditorium-gymnasium, science class rooms and laboratories, home economics rooms and shops. Such an addition will free enough space in barracks now being used for these purposes to permit an extension of the present size of classrooms to a more acceptable standard. Every attempt should be made to complete the new buildings by September 1. Otherwise the proposed alterations submitted in this report cannot fulfill your needs. The plans

submitted in this report cannot fulfill your new high school buildings and the alterations will be completed by the time school opens this fall. We believe that the high school buildings can be completed by September 1 if material can be made available and full time effort be given to this construction.

Attached are copies of plans for alterations of Canal Elementary school, Canal High School, Butte Elementary School, and Butte High School.

In order to provide better lighting, it is recommended that cross lighting to be eliminated and that all windows be placed on the north or east side. Each classroom should have at least three light fixtures and these should be located a little off center, opposite the side where windows are placed. Indirect or fluorescent lighting is recommended. Ceilings should be painted white and walls some light color in order to give approximately 80% reflection. Green blackboards are distinctly preferred. All doors should swing out. Two doors to a classroom are recommended for safety measures. One of these doors can be in the partitions between rooms. There are certain educational advantages in such an arrangement. Doors should be opposite windows.

1. Remove 39 partitions.
2. Install 27 partitions as per attached plan.
3. Install 45 new doors.
4. Remove 98 windows from west side of barracks and install on east side. Board up intervening space.
5. Install 256 window blinds or awnings.
6. Install shower heating facilities in the latrines.
7. Partition barrack 3 for office space as per inclosed plan.
8. Install stage in mess hall 2' x 12' x 40' (1500 bd. ft.)

9. (a) Build 100 benches with backs--13" high, 8 ft. long.
(b) Build 300 benches with backs--16" high, 8 ft. long.
(10,000 bd. ft. lumber)
10. Install one telephone.
11. Cover all floors except mess hall with masterpave.
12. Seal all walls and ceilings with sheetrock.
13. Paint all ceilings oyster white, walls light sand.
14. Build one concrete incinerator.
15. Install 1000 bd. ft. of shelves in library.
16. Install closets in each classroom. Same as Canal High School plans.
17. Install shelving in store room, 36" wide. (500 bd. ft.)

At the present time there are approximately 200 evacuee apartments shared by more than one couple. This, with the average marriage rate of 3 per week seems to justify the construction of 200 partitions to secure one family per apartment conditions. There also are approximately 300 apartments without stoves. Combined with the 200 stoves to outfit the 200 apartments to be created, the project should request 500 stoves, complete with flues. The relocation policy may eliminate the necessity for both the partitions and stoves, but at present we can not determine to what extent. Therefore, we have included these items in our estimates and recommend that the War

Production Board be requested to grant approval. It is possible that this trend may be determined before it becomes necessary to purchase all the material requested.

Upon completion of the staff housing units as now planned it is expected ample facilities will be available to house the appointed personnel. There are a number of unfilled positions, which if filled, may change the number of families as listed, however, no further new construction is recommended as normal turnover in personnel as well as those who normally live in nearby towns and provide their own transportation will probably offset any increase.

Recreation buildings at Gila serve the same multiple purpose as at other centers. No new construction is recommended here as the recreation program seems to function as now equipped as far as buildings are concerned.

The new store buildings and warehouses as approved by the War Production Board are still required. The construction of these buildings will allow the release of other buildings to their original use and will improve both the recreation and warehousing problems.

The following is a list of the construction projects discussed with you and your staff shown in the order of their action priority as determined by the Project Engineer. The first group represents projects for which approval has been granted by W.P.B. The second is for other proposed projects. Priority of the proposed construction may be determined by allowing the A numbered items to follow next but after the unlettered item in the first list.

1. Schools and Staff Housing
2. Dairy Project
3. Hog and Poultry Unit
4. Hospital Coolers
5. Roads and Bridges
6. Camp Irrigation
7. Bakery
8. Carpenter-Plumbing and Electrical Shop
9. Automotive Shop

- 1A. Gold Storage Warehouse (2)
- 1A. Field Packing Shed
- 1A. Loading platform at Railhead
- 2A. Flourine Filter Reactivating Plant
- 3A. Hospital Situation (2)
- 4A. Car Shelters (3)
- 5A. Dehydrator

PD-200 forms should go forward to the W.R.A. office in Washington for the above unapproved projects as well as the school alterations as rapidly as possible.

It is also suggested that designs for buildings planned for the Automotive Shop and the Carpenter-Plumbing and Electrical Shop to be carefully considered. The original plans were very elaborate as compared to our actual requirements and it may be found possible to utilize much lighter construction and conserve considerable materials.

Estimated cost of materials for alterations to the schools is \$35,000.

We wish to thank you and your staff for the cooperation and assistance extended during our visit.

ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY

Canal High School established student body government during the first semester of 1942-1943, the first year the school was operated. This was done through holding a constitutional convention which wrote the constitution and submitted it to the student body for adoption.

The Constitution provides that student body officers shall be elected for a term of one year. Student body officers are: president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, chairman of publications, yell leader, and sergeant-of-arms. The Constitution also provides for a student council which is made up of all student body officers, all class presidents, and one representative from each class. Two faculty members are selected to serve as advisors.

Student government in Canal High School has succeeded in fostering school spirit and developing the ideal of democratic self government among the students. Outstanding leaders have been elected to serve as officers.

QUILL AND SCROLL

A chapter of the Quill and Scroll Society was formed at Canal High School on January 20, 1944. The Quill and Scroll is an international honorary society for high school journalists and our local chapter is made up of staff members of the three principal publications of the year; the Hi-Tide, our high school newspaper; the Rivulet, the annual; and Bear Trails, the high school handbook.

Students on the staffs of the previous three publications of Junior and Senior level having a grade average of "B" are eligible for membership. There are twenty-six members of this organization who actively participate in the journalistic program of the high school.

THE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The Canal High School Chapter of the National Honor Society of Secondary Schools was started in Canal High School May 11, 1943. It has served to stimulate scholarship among students and to place secondary education on a high level. From the beginning it was decided that the Society should recognize scholarship, leadership, service, and character with the view of stimulating all students in the secondary schools to strive for attainment of those attributes of high standing.

The Society promotes scholarship and thereby elevates the standards of secondary education in three principal ways: (1) It identifies student ability through recognition of those students whose work is sufficient quality to meet the standards required for membership; (2) It fosters chapter activities and projects designed to realize the ideals of the Society which have a wholesome influence in improving scholarship in the entire school; and (3) It teaches students the importance of looking beyond the high school courses, seeing and striving toward worthy goals, and making the ideals of the Society a means of self-guidance in the higher education and in their daily living.

Membership in the Canal Chapter is limited to fifteen percent of the graduating class and ten percent of the Junior class are elected to membership during the second semester.

NATIONAL ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIP SOCIETY

CANAL HIGH SCHOOL CHAPTER #10,030

The boys of Canal High School petitioned on February 22, 1944, for a charter of the National Athletic Scholarship Society. This charter was granted on March 2, 1944.

The purpose of this organization is to promote sportsmanship, citizenship, and healthful living. Each member has to have earned an "A" or a "B" class letter in his school and to have a grade average for three consecutive semester, including the semester in which the letter was earned, equal to or above the general average of the school. He is to have exemplified the highest type of citizenship and sportsmanship. All students who are eligible by the preceding rules become members by a majority vote of the members. The charter members were selected in conformance with the constitutional requirements by a faculty committee appointed by the principal. Members who fail to live up to the ideals of scholarship, citizenship, or sportsmanship, may be expelled from the society by a majority vote of the membership.

The present club at Canal High School consists of thirteen charter members.

FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

Canal High School Chapter of the Future Farmers of America is a group of vocational agriculture students who, as the title implies, plan to be farmers. The activities consist of lectures by men who have had vast experience in farming and stock raising. The boys have made several field trips to Sacaton and to the Rivers dairy and hog farms. They also work on the farm and in the nurseries as a contribution to the project's agricultural division. The Future Farmers of America is a national organization that is endeavoring throughout the country to improve and stabilize agricultural production upon which they will depend as future farmers.

Canal High School Chapter of the Future Farmers operates in accordance with the national organization. The status of the chapter is not definitely established.

FORENSICS

The Forensics Club is an organization of class officers of the school and those who are interested in public speaking, debate, and parliamentary law. This organization has been very active throughout the current school year and added interest has been brought to it by an extensive program for relocation. Many interesting outside speakers have been called in, who describe their states, the states from which they came, to the students in an effort to inform them upon relocation conditions in the localities discussed. At the close of this year, the Forensics Club is sending four representatives to Butte to debate against the Butte High School debating team.

CANAL HIGH SCHOOL SCIENCE CLUB

The Science Club of Canal High School, affiliate of the Science Clubs of America, has served the purpose of giving its members a broad outlook on many phases of science, the quality so necessary in any chosen profession.

Meetings are held once in two weeks at which time speakers have enlightened the members as to the many applications and possibilities of science. The subjects at the meeting range from the "Theory of Relativity" to a more practical demonstration of "Petroleum Distillation".

The club has thirty-five members with diversified interests and knowledge. This fact was put to good advantage in compliance with the first requirement of those engaged in scientific study. "To study facts, principles and causes in so far as I am able, and to spread the knowledge so obtained."

BIOLOGY CLUB

"Bios" is the term given to this ambitious group which is confirming its activities to study and research work in the science of biology, outside of the regular biology classroom.

By dissection of animals which live around camp, valuable knowledge has been gained by the enthusiasts. The meetings and time for the "Bios" is usually provided for at night, when time is not restricted to a one hour period.

Several parties and assemblies have been held among the group, exclusive to members.

A person who has taken one year in Biological Science is eligible to join the organization, but only a certain number is allowed and new ones have to be approved by a quorum of the members.

THE RIVULET

Canal High School yearbook, "The Rivulet", is issued at the end of each school year. The director of student publications appoints the editor from the senior class and the editor with the assistance of the student director of publications appoints the staff.

The annual is primarily a pictorial review of the year. Individual pictures of the faculty and the graduating class, as well as group pictures of the other classes with all students' names comprise the first part of the book. Other sections are devoted to school activities such as, dramatics, athletics for both boys and girls, club activities, and societies.

Another section is devoted to a pictorial review of community activities for the year.

This publication is financed entirely by the student body book sales and from funds raised for that purpose at a carnival. The Parent-Teacher's organization has assisted in financing this publication.

HI-TIDE

The Hi-Tide was started as a regular publication, the first week after school started in September of 1943. Since that time it has been brought out every two weeks. The principal work on this publication has been done by a journalism class which meets twice a week during the activity period. The Publications Art Club, the commercial department, and the journalism staff work together to bring out this paper.

The paper is mimeographed on a hand-mimeograph machine by members of the staff. It is the purpose of this paper to distribute high school news, to publish the dates of various social functions and sports events, and to keep the students generally informed upon matters which vitally concern their school work and activities.

LETTERMEN'S CLUB

The Lettermen's Club was organized by the boys who earned athletic letters. The purpose of this club is to promote better sportsmanship and citizenship. Anyone earning an Athletic letter in this school is eligible to join the club. The officers of this club consist of the President, the Vice President, and the Secretary-Treasurer. The advisor of this club is the Physical Education teacher of Canal High School.

Due to frequent changes of the Physical Education instructor this year, the activities of this club had been few and varied. The Lettermen have helped on occasions such as the Student Body Carnival and Student Body Assemblies. They sponsored a Pre-Easter Hop and a Student Body Social jointly with another club to top the year off.

THE GIRLS ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Girls Athletic Association was organized to encourage girls to participate in the sports provided, to promote good sportsmanship, and to encourage competition among students.

Various awards are presented by means of a point system. Class competition takes place in the four major sports: volleyball, basketball, speedball, and softball. Participation in three-fourths of the games of each tournament earns 100 points. In the minor sports, tennis, badminton, and ping-pong the "ladder system" is used. Points may also be earned by going on hikes.

A drill team is formed to perform for school functions as well as community events.

Most of the members participated in the two field days one in Butte, the other in Canal.

Toward the middle of the year an initiation was held to welcome in the new members. The G.A.A. has wholeheartedly supported all school activities.

TRI-C

Tri-C is the commercial club of Canal High School. The purpose of this club is to present opportunities for broadening our general knowledge and usefulness in things pertaining to business practices.

This club has also sponsored an honor roll which is composed of scrolls for each of the different commercial subjects. Names of students, not necessarily members of this club, can appear on these scrolls if the students meet the scholastic requirements.

Requirements for membership in this club is as follows:

Each member must:

Have an average grade of "C" or above in commercial subjects.

Have at least 3 semesters work in the commercial field.

A student with two credits in the commercial department is a permanent member.

The advisors of this club are the faculty members of the commercial department.

LOS PAN AMERICANOS

"Los Pan Americanos", a club sponsored by the Spanish Department of Canal High School, invites and welcomes all students interested in gaining some understanding and appreciation of the culture, historical background, and present problems of our Latin American neighbors.

When the students in the Spanish classes decided to form a club and open it to "all students", they felt that they were simply making a gesture. They have been pleasantly surprised to find that one-fifth of the membership is composed of students not enrolled in this department.

The club considers the Christmas party, which it gave for the student body and to which "El Circulo de Amistad" of Butte was invited, to have been the outstanding event of its past semester. The program presented a typical Mexican Christmas with "Las Posadas" (The Christmas procession), the "Pinata" (the breaking of clay jugs filled with candy), and Mexican songs. Mexico's colors - red, white, and green - were fortunately traditional for Christmas in this country. The central unit of decoration was an excellent reproduction of the Virgin of Guadalupe, done by the Art Department of the school.

PUBLICATIONS ART CLUB

The Publications Art Club was organized to be of service to our school, and to encourage art experience and art appreciation.

This club meet regularly every week, and some of the things that we have been doing are: The art work for the Hi-Tide (school paper), for the Rivulet (school annual). The colored pictures in the annual were made by the Silk Screen method.

We have also used the Silk Screen to make the Honor Roll cards and have presented each student with a picture of our school.

THE DRAMA CLUB

The Drama Club is open to all students. The club meets twice each week during the regularly scheduled activity period. The members have worked on one act plays for class use, on expression by pantomime, and on brief, creative roles.

During the first semester, the club, assisted by several departments of the school, presented for the student body and the community the well known Christmas play, "Why the Chimes Rang". The effective settings were designed and created by the Art Department; the costumes for the pageant scene were designed and made of jewel-toned crepe paper by three students of the Home Economics Department; background music was provided by the Music Department.

Soon the club will present as an assembly program a short and amusing play of college life, "Getting Pinned". The play was chosen by the members of the club as the answer to their desire for "something very modern".

GIRLS GLEE CLUB

The Girls Glee Club of Canal High School was organized on February 19, 1943. This organization is open to any girl in high school who is interested in vocal music.

Emphasis is placed upon group singing, but some solo work is offered. Interest is stimulated in group singing by the presentation of musical programs, recitals and operettas offered throughout the school year.

GIRL SCOUTS

This organization is very new on the campus, though the national organization is quite old and firmly established. The girls in this group have green uniforms, which they are required to wear at the meetings.

There are two divisions of the Girl Scouts on the school campus, the Senior and the Junior Divisions. The former includes girls from the Senior and Junior Classes (11th and 12th grades) and the latter includes those from the Sophomore and Freshman classes. (9th and 10th grades.)

The meetings for this organization generally are held after school. Special ones are called in the evenings. Their activities include: Drum and Bugle Corps, the technique of ropes, and everything which the national organization requires and expects of the Scout.

This group is among the privilege, in that it owns its private clubhouse with furnishings complete. The attractive environment of the clubhouse invites and stimulates the work of the Scouts.

GIRLS RESERVE

Membership in the Girl Reserve Clubs of Canal High School is open to any girl enrolled in school.

Our clubs follow the goals of the national organization which are:

1. To help its members gain those attitudes and desires which are basic to the way of life.
2. To increase understanding between religious groups.
3. To help young people in problems of personal relations, including family adjustments and sex education.
4. To promote interracial friendship and do away with racial injustices and discriminations.
5. To strive to understand basic economic problems and proposals for their solution and to support such measures for the adjustment of the economic life of our nation as shall raise standards of living to levels compatible with health and security.
6. To preserve the right of freedom of speech and other forms of individual and social liberty.
7. To assist in the struggle to promote peace and abolish war.

The advisor writes a letter of recommendation to the Y.W.C.A. for each club member when she has made known her plans for relocation. This has aided many girls in becoming acquainted in their new communities and they are asked to join the local club in their school.

"EDUCATION TODAY, SUCCESS TOMORROW"

"I shall study and get ready, and perhaps someday my chance will come." So spoke Abraham Lincoln when he had yet no vision that he would be the great leader of this country. So, too, have we expressed that same thought in our class motto-- Education today, Success tomorrow; and so, too, shall we keep on saying as we continue on the road of life that beckons so feebly in these times of strife. We must study; we must get ready--for someday our chance will surely come if we are prepared. We must remember that preparedness is one great element in life which leads to the highest success. And to become prepared, we must work honestly and diligently.

Tonight we are graduating. We can say that we have successfully completed the basic training for the foundation of our future. And though it is a termination of a happy and important phase of our life, it is the beginning of a new struggle, a new life -- a life which only we, as individuals, can mold and shape. The road ahead is cloudy and dark, and the light that will glow at the end of that road will depend entirely on our individual efforts and the preparedness with which we face each new situation.

As we leave here tonight, we no longer are dependents of society but an actual part of that society, and in the short time left we must find our places. Whether we go to college or begin our field of work, our aims and ambitions must be high. We must try -- and continue trying, for tomorrow is just what we make it. We shall fail -- and fail many times. But if we succeed on the tenth attempt, the first nine failures have not been in vain.

The task before us is great. We realize the many obstacles which may cross our paths as we venture forth into this wide world. But we must not give up hope. On our behavior, on our perseverance, on our success will depend the future of us of Japanese ancestry in America. On us will depend the happiness and glory of our own lives.

So now we leave this high school. We can never boast of its buildings, its scanty equipment, or its books. But we'll always remember it because, you see, it was our school. Within its rooms we shivered through the stoveless winter and perspired through the heat of an Arizona summer. But we made it our school as we experimented and learned to study the pioneer way. And crude as this school was, the knowledge and pioneering spirit that we acquired here will help us as we go forth.

Our school days may now be over, but we shall never cease to study. With the realization that better days are sure to come, we shall keep our torch of ambition and hope burning within our hearts. We'll study and prepare till that day when our chance will come.

"ENTER TO LEARN; GO FORTH TO SERVE"

Honored guests, parents, and friends--

I am very happy to welcome you this evening to the commencement exercises of the Class of '43. Our graduation tonight has an added significance to the usual importance of such occasions. A year ago, no one would have dreamed that we would be making history as the first graduating class of a small high school hundreds of miles away from our own friends. Nobody thought that we would be pioneering and building a new school in a community in the middle of a desert. On the first day of school, pupils walked into bare barrack rooms, not knowing whom they would see, or what the class would be like. There were not even enough tables or chairs for everyone, and the teachers were strange people whom they had never seen before. Since then, faces have become personalities, the boys and girls have become individuals, and the teachers have become real friends who are willing to understand and help us with our problems. We studied hard, because we wanted to raise our academic standards in order to make it possible for our school to be accredited to colleges throughout the United States. However, there were rewards for the studious ones. They had their names placed on the honor roll and the more outstanding Juniors and Seniors were voted into the National Honor Society.

But, aside from all their academic interests, the students have had their fun, too. Their wonderful spirit helped to make our school as nearly a normal one as possible. We had organizations, sports, and all the usual school parties.

We are fortunate to be in a country which, although it has taken us away from our old homes, has given us an opportunity to continue our education and to have a graduation like all the other schools in America. It has let us organize our own school government and constitution with provisions for student body officers and elections. In a year's time, although we were handicapped by the lack of some things we acquired an excellent education, and established new traditions and precedents for the coming classes to follow. Even more important than this was the fact that we learned to get along well with people under trying circumstances; we made valuable new friends; and we learned things which developed our abilities and strengthened our characters.

Our being taken away from our own state has brought us closer to the problems facing young Americans of Japanese ancestry, and we are the ones to help solve them. Now that we have gained a foundation for new types of learning, many of us will be relocating to eastern parts, which is the first step in solving these problems. No matter where we go, or how obscure we are in our work, we will be making this country a better one, if, by our actions and words, we learn to live with Americans, as Americans, and become good citizens. Some of us will do outstanding things and become famous, perhaps, while others will just be quiet, average Americans, but we will be helping. It is our willingness to accept the responsibilities and customs of this country, and our pride in it, which will do the most toward holding the rights and privileges which are ours.

And so, in this spirit of courage and optimism, I again welcome you to our final achievement, our graduation.
