To all outward appearances, Manzanar has returned to the pre-riot normalcy. Unofficial report from the time keeping office indicates that most of the men and women who were "fired" following the riot and the lay-off of nearly two weeks have gone to work. This is, or was an issue.

It was claimed that "400" were out of work, including approximately 260 camouflage net weavers, who are not going back to work since that project has been suspended. Young people, clerks, typists and office workers have returned to work in most of the administrative departments except in the Family Relations Division, which is being reorganized. Children still enjoy their extended Christmas vacation, pending the resumption of school classes.

Robert L. Brown, assistant reports officer, became the acting assistant project director. He assigned his own assistant, Roy M. Takeno, to the reports office in temporary capacity.

Hospital:

GENERAL COMMENT:

The hospital report for the Month ending March 31 reveals an increase in almost all categories. A great number of persons admitted and discharged, a great number of hospital beds occupied, and more Out-patients seen in all categories than in the previous month.

There have been a mild epidemic of chicken pox which is a continuation of the previous month. No scarlet fever epidemic has yet appeared.

The births were far greater in this month than in the previous month, averaging close to one a day. Deaths were the same as in previous month.

An outbreak of food poisoning occurred in Block 25, apparently from inadequate refrigeration of food, and another outbreak occurred in the Appointed Personnel mess. No definite findings could be determined, although general sanitation was not good due to change-over of mess and inadequate hot water supply.

Mr. Edward Sheppard, 82, once owner of all the land now occupied by W.R.A. at Manzanar was admitted to our hospital suffering with a broken leg as there were no facilities in the county to care for him. A week later Mr. Frank Tilton, 67, once a 20 Mule Team driver in Death Valley was also brought here with the same type of injury - and for the same reason. As these were 2 county charity cases we were brought in contact with the County Supervisors who have been outspoken in their desire to have the Center closed as soon as possible. The attitudes of these gentlemen suffered a complete about face under the circumstances and they are now to be counted among our staunchest supporters!

By making our hospital facilities available to two aged, ailing Caucasian pioneers of Owens Valley, our project undoubtedly helped to improve its relations with the communities in the valley. The two patients were Edward Shophard, descendant of the family which first owned the land now occupied by the Manzanar project; and David Tilton, one-time driver of the famed twenty-man teams which transported borax mined in this valley in the pioneering days of the West.

When it was learned that there were no nearby hospitals to which they could be taken, the project director gave them permission to be hospitalized in Manzanar. The patients have recovered. Their lives probably were saved by this act.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

This office is studying methods to improve the procedure for gathering information that will help the administrators determine in advance the evacuee's probable reactions to programs to be instituted by the administration. As one method to be tried in accomplishing this task, the executive secretary of Town Hall and the assistant to the reports officer are planning to issue weekly bulletins to the block information clerks.

These circulars will contain supplementary administrative information, subject to approval of Assistant Project Director R. L. Brown. The bulletins will contain pointers on the type of information desired. This service is intended to stimulate the clerks' interest in their work and give them suggestions for improving their reports.

MONTHLY REPORTS

Considerable hardship is being experienced by some divisions and departments which are unable to write complete reports for the four-week period on the last day of the month, and due in your office on the fifth of the following month. It is suggested that the deadline for mailing the reports to Washington be the 15th of the following month.

OUTSIDE PUBLIC RELATIONS

Three noteworthy events contributed toward improving Manzanar's public relations during the past month: addresses given at the Lions Club dinner at Lone Pine by Proj. Dir. Ralph P. Merritt and Ass't Proj. Dir. Robert L. Brown; the Autumn Fair sponsored by the Community Activities Division and the visit by Dr. Glen Fisher, in charge of research for the Committee on Fair Play and American Principles.

POLICY TOWARD MINORITIES

The project director discussed at the dinner the United States' general policy toward its racial minorities. Considering the generally cool, if not hostile, attitude of the Owens Valley residents toward the Japanese, his talk was received with moderate and thoughtful attention. Lone Pine's weekly newspaper covered the event but refrained from reporting the address itself. Not all of its subscribers would have read calmly the account of the director's view regarding the Japanese, according to its editor.

EVACUEE ABILITIES

The Autumn Fair drew well over 300 valley visitors. It was a revelation to them. They were impressed with productive and artistic abilities of the evacuees.

COMMITTEE ON FAIR PLAY

An organization upon which considerable hope is being attached by the evacuees and the tolerant American people on the West Coast is the Committee on Fair Play and American Principles.

Dr. Galen Fisher, research official for the committee, visited Manzanar as personal guest of the project director. He spoke at the Protestant young people's service last Sunday, conducted a forum on the subject of the assimilation of Japanese-Americans. The visitor conferred with Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. officials, and other evacuee leaders to learn about the residents reactions toward segregation.

OUTSIDE PUBLIC RELATIONS

Effort is being continued to improve the Owens Valley resident's appreciation of the Federal Government's task of maintaining the Manzanar project. As a permanent resident of this valley and reports officer, Assistant Project Director Brown is able to apply in public relations work his knowledge of the local sentiment toward the project and public relations work here which would be consistent with the degree of its acceptance by the residents. On the whole, the public relations policy for the project has been one of under-playing the attention on the project. Through the past year and a half, increasing number of valley residents have come to understand the evacuee problem and relations of the American public's responsibility to them but the general tone of the valley residents toward the Japanese is still one of indifference or hostility. Select groups and individuals have been permitted to come to Manzanar to inspect the project operations and to meet some of the residents. The results have been encouraging, although it does not necessarily mean that progress from here can be expected to speed up measurably.

The close working relation between the project and the publishers of the Owen Valley chain Newspaper organization is helping us to implement our public relations work.

Arrangements are now being made to receive members of the Women's Club from Big Pine, who requested permission to visit here. The Social Welfare department is in charge of the reception.

The evangelist from India, Dr. E. Stanley Jones, spoke before a large evacuee audience during his recent visit here. It is expected that he will use his impressions of the residents' way of life here and their attitudes and interpret our problems to the public.

The keynote of the project's public relations work rests on a sense of balance between sympathy and objective appreciation of the evacuee problems. Morbid, sob-sister sympathy expressed by Caucasians toward the Japanese can defeat our public relations work.

COMMENT AND SUGGESTIONS

The internal public relations is handled by the Reports Office through Town Hall and the block managers. Next to the chairman of the block managers, the executive secretary of Town Hall is the key person. His position permits the executive secretary to use a wide latitude of discretion and actions, under the supervision of the chairman. The present executive secretary, Frank Yasuda, has been invaluable to the managers, to the Town Hall and to the project director.

Mr. Yasuda, however, has a marketing and merchandise background. For this reason he is being sought by the board of director of the Co-op for the position of assistant general manager. The prospect of his transfer to the Co-op, subject to the approval of the project director will leave an immediately unreplaceable vacancy. Residents with clerical ability are available but persons with executive knowledge and the ability to act in liaison capacity between the block managers and management is difficult to find. The whole matter now rests upon the action of the director. A satisfactory solution of this matter is important to the Reports Office's task of sustaining the internal public relations between the management and the residents.

Under the guidance of Assistant Project Director Robert L. Brown, this office plans to intensify the work of sending significant information concerning project facts to key public officials and influential persons on the outside.

As this month ends, we are preparing to send out to these people, together with covering letter, the mimeographed digests of some of the accomplishments on the project entitled "Some Interesting Facts on Manzanar." A copy of this sheet is enclosed.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ON MANZANAR

1. Bring \$900,000.00 of "New Money" a year into Inyo-Mono.
 - (a) Estimated from direct purchases locally, percentage of payrolls spent locally; and visitors, official and others, it brings here.
2. Has developed 305 (375 by Jan. 1, 1943) acres of land for intensive cultivation including 22 miles of lined irrigation ditches.
3. Entire plant represents an investment of \$3,167,000.00.
 - (a) Sewage disposal plant one of the most modern (\$147,000)
 - (b) Steam plant, hospital, and laundry unit best U. S. Army standard.
4. Cost of operation in September 1943 was \$1.07 per day per person. This includes all food, shelter, heat, lights, salaries, hospitalization and education. This cost is decreasing monthly.
5. This year the farm produced 1800 tons of vegetables at an average cost of \$25.00 per ton. If purchased in the market at wholesale those vegetables would have cost an average of \$61.00 per ton.
 - (a) The farm raised 31 kinds of vegetables.
 - (b) The wholesale market value of this year's production was \$110,000.00.
6. The industrial unit produces clothing, furniture, prepared foods. It handles all vegetable storage and operates a dehydration plant.
 - (a) 25 tons of vegetables were dehydrated for winter use.
 - (b) 54 tons of vegetables were pickled for winter use.
 - (c) 386 tons of vegetables were stored for winter use.
 - (d) During the past 12 months this unit produced goods costing \$75,501. These goods if purchased in the wholesale markets would have cost \$166,276.
7. Out of 4343 employable persons now at Manzanar, 4007 are employed.
 - (a) They are paid: \$12 for unskilled work; \$16 for skilled work; \$19 per month for professional and administrative work.
8. An average of 26,000 meals are served each day using 36 kitchens.
 - (a) Cost of feeding varies from a low of 26¢ per day to a high of 34¢ per day per person through the various months of the year.
 - (b) Foodstuffs are rationed on the same basis as the independent housewife's food is rationed.
9. There are 1195 students enrolled in Elementary school
970 students enrolled in high school
1005 students enrolled in adult classes
 - (a) Educational standards meet the highest requirements of the California State Department of Education and the University

of California;

- (b) English and Americanization classes are the most popular in the adult program.
10. The present population of Manzanar is 8468. There were 15 births in September and no deaths.
 11. There are 158 members of the administrative staff.
 - (a) 25 of these are Inyo or Mono county residents.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

MESS HALL STAFFS:

In the hierarchy of evacuee positions, the chief cooks and then their staffs occupy special positions of distinction. The reason is apparent. Good food and mess hall operation come first to the evacuees' attention. Throughout the year, kitchen staffs have been praised and condemned for their alleged sins of commission and omission, but at the end of the year, custom dictates the action of the residents. They collect sums of money to be offered to the mess hall staffs. Most of them have worked especially hard to prepare Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year dinners.

GAMBLING:

The people are showing increasing concern over the state of almost wide-open gambling in the various apartments throughout the camp. At the request of the chairman of the block managers, the project director called a special meeting last week to caution the residents against professional gambling. New Year's Holiday season customarily is the time for friendly games, and the professionals are attempting to take advantage of the fact. That is the problem which the managers propose to curb with the aid of the project director.

TULE LAKE:

With one out of every four residents scheduled to go to Tule Lake, these people are constantly requesting accurate information regarding the housing problem at that center. The recent visit by the Spanish Consul served to whet the interests of these residents in the segregation.

While no substantial credit can be given to the influence of the segregants' attitude, this influence undoubtedly is a deterrent factor to accelerating the relocation program. Undoubtedly Ralph Smeltzer of the Evacuee hostel in Chicago, and relocation officers John Penery, and Roger Clapp perceived this evacuee atmosphere during their recent visits here.

Officially the block managers and the residents as a whole are considering the whole problem of relocation as though the segregants are not present. Meanwhile, plans are being discussed by the relocation office for the step up of publicity on relocation. It is expected that the Reports office will assist the Relocation Office in this work.

BUDGET:

The residents have been receiving some information and some misinformation concerning the WRA fiscal budget and its effect on evacuee employment. The truth of this matter is being propagandized in controlled doses so that the misunderstanding is decreasing. The problem lies not so much in telling the residents about the budget as it effects them so much in how explain it to them. Lack of correct information arouses their suspicion and causes them to be restless. Complex explanation of the budget confuses them. The answer lies in giving the residents calculated and controlled doses of this type of information to the extent that they can digest it.

DECEMBER 6:

The riot of a year ago, December 6, caused residents to fear recurrence of trouble on the anniversary day. The Japanese are particularly susceptible to anniversaries; particularly anniversaries of deaths and unfortunate events. The evacuees would be the first to deny however that they are superstitious. However, their fears were unfounded. A thorough check on the evacuee sentiment made by the project director enabled him to predict that there probably will be no disturbance on that day.

INFLUENZA:

While the project's chief medical officer assured the residents that influenza would not reach the epidemic stage in the center, it appears to the residents that increasing number of victims of flu is causing them some concern. Majority of the very mild cases, it is reported, are not being reported to the hospital.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

Resignation to the inevitable, or indignant scorn; these were the two predominant reactions of the evacuees to the announcement by the project director that Selective Service has been reinstated for the niseis.

Although Tule Lake-bound people naturally almost solidly are against the draft, antagonism toward it was not confined to them. Many borderline "yes" boys and their parents also are opposed to the army service. Some of them want to negate their loyalty answer in order to climb on the train bound for the Northern California camp. The assumption is that once a nisei asserts disloyalty to the United States, he surely will not be drafted. The evacuee reaction to the draft, once again, underscores the futility of attempting to determine the Manzanar evacuees' loyalty or disloyalty by their answers on paper, or by leave clearance hearings or even by establishing a segregation camp.

Because of the unenthusiastic majority feeling toward the draft, the boys who are ready and willing to enter the army, are being unobtrusive regarding their convictions. Loudly and emphatically, the evacuee elements opposed to the draft are drawing the attention of their listeners to the so-called discrepancy which permits a portion of the American public to classify the evacuees with the residents of Japan when convenient; doubt their loyalty and therefore, regard them as liabilities on the west coast; and yet draft them to show the world that America abstains from racial discriminatory practices. The views of these boys are narrow, shallow and unimaginative; but their resentment is well-nigh razor sharp at the moment.

COMMENT AND SUGGESTIONS

Evacuee confidence in the statements issued by the administration arose a degree this month with the departure of segregants to Tulelake. Some skepticism was expressed by the residents last November with the departure of the first group to the Northern California project, when the administration let it be known in response to the evacuee inquiry as to the probable departure date of the remaining 1900 segregants, that accommodations for them at Tulelake "probably would not be ready before February. Many residents thought segregation would not take place until the middle of this year, or perhaps, not at all.

When reports of sporadic opposition and threatened evacuee defiance to the selective service were received by the administration, it followed the policy of limiting its actions to clarifying the draft laws and the terms of penalties to draft evaders. The administration gave the nisei residents permission to conduct meetings and did not prevent the disgruntled few from expressing their views. The administration felt that to curb these expressions, or to deny them the permission to assemble would only serve to inspire dissatisfied few and add disciples to their views. Whereas, by giving them free reign, the disgruntled, imprudent few probably will convict themselves and alienate the attention of the majority of the sane niseis.

Caught by their own indecision and opportunistic attitude are a few originally disloyal boys who changed their answers on the assumption that the War Department probably would not reinstitute draft for niseis but limit the acceptance of niseis to the volunteers. Now they are

angry at themselves for changing their answers and for not having gone to Tulelake.

The announcement that the WRA would be transferred to the Department of Interior pleased the residents. Most of them, so far as can be learned, felt that the continuity of the Authority would be assured probably even after the war. Some want further to read into this transfer the final assurance that Manzanar would not be closed.

3 Possibly with an eye on the post-war status of this center, prominent residents and groups in the neighboring areas are beginning to show much interest in Manzanar. Talks by the Rev. H. B. Bovenkerk to the Bishop Lion's Club and Senior Engineer Arthur M. Sandridge, to the Bishop Rotary Club were quite successful and well received. Also, the project director has extended invitations to Inyo Associates, which is comparable to a Chamber of Commerce, and to the Bishop Rotary Club to hold meetings in this Center. In the hope that the visitors will arrive early in the afternoon, the Office of Reports is making arrangements to provide evacuee guides for their benefit.

On March 29th, a judge, court reporter, attorneys, and representatives of state and federal tax offices, arrived to examine a private lawsuit. Upon completion of their business, they were taken on tour of the center. They seemed to have received a very favorable impression. One of the group voiced an opinion that our public relations work should include provisions and facilities for more visitors. Specifically, the suggestion was to initiate a special bus service to and from Los Angeles. Although the plan may not be practical, this visitor's belief in the effectiveness of such a program might be a point worth considering in planning public relation activities.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

Discussions on the plan to exhibit Ansel Adam's photographs at the Owens Valley High School is underway. A selection of these pictures have been shown to a group of local people and favorable impressions were created among them.

Two meetings are scheduled on the project during the month of April; plans for which were made in March. Members of the Inyo Associates are to be here on April 17 and members of the Rotary Club in Bishop on April 24. The Associates is composed of leading citizens of this valley. At present, they are interested particularly in the post-war program for the development of this valley. Possibilities of gearing Manzanar into that program have been discussed with them at some of their past meetings by project officials.

We are learning in our office that quantity does not make up for quality in evacuee staff positions. We have had difficulty in replacing experienced resettlers and segregants. With the coming of the draft, it is expected that present positions cannot be replaced by competent workers. So the Office of Reports looks toward a selection of critical tasks which it must perform; i. e., publishing the Manzanar Free Press, preparation of the monthly reports. This is not to imply that other miscellaneous tasks asked of the Office of Reports by Washington and project management cannot be performed. It simply means that more time will be required to complete these special tasks.

Outside public relations

On April 17, 41 members of the Inyo Associates composed of influential businessmen and citizens in this area, held a dinner and meeting at the Manzanar Relocation Center. Members of this organization, the most influential civic group in the county, came from as far as Death Valley, 110 miles to the south and Bishop, 50 miles to the north. During the afternoon, the visitors were taken through the center and shown interesting spots and activities. In the evening dinner was served in the center and entertainment provided by the evacuees. The visitors were quite favorably impressed.

A letter dated April 3 was received from the evacuee editor of the Minidoka Irrigator by the editor of the Manzanar Free Press. The Irrigator editor requested the opinion and the editorial policy established by the Free Press regarding James M. Omura, editor of the English section of the Rocky Shampo in Denver, Colo. The Free Press replied that a policy of not becoming involved is maintained by this office. At that time the Free Press had been attacked vociferously by the Rocky Shampo, and in reply had more or less insinuated that Omura "makes too much noise." Shortly after an open letter to the Free Press stating in much milder language that the Free Press was avoiding the issue. The editor of the Free Press feels that there is no issue other than that which Omura has invented, and therefore, the Free Press will make no public statement regarding the latest Rocky Shampo article.

Ten photographs from the Reports Office file were lent to Rollin C. Fox, principal of the Manzanar High School. The pictures were forwarded to the editor of the Kiwanis International magazine to illustrate an address given in February by Mr. Fox to the Kiwanis Club of Westwood in Los Angeles.

Senior Scholastic, nationally popular publication for secondary schools recently printed an article written by the pupils of the tenth grade at the Manzanar High School. The article described the evacuation from their homes, life in Manzanar and the attendant emotions of the students.

OUTSIDE PUBLIC RELATIONS

Acting Reports Officer Roy M. Takeno resigned this month to take the managing editor position of the bi-lingual Rocky Shimpo in Denver. News stories of Takeno's acceptance of the Denver position appeared in the Inyo Independent and the Pacific Citizen. The latter paper included a cut of his portrait.

Assistant Project Director in Charge of Community Management Mrs. Lucy Adams addressed the Pasadena Chapter of the Pacific Coast Committee on American Principles and Fair Play on May 25. She gave a picture of the relocation program of the WRA.

The latest controversy of the Los Angeles City Council regarding the assertion that the local hog farm was polluting the city water supply resolved into a "compromise" agreement. The city of Los Angeles agreed to drop the whole matter if the Manzanar hog farm would not be enlarged over 500 head. The original accusation first appeared without warning in the Los Angeles Times. The charges were answered by the project director immediately; newspapers of this valley carrying the complete story headlined on the front page. Due to the long term altercations with the city of Los Angeles regarding water rights in this valley the people in this vicinity were in sympathy with the local administration in the matter.

Two visiting groups this month helped the administration to spread more information on the WRA and relocation program. Members of the Rotary Club in Bishop and their wives held a dinner meeting in this center. In the afternoon they were divided into groups and were taken on tour of the center by appointed staff members. Dinner was served in the evening. They were entertained by the high school choir and glee club. Received with most applause and enthusiasm was the project director's address stating in no uncertain terms the future of the evacuees and of this center. The other group of visitors were officials of this, the 15th district of the American Legion. The legionnaires in discussions with project director and assistant project directors showed none of the antagonism that might be expected of the California group.

OUTSIDE PUBLIC RELATIONS

Much publicity was given Manzanar by various organizations in this valley and in Los Angeles this month. Resolutions were passed by these groups, which included the convention of disabled veterans in Los Angeles and local Lion and Rotary Clubs, recommended that Manzanar be used as a veterans' rehabilitations center after the evacuees are relocated.

Valley newspapers commented on the Manzanar High School annual, declaring that the local publication paid tribute to the scenic beauty in Owens Valley. Favorable comments were also received from the president of Occidental College, Los Angeles.

Unexpectedly favorable relations with the Aqueduct Post of the American Legion in Los Angeles was effected by the project director. Officials of the Aqueduct Post, which is composed of employees of the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, visited this center after having conducted a Fifth War Loan campaign in this area. They called upon the project director and after a short conversation, were shown the activities of the evacuees. These men had come in here with ideas typical of the California Legionnaires, but when the project was described and shown to them, they showed complete sympathy with the WRA and made generous promises to inform state and municipal officials of the program.

Twenty-five copies of an editorial printed in the Free Press and written by K. Matoba, evacuee acting reports officer,

was sent to various editors and influential publicity men throughout the country. The editorial appearing on the June 10, 1944 issue of the Manzanar Free Press declared that Californians who are preparing to keep Japanese out of their state might be met with a rude shock if when the West Coast ban is lifted, the Japanese did not choose to return.

Ansel Adams, photographer who is having a pictorial book on the evacuees published in September, visited Manzanar to make final arrangements with the administration. The photographs, all of which were taken in Manzanar will be placed in a traveling exhibit to tour the West and Midwest. Concurrent with the release of the book, another exhibit is being prepared by the New York Museum of Modern Arts.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

Reports Office staff member in charge of compilation of the monthly reports is under considerable strain with the present system. Most departments can not complete their statistical report until the month is completed; thereby delaying their report until the third or fourth of the following month. Also, some departments must receive reports from subsections before they can make up a complete report for their department. These facts plus the acute general clerical worker shortage prevents the reports from reaching the Office of Reports until about the fifth day of the following month.

Finally the reports must be organized by the only one staff member that can be spared. After completion, a copy of the report must be submitted to the Records and Statistical office for check as per administrative instructions.

Consequently, the reports can not be possibly in the mail before the tenth of the following month. Heretofore the statistical check was being made after the reports were submitted to the Washington Office, but if the check is to be made prior to submission, the deadline for submission must be extended to at least the tenth day of the following month.

OUTSIDE PUBLIC RELATIONS

Project public relations throughout the month have been good. The principle event was the visit of General Bonesteel, Commanding General of the Western Defense area, and his aides, accompanied by Mr. Dillon S. Myer. Representatives from the California Institute of Technology and the University of Southern California, of the United States Rubber Company, and of Lyon and Lyon a well-known firm of Los Angeles patent attorneys visited the guayule project for observation and consultation. Eleven evacuees were granted permission to attend a series of religious conferences in California where they took a leading part in the program and in the discussions. Representatives of the Civil Affairs Training School at Stanford University visited the project to interview candidates for the language school to be held at Stanford beginning in September, and approved all except one of those applying. Dean Peral Clark of Chaffey Jr. College visited the project to assist in the formulation of a school guidance program and for the annual meeting of the P.T.A.

The only newspaper publicity came in several blasts from the LOS ANGELES EXAMINER, complete with pictures, disclosing that Jack Sergel of the Los Angeles Police department, was bringing judo students, including women, to Manzanar, and implying that his activities were of questionable loyalty. The story was featured by the EXAMINER for several days; and a police board of inquiry was appointed to review the charges. The LOS ANGELES DAILY NEWS featured an article ridiculing the charges made by the EXAMINER, and the Police Board of Inquiry vindicated Sgt. Jack Sergel and his students, reporting that "just because a man likes to wrestle J Japan fashion doesn't mean that he's a dangerous, "son of heaven". The Board recommended, however, that the visits to Manzanar be discontinued for a time as a matter of public policy.

Mr. Todd Watkins, editor of the Inyo County string of papers, spent several hours with the staff at the FREE PRESS talking with them about news and make-up, and offered to send cuts and other material which would be appropriate in the FREE PRESS.

Public relations in the Owens Valley remain good. The Reports Officer has made three trips to Lone Pine to confer with Todd Watkins, editor of the Bishop, Independence and Lone Pine papers with good results.

The Reports Officer attended one meeting of the Lone Pine Lions Club and found no unfavorable reaction to the Center among the membership.

Public relations were threatened on Saturday afternoon, October 28th, when three honorably discharged Japanese Americans who were visiting the center appeared in Lone Pine in civilian clothing. Eleven telephone calls were received from the town asking if Manzanar were permitting evacuees to leave the camp. Chief of Internal Security, Gilkey quieted the residents when he explained that the men were permitted to travel without restrictions on a pass issued by General Bonesteel. It was further explained that the Project Director would not permit commuting by evacuees and had made arrangements with the 1999 Service Command that such passes were not valid for egress from the gate.

A news release to the several valley papers followed.

News releases during the month concerned injuries sustained by Japanese Americans who are in active service. Releases were to home town papers.

With the establishment of the "corridor" or "freeway" travel system by the Western Defense Command a trip was made by the Reports Officer to advise law enforcement agencies of the unescorted travel now permitted evacuees leaving Manzanar for Mojave and Barstow. Contacted were sheriffs, constables, judges, and Provost Marshals along the line of travel. Since the Western Defense Command had released no publicity the news came as a surprise to all contacted. They expressed gratitude for being informed and without exception assured the Reports Officer of their cooperation. Notable was the fact that none contacted expressed disapproval of the plan and all civil law enforcement officers expressed approval of the plan.

At the request of the Associated Press, through their representative, Todd Watkins, the Reports Officer interviewed five leading evacuees regarding their reaction to the modification of the restrictions on the west coast. All expressed approval and four insisted that it was not the time for Japanese to return to the coast. A fifth stated that he would leave his family at Manzanar and look over the situation on the coast and then decide on returning to his Los Angeles home or relocating to Tooele Ordnance Plant.

Nearly 100 residents of Bishop, Independence, and Lone Pine came to Manzanar on Saturday evening, February 3rd to attend an appointed Staff Dance and Party sponsored by the M.A.P. Club.

Cancellation of a basketball game scheduled between Bishop High School and Manzanar, by the Bishop School board made front page news in the Bishop, Independence and Lone Pine papers. The story was presented factually, and expressed the regret of the Bishop students that the game had been cancelled and the hope that it would be scheduled at a later date.

Story of the death of Mathilda Alch was carried in the Lone Pine and Independence papers.

A small item, on an inside page referred to the case of the evacuee convicted of a morals offense.

Information Specialist Earle O'Day arranged to bring a group of prominent Los Angeles Officials to the center, including the Chief of Police and a KFI executive. Due to illness the trip was postponed. Outside releases to home town papers continued.

Following receipt of Mimeographed letter "The Reports Officer Part in Disseminating Relocation Information at the Centers", dated March 14, 1945, the Reports Officer and the Relocation Program Officer met to discuss plans for putting into effect the suggestions in the new plan.

An attempt was made to expand the Saturday edition of the Free Press to an eight page tabloid, but this failed due to restrictions on the use of news print by the printers, the Chalfant Press. In addition they are unable to handle the additional composition since they have not received a new Intertype ordered last summer.

Plans are made to print an insert to stuff into the Saturday edition of the Free Press. Named the Free Press Relocation Supplement, this will contain information suggested in paragraph two of your above mentioned letter dated March 14, 1945.

It is suggested that more photographs be sent to the project where former Manzanar evacuees appear in the picture. In lieu of these, pictures sent should have direct bearing upon relocation. Eight such pictures recently received are being reproduced in the Free Press. One, attracting considerable attention, was of Mr. Sam Nagata standing by his truck on which his name was printed in large letters. (B)

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The Relocation Supplement was continued during the month, but the name, "Free Press", was dropped at the suggestion of Mr. Russell Bankson. Interest in the Supplement runs high and the Relocation Program Officer continues to report that evacuees are calling at his office in answer to selected job offers which appear therein.

Serial features started during the month were "Facts on Ohio" and "The Midwest".

The Japanese Section of the Free Press is expanded to four pages on Wednesday and Saturday. This has been accomplished without increase in staff. It is hoped that the Saturday issue will be increased to a six page paper and if this is not possible with the present staff, attempts will be made to secure one Stencil Cutter. Additional pages are devoted largely to Relocation news.

During the month, Personnel Management approved the increase in staff for the English Section of the Free Press as recommended by the Reports Officer. This increase was made necessary by the establishment of Relocation Supplement and to train replacements to fill the positions of terminating personnel.

Nobuo Sawamura, Editor of the Free Press for the last year, relocated late in May. Reorganization of the staff followed with Yoshio Kusayanagi, old time Free Press reporter and former Associate Editor, moving into the key spot.


A summer schedule of moving pictures secured by the Reports Office and to be displayed by the Co-op on Friday and Saturday evenings is attached herewith.

With the anticipated relocation of the present editor of the English Section, Free Press, plans are made to discontinue publication of the mid-week edition. The Japanese Section, and the Saturday printed edition will continue. The Relocation Supplement will be distributed at mid-week beginning on Wednesday, August 15th.

OUTSIDE PUBLIC RELATIONS

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Mr. Tom Caton, L.A. Times Special Representative, accompanied by Frank Brown, Times Photographer, were received by the Project Director, and the Reports Officer. Remaining at the center for about one half of a day the Times men contacted evacuees and took pictures of each of the dozen interviewed. As a result the Times, August 29, carried a two col. story headed, "Japs At Manzanar Hope For Chance", together with four pictures of Manzanar residents, on page 8 Part 1. The manner of presenting the story was entirely friendly and reflected a new and changed attitude on the part of the newspaper.

Excellent relations with Todd Watkins, Editor of the several papers published in the Owen's Valley continued with several stories indicating that the Center was closing by December 1. Excerpts were mailed to the Washington office.

COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

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Late in the month, the Reports office was advised that support of the Manzanar Cooperative Enterprises would be withdrawn with the Free Press printed edition of September 1, 1945.

Future publications will consist of Relocation Supplement which will be distributed on Wednesday, and the Free Press, in mimeographed form will be published by the Reports Office on Saturday. The Japanese Section will continue to be published on Wednesday and Saturday.

Relocation of key personnel and difficulty of maintaining staff have resulted in streamlining some services of the Reports Office.

The prompt and able assistance of the San Francisco office in contacting State Supt. of Public Instruction, Dr. Walter F. Dexter, and the Project Director in contacting Dorothy C. Cragen, County Supt. of Schools, resulted in the development of a particularly effective story proving that schools would not be opened in the center. The story appeared in The Free Press of August 25, 1945.

Through the cooperation of Reports Officer Vaughn Mechau, the Free Press of the same date was able to run a five col. 6½" cut of a trainload of evacuees leaving Heart Mountain Center.

Special editions published during the month appeared on August 15, with the news of the surrender of Japan.

Moving pictures selected by the Reports Office continue to be displayed on Friday and Saturday evenings.
