Crime Prevention Work:

Crime prevention work during September has shown decided decrease in crime. No cases handled by the Judicial Council during this month.

Trends Noted:

Evacuee Police Department and Internal Security are working well together in all phases of crime preventative work. A splendid attitude of esprit de corps is developing.

Current Problems of the Department:

Recommendations

In anticipation of sub-zero weather to come, patrolmen request sub-stations be erected near public telephones in lieu of emergency calls that may arise requiring the use of phones.

Recommendations (continued)

Complete enclosure of warehouse area advised to guard against illegal entries (unauthorized or otherwise) wherein merchandise, equipment and supplies may be missing and unaccounted.

Police should exercise control over vehicles other than project cars in the area regarding their movements, and operation regarding the limited allowance of time from time of entry into the Center.

Necessity for precautionary measures to prevent accidents wherein youngsters may be involved (i.e. unfinished concrete foundations near playground, hot ashes disposal pits, scrap coal piles that may spark up by spontaneous combustion).

With the approach of cold weather, cooperation of residents requested when disposing hot ashes.

Reminder to caretakers of public buildings of leaving premises securely locked and closed to discourage illegal breaking-in.

Due to the number of dogs on the Project a plan of licensing has been suggested, license fee to be the amount necessary for purchase of plastic tags, these to serve merely to identify dogs with their owners and help eliminate homeless dogs. Have had several cases of dog bites throughout the area this past month.

Would recommend the use of one Associate Chief and three Internal Security Officers rather than two Associates and two Internal Security Officers. Believe this would make for more efficient work and better discipline in the ranks of Internal Security.

In general this month, peace and order have prevailed with one exception. About February 8, 1944, meetings of small groups started in Block 2 and as time went on, these meetings grew in size and spread over most of the project. These meetings in the beginning were presided over by a certain individual who has a reputation of being very articulate about different policies of the government and in this particular instance he has attacked the Selective Service Program as well as relocation. About the middle of February he was joined by another evacuee and a committee called the "Fair Fly Committee" was formed. On about February 25, another well-known evacuee joined this group. These meetings have grown in size and are being watched very carefully and a complete file has been built up on their activities and is being maintained in the confidential files of Internal Security. On February 22, 1944, Mr. H. W. McMillan, agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, visited the project and he was fully informed of the situation by the Project Director and myself and is now working on the case. The progress of these meetings is being carefully watched and any known potential agitators are receiving attention.

On February 17, Mr. Gary Neville of Naval Intelligence was on the project and departed the following day.

On February 26, Mr. Kepple, an Immigration guard from Ft. Missoula, Montana, came to the project with an evacuee who's daughter is quite ill in the hospital. He is still here.

On the evening of February 29, Mr. Peterson of the Boarder Patrol, came in from Crystal City, Texas to escort a group of people to that place, leaving today.

A semi-annual report of the Internal Security Section and the Evacuee Police Department was submitted to Mr. Robertson, Project Director.

Crime as a whole throughout the area has been below normal for a period of three months. Experienced no difficulties during reclassification of Evacuee Police Department and have received wholehearted cooperation in all phases of police work.

This has been a fairly busy month on the Project. A total of thirty cases handled this month as well as an additional twenty-five lost and found cases. Assault cases, aggravated and others, disorderly conduct, drunkenness, and violation of the liquor law numbered among the cases arising for this month. Other cases which were handled by the police pertained to dog bites, warnings to owners of animals, disposal of vicious animals, minor fires, hot ashes, and fire hazards.

One aggravated assault case was tried before District Court Judge P. W. Metz, defendant sentenced from two to five years in the Wyoming State Penitentiary at Rawlins, Wyoming.

Same court sentenced a defendant for illegal sale of liquor to a fifty dollar fine and a sixty day suspended jail sentence.

Considerable activity by an organization known as the Fair Play Committee has been apparent, this having a direct bearing on Selective Service. Approximately fifty-four delinquents in answering call for preinduction physical examinations to date. Mr. McMillen of the Federal Bureau of Investigation spent several days on the Project. Twelve delinquents were arrested by Deputy United States Marshall Smith on Federal warrants.

Two evacuees were transferred to Tule Lake.

SUBJECT: Report of Medical Social Service Department for the
Month of March, 1944

This has been an unusually busy month with varied activities. Aside from the routine work with the venereal diseases and tuberculosis cases, the worker has had requests from the councilmen for suggestions and help in an educational program for the center regarding tuberculosis. We are counting on some help from the State Department of Health and Tuberculosis Association. During her visit in Cheyenne, the worker made some contacts with the State Tuberculosis Nursing Staff.

There has been a need for some sort of occupational therapy on the wards. We are quite hopeful that this can be arranged through the cooperation of the Department of Community Activities. A conference was held with them recently and they are attempting to work out plans for some of their staff to visit ward patients and see what projects can be started. We feel confident that this will help the morale of the chronic patients in particular.

The statistical report shows a large increase in the number of letters sent this month. This is due to the fact that routine blood tests are being done on all mess hall workers. If they have a positive Kahn test, follow-up letters are sent advising them to return for a Wasserman test.

Several new mental cases have been referred this month. One or two of them may have to be committed. A contract has been presented to the State Board of Charities and Reforms in Cheyenne and we are planning to go ahead with commitments, anticipating admission to the State Hospital at Evanston.

This month the United States Marshall Mr. A. A. Sanders and United States Deputy Marshall George G. Smith picked up forty-one boys on Federal warrants for failing to report for their preinduction physical examinations. Considerable investigative work was done on the organization known as the Fair Play Committee and key members were interviewed.

Mr. E. C. Gorman of Internal Security was transferred to Poston Project as Associate Chief.

A sanitary measure regarding animals kept within or adjacent to the barracks was made into an ordinance and passed by the Community Council.

Crime was at a low level this month and minority groups of troublemakers have ceased to be articulate. This is perhaps due to the fact that agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation have been on the Project for over a week. The visit of Sergeant Ben Kuroki and his admirable talks have made a very positive impression on draft age youths.

The Internal Security staff now consists of three men with the possibility of another transferring in the near future. It is recommended that a future staff consisting of nine men be considered for this Project due to the fact that the military police personnel has been reduced to approximately twenty men.

During this month Mr. Bob Lawrence, Mr. Harry McMillen, and Mr. Ken Brown of the Federal Bureau of Investigation were active on various investigations.

As soon as this Section is re-staffed, plans for the resumption of the police school for evacuees ~~for evacuees~~ and also a police school and section staff meetings of Internal Security are being made.

Would like to recommend that the Coordinating Council be revitalized as it has had a fine effect in holding down potential juvenile delinquents.

This month has proven very quiet with no major crimes committed and no trials.

The Community Coordinating Council is being reorganized and revitalized. This is a group comprising representatives of the Boy Scouts, Red Cross, Health Section, Internal Security and various other groups interested in juvenile delinquency and crime prevention work.

It has come to our attention that there have been some cases of youngsters going through the fence into the Motor Pool area and destroying tires to obtain the tubes therein to make sling-shots. It is recommended that the Motor Pool area as well as the Warehouse area be illuminated at night as brightly as possible. This, we believe would discourage potential mischiefmakers and thieves from entering that area as well as the warehouse area.

On May 13, 1944, the United States Marshall Sanders and Deputy United States Marshall Smith were on the Project to serve Federal warrants on people who had failed to report for preinduction physical examinations.

The grounding of visitors cars is getting to be a problem and some feasible solution to this will be worked out in the near future.

Mr. Richard W. Wilkins, Internal Security Officer, reported for duty on May 26, 1944.

Mr. Karl W. Miller, Internal Security Officer, has been promoted to Associate Chief of Internal Security.

The organization known as the Fair Play Committee is now broken down to the point where it presents no problem and it's activities have been curtailed to such an extent that it is ineffective.

Resumption of police schools and training programs will start within a week and it is hoped that during the summer months when things are quiet that the Police Department can be made much more efficient and in addition to police procedures, it is planned to have classes in First Aid so that each member of the department may become proficient in handling such cases.

On June 11, 1944, Internal Security Officers, Huff, Miller and Campbell were subpoenaed by the United States Attorney to attend the trial of 63 evacuees who had failed to report for pre-induction physical examinations. The trial started on June 12, 1944, and on June 16, the prosecution rested. On June 19, 1944, the court found the 63 defendants guilty, and they were sentenced to three years imprisonment.

During the first nine days of June, special agents, H. W. McMillan and R. Lawrence, of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, were active on the Project regarding the coming trial in Cheyenne.

Flood lights were recommended for the Motor Pool area to discourage petty theft and prowling, and these were erected on June 15, 1944

A check was made on private enterprise in the Area and those engaged in this unauthorized activity were given a week to close up their business, and failing to do so, their goods and equipment will be confiscated.

Mr. Karl Miller was appointed Associate Chief of Internal Security, effective, June 1, 1944. Mr. Huff, an Internal Security officer, transferred to Tule Lake in the same capacity as of June 23, 1944.

It was reported that several short wave receiving sets were in use, but after checking thoroughly with the Property Officer, Police Department, and representative people in the Area, it was found that this report was groundless. A further check was made of radio antennas and there is none that is capable of being used for transmittal purposes.

All in all, the month has been very quiet. No new trends noted. Some crime prevention work has been done, and some work with juveniles to curb mischief. The Section is working close with the Coordinating Council on youth problems.

On the 15th of July, 1944, Chief H. L. Campbell transferred from this Department to Oswego, New York. Also, on the first of the month Charles B. McFarland was appointed to the staff as an Internal Security officer. On the 7th of the month, Harley B. Kinkade was also added to this Department as an Internal Security officer. Associate Chief, Karl W. Miller has been in charge of the Department since Chief Campbell left.

On the 20th of July, 1944, with the cooperation of this Department the U. S. Marshal and his Deputy with McMillan of the FBI, apprehended three "Fair Play" members in this Center. They were taken into custody with no incidents relative to same, and were transported by the U. S. Marshal to the Cheyenne, Wyoming Jail.

On the 6th of July, 1944, a Mr. Honda of 25-1-B, who had been investigated a week prior to the time, was found to be conducting a large amount of private enterprise dealing with hardware, electrical appliances and etc., was called on again and found to be still in business, so his goods were apprehended and stored in a government warehouse on authorization of a search and seizure warrant issued by the Director.

A very close check is being made at this Center on short wave equipment to see that none is in operation.

During the month three surprise gambling raids were held with the result that five men were convicted in one case.

On the 8th of July, 1944, a 14 year old youth drowned in the Garland Irrigation Canal. His body was recovered on the 9th of July, during this period the Internal Security officers and the Police Department were on duty continuously searching for the body. This accident resulted in a very close check being made on the Canal system and we instigated a very thorough patrol of this area to prevent further happenings of this kind.

No new trends were noted during the month. The Center, as a whole, has been very quiet.

Several reports were investigated of teenage youngsters riding their bicycles from the back of the Project and riding into town. Several have been caught and the youngsters have been brought before the project director.

During the month, this department has been working with the School Officials in an effort to curb Juvenile Delinquency. The cases reported have implicated boys with ages ranging from 13 to 16 years.

Two mental cases referred to this department were confined in the Center Hospital and were later removed to the State Hospital at Evanston, Wyoming, on two different occasions.

On October 18, 1944, a case of Drunkenness and Disorderly Conduct was brought to the attention of this department. The case was heard by the Project Director, with the defendant pleading guilty, and sentenced to serve 90 days in the County Jail at Billings Montana. On October 21, 1944, the defendant was removed to Billings by Internal Security Officers.

Mr. Karl W. Miller, Associate Chief of Internal Security, was called to Cheyenne Wyoming, as a witness for the prosecution, in a case involving 8 Fair Play Committee members. This case was held by the Federal Court.

During the month there was one case of Draft Evasion reported.

On December 7, 1944, Kumezo Tabuchi who was serving a 90 day Jail sentence in the Yellowstone County Jail at Billings, Montana, was ordered released on Parole, after serving 48 days. Order was issued by Mr. Guy Robertson, Project Director.

It became necessary to revoke the Drivers Licenses of two Evacuee drivers operating out of the Motor Pool. One of the drivers was terminated after being picked up for speeding and careless driving. The other driver has had two accidents during the past 30 days, and it was found that his vision was bad.

During the month, two fires were reported with damage slight, as reported by the Fire Department. One fire started in the Military Police Warehouse that was being remodeled. Fire was caused by overheating of a bucket of tar, same becoming ignited. The other fire was caused by overheated stove in the Dispatchers Office of the Motor Pool.

One Break-in was reported by the School Officials. On Sunday night, December 17, 1944, the rear door of the Auditorium was forced open, and some damage was caused to the interior of the Building.

During the month there were three reports of Gambling, and were investigated by the Police Department, but to date no definite information has been received. These cases are still pending.

The Police Department have had 5 additions and 1 termination during the month of December.

Officer Dennis of the Border Patrol, and two assistants arrived from Crystal City, Texas, to escort the Morita family to Crystal City, leaving the Center on January 22, 1945.

During this month this Department has been assisting the Army Team in notifying and transporting residents of the Center to the Army Office for interviews. It was also necessary to furnish transportation for the Officers when notices and orders were served on the residents.

Four Inspectors of the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization arrived here January 22, 1945 to conduct hearings for parolees, deportees and other aliens. They have set up offices in blocks 15 and 17.

On January 23, 1945, an Evacuee Police Officer, while on duty in the Administration was attack by three men, that were intoxicated. The Officer suffered lacerations of the face and was painfully bruised to the extent that it was necessary to have him removed to the hospital for medical treatment. The assailants were identified, arrested and lodged in the County Jail at Cody, Wyoming. Charges of Assault and Battery, and Disorderly Conduct were filed with the Judicial Commission, against the three men. The Commission found all three guilty and sentenced each to serve thirty (30) days in jail.

Two mental cases were removed to the State Hospital at Evanston, Wyoming, on January 18, 1945. Internal Security Officer Kinkade, with the assistance of Miss McCaffery, transported these two cases in a government vehicle.

During the month, the Police Department had reports of damage to government property by youngsters of ten and eleven years old. These youngsters were called in to the Station, accompanied by their parents. The parents were advised to have more supervision of their children.

The Police Department has had 14 additions and 8 terminations in the department with a total of 68 at the close of the month.

On the morning of February 3, 1945, several high school boys were causing a disturbance at the high school auditorium. The case was referred to the Preliminary Hearing Board, and after hearing of evidence, it was decided that one of the violators be filed on for Disorderly Conduct before the Judicial Commission.

At 9:30 A.M. February 9, 1945 case was heard by the Judicial Commission the defendant, (Shiro Teramoto) was found guilty, sentenced to fifteen (15) days in jail, the jail sentence being suspended after defendant was placed on thirty (30) days probation, and reporting to the Chief of Internal Security every week.

During the month two motor vehicle accidents were reported with property damage of about \$5.00. It was decided that the driver involved in one of the accidents was careless, and that his driving privileges be revoked.

The Fire Department was called out twice during the month to extinguish small fires caused by hot ashes being blown out of ash containers in the center area.

Mr. Joseph Freeburg of Cody, Wyoming was added to the Internal Security staff, February 19, 1945, as Internal Security Officer.

The Police Department has had 5 terminations, 3 additions, leaving a total of 66 members at the close of the month.

During the Month of March the following cases came to the attention of this department: Four break-ins were recorded, (1), the office of the elementary school in Block 7, a basketball being stolen; two junior high school boys were apprehended in connection with the case and after questioning the ball was returned to the school officials and the boys were released to their parents, (2), entrance was made to the home economics room in the high school building through a window, no damage reported, (3), in the Block 15 library an entrance was made through a window and some property destroyed, (4), entrance was made in the Block 2 sewing room and it was reported that a small electric motor was taken from one of the machines.

The Fire Department was called out on four different occasions this month. One fire being at the 22-27 mess hall on March 6, 1945. The blaze was brought under control in a very few minutes and damage was estimated to be under \$5.00. The other fire was a coal box at 20-16-A, with no damage reported. The other two cases were of hot ashes being blown from ash containers.

On the night of March 3, 1945, a raid was conducted at 22-8-B where professional gambling games were being operated. Seven share holders, all operators, were filed on in the District Court, of Park County, Cody, Wyoming. Two others that were residents of the address where the raid was conducted were also filed on in the District Court.

On March 29, 1945, a case was heard by District Judge Metz and each of the above mentioned defendants were fined \$75.00 and cost.

There were two cases of aggravated assault and battery, one occurring on the night of March 20, 1945. This case being referred to the District Court and tried on March 29, 1945; the defendant receiving a sentence of six months in the County Jail. The other offence occurred on the night of March 27, 1945, this case being referred to the Judicial Commission which is to be heard on April 4, 1945.

After receiving complaints from residents of the Center five raids were conducted, on each raid it was found that the parties were manufacturing sake. All of the manufacturing equipment was confiscated and destroyed. The Preliminary Hearing Board has referred all of these cases to the Judicial Commission and are to be tried sometime during the Month of April.

During the month it became necessary to destroy six dogs and three cats at the request of the owners.

The Police Department reports five terminations and three additions on their force this month.

During the Month of April, four cases were tried before the Judicial Commission of Heart Mountain, Wyoming. (1) Mr. Otosuke Tamari of 14-17-E was found guilty on two counts, assault and aggravated assault and battery. On April 4, 1945, Mr. Tamari was sentenced to one month in the Park County Jail, Cody, Wyoming, sentence to be suspended in the event that he relocate. (2) On April 14, 1945, Suetsuna Okashima, Yoshi Yoshimoto and Yoshiye Takaki were tried for trespassing and were found guilty. Mr. Okashima was given a suspended sentence of 1 week in jail. Yoshimoto and Takaki received a suspended sentence of 10 days in jail.

Mr. James D. Perry reported for duty on April 3, 1945, as an Internal Security Officer.

On the evening of April 12, 1945, Mrs. Forsythe, Principal of the Block 7 Elementary School, reported that two boys had broken into Building 18 in Block 7. The boys were punished by their parents, and are to report to the Chief of Internal Security every Saturday morning until the end of the school term.

On several occasions windows in the High School Building have been broken, Chief of Police, Matsui, has increased the patrol in this area and children are prohibited to play in and around the Building after school hours.

At the request of owners leaving the Center, 10 cats and 4 dogs were destroyed.

On April 19, 1945, a fire started in the laundry room of Personnel Barrack, no. 19. The Fire Department was called and soon had the fire under control.

Two motor vehicle accidents were reported during the month, damage was reported to be less than \$10.00.

On May 3, 1945, the Preliminary Hearing Board reviewed the case of Tomaoki Tanaki of 29-11-B, for creating a public nuisance; and the case of Henry Hashimoto of 29-11-Bs for assault and battery. Both cases were referred to the Judicial Commission, to be tried on May 7, 1945. Mr. Tanaki was found guilty and put on probation for 10 days. Mr. Hashimoto was found guilty and put on probation for 15 days. The Judicial Commission also recommended that Mr. Tanaki be moved to another apartment as soon as the Housing Section found suitable quarters.

Mr. Robertson requested that a survey be made of all evacuee owned automobiles, and to determine the number which are now in operating condition.

Three boys: James Kato, age 9, of 25-5-D, Kenji Kato, age 7, of 25-5-D, and Yoshiharo Takahata, age 9, of 25-4-D, entered Block 25 Block Manager's office and stole some money. The boys confessed to stealing the money and it was returned. These cases are to be reviewed by the Preliminary Hearing Board.

Two motor vehicle accidents occurred this month. The first occurring on May 10, 1945, in the warehouse area, with car and truck colliding. The second accident occurred near Block 30, a car overturned. No personal injuries.

During the month six drivers were stopped by the Internal Security Officers for driving violations and warned. A report of the violations was forwarded to Mr. Reichert, Motor Pool Superintendent.

Two dogs were destroyed during the month at the request of owners.

Mr. A. Korematsu of 28-17-E was reported missing at 9:50 P.M., May 3, 1945 after a hike to Heart Mountain. He was located two hours later. Two 3-year old boys were found by Police Officers after being lost for several hours on May 10, 1945.

Several school boys, ages ranging from 8 to 13 years, were picked up on May 14, 1945, by Internal Security Officers for damaging machinery in the Motor Pool Area. They were questioned and released to their parents.

Police officers picked up Shiro Suzuki and Tatsuo Sato of 21-24-B for being intoxicated and creating a disturbance. Tatsuo was taken to the hospital for treatment of cuts, and Shiro Suzuki was detained at the Police Station over night.

Larry Iwafuji was received a dog bite on face and lips on the morning of July 16, 1945.

Police officers, Arimoto and Miyada discovered a fire in the coal bunker at 2-27 mess hall on July 17, 1945, about 5:00 A.M.

The following men were assigned to this section as guards: Lars Christensen and B. R. Greene on July 16, 1945, and W. W. Phillips and John Nielsen on July 29, 1945.

During the month it has been reported that about 1000 people left the Center on four special trains. Of these, about 400 have relocated to eastern cities, others returning to the west coast.

During the noon hour, August 6, 1945, a fire broke out in 20-24-A, causing damage to five mattresses that had been stored there. Officers investigating the case found that youngsters had tunneled under the apartment, entering the apartment through the floor. And on the morning of August 6, 1945, while playing in the apartment with matches, had ignited the mattresses. The youngsters left the apartment not knowing they had started the fire. The youngsters were brought before Chief of Police Matsui for questioning.

Three reports of break-ins have been reported during the month. These occurred in blocks 8, 27 and 28 and in each case the block managers office was entered with money being taken. Police Officers assigned to the case were unable to apprehend anyone connected or responsible for the break-ins.

On the morning of August 23, 1945, Tommy Yamada, 28-7-B and F, was taken to Billings and placed on the east bound train, in order that he reach Omaha Nebraska, to be entered in Boys Town.

In the evening of August 17, 1945, a 2 year old boy was reported missing. He was Ronald Hada of 22-15-E and F, and was found by Police Officers near the Fire Department at 7:15 P.M.

On August 6, 1945, Mr. Okazaki of 17-8-B was attacked and bit by a dog owned by occupants of 17-5-C. Mr. Okazaki was treated at the hospital. Owners of the dog were notified to keep the dog indoors or it would be destroyed.

The Fire Department answered a call to block 27-28 boiler room. Fire started when a hot coal ignited the Calotex on the wall. Fire was brought under control in a very short time and only slight damage was done.
