SPONSORS EVALUATION

The Amache Hi-Y functioned differently than such an organization would in a normal community. Because of the limited social life and lack of recreational facilities, available in the Center, it was necessary to organize a program in which social activities were paramount. It is not to be inferred that the group forgot or neglected the purpose and platform of Hi-Y as the records will show that the members participated in a large number of service activities in the school and community.

Because so many of the boys were afraid of the "outside" it was thought advisable to send as many as possible to conferences, conventions, and camps as funds would permit. This sort of activity not only reassured the individuals that people on the outside would receive them but it also introduced the Nisei to a large number of boys who never before had the opportunity of associating with people of Japanese ancestry. A great deal of credit should be given to the National Council of the Y. M. C. A. and the West Central Area Council for so generously providing the funds to make these trips possible.

As a result of their Y. M. C. A. experience at Amache many boys after relocating have affiliated with Hi-Y clubs and Y. M. C. A.'s in their new communities. All such transfers have been accepted without questions.

Special grants-in-aid have been made available for the authorized use of Y.M.C.A.'s in Relocation Centers. Disposition of these grants is to be made through the four area councils as listed in the memo "Functions of a Y.M.C.A. Co-ordinator." Requests for appropriation of these grants should be made to the appropriate Area Council Executive by the Y.M.C.A. co-ordinator, and countersigned, after responsible board or committee action, by the President of the Center Y.M.C.A.

The purposes for which these grants-in-aid are available, and the amounts are as follows:

* Where, to the Center Y.M.C.A. Board, an additional assistant co-ordinator seems to be essential, a request for an additional grant of \$16.00 and \$3.25 clothing allowance per month should be made to the appropriate Area office. They in turn will consult with the National Council office to see if the necessary funds are available.

It is assumed that each center Y.M.C.A. will draw up a budget to cover its year's work and adopt a financial policy that will include the securing of some funds within the center itself, and a careful accounting of all funds used. Copies of this budget should be sent to the Area office, the National Council office, and to Masao Satow.

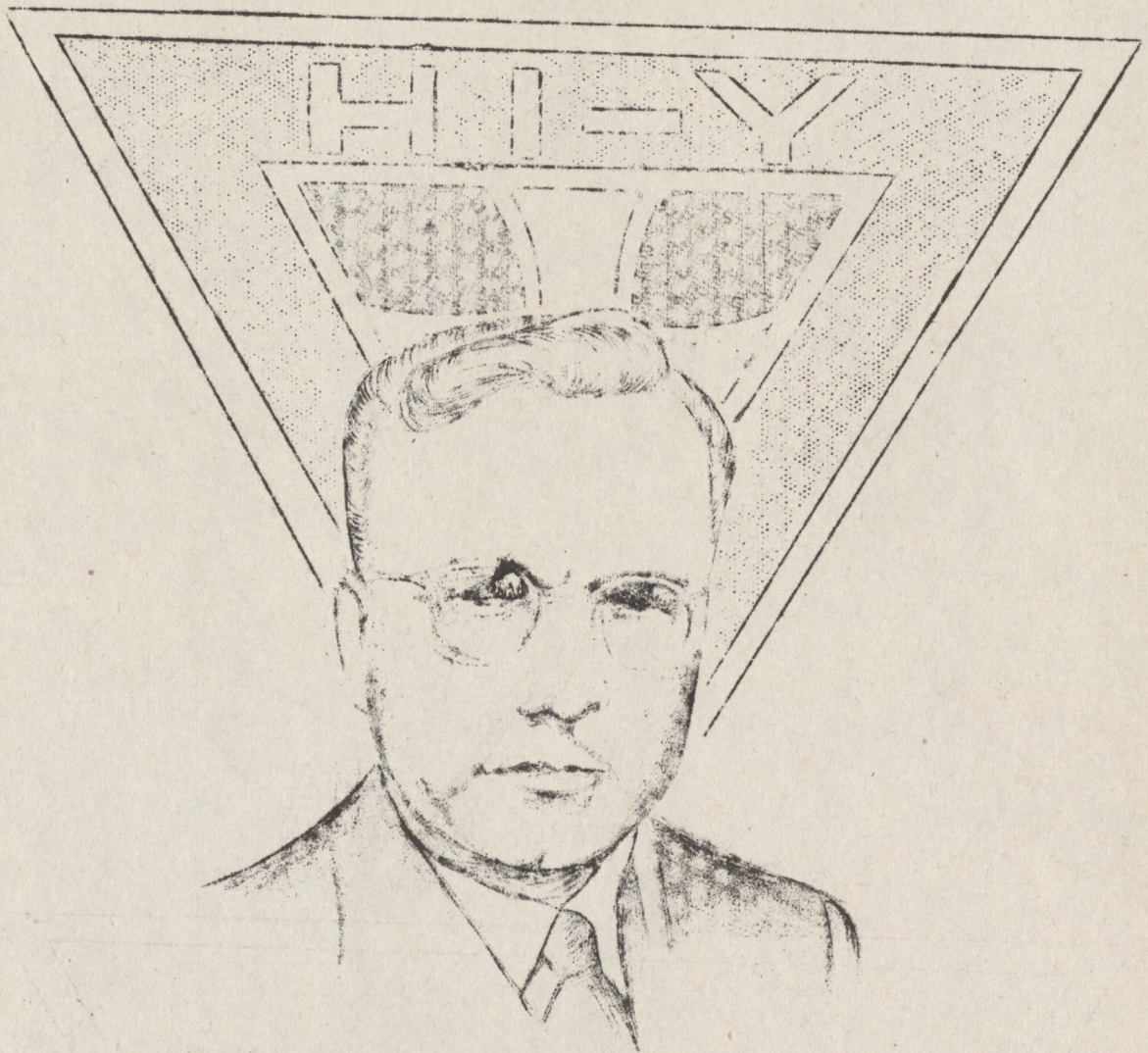

Saturday and today these Hi-Y members from Southern Colorado are gathered at the "Y" to learn more about Hi-Y fellowship thru unified purpose, clean living, clean speech, athletics and scholarship. Part of each dollar given during the forthcoming campaign of the National war fund and Pueblo Community chest is an investment in youth programing for a better future. The Young Men's Christian association, for 100 years has been devoted to character building, physical education, and developing high standards of fellowship. Saturday and today the Colorado Hi-Y conference is convening at the City YMCA for officer training by Howard Kusterman, area representative from Topeka, Kan.

The Hi-Y is a national movement with 7,760 Hi-Y clubs representing 27,000 high schools and with a membership of more than 300,000. In Colorado are 47 Hi-Y clubs with an estimated enrollment of 1,500 and of this number five clubs are located in Pueblo with an enrollment of 140. All Hi-Y clubs do not belong to the national Hi-Y membership, but those in Pueblo are affiliated thru the west-central area office, Kusterman reported.

These clubs are but one phase of the YMCA's boys program. The Hi-Y is designed for high school youth.

The purpose of the Hi-Y is to create, maintain and extend thru-out the school and community high standards of Christian character. The platform is based on clean living, clean speech, athletics and scholarships.

It's function is to help boys to deal more adequately with their own immediate problems; "to face realistically the world in which they live; to deepen their Christian convictions and to put those convictions to work. To understand the background and meaning of democracy and to demonstrate how it operates.

"To prepare for citizenship and

active participation in community life and to lay the foundations for the kind of peaceful world to follow the war."

PROGRAM PUT INTO OPERATION IN 1870

This program of the YMCA is not new for it was put into operation in 1870.

Foremost among the boy's and youth programs of the City YMCA is the annual summer camp conducted at camp Crockett and designed to give each camper a rich experience in right living, according to S. Hugh Cronin, general secretary.

During 1944 the actual camp totals show boys camps were conducted in four sessions with 137, from 7 to 16 years of age, participating for a camper day total of 1,509. Seven sessions were reserved adult week ends with 42 persons spending a total of 67 camper days; the "Y" Youth club conducted three weekend sessions, with 61 attending for a total of 315 camper days.

Sixty-seven attended the Christian Endeavor conference for a total of 315 camper days; one day winter sports outings were enjoyed by 112 in five groups two of which were co-ed. In all a total of 509 spent total camper days numbering 3,236 in healthful, inspiring out of door activities. Cronin stressed.

The "Y" Youth club showed a registration of 210 very shortly after it was organized, but the number has been cut to 170 because of boys being called to the armed forces. Saturday night was the formal opening of the club for the fall and winter season. Fred Smith is sponsor to the group.

MEMBERSHIP IN BOYS' DEPARTMENT NOW 494

The 1944 membership in the boys' department is 494. Of these prep boys 9-10-11 years of age number 173; juniors, age 12-13-14, number 153; intermediates, age 15-16 number 123, and seniors 15-17 number 50.

The Trailblazers club has 25 members; the Pioneers 22; archery club 12 and the crafts club 12.

The annual summer free swimming classes conducted at the close of the school attracted 300 boys many of whom later became members of the boy's department for swim and gym activities. There was a total of 66 swim sessions during the summer with an attendance of 1,180 among boys 9 to 14 years of age conducted under the supervision of John O. Snodgrass, program director.

Another outstanding service of the YMCA is that rendered to men of the services. From Jan. 1 thru Aug. 31, 42 made use of the gymnasium; swimming attendance, 1,677; showers taken 2,456; special swim class participation 493; table tennis attracted 54 for 1,164 games and pool and billiards, 430 for 5,621 games. Cronin reported. Approximately 1,300 have been provided with sleeping quarters, largely over the week ends when the soldiers are in town on furlough.

The City YMCA is a participating, character building, agency of the Pueblo Community chest. The annual campaign of the Community chest, which this year is united with the National war fund will be conducted the week of Oct. 16. Part of every dollar of the \$169,398 goal is earmarked to carry on the work of the YMCA among the boys, youth, and soldiers of the community.

Two hundred seventy-five boys from Colorado, Kansas and Missouri participated in the Hi-Y Training Camps held at Camp Wood during the past summer.

Through organization into Hi-Y Clubs, these Hi-Y officers, committee chairmen, and members gained practical experience in methods of club organization, operation, and program planning. Experience in planning activities for the entire camp group will also prove helpful as these fellows plan for all-school events and activities in their local communities. Morning chapel services, stunt nite programs, and discussions on such questions as what should we do about juvenile delinquency, what can we do to improve racial conflict situations, what is our share in helping to rehabilitate the world after this war, etc., offered the campers opportunities to practice leadership in fields which they will be expected to carry on with their Hi-Y clubs.

Outstanding programs which can be used by local clubs this fall were the Centennial Fire of Friendship and a skit dramatizing the founding of the Y.M.C.A. in 1844 in London. Copies of the Fire of Friendship program and the skit which was used at camp are available at the Area office for use by clubs in observing "Hi-Y Centennial" week, November 13-19.

Members of the first Hi-Y camp were especially fortunate in getting to know five boys from the Amache Hi-Y Club, located at the Amache Relocation Center in Colorado. These American boys of Japanese ancestry were able to help other club members to understand the interests, ideas, and ambitions as well as the problems of the young "Japanese-Americans" who are citizens of our country today.

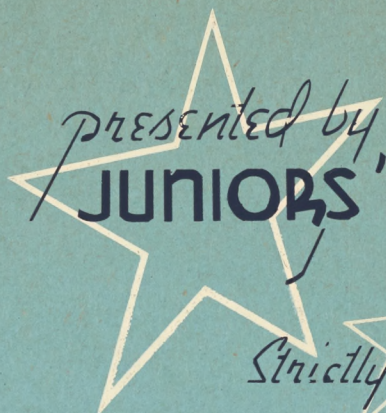


