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

**T**HE STATE LEGISLATURE in 1975 wrote an impressive and historic record. It enacted, and Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. signed into law, twenty-four measures of real and lasting value to California workers. Some were overdue, long denied by inaction and veto. All were of immediate importance. Taken together, they measurably extend the boundaries of justice and security for all Californians.

*But the needs and aspirations of California's workers are unending. They must not be denied through poverty or a denial of a fair and decent share in what our economy is capable of producing. This report is concerned with what labor achieved in Sacramento in meeting unmet needs and aspirations. We still have work to do and a long, long way to go.*

**T**HE TWENTY-FOUR BILLS enacted into law by the 1975 session of the State Legislature reached into many, long-neglected areas. They finally opened the way to collective bargaining rights for farm workers (and to unemployment insurance coverage, as well) and for teachers and other school employees. They contributed important improvements and extensions of the state's social insurance programs, including an increase in the lagging maximum unemployment insurance benefits. They prohibited employers from converting employees' tips to reduce even further the meager wages of service workers. They imposed overdue restraints on the abuse of restraining orders and temporary injunctions in labor disputes. They ordered the University of California to pay prevailing wages to construction workers. They provided for voter registration by postcard. The nation's economic plight is acknowledged in measures intended to prime the state's lagging housing industry and to increase and strengthen the financial underpinning of unemployment insurance. The list is long and impressive; it is reported in more detail below.

The session's extraordinary achievements, of course, are not the work of any one person. Many are entitled to credit and thanks for their parts in them. Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr. quickly recognized the merit and justice of the labor-supported measures. Assembly Speaker Leo McCarthy (Dem-San Francisco) and Senate

President Pro Tem James R. Mills (Dem-San Diego) exercised effective and forward-looking leadership. Scores of legislators shouldered the detail and responsibility of carrying the various bills, working them through committees and on the floor to passage. They were supported, in one vote after another, by lawmakers from every corner of the state. This review, of course, documents in detail the votes of the members of both houses. (*See vote tabulations starting on page 5*)

Throughout the session, local union and local central body officers and other representatives gave unstinting support to the Federation's program. They responded frequently to calls for aid with dedication and enthusiasm.

Nor should the underlying fact be ignored that union members, their families and friends, their local union, state, and regional officers are entitled to generous credit for the election of a liberal Legislature and a perceptive governor. Their votes were the vital force that opened the way for the progress measured in these twenty-four bills.

Not the least remarkable aspect of the year's accomplishments is that they stand as still another measure of labor's concern with the public good. When you examine the scope of these bills, it quickly becomes apparent that all Californians, not union members alone, are the principal beneficiaries of this year's enactments. Many thousands outside union ranks stand to benefit measurably from many of the bills that were enacted in 1975. They are the best evidence of labor's claim that it serves the common good for all men and women who work.

## LABOR RELATIONS

**1. Farm labor relations.** SB 1 (Alatorre-Zenovich-Dunlap-Berman) (Third Extraordinary Session) extends collective bargaining rights and secret ballot union representation elections to farm workers. Establishes the Agricultural Labor Relations Board.

**2. Public school employees' collective bargaining.** SB 160

(Rodda) extends collective bargaining rights to employees of California's public schools and establishes the Education Employment Relations Board.

**3. Professional strikebreakers.** SB 719 (Roberti) prohibits the employment of professional strikebreakers in labor disputes.

**4. Strike injunctions.** SB 743 (Moscone) restricts the unfair use by employers of temporary restraining orders and preliminary injunctions in labor disputes.

## SOCIAL INSURANCE

**5. Unemployment insurance benefits.** AB 91 (McAlister) boosts the maximum unemployment insurance benefit from \$90 to \$104 a week. Increases the taxable base from \$4,200 to \$7,000 and raises the tax rate on employers from 4.1 to 4.9 per cent.

**6. Unemployment insurance coverage.** AB 118 (Fenton) extends unemployment insurance protection to farm workers.

**7. Unemployment insurance claims.** AB 2109 (Chimbole) facilitates the claimant's right to be represented by counsel or agent.

**8. Choice of doctor.** AB 1287 (Foran) provides for free choice of physician in workers' compensation cases.

**9. Compensation coverage.** AB 469 (Ralph) extends full workers' compensation coverage to household domestics and gardeners.

**10. Disability insurance coverage.** SB 979 (Rodda) enables claimant to obtain disability insurance benefits during a trade dispute, as long as disability did not arise from the dispute.

## WORKING CONDITIONS

**11. Employee tips.** AB 232 (Greene) prohibits an employer from taking any part of a tip left for an employee or crediting any part of tips against wages due.

**12. Industrial homework.** AB 353 (Montoya) outlaws industrial homework in garment production in California.

**13. Prevailing wages.** SB 394 (Marks) requires the University of California to pay prevailing wages to construction workers.

**14. Grievance procedure.** AB 804 (Berman) requires trustees of the California state universities to set up grievance procedures, culminating in arbitration.

**15. Personnel records.** SB 955 (Roberti) requires an employer to allow an employee to inspect personnel files that have been used

to determine his qualifications for employment, promotion, additional compensation, termination, or other disciplinary action.

**16. Employee protection.** AB 407 (Berman) exempts theatre employees from prosecution for obscenity where obscene films are shown.

**17. Bar pilots.** AB 1750 (Brown) increases bar pilots' rates in San Francisco, San Pablo, and Suisun bays.

## GENERAL

**18. Home construction loans.** AB 1 (Chacon) (First Extraordinary Session) authorizes a \$950 million program to provide low-interest loans to aid the state's depressed housing industry.

**19. Price-marking.** SB 261 (Roberti) requires supermarkets using computerized checkout systems to mark packaged food items with their prices.

**20. Postcard registration.** AB 822 (Keysor) permits voter registration by postcard.

**21. School aid.** SB 220 (Rodda) requires an adjustment in the formulation program to change the assessed valuation per unit of average daily attendance (ADA) for grades K-12 and community colleges.

**22. Truck identification.** AB 2247 (Deddeh) requires trucks and other carriers regulated by the Public Utilities Commission or the Interstate Commerce Commission to display their permit numbers or other identifying symbols on their doors.

**23. Cargo containers.** SB 659 (Marks) provides that opening cargo containers shall not necessarily result in the loss of immunity from taxation for such imports.

**24. Property in transit.** SB 389 (Marks) exempts from personal property taxation in full personal property manufactured or produced outside of California and brought into the state for transshipment in foreign commerce.
