Despite Democratic control of both houses of the Legislature, Governor Pete Wilson, stymied labor's agenda for progress. In his final year, Wilson vetoed 14 pieces of important legislation and compiled the worst anti-worker record in California history.

- Wilson became the only governor who failed to sign an increase in unemployment and disability insurance since these programs began.
- Wilson deleted budget language that protected union apprenticeship programs, denied state employees a pay raise, and cut Cal-OSHA targeted inspection programs.
- The Legislature failed to send important bills to the governor's desk: an increase in the minimum wage; wage and benefit parity for part-time workers; and model legislation that would give temporary employees the right to know what their employer really pays for their services.

There were bright spots. The Federation stopped Wilson's last-minute attempt to cut disability benefits for pregnant women. We stopped his efforts to cheat immigrant workers out of disability benefits they had already paid for. Funding for education increased. Labor stopped the confirmation of anti-worker appointees to the unemployment insurance appeals board.

California union members and working families rejected Wilson's agenda and elected pro-worker majorities to the Legislature in November. Labor's intensive field campaign resulted in unprecedented voter turnout among union members and a near sweep of the statewide offices.

For the fourth time in this century, Californians elected a Democrat as governor. As we move ahead on our 1999 agenda, the Federation will work to translate our political momentum into legislative accomplishments for California workers.

Federation-Supported Bills Enacted

CIVIL RIGHTS

1. **AB 2303 (Runner)** Prohibits an employer from making an audio or video recording of an employee in a room the employer designates for changing clothes.

SAFETY AND HEALTH

2. **AB 1208 (Migden)** Directs Cal-OSHA Board to revise its bloodborne pathogen standard to include development of safe needles to prevent injury to health care workers.
3. **AB 1957 (Knox)** Extends the life of the employer-funded Cal-OSHA targeted inspection and consultation programs until January 1, 2000.

SOCIAL INSURANCE

4. **SB 165 (Solis)** Provides that persons are eligible for unemployment insurance benefits if they leave their employment to protect their children or themselves from domestic violence.

WORKER PROTECTIONS

5. **SB 654 (Johnston)** Prohibits discrimination against employee or prospective employee based on genetic characteristics or hereditary traits over which they have no control.
6. **SB 1514 (Solis)** Increases civil penalties for wage and hour law violations in the garment industry.

Federation-Supported Bills Vetoed

CIVIL RIGHTS

1. **SB 1098 (Kopp)** Would have prohibited employers from replacing a worker over 40 with a younger, lower paid worker in order to increase profits.

2. **AB 1643 (Escutia)** Would have declared it is the Legislature's intent that using salary as the basis for distinguishing between employees when terminating employment may constitute age discrimination.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

3. **SB 1431 (Solis)** Would have prohibited employers from requiring reimbursement from firefighters for expenses incurred during their hiring or training.

SOCIAL INSURANCE

4. **SB 164 (Solis)** Would have required that EDD conduct a cost study to determine the fiscal impact of providing SDI benefits to persons taking leave to care for a seriously ill family member.

5. **SB 495 (Rosenthal)** Would have increased the maximum weekly state disability insurance benefit from \$336 to \$490.

6. **SB 924 (Solis)** Would have established a penalty of \$1,000 per worker against an employer for failure to maintain workers' compensation insurance even if no stop work order is issued.

7. **SB 1909 (Rosenthal)** Would have increased the maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$230 to \$300.

8. **SB 1933 (Johnston)** Would have assured continued coverage of SDI and workers' compensation benefits to immigrant workers whom the governor is seeking to disqualify for eligibility through administrative action.

9. **AB 236 (Figueroa)** Would have provided for an interpreter's services for limited English-speaking injured workers during the course of medical evaluation.

10. **AB 1680 (Alquist)** Would have required EDD to provide an appeal form to unemployment insurance claimants being denied benefits.

WORKER PROTECTIONS

11. **AB 15 (Knox, formerly AB 480-Knox)** Would have required employers to permit employees to use their sick leave to attend to an ill child.

12. **AB 574 (Villaraigosa)** Would have prohibited an employer from requiring an employee to agree to arbitrate a claim prior to the existence of an actual dispute, thereby preserving the employee's constitutional right to a jury trial.

13. **AB 2025 (Aroner)** Would have provided incentives to persons who pursue child care development training and insure child care providers adequate compensation.

14. **AB 2156 (Keeley)** Would have extended the period for filing discrimination complaints with the Labor Commissioner from 30 days to one year.

Federation-Opposed Bills Defeated

CIVIL RIGHTS

1. **SB 2041 (Kopp)** Would have dismantled programs that promote access for women and minorities in public sector employment, education and state contracting.

2. **AB 1700 (Richter)** Would have repealed major state affirmative action laws.

3. **AB 1842 (Baldwin)** Would have allowed non-profit corporations to discriminate against a worker based on the employer's perception of the worker's sexual orientation.

4. **AB 2378 (House)** Would have permitted random drug testing of employees without adequate safeguards for the tested employees.

CONTRACTORS LICENSING LAW

5. **AB 2399 (Poochigian)** Would have permitted farm labor contractors to renew their license on a biennial basis rather than on a yearly basis.

PUBLIC WORKS

6. **AB 453 (Kuykendall)** Would have raised the threshold for paying prevailing wages on public contracts to \$100,000.

7. **AB 977 (Oller)** Would have exempted any work performed on public school facilities from prevailing wage requirements.

SOCIAL INSURANCE

8. **SB 541 (Kopp)** Would have denied workers' compensation benefits to out-of-state professional athletes for cumulative injuries sustained while performing in California.

9. **SB 964 (Knight)** Would have imposed a private industry disability plan on unorganized workers in place of the State Disability

Insurance program by a simple majority vote of all the employees instead of the current super majority.

10. **SB 1891 (Hurtt)** Would have denied unemployment insurance benefits to prisoners who worked while incarcerated.

11. **SB 2096 (Mountjoy)** Would have created a new class of worker called a “free agent” who would be required to buy his or her own health insurance and would be exempt from employer-paid workers’ compensation and unemployment insurance programs.

12. **AB 1704 (Miller)** Would have provided that paid holidays during layoff would be deemed wages and disqualify the claimant from receiving unemployment insurance benefits.

13. **AB 1965 (Aguiar)** Would have provided that CALWORKS (Welfare to Work) participants be paid workers’ compensation benefits from General Fund monies thereby encouraging their employers to disregard workplace safety issues.

14. **AB 1985 (Brewer)** Would have provided that a clerical error which delays payment of workers’ compensation benefits is not an unreasonable delay and is exempt from penalties.

15. **AB 2497 (Brewer)** Would have limited injured workers’ ability to receive vocational rehabilitation monies and limited ability of Employment Development Department to place liens on employers for recovery of workers’ compensation monies.

WORKER PROTECTIONS

16. **SB 1748 (Kopp)** Would have deprived public transit employees of the right to strike.

17. **SB 2206 (Mountjoy)** Would have changed the legal standard for proving a wrongful termination case in favor of employers.

18. **AB 2148 (Pacheco)** Would have limited damages to wrongfully terminated employees.

19. **AJR 64 (Richter)** Would have allowed an increase of foreign workers under the H-1B visa program to work in the high-technology industry which has already been hit with massive layoffs.

Federation-Supported Bills Defeated

BUDGET

1. **SCA 16 (Lockyer)** Would have provided that a budget bill be

enacted by a simple majority vote of both houses of the Legislature rather than a two-thirds vote, thereby enhancing the Legislature's ability to gain passage of a budget bill by the constitutionally provided deadline.

CIVIL RIGHTS

2. **SB 2192 (Vasconcellos)** Would have declared the Legislature's intent that using salary as the basis for distinguishing between employees when terminating employment may constitute age discrimination.

HOUSING

3. **SB 1730 (Burton)** Would have prohibited a landlord from using income standards in evaluating a prospective tenant.

MISCELLANEOUS

4. **SB 1616 (Burton)** Would have required state agencies to establish a policy to give a preference to California-based bidders in awarding contracts for construction and the procurement of goods and services.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

5. **SB 2018 (Polanco)** Would have provided all state employees with a salary increase of six percent retroactive to March 1, 1998.

PUBLIC WORKS

6. **SB 1610 (Burton)** Would have required at least 50 percent of the workers on a public works project be a resident of California.

SAFETY AND HEALTH

7. **AB 2800 (Labor & Employment Committee)** Would have prohibited Cal/OSHA from using mitigating factors to reduce penalties to employers who repeatedly violate Cal/OSHA standards.

SOCIAL INSURANCE

8. **SB 1551 (Solis)** Would have strengthened penalties against insurers and third party insurance administrators for late payments of workers' compensation benefits.

WORKER PROTECTIONS

9. **SB 233 (Solis)** Would have made cooler shippers jointly liable for field sanitation violations committed by strawberry growers if amendments had been adopted.

10. **SB 1506 (Hayden)** Would have provided unpaid family care and medical leave benefits to employees to care for a person dependent on the employee and with whom they have lived for one year or more.
11. **SB 1515 (Solis)** Would have appropriated funds for labor law enforcement sweeps in the janitorial industry.
12. **SB 1743 (Johnston)** Would have given temporary workers the right to know how much money their boss is paying the "temp" agency that dispatched them.
13. **SB 1967 (Solis)** Would have made cooler-shippers jointly liable for field sanitation violations committed by strawberry growers.
14. **SB 1968 (Solis)** Would have provided for wage and benefit parity between full-time and part-time workers.
15. **AB 480 (Knox)** Would have required employers to permit employees to use their sick leave to attend to an ill child.
16. **AB 1184 (Shelley)** Would have increased the state's minimum wage from \$5.75 to \$6.50 an hour effective March 1, 1999.
17. **AB 1777 (Labor and Employment Committee)** Would have provided mechanisms for the state to enforce its contracts with private landlords and would insure payment of prevailing wages for custodial workers.
18. **AB 2685 (Alquist)** Would have increased the state minimum wage to \$6.50 on March 1, 1999.

Pete Wilson's Budget Cuts

Vetoed a \$1.8 million budget item that would have provided for continuation of Cal-OSHA targeted inspection and consultation programs through general fund monies.

Vetoed budget language that would have stopped the California Apprenticeship Council from making rules to slash apprenticeship pay and programs.

Vetoed new funding for the Industrial Welfare Commission.

Vetoed increased funds to audit workers' compensation insurance companies that fail to pay benefits on time.

1. **Civil Rights** (SB 1098-Kopp) Would have prohibited employers from replacing a worker over 40 with a younger, lower paid worker in order to increase profits. Passed 42-27, June 25, 1998. (YES=Right)
2. **Civil Rights** (AB 1643-Escutia) Would have declared it is the Legislature's intent that using salary as the basis for distinguishing between employees when terminating employment may constitute age discrimination. Passed 49-21, May 4, 1998. (YES=Right)
3. **Safety and Health** (AB 1957-Knox) Extends the life of the employer-funded Cal-OSHA targeted inspection and consultation programs until January 1, 2000. Passed 42-33, May 14, 1998. (YES=Right)
4. **Safety and Health** (AB 2800-Labor and Employment Committee) Would have prohibited Cal-OSHA from using mitigating factors to reduce penalties to employers who repeatedly violate Cal-OSHA standards. Passage refused 38-28, May 26, 1998. (YES=Right)
5. **Social Insurance** (SB 164-Solis) Would have required that EDD conduct a cost study to determine the fiscal impact of providing SDI benefits to persons taking leave to care for a seriously ill family member. Passed 42-31, August 6, 1998. (YES=Right)
6. **Social Insurance** (SB 165-Solis) Clarifies that persons who leave their place of employment because of domestic violence do so for "good cause" and may be eligible for unemployment insurance benefits. Passed 46-21, July 7, 1998. (YES=Right)
7. **Social Insurance** (SB 495-Rosenthal) Would have increased the maximum weekly state disability insurance benefit form \$336 to \$490. Passed 42-34, August 6, 1998. (YES=Right)
8. **Social Insurance** (SB 924-Solis) Would have established a penalty of \$1,000 per worker against an employer for failure to maintain workers' compensation insurance even if no stop work order is issued. Passed 41-33, August 26, 1998. (YES=Right)
9. **Social Insurance** (SB 1909-Rosenthal) Would have increased the maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$230 to \$300. Passed 41-33, August 27, 1998. (YES=Right)
10. **Social Insurance** (SB 1933-Johnston) Would have ensured continued coverage of SDI and workers' compensation benefits to immigrant workers whom the governor is seeking to disqualify for eligibility through administrative action. Passed 41-34, August 28, 1998. (YES=Right)
11. **Social Insurance** (AB 1680-Alquist) Would have required EDD to provide an appeal form to an unemployment insurance claimant being denied benefits. Passed 77-1, May 21, 1998. (YES=Right)

- 12. Worker Protections** (SB 233-Solis) Would have made cooler-shippers jointly liable for field sanitation violations committed by strawberry growers if amendments had been adopted. Passage refused 30-40, August 24, 1998. (YES=Right)
- 13. Worker Protections** (SB 1968-Solis) Would have provided for wage and benefit parity between full-time and part-time workers. Passage refused 18-37, August 27, 1998. (YES=Right)
- 14. Worker Protections** (AB 15-Knox, formerly AB 480-Knox) Would have required employers to permit employees to use their sick leave to attend to an ill child. Senate amendments passed 48-29, August 31, 1998. (YES=Right)
- 15. Worker Protections** (AB 1777-Labor and Employment) Would have provided mechanisms for the state to enforce its contracts with private landlords and would insure payment of prevailing wage for custodial workers. Passed 42-35, May 14, 1998. (YES=Right)
- 16. Worker Protections** (AB 2025-Arter) Would have provided incentives to persons who pursue child care development training and insure child care providers adequate compensation. Passed 43-31, May 27, 1998. (YES=Right)
- 17. Worker Protections** (AB 2156-Keeley) Would have extended the period for filing discrimination complaints with the Labor Commissioner from 30 days to one year. Passed 46-23, May 26, 1998. (YES=Right)
