

Bills that build our unions

Supporting our unions in their struggle for justice and organizing ... this was our legislative priority of the past two years. Striking Los Angeles janitors used new Federation legislation to protect their right to rally. Assembly Bill 1268 (Kuehl) stopped janitorial contractors from using injunctions against picketlines and marches. Gigante supermarket workers, fighting to join UFCW, also used the bill to assert their freedom of speech on the picketline. And other unions did.

Our 2000 bills will be useful tools for organizing as well. Assembly Bill 1889 (Cedillo), historic right-to-organize legislation, stops employers from using taxpayer funds against organizing campaigns. Assembly Bill 2509 (Steinberg) enforces existing wage laws. Every union should use it to pressure scofflaw employers. Assembly Bill 212 (Aroner) will improve the quality of childcare services available to working families.

We had other victories. Five years ago, the Federation resorted to a ballot initiative to raise the state's minimum wage. In 2000, the Federation led a labor-community coalition to win an increase from the Industrial Welfare Commission. By 2002, our minimum wage will be the second-highest in the nation, benefitting nearly two million low-wage workers, their families and communities.

However, we did not achieve all of our objectives. Many bills were passed but not signed, including our corporate welfare bill to disclose company tax credits (Assembly Bill 1220, Romero). Legislation to raise California's unemployment insurance benefits from our last-in-the-nation ranking (Senate Bill 546 – Solis and AB 2477 – Wiggins), as well as increasing benefits to injured workers (Senate Bill 996 – Johnston) have been re-introduced for 2001.

We will continue to support the work of our unions in amplifying the voices of workers. Our focus now will turn to building a stronger voice back in the home districts where our members work and live. There lies our greatest strength and best accountability of the people who make our laws. Local legislative action committees will work in tandem with our advocates in Sacramento.

We will not relent until the banner of economic justice flies high for every worker in California.

Federation-Supported Bills Enacted

AGENCY SHOP

1. **SB 739 (Solis)** Transfers jurisdiction for the resolution of unfair labor practice charges and representation disputes under the Myers-Milias-Brown Act to the Public Employment Relations Board and ensures workers an opportunity to elect an agency shop.
2. **SB 1960 (Burton)** Provides same agency shop protections for public school employees as employees organized at U.C. and California State University System.

AIR POLLUTERS

3. **SB 1865 (Perata)** Revises civil and criminal penalties to encourage compliance with air quality laws and to punish egregious violators.

CESAR CHAVEZ HOLIDAY

4. **SB 984 (Polanco)** Establishes Cesar Chavez's birthday as official state holiday for state employees.

CHILD LABOR

5. **SB 1888 (Hayden)** Prohibits state agencies from purchasing foreign goods made by children exploited by sweatshop labor.

CHILDCARE

6. **AB 212 (Aroner)** Improves quality of child care services for working families by providing incentives for trained, experienced workers to stay in the field.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE DISCRIMINATION

7. **AB 2357 (Honda)** Allows victims to take up to 15 days unpaid leave from work for specified reasons relating to domestic violence.

FIREFIGHTERS' ARBITRATION

8. **SB 402 (Burton)** Establishes procedures for final and binding arbitration of economic issues in a dispute between firefighters, law enforcement officers and their public employers.

L. A. TRANSIT WORKERS

9. **SB 1101 (Murray)** Ensures that existing collective bargaining rights of Los Angeles transit workers are preserved when a transportation zone is created.

LEMON LAW

10. **SB 1718 (Sher)** Expands provisions of the lemon law to include new motor vehicles with safety defects and vehicles used primarily for business purposes.

PERSONNEL FILE INSPECTION

11. **SB 1327 (Escutia)** Extends the right to inspect personnel files to public as well as private employees.

PREVAILING WAGE

12. **AB 1901 (Steinberg)** Ends many years of discrimination against paying the prevailing wage on low income housing projects assisted by state funding.

RIGHT TO ORGANIZE

13. **AB 1889 (Cedillo)** Stops the misuse of taxpayer funds to interfere with workers' freedom to join or form a union.

TRIAL COURT EMPLOYEES

14. **SB 2140 (Burton)** Clearly defines trial court employees as court employees with court employment status except for certain benefits where they are designated as county employees.

UNDERGROUND ECONOMY

15. **AB 2509 (Steinberg)** Enforces existing laws protecting workers' wages by providing more effective penalties and stricter procedures for employers who engage in underground economic practices that cheat workers and robs the state of \$3 billion in tax revenues.

UNSCRUPULOUS CONTRACTORS

16. **AB 2513 (Shelley)** Closes a gaping loophole that allowed unscrupulous contractors to create shell corporations and continue state work after sanctions.

WORKERS' EXPENSES

17. SB 1305 (Figueroa) Provides that interest and costs, including attorney's fees, shall be awarded when the court orders the employer to reimburse the employee for necessary work-related expenditures.

YOUTH JOB SAFETY

18. AB 1599 (Torlakson) Creates a statewide young worker and safety network aimed at preventing young worker injuries and provides funding to D.I.R. to contract with local district attorneys to establish "circuit prosecution programs" intended to prosecute CAL/OSHA criminal violators.

Federation-Supported Bills Vetoed

AGENCY SHOP

1. AB 502 (Wildman) Would have permitted an agency shop agreement between public agencies and employee organizations to include management, confidential or supervisory employees.

BACKSTRETCH WORKERS

2. AB 2760 (Wesson) Would have provided for "backstretch" workers to exercise their rights to organize a labor union, and set housing standards to protect the health, safety and general welfare of these workers living at the racetrack.

COMPUTER MONITORING

3. SB 1822 (Bowen) Would have prohibited an employer from secretly monitoring employee email or other computer records without first advising the employee of the employer's monitoring policy.

DISABILITY INSURANCE-STATE UNIVERSITIES

4. AB 2815 (Kuehl) Would have allowed employees of the State of California, the Legislature, and the California State University to

negotiate out of the state fund's non-occupational DI program into the State Disability program when bargaining for a new contract.

FAIR LABOR STANDARDS ACT

5. **AB 2497 (Romero)** Would have provided that the State of California shall be subject to the federal Fair Labor Standards Act and prohibits the state from claiming immunity in FLSA actions.

FAMILY SICK LEAVE

6. **SB 1149 (Hayden)** Would have provided that an employee could take family care and medical leave to care for a grandparent or sibling, or domestic partner, who has a serious health condition.

IMMIGRANTS' RIGHTS

7. **AB 1463 (Cedillo)** Would have allowed a person who has applied for immigration status, but having no Social Security number, to apply for a California driver's license or I.D. card.

INTERNET SALES TAX

8. **AB 2412 (Migden)** Would have ensured that any business with an Internet site and a sales presence in California collects tax on its Internet sales if the Internet business sells substantially the same products under substantially the same name as the bricks and mortar stores.

JANITORS' JOB STABILITY

9. **SB 1877 (Alarcon)** Would have provided job stability for janitors by giving them a chance to keep their jobs when their employer had lost an account with the building manager.

LIE DETECTOR

10. **SB 1854 (Alarcon)** Would have required that a polygraph test be videotaped when administered by the employer.

PATIENT SAFETY

11. **AB 675 (Thomson)** Would have required hospitals to set standards to provide for hospital patient safety in order to counter

the intense fiscal pressures to minimize staffing which effectively puts patients at risk.

PERB-UNFAIR LABOR PRACTICES

12. SB 860 (Hughes) Would have authorized PERB to penalize UC and CSU employers for repeated unfair labor practices that were similar in nature.

PRISON TEACHERS

13. SB 1845 (Polanco) Would have upgraded the status of teachers in prisons from the jurisdiction of custodial management, thus allowing them to focus on purely educational activities.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT BENEFITS

14. SB 1410 (Speier) Would have made domestic partners of San Mateo County Employees eligible for the same survivor benefits received by spouses of county employees.

15. AB 2642 (Calderon) Would have allowed PERS agencies to offer improved retirement benefits to non-safety employees, providing a powerful recruitment tool in California's tight labor market.

PUBLIC WORKS

16. AB 2783 (Villaraigosa) Would have provided direct access to certified payroll records and right to file civil actions to enforce wage and hour provisions in public works contracts.

TAX CREDITS

17. AB 1220 (Romero) Would have required big corporations accepting tax credits for job creation to report how many and what kinds of jobs they were creating.

TAX USE AND ECONOMIC IMPACT

18. SB 1710 (Hayden) Would have required the Legislative Analyst to review the economic and employment impacts of certain state business tax expenditures and public subsidies by the state.

TRADE AND ENVIRONMENT

19. **SB 1516 (Hayden)** Would have required the state to review and assess existing and proposed international trade agreements that could compromise California's environmental laws.

TRADE IMPACT ON WORKERS

20. **SB 1566 (Hayden)** Would have provided for the Department of Industrial Relations to review and assess international trade agreements that may have adversely affected California laws governing wages, working conditions, and workplace health and safety.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

21. **SB 546 (Solis)** Would have provided the first unemployment insurance benefit increase since 1989 by raising the state's maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$230 to \$380 per week over a three year period.

22. **AB 2477 (Wiggins)** Would have provided an alternate base period to reflect most current earnings upon which unemployment insurance benefits could be calculated.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

23. **SB 996 (Johnston)** Would have increased maximum weekly benefits for temporarily and permanently disabled workers.

Federation-Supported Resolutions Adopted

BASIC VEGETABLE PRODUCTS

1. **SR 32 (Solis) and HR 61 (Keeley)** Urge the State of California to cease supporting Basic Vegetable Products through state purchases of Basic Products during a current labor dispute with Teamsters Local 890 and calls upon Basic to negotiate in good faith and rescind the permanent placement of strikers.

Federation-Opposed Bills Defeated

DAILY OVERTIME PAY

1. **AB 367 (Margett)** Would have provided that an alternative workweek schedule could be adopted by agreement between employee and employer to accommodate an employee's "special needs."
2. **AB 2056 (Briggs)** Would have gutted daily overtime pay by permitting workdays of up to 12 hours per day instead of the current lawful 10 hours without overtime pay in excess of eight hours in a day.

Federation-Opposed Bill Signed

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

1. **AB 1856 (Kuehl)** Effectively limits an employer's incentive to stamp out sexual harassment in the workplace and deviates from standard employment law by holding individual employees liable for workplace harassment, rather than placing a higher burden on the employer to provide a harassment free workplace.

- 21. Sexual Harassment AB 1856 (Kuehl)** Effectively limits an employer's incentive to stamp out sexual harassment in the workplace and deviates from standard employment law by holding individual employees liable for workplace harassment, rather than placing a higher burden on the employer to provide a harassment free workplace. Passed 42-31, June 1, 2000. (YES=Wrong)
- 22. Tax Credits AB 1220 (Romero)** Would have required big corporations accepting tax credits for job creation to report how many and what kinds of jobs they were creating. Concurrence in Senate amendments 45-31, August 29, 2000. (YES=Right)
- 23. Underground Economy AB 2509 (Steinberg)** Enforces existing laws protecting workers' wages by providing more effective penalties and stricter procedures for employers who engage in underground economic practices that cheat workers and robs the state of \$3 billion in tax revenues. Passed 41-32, May 25, 2000. (YES=Right)
- 24. Unemployment Insurance SB 546 (Solis)** Would have provided the first unemployment insurance benefit increase since 1989 by raising the state's maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$230 to \$380 per week over a three year period. Passed 46-31, August 28, 2000. (YES=Right)
- 25. Unemployment Insurance AB 2477 (Wiggins)** Would have provided an alternate base period to reflect most current earnings upon which unemployment insurance benefits could be calculated. Concurrence in Senate amendments 41-30, August 31, 2000. (YES=Right)
- 26. Unscrupulous Contractors AB 2513 (Shelley)** Closes a gaping loophole that allowed unscrupulous contractors to create shell corporations and continue state work after sanctions. Passed 46-27, May 18, 2000. (YES=Right)
- 27. Workers' Compensation SB 996 (Johnston)** Would have increased maximum weekly benefits for temporarily and permanently disabled workers. Conference Report adopted 42-31, August 31, 2000. (YES=Right)
- 28. Youth Job Safety AB 1599 (Tortlakson)** Creates a statewide young worker and safety network aimed at preventing young worker injuries and provides funding to D.I.R. to contract with local district attorneys to establish "circuit prosecution programs" intended to prosecute CAL/OSHA criminal violators. Concurrence in Senate amendments 46-28, August 31, 2000. (YES=Right)
