

Legislative Notes

Workmen's Compensation. The Assembly has given approval to AB 76 (Hawkins) extending workmen's compensation to domestic workers who earn \$50 or more a month. The vote was 57 to 12. This is the only workmen's compensation bill that has seen the light of day thus far. All other compensation bills on the Assembly side are still tied up in Finance and Insurance subcommittee, as reported previously. This week, the subcommittee held an "orientation" meeting.

Minimum Wages. AB 1223 (Hawkins) establishing a \$1.25 per hour minimum and a lower rate of \$1.00 for Agriculture, which was reported out of the Assembly Industrial Relations Committee last week, is now resting in the Committee on Ways and Means, because it carries an implied appropriation. The bill has a long hard road ahead. Active local support is absolutely necessary to get the bill through the legislature.

Civil Rights. Focus your attention on the Senate from here on out. AB 91 (Rumford), the FEP bill which got through the Senate Labor Committee last week, has been referred to Senate Finance Committee. This is a tough committee, composed of 7 Republicans and 6 Democrats. AB 890 (Hawkins), prohibiting racial discrimination in housing financed in whole or in part from government funds, is also in the upper house waiting for a hearing in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

"Hot Cargo." Federation-sponsored AB 711 (McMillan), repealing the state hot cargo and secondary boycott act which has been declared unconstitutional, received Assembly Committee approval last week and was passed by the lower house on March 24th by a vote of 66 to 3. Although unconstitutional, the hot cargo act is still in the Labor Code.

Employer pension fund contributions. AB 380 (Bane), also a Federation-sponsored measure, was passed by the Assembly without opposition. The bill makes it unlawful for an employer to wilfully and with intent to defraud fail to make agreed payments to a pension or vacation plan.



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Farm Workers Included As Committee Okehs Minimum Wage Bill

Presaging a new era in consideration for the agricultural worker the Assembly Committee on Industrial Relations last week approved AB 1223, Hawkins, which establishes a minimum hourly wage of \$1.25 and includes agricultural workers for the lesser amount of \$1.00. The bill which is a part of Governor Brown's legislative program, must now clear the Ways and Means Committee before reaching the Senate.

At the committee hearing there was vigorous opposition by farm and employer groups which is expected to gain additional vigor when the bill reaches the Senate. On the other hand strong representation on behalf of the bill was presented by representatives of the California Labor Federation, farm workers organizations, and religious groups. The California Labor Federation is particularly strong in its pursuit of minimum wage legislation that includes all employees including agricultural workers.

The measure originally called for \$1.25 per hour minimum for all workers but Assemblyman Hawkins (D) of Los Angeles County, the author, reluctantly accepted the amendment to lower the rate for farm workers. However, inclusion of agricultural workers at any rate is a step in the right direction, according to Hawkins who said, "the farmers would object if the rate was only 35 cents per hour."

Opponents of the bill contended during the nearly three hour session that it would create unemployment, kill off agriculture and put restaurants out of business.

When the claim was made that Cali-

BILL ON PICKET SIGNS GOES TO COMMITTEE

A bill that would require pickets to carry signs stating whether a labor dispute is with the employer or his employees has been introduced in the state senate.

The bill (SB 1034) by Senator Hollister (D) of Santa Barbara County, has been referred to the Senate Labor Committee.

SENATE LABOR BILL WINS COMMITTEE APPROVAL AS HEARING CONTINUES

The Senate Labor Committee which continued last week's hearings on SB 209, (Teale), which is Governor Brown's labor bill, passed the bill with a "do pass as amended" recommendation at this Monday's meeting. The vote was 4 to 0 with all amendments as reported last week unchanged and included two minor additional amendments.

The new amendments would (1) change a portion of another amendment so that union officers must be elected at least every four years instead of three, and (2) would describe those eligible to vote for officers as all members who are eligible under the constitution of that union.

This measure was supported by the California Labor Federation after the helpful and clarifying amendments were included. This is in line with the Federation policy as set forth by the last AFL-CIO Convention and carried out by the Legislative Committee which met in Sacramento recently.

At the hearing Monday a spokesman for the Federated Employers of San Francisco complained that "the only provisions of this bill which have any teeth apply to the employers—all those without teeth apply to unions."

Senator Teale, author of the bill, said the bill was introduced January 20, and to date no representative of the employers had been to see him. He said, "I think it is a good bill."

The vote of the committee showed: Yes; Hollister, Short, Teale, Montgomery, (chairman). Not voting; Byrne. Absent; Williams, Richards.

DIGEST OF BILLS †

ASSEMBLY BILLS

AB 2003 Thomas (Fish and Game) Authorizes the use of bait nets in any ocean district except District 19B to take designated species of fish, including jack and Pacific mackerel, for bait or processing, rather than use in all ocean districts except District 20 and for taking designated species in Districts 19A and 19B, if fish used for bait only. March 13. **Good**

AB 2025 Beaver (Industrial Relations) Requires the body awarding any contract for public works to keep on file, as well as ascertain, the general prevailing rate of per diem wages in the locality in which the work is to be performed.

Specifies that such body may, in calling for bids for the contract or the contract itself, incorporate by reference the prevailing rate as found in such file. March 13. **Good**

AB 2029 Grant (Public Health) Requires that all gas appliances be approved by an approved agency rather than by a nationally recognized testing agency. Exempts from vent requirements gas dryers approved for unvented use, changes the height requirement for vents, and provides that approved gas heaters designed for unvented use may be used without vents in buildings equipped with unvented heaters on September 22, 1951.

Requires the removal of all unapproved heaters or hazardous appliances, makes it unlawful to sell unapproved heaters, and provides for local enforcement. Requires that every gas heater have seal of approval of the approved agency. March 13. **Bad**

AB 2040 O'Connell (Criminal Procedure) Provides that no evidence obtained as the result of an arrest shall be admissible in a criminal proceeding against the person arrested unless following such arrest the person is taken before a magistrate without undue delay. Provides, however, that the preceding rule shall not be applicable to evidence obtained as the result of a lawful search which is incident to a lawful arrest and which is conducted at the same place and time as the arrest. March 13. **Good**

AB 2041 O'Connell (Criminal Procedure) Existing Sec. 842, Pen. C. provides that an arrest by a peace officer acting under a warrant is lawful even though the officer does not have the warrant in his possession at the time of the arrest, but if the person arrested so requests it, the warrant shall be shown to him as soon as practicable. The bill would provide, instead, that a peace officer making an arrest pursuant to a warrant shall, whenever practicable, take the warrant or a copy thereof with him and shall make such reasonable efforts as are consistent with the efficient performance of his duty to show the warrant or the copy to the person arrested at the time the arrest is made. The bill would further provide that a peace officer making an arrest under warrant who does not have the warrant or copy with him at the time of arrest shall, as soon after arrest as practicable, in the event that physical custody over the person is maintained, have the warrant shown to the person, or if the person has been released from physical custody, make the warrant available for the inspection of such person and use reasonable efforts to notify such person of the availability of the warrant for inspection. March 12. **Good**

AB 2051 McCollister (Municipal and County Government) Amends Ch. 994, Stats. 1949, the Sonoma County Flood Control and Water Conservation District Act.

Permits the district board to sell real property, water rights, or water-works without an election. Authorizes the district to furnish water outside of the district.

Increases the estimated cost of work or materials as to which bids must be obtained by the district from \$2,000 to \$4,000. Makes requirements that contracts be submitted on bid inapplicable to contracts entered into with the State of California or any other governmental agency. Permits the district to purchase material and perform construction and other work by force account, day labor, or negotiated contract within the monetary limit. Permits the district to rent or otherwise contract for equipment with or without an operator for use on district works where approved by the board of directors.

Provides for an election to authorize an aggregate zone tax in excess of 25 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation on land within two or more zones. Designates the district board as an ex officio the board of directors of any zone therein.

Permits formation or expansion of a zone within the district without the filing of a general description of the lands to be taken or general estimate of cost of the initial project by the district engineer with the district board and without including a statement of the estimated cost of the proposed initial project in the resolution of the board of intention to establish or expand a zone.

Validates the creation of certain undescribed zones. March 13. **Bad**

AB 2062 MacBride (Civil Service and State Personnel) Adds Survivor's benefits to State Employees Retirement Law. Provides when a survivor is also entitled to a greater monthly allowance under Section 21365.5 (where member dies while in state service and before retirement but is qualified for voluntary retirement), such allowance is reduced by the amount of the survivor allowance payable. Provides where survivor is also entitled to a special death benefit or the patrol members or local safety members' continued allowance, survivor may elect to receive such benefit or allowance in lieu of the survivor allowance, otherwise only the survivor allowance is payable.

Increases state contributions to Retirement Fund for various categories of members by unspecified amounts. Makes survivor allowance provisions applicable to contracting agencies only if agency so provides in its contract. March 17. **Watch**

AB 2073 Z'berg (Finance and Insurance) Eliminates requirement, for eligibility for unemployment compensation weekly benefit amount, that an individual have made an effort to seek work on his own behalf in accordance with the regulations of the Director of Employment, and specifies that the individual shall be ineligible if he failed to seek suitable work in accordance with specific and reasonable instructions of a public employment office. March 18. **Watch**

AB 2077 Winton (Livestock and Dairies) Authorizes the Director of Agriculture to designate the minimum markup to be applicable to the retail sales price of poultry and poultry meat.

Prohibits the retail sale of poultry and poultry meat at less than actual cost plus such markup and makes such sale a misdemeanor. March 18. **Bad**

AB 2087 MacBride (Education) Authorizes school district governing board to request county auditor and county superintendent of schools to revise reports and information required to be filed by them with the Superintendent of Public Instruction in connection with the assessed valuation of property in the district, to eliminate items of assessment involving non-assessable possessory interests in personal property. Requires revisions to be filed with the Superintendent of Public Instruction before June 30, 1959, and requires revisions to be used in computing apportionments for the 1959-60 Fiscal Year.

In effect immediately, urgency measure. March 18. **Watch**

AB 2092 George A. Willson (Judiciary—Civil) Requires a person presenting an award of the Industrial Accident Commission to pay the same fee on filing the document with the clerk of the superior court as he paid on any civil action or special proceeding. March 18. **Bad**

AB 2098 George E. Brown (Education) Provides for participation in the Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance program, in addition to participation in the State Teachers' Retirement System, of members of such system, who are school district employees, on a district basis.


Authorizes division into separate coverage groups of members in such district, with respect to those who desire coverage and those who do not, and provides for referendum of employees in each district. March 18. **Good**

AB 2103 Holmes (Agriculture) Requires a carnival or circus to be licensed annually by Division of Industrial Safety on finding of compliance with industrial safety standards, fire safety requirements, and health and sanitation laws and regulations. Provides for suspension or revocation of license on failure to comply. March 18. **Watch**

AB 2104 Holmes (Agriculture) Provides a carnival, circus, side show or other amusement authorized by a state, district, county, or citrus fruit fair to operate on the fair premises may not be required to obtain additional authorization license, or permit from any city, county, or other local governmental agency. March 18. **Watch**

FORM 3547 REQUESTED

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AB 2113 Biddick (Transportation and Commerce) Provides that evidence relating to the speed of vehicles obtained through the use of radar equipment shall be admissible in court.
Provides for the erection of signs informing motorists that radar is used in this State to measure the speed of vehicles. March 19. **Bad**

AB 2118 Davis (Water) Creates the Lassen County Flood Control and Water Conservation District within the territory of Lassen County, for the purpose of controlling, conserving, and disposing of storm, flood, and other waters.

Prescribes the organization, operation, management, financing and the powers and duties of the district, which include the creation of zones, the development and sale of electric power, the issuance of general obligation bonds, and the levying of taxes and assessments. Does not contain collective bargaining provisions. March 19. **Watch**

AB 2139 Britschgi (Judiciary—Civil) Provides for chemical re driving under the influence of liquor. Refusal to submit to the test to result in a temporary suspension of the driving privilege which may be followed, after a hearing, if requested, by revocation or suspension by

the Department of Motor Vehicles on finding that the refusal was unreasonable.

Permits person tested to receive test results and to have additional test at his own expense. March 19. **Bad**

AB 2161 Gaffney (Industrial Relations) Requires the Director of Employment to establish and maintain a placement service devoted to securing gainful employment for persons who, solely because of restrictions imposed on their employability based on their advanced age, are not readily able to secure employment. March 20. **Good**

ACA 31 Lanterman (Constitutional Amendments) Provides that in any criminal proceeding, a narcotic or deadly weapon, seized by any peace officer outside the curtilage, as defined, of any dwelling house, shall not be rendered admissible in evidence by reason of illegality of its seizure. March 13. **Bad**

AJR 23 Z'berg (Rules) Memorializes the Congress of the United States to enact legislation to provide for public, rather than private, construction and operation of the hydroelectric power facilities of the Trinity River Project. March 20. **Good**

SENATE BILLS

SB 971 Teale (Labor) ADDs X-ray laboratory technicians in hospitals to list of occupations not subject to limits on hours of employment. March 12. **Watch**

SB 980 Richards (Elections) Requires person or organization to obtain the prior written approval of a candidate or officeholder to the advertising copy before using the name of the candidate or officeholder in paid political advertising. March 13. **Good**

SB 985 Beard (Local Government) Makes numerous provisions regarding the provision of county medical facilities. Among other things requires county boards of supervisors authority to adopt standards of eligibility and admissibility to county facilities. March 16. **Watch**

SB 999 Teale (Local Government) Creates Mariposa County Water Agency. Contains no prevailing wage provision and requires sale at wholesale to both public and private entities. Contains no collective bargaining provisions. March 16. **Bad**

SB 1003 McAteer (Revenue and Taxation) Exempts from taxation except for state purposes vessels under construction within the State of more than 50 tons burden or 100 tons displacement, rather than of 1,000 tons burden, and all parts and materials thereof held at the building site by the builder.

To take effect immediately, urgency measure. March 17. **Good**

SB 1017 Teale (Revenue and Taxation) Imposes a privilege tax on the purchase by a private corporation subject to the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission of electricity for resale of falling water where electricity is generated from tax-exempt facilities at a rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mill for each kilowatt hour of electricity so purchased and $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mill for each kilowatt hour of electricity generated by the falling water so purchased.

Provides that moneys collected by State from the tax imposed on the purchase of falling water where electricity is generated shall be paid to the county where such tax-exempt facilities are located. March 18. **Watch**

SB 1026 Rodda (Governmental Efficiency) Provides for survivor's benefits on state retirement system. Provides when survivor is also entitled to a greater monthly allowance under Section 21365.5 (where member dies while in state service and before retirement but is qualified for voluntary retirement), such allowance is reduced by the amount of the survivor allowance payable.

Provides where survivor is also entitled to a special death benefit or the patrol members' or local safety members' continued allowance, survivor may elect to receive such benefit or allowance in lieu of the survivor allowance, otherwise only the survivor allowance is payable. Increases state contributions to retirement fund for various categories of members by unspecified amounts. Makes survivor allowance provisions applicable to contracting agencies only if agency so provides in its contract. March 19. **Watch**

SB 1031 Miller (Education) Provides for revocation of teaching credentials of person employed by a school district in a position requiring certification qualifications, who is assigned to a particular school of the district, and who fulfills the duties of his employment for that year, if the person fails to teach in the field of his subject matter competence, as determined by his major or minor subject in college training, for at least one instructional period for one semester in a school of the district of the same grade level as that for which he is employed.

Makes provision inapplicable to employee on leave of absence for a school year, or employed for a school year as a teacher or superintendent, or deputy, assistant or associate superintendent, or to any person not assigned to a particular school. March 20. **Good**

fornia agriculture is forced to compete with substandard wages in the south, John F. Henning, state director of industrial relations, who was one of the chief witnesses for the bill declared;

"We should never attempt to remake California in the image of Alabama, Arkansas, and Mississippi." To the argument that the bill would bankrupt the work, and create an unbearable relief load in California, Henning replied, "California industry has not only survived but prospered in spite of a similar difference with the south in average farmer, put a large labor force out of weekly earnings where the differential

is from 40 to 60 per cent higher in California."

At a press conference following the committee action, Governor Brown said he would go along with Hawkins in fixing the minimum wage in agriculture at \$1.00 per hour.
