Dear Jean and George:

Thanks, George, for getting the checking account for me. With all the "pretty little things" running around here, I'll probably need it for refreshments, i.e., soda and candy bars. In fact I'm going to spend all of it -- in spite of your fatherly advice to me via Miss Lynn.

Tanforan is windy and cold. The horse stables converted into family homes are warmer than the new barracks set up. The former house 2-4 persons. They are the same type you see at the Sacramento Fair grounds. The barracks are about 20' x 120' divided into 3 rooms more or less. They are reserved for family units of three or more. This is not definite because changes have been made continuously in the past few days. Some families have had to move into other rooms because of this reorganization. Many of them resent it, particularly after they have put a great deal of labor into fixing the place up. Barracks are much colder than the stables. When the eaves of the stables are walled up and the cracks of the doors fixed, it's quite cozy; however, in the barracks the thin pine veneer and tarpaper offers no insulation. Furthermore, the wind whistles under the house (houses are on stilts) and up the 1/8" - 1/4" spaces between the floor boards and up through the holes cut in the roof for stove pipes. It takes "quite a bit" of blankets and rugs to "warm up" a person living in them and most of the occupants didn't bring enough of them because the regulations were to bring only necessities. Some people have sent for them by writing to friends.

The camp is equipped with laundries, showers, and latrines -- and (important) mess halls. The Assembly Center is divided up into several sections each with its mess halls, recreation rooms, etc., but they are not fully ready to be used, some cases not yet constructed and usually not well organized.

The food situation is lousy. That is in my neck of the woods. I eat in the main mess where about 3,000 have been eating. As new mess rooms open the number will probably decrease here and the quality of the food would probably become better. At least I hope so.

The idea of just being cooped up behind barbed wire fences and armed outlook towers isn't pleasant in spite of relative freedom of movement within the camps. It is maddening to watch the neon lights of San Bruno go on at night, to see lights of some city across the bay, to see people working in the fields just outside, to see cars whizzing by on the highway just feet away or on Bayshore miles to the East. After being taught and educated that freedom of expression and movement is something worth while in the schools, it is extremely difficult to accept cooping up as if it were inevitable hand of fate had thrust us here, and that we should meekly

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accept that as such. The older folks are, younger kids are, and the rest of us will have to.

In this camp there is a great deal of petty jealousy of this kind or that which hinders a well-thought-of organization or plan. Planning the camp activities in itself is a tough job and this petty bickering adds to the confusion.

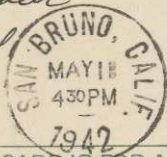

Thanks for everything big and small. The fool in particular was appreciated altho it had to be marred by your awful domineering presence. But like all things in life the good must be taken with the bad so I shouldn't kick too much. The good food offsets your bad presence. Too bad George that you're across the Bay and you won't be able to annihilate me.

For the first time since I have been here I feel pretty good. During the first week I had stomach trouble as usual, then I came down with the Tanforan sniffles, then the induced typhoid left me in a rather dismal mood.

Everything seems o.k. now.

I propose to do something which will probably get you pretty mad. If you get "mad", the hell with you.

Since Said passed his exams, since Alex passed his departmental, and since even you have your theses finished, it's about time that I did something.

I think I am enclosing enough for Jean, Said, Alex and you to take one round of the cheapest liquor at Trader Vic's, so will you Kindly escort the above to the "proper" place.

Thanks Butch for the swell cookies which you helped your Mom make, they were delicious. The cookies were blitzed by my room mates as soon as the cover was taken off. It didn't last very long. When four hungry fellows get into food---well it just doesn't survive very long.

Just don't know what to write about, Butch, so will you kindly excuse me from making more noise.

From your letter you seemed to have had a wonderful time at Sacramento and Carmel. How were the pretty young things. I bet they just disgusted you. I bet they cooed and made great deal of funny noises, thinking that they were entertaining you. Aren't the "grown-ups" funny? You would think that they never had the chance of being young and healthy once. But shucks the people forget things as time goes by so we can't blame them if they say and do rather queer things. We have to be tolerant and broad minded.

Thanks? Jean, for the cookies. It is not within my vocabulary to say all the things which would be appropriate to say in order to thank you.

In spite of rather good treatment we get in camp here at Tanforan. Most of us want to get out. Why? It's something hard to describe. One just feels it, so to speak. We might become conditioned to it in the long run. Maybe we won't.

Just a little note to thank you, Jean, for everything you have done for me. I hope to sit down some day and write to you, Mrs. Peterson, Dr. Thomas, Miss Lynn and others, letters which I should have long ago.

Should write more but the third typhoid "shot" is making my arms ache and my head dizzy. - so 'xcess play.

Dear Naj:

Thanks for writing me. It was good seeing you, pal. Really we miss you around here. And you should see the papers that have piled up since you left. The girls downstairs are clipping them now under Morton's supervision but it seems to be going awfully slowly. Maybe they're doing what we used to do--stop and read everything. 'Member?

George M. was just in the office and had a long talk with Morton on Constitution, imagine.

Yep, I'm afraid I'll have to confirm the report on the Fresno county order. It is a freezing order and so far no evacuation order, but they will be out soon. Dr. Thomas said for you to send her the age, sex, occupation of your family and she will try to see that they go to Tulelake with you. It is very possible but I don't know how probable. She'll do all she can, so don't worry.

I found that letter from DeWitt to Tolan in the Tolán reports and it is being copied downstairs. I'll send it to you and To, just as soon as they give it to me.

I'm inclosing the list of our missing copies of the Neichi Bei. If you can will you ask your parents, and others who take it if they can supply any of these. Thanks, Naj.

Let me know when you leave, I'll write Tulelake next, I bet.

Dear Virginia:

It might be quite difficult to get the back issues of the Nichi Bei from the "outside" (that is, from my folks because I think they have their hands full packing to be evacuated), but I'll try there and here at Tanforan.

I'm sending you the information which you want for Dr. Thomas on my family, but I don't know whether the family will want to go to Tule Lake even if it could be arranged if the friend who is living with them cannot also go. My parents have more or less raised him from childhood and at the present time he has taken my place ~~/~~ at Selma. If he weren't with them, I doubt if I could have come here to Tanforan with any peace of mind.

I don't know just how much "community pressure" will be put on me to go to where my parents are going. At present quite a bit has been put on me from my parents' friends and indirectly from my kibeis and nisei friends. They have been satisfied so far with my answer that if the things got worse I would go to my parents. The things have turned out to be "worse", but I don't believe I would care to go to the Assembly Center or Relocation Center where they might be sent. Just what the reaction of the community would be is uncertain, but it would probably be something quite unpleasant. It would not be just now, but after this whole mess has blown over. The Japanese community has a long memory for "deserting one's family".

I don't know the exact "vital statistics" of my folks, but I think it is as follows:

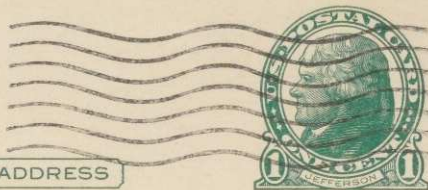
