Construction has begun at the powerhouse area and will soon become the principal activity on the site. All but a few items of minor equipment have been installed at the gated spillway and completion works are proceeding on the dikes, either side of the structure, and the paving downstream of the main spillway.

NEWS FROM ATLANTA
