Suggestions for precinct Captains.

1. Secure at headquarters the list of yeses + the list of voters for given precinct.
2. Secure at headquarters literature + cards for distribution.
3. Secure 6 or more workers for day work at polls.  
Secure 2 " " tally clerks in evening.
4. Extend invitation to women in the precinct to show their interest by coming to the polls during the day.
5. Secure a place where workers may meet or use as headquarters, if only the steps of a neighboring house.
6. Look up phone numbers for yeses.
7. Try to win over the undecided or indifferent voters.

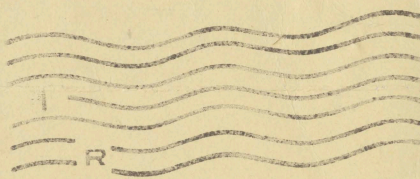
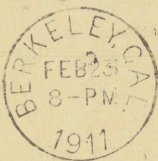
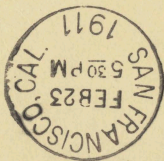
At the polls.

8. See that workers are at the polls from 6 AM to 6 PM.  
The early morning hours from 6 AM to 10 AM are the most important hours for work as the greater number of votes are cast then.
9. Stand 100 feet from the booth when giving out cards or soliciting votes. It is against the law to be nearer when asking for votes. Anyone can go up to or within the booth, provided he or she does not electioneer within the 100 ft. limit.



10. Caution the workers to observe the 100 ft. limit.
11. It would be well either on Monday or before the voting begins on Tuesday to speak with the election officials at the booth in your precinct, so that they will understand your purpose & be friendly.
12. Take the list of yeses & check the names of those who have voted according to the list ~~that hangs at the corner of the booth.~~
13. About 3 o'clock phone to the yeses who have not voted or try to get them to the polls by carriage or auto.
