Yes, Donna, please copy any Dellums-related material you find in the SR. That would be very helpful. I spoke with Ron Dellums. He doesn't think anyone has ever tried to get CL's FBI file thru FOIA, and he is willing to help with that. I will put together a list of specifics -- dates, and organizations with which CL was affiliated -- as that will facilitate the search.

I've been having a great time going thru CL's correspondence. He was a prolific writer, and his letters are rich -- detailed, expressive and full of anecdotes. It's interesting to get a feel for his strong friendship with, and deep loyalty to, Randolph. Of course, CL could also argue his position and disagree with Randolph; he was no sycophant. I'm making an annotated index in database/table form that will allow me to sort the letters I've read by keyword or date, as well as search for specific names or terms. This is a bit tedious, but it will be enormously helpful during the writing.

Yes, I had a look at Carton 9 in the NAACP files, and found some things there. Thanks for ordering it for me, and thanks for the list of other materials to check in the rest of that collection. Did you compose of list of what's of interest in the bscp papers? Later, maybe you can let me know if there is anything of interest in the Rustin papers. I was happy to see that the library has an extensive collection of the Black Worker issues and the Messenger. I'm looking forward to diving into these. I'm really pleased with how much seems to be available at UC. And there was an article in the SF Chronicle about the upcoming reopening of AAMLO, and the fact that they have some of CL's personal papers.

Hi Donna,

Thanks for your report on the bscp papers. Here are my thoughts.

While I wish to understand bscp forms of organizing, I want to give special attention to two things. (1) Materials that will help in understanding dellums' personal development and style as a labor organizer and leader of the bscp, naacp, fepc, etc.; (2) Materials that help in understanding how dellums and bscp positioned themselves vis-a-vis wider working class concerns (e.g. fepc) and "non-labor" social issues and organizations, e.g., civil rights, nnc, housing, peace, etc. In short, I want to examine the bscp as an org. that had an impact far beyond the confines of its own specific labor turf. So, in thinking about what to copy, let this guide you. Other materials can simply be mentioned in your general description of what is there. I will take up your suggestion to look at this stuff myself, and this is where your general description of contents will be helpful.

I really appreciated your paper on Foner and the future of labor history. It is an excellent discussion of the development from institutional histories of unions to histories that look at broader social, cultural, and gender factors that affect working class struggles. This is a helpful perspective in looking at the bscp. (For example, women, specifically wives and girlfriends, of porters played a critical role in the organizing drives, as was made clear by Mrs. Tucker in the lovely documentary, "Miles of Smiles, Years of Struggle.") Where Hunter and Kelley look at the impact on workplace struggles of factors outside the formal labor movement, with this study of the BSCP my interest is in the impact of a black labor union on social struggles outside the workplace. (Two sides of a dialectic? Need to consider both.) Dellums and Randolph were very conscious of the role they wanted the Brotherhood to play in larger struggles. (Dellums makes this point in a 12/2/38 letter to Randolph I just read: "There is no doubt that ours is the most outstanding organization within our race and I am sure that Negroes are guided more by the actions of the Brotherhood than any other single agency on the Pacific Coast.") They were conscious of this precisely because they were organizing a black union, whose success was intimately linked with the success of larger civil rights and other

struggles. For them, wages, hours and working conditions could not be separated from the state of the race. (And an irony: the ultimate success of the civil rights movement and its impact on the labor movement was partly responsible for the demise of the bscp in the late 1960s. Of course, airplanes also played a part.)

I'm reading the "paradox of equality" dissertation by Charles Curtoya. It contains some information on the history of the fepc, but is chiefly a study of organizational dynamics. It looks at outcomes from the standpoint of complainants, respondents, fepc employees, fepc as an organization, civil rights groups, and society. The fepc found itself on the horns of a dilemma, whether to emphasize equality or ability as the basis for opportunity and advancement in employment, resulting in equivocation (227-8). Underlying this, the author says, is the "paradox of equality": "In order to be fair to everyone, one must discriminate between individuals, but to discriminate is unfair. If one equalizes individuals by ignoring their differences, one inevitably creates unequal conditions, thus discriminating against those of more ability in order to help those of less. On the other hand, if one equalizes conditions by equalizing opportunity, the inequality of individuals will be preserved and those of more ability will rise above those of less." (230-31) In my view, this abstract argument ignores the historical reality that for most of American history racial privilege, not ability, has been the basis on which some groups have risen at the expense of others. Equality is actually not a sufficient response to this historical reality. Reparations (affirmative action being one example) are required to redress the historical injustice and establish a level playing field where equality of opportunity would then be meaningful. (And sorting individuals by ability is not inherently unjust so long as irrelevant group markers like race or sex don't become determinants.) The issue is not simply the plight of individuals, but of historically racially privileged and racially subordinated groups. The discussion, I would suggest, should not be limited simply to an appeal to an abstract, logical argument about equality, but must also appeal to national and international case law with regard to reparations (as I argued in my article on reparations in *The Black Scholar*).

You probably didn't expect all of this in response to a query about what to copy, but I wanted to write out some notes in response to reading and thinking about these issues. From time to time I may do this; feel free to do the same if the mood strikes you. In fact, I

flagged this email as a memo to distinguish it from routine housekeeping emails. Later I'll pull these memo emails (dealing with issues of methodology, findings, concepts, theory) together to help in the writing process. You might want to do the same; it saves time when sorting through email archives.

robert -- i just read through the full guide for the naacp papers and annotated the boxes/folders that i thought would be of interest to you. i have this list if you want to look at it. i also checked the abstract of the collection to get an overview of the organization, and according to it dellums was not the first director of the west coast regional office. the chronology of leadership is listed below:

The West Coast Regional Office of the NAACP (Region I) was established in November 1944 with headquarters in San Francisco, to coordinate the operations of the branch offices in California, Nevada, Oregon and Washington. In 1947 the states of Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and the territories of Alaska and Hawaii were added to the Region.

Noah W. Griffin was appointed the first Regional Director and was succeeded by Franklin H. Williams in 1950, Tarea H. Pittman in 1961, Leonard H. Carter in 1965 and Virna M. Canson in 1974.

no. i do not have the randolph citation or rustin. please follow up and obtain a listing of what is in these files. the dellums collection is a huge and rich trove. i spent four hours yesterday going through one folder of dellums' letters to randolph -- out of about 20 folders in the carton; and there are more than 40 cartons in the collection. this could take a while! however, the letters to randolph are especially rich because these are in effect detailed reports on dellums' union work, full of anecdotal detail, just like the oral history.
