**Abstract:** The Quakers, also known as the Religious Society of Friends or simply Friends, are a religious group that emphasizes individual relationships with God, abolitionism, pacifism, international volunteer work, and other socially progressive causes. On April 4, 1887, a group of Friends in Pasadena and Los Angeles established a new city in the Puente Hills/Los Nietos Valley that they called Whittier. The Quaker Collection is an extensive grouping of personal papers, novels, non-fiction books, periodicals, and artifacts of daily life developed by Whittier College for purposes of understanding this Quaker heritage.

**Biography and Administrative History:** The Quakers, also known as the Religious Society of Friends or simply Friends, are a religious group founded by George Fox in 1650 that is based in Protestant Christianity. Quaker beliefs emphasize the direct and personal relationship that each individual person can have with God through Jesus Christ, and the therefore inherent spiritual potential that every person represents. On the basis of these beliefs, Friends generally practice abolitionism, pacifism, international volunteer work, and other socially progressive causes. Each community of Friends, organized into regional Yearly Meeting groups, establishes its own Book of Discipline, which seeks to reflect what that community feels God wants for them and guide its members towards a life that meets those desires. As such, each geographical group of Quakers may have a slightly different interpretation of what it means to successfully live a Quaker life, even if they belong to the same sub-denomination of the Religious Society.

In the 1600s, Friends sought religious freedom by participating in the English settlement of New England, and contributed to the founding of several cities and, later, states. In the 1800s, Quakers began to move into the western parts of North America, founding towns, cities, and schools along the way. In 1887, Aquilla H. Pickering and Hannah Pickering came to Los Angeles from the Midwest. On April 4, 1887, they, along with a group of Friends who already resided in Pasadena and Los Angeles, established a city in the Puente Hills/Los Nietos Valley and named it Whittier. Some of the founding members of this new city include John Painter, T. Elwood Newlin, Jonathan Bailey, Fordyce Grinnell, Hervey and Milton Lindley, Eleazer Andrews, and Washington Hadley.

The Quaker Collection contains seven sub-series: the Sarah Coffin Collection, the Pillsbury Papers, the Mendenhall Papers, the Bailey Family Genealogy Papers, the Johnson Family Papers, the Dombeck Papers, and the Wells-Cammack Papers; Each sub-series has its own, more detailed container list. This finding aid was developed by Paige Harris in 2023, in collaboration with others.

**Scope and Content of Collection:** The Quaker Collection is an extensive grouping of personal papers, novels, non-fiction books, periodicals, and artifacts of daily life developed by Whittier College for purposes of understanding the Quaker heritage of the College and of the city in which the College is based. The Collection focuses broadly on genealogies, including those of the Bailey and Johnson families, records of Quaker settlement of Southern California and the modes of living thereof, and information about both past and current Quaker values and activities on an international scale.

**Biography and Administrative History:** Dr. Coffin was a distant relative of J.G. Whitter and was deeply involved in the founding of what would later become Whittier College, what was then known as the Third Whittier Friends Academy. He, along with Professor John Chawner, was one of the first instructors at the Academy when it opened on September 23, 1891. Dr. Coffin later served on Whittier's first Board of Trustees after the city was incorporated in 1898, a process in which he also participated. He was a leader in the community for the entirety of his life, retiring as President of the Whittier College Board of Trustees in 1920 after eighteen years of service. When, in the late 1930's, he and his wife Sarah moved houses, they donated artifacts from the earliest days of the city to Wardman Library and their home, which was renamed "Earlham Hall" and became housing for female students, to the College.

**Scope and Content of Collection:** The Coffin Collection is an object-based sub-series that reflects what daily life was like for the residents of the newly established Whittier. Certain

objects were procured and used by residents of the new city, while others were brought from the Midwest and were already considered family heirlooms at that time.

**Biography and Administrative History:** Parker Pillsbury (1809-1892) was an American social reformer, minister, lecturer, newspaper editor, and advocate for abolition and women's rights. During his various travels, he wrote letters to his wife, Sarah Pillsbury and their daughter, Nellie. This finding aid was created in part by Abigail Chavez.

**Scope and Content of Collection:** The Pillsbury Papers Collection contains material relating to Parker P. Pillsbury, Helen 'Nellie' Pillsbury, Sarah Pillsbury, and others connected to the Pillsbury family during the years 1828 through the 1900s. The content of the collection

includes correspondence, legal documents, photographs, newspaper articles, clippings, obituaries, envelopes, souvenirs, almanacs, speeches, books, and compositions.

**Biographical and Administrative History:** Mrs. Lena May Mendenhall, nee England, donated properties in La Habra and Whittier to Whittier College on February 29, 1936, including a building that had once been an Elks Lodge and currently serves as Mendenhall Building. Despite her name, Mrs. Mendenhall was not a close relation of Dr. W. O. Mendenhall, the President of Whittier College from 1934 to 1943.

**Scope and Content of Collection:** The Mendenhall Collection consists of five boxes of papers that have not yet been cataloged.

**Biographical and Administrative History:** G.L. Bailey served as the librarian at the public library in Ridgeville, Indiana, and conducted research into his family histories. He was related to Jonathan and Rebecca Bailey, Quakers who participated in the founding of the city of Whittier. Jonathan Bailey was born in Virginia to an abolitionist family, lived in Ohio in the 1820s, and settled in Los Angeles in 1885. While in Ohio he had helped to start Wilmington College, and thus other founding members of Whittier gave significant weight to his words. In California he managed real estate and directed building projects in the new city including construction of irrigation tunnels and the Friends Church, among others. In 1887 he was appointed as one of the Trustees of the new Friends' College (which would later become Whittier College), participated in the 1898 petition for Whittier's incorporation as a city, and served as a Trustee of the Whittier Public School District during the 1930s. This collection was processed in part by Alejandra Gaeta in March 2014.

**Scope and Content of Collection:** The collection includes G.L. Bailey's correspondence on the subject of different family genealogies, including typed and longhand written

genealogies of the Bailey family. Smaller collections of genealogies of the Sears, Zell, Thomas, and Payne families are also present, as are newspaper clippings and other print materials not directly related to the family histories.

**Biographical and Administrative History:** The Johnson Family were some of the first Quaker settlers in Whittier and continued to live in the neighborhood into the modern age. Like many people of their time period, they exchanged letters and other correspondence as a primary mode of communication between family members who were spread out across America, having left their original hometown in search of new land and new opportunities.

**Scope and Content of Collection:** The Johnson Papers are composed primarily of correspondence between various members of the Johnson family. Bills, legal documents, and ephemera from the time period are also included.

**Biographical and Administrative History:** Florence Wells was a Quaker missionary who taught school in Japan for seven years, between 1911 and 1918. After returning to the United States, she became a student at Columbia University, where she ran a Japanese import shop to sup port herself and Japanese exchange students. Wells later returned to Japan where she taught at the Tsuda and Jissen universities, freelanced as a newspaper/magazine writer, and edited the English-language manuscripts of Japanese writers. After the Tokyo earthquake of 1923, Wells again returned to the United States, where she was incarcerated at an internment camp during World War Two due to her close ties with Japanese nationals, Japanese Americans, and Japanese culture.

The majority of the letters included within the collection are to Mrs. William L. Blott, a fellow Quaker and patron of the Japanese gift shop that Wells ran. Blott had close ties to Whittier College, including being related by marriage to President Walter F. Dexter and living on a property that abutted the College. The two women discuss several other Quakers, including Edith Sharpless of Haverford, the Dexter family, Herbert Nicholson (a fellow missionary in Japan), Elizabeth Gray Vining (tutor to the Japanese Crown Prince), and Esther Rhoads (tutor to the Royal Family). Wells also includes photos of herself in 1914, 1953, and 1960, and pictures taken of her house in Toyko and a summer residence in the mountains.
