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BIOGRAPHY

IRMA KAY

Irma Kay, founder and director of the San Francisco Opera Ring from 1954 to 1967, had a broad-based background in the performing arts before arriving in the Bay Area in 1952. She was born in Philadelphia, and while still in school, she began giving theatrical performances. Trained as a pianist, she had derived additional inspiration from her brother, Hershy Kay*, a composer, musical arranger and conductor.

When Irma joined Hershy in New York, she studied dance with Martha Graham and gained experience working at the Neighborhood Playhouse and off-broadway's Provincetown Playhouse. Summer stock followed. After a time in Los Angeles, still involved with performance, Irma came to San Francisco where she founded the Opera Ring Theater. She presently resides in San Rafael.

*Hershy Kay was a composer, conductor, and musical arranger. By 1943 he was on the NBC staff. He gained fame working on the Broadway shows: <u>On the Town, Peter Pan, Candide</u>, and <u>Once Upon a Mattress</u>. He also worked with the Martha Graham Company, Ballet Theatre and the New York City Ballet.

HISTORY

OPERA RING THEATER

Irma Kay's vision was to produce operas in English and in-theround in order to reach out to and educate an audience unfamiliar with traditional opera production. After much negotiation, she rented space at the Theatre Arts Colony building on Washington Street. The Opera Ring Theater Company opened to good reviews with a production of Gian-Carlo Menotti's <u>The Telephone</u> and <u>The</u> Medium, in July 1954.

Encouraged by the favorable reception, Irma managed to secure a lease on a warehouse with adequate auditorium and stage space at 123 South Van Ness Avenue. A Board of Directors was formed to manage the Opera Ring Association. Rehearsals were held, and the the West Coast Premiere of Kurt Weill's <u>The Threepenny Opera</u>, opened on September 21, 1955. Although the critics were favorable to Irma's ambitious project, there were rough spots to be overcome. The run was extended more than once, running 23 weeks, until March, 1956. It was immediately followed by a revival of <u>The Telephone</u> and <u>The Medium</u> which ran for three months.

In June, 1956, John Latouche's <u>The Golden Apple</u>, music by Jerome Moross, played a three month run. Kurt Weill's <u>Street Scene</u>, Cole Porter's <u>Kiss Me Kate</u> followed. The theme had been established. "Grand" opera was not to be the performance medium of the Opera Ring. The 30 productions of the next decade would all be from the classical musical comedy genre, i.e. <u>Finian's Rainbow</u>, <u>Carousel</u>, <u>Lady in the Dark</u>, <u>Oklahoma</u>, <u>Guys and Dolls</u>, to name a few. The unique factor was that all were performed "in the round".

Other performance elements were added including concerts of chamber music, and dance of the Renaissance. Children's productions such as <u>Hansel and Gretel</u>, and <u>Heidi</u>, were produced between the main staged productions. Saturday nights at midnight there were "melodramas" complete with olio acts. Productions often alternated, one playing Thursday and Friday, another on Saturday and Sunday. The Opera Ring had as many as 85 singers, actors and dancers working on several productions at the same time. <u>Can-Can</u> (1959-1961) and <u>West Side Story</u> (1960-1962) each ran for two years. There were revivals of <u>The Golden Apple</u>, Threepenny Opera, Pal Joey, Guys and Dolls, and Little Mary Sunshine.

Dramatic productions such as <u>Dirty Hands</u> by Sartre, and Thornton Wilder's <u>The Skin of Our Teeth</u> were presented under the banner of the Theatre Ring.

Although the casts were primarily composed of local performers, there are names from the eleven years of the Opera Ring that are recognized by music and theatre patrons. Morgan Freeman was with the O.R. from 1960-62 and appeared in <u>Once Upon a Mattress</u>, <u>West Side Story</u>, and as the street singer in revival of <u>Threepenny</u> <u>Opera</u>. Diane Berman was a leading lady in several O.R. shows as was June Purviance. Donna Petersen of the San Francisco Opera appeared in early Opera Ring productions, as did Marty Buchwald, aka Marty Balin who went on to create SF Sound and the Jefferson Airplane.

Opera Ring's demise was due to two things. The golden age of musical comedy was coming to an end, and there wasn't new material of a like-kind to choose from. Locally, several large Las Vegastype theaters opened with budgets allowing for "stars" who appealed to changing audience taste. The final production was Weill's Lost in the Stars, critically acclaimed, but poorly attended, in the summer of 1967. Earlier in the year, a Familiar Faces benefit for O.R. gave two performances of scenes from earlier productions with as many of the original players as could be assembled.

The Opera Ring closed in February, 1967.

SCOPE AND CONTENT

The greater part of the Opera Ring Theater Collection, 1954-1967, consists of materials on paper, collected by Irma Kay, which document the history of the company. Included are programs, press clippings, staging diagrams, promotional materials, and production photographs. Included in the historical material are two company scrapbooks, and some framed awards.

The architectural materials include blueprints for the theater building, sketches and photos of the lobby, and lighting plans.

There is a small group of costume and set designs, but the costumes themselves are not a part of this collection.

Included in correspondence files are letters, drafts of speeches and some congratulatory telegrams. Other than a permit and union contract, there are few administrative records.

SERIES DESCRIPTION

- SERIES 1. HISTORICAL/PROMOTIONAL MATERIAL Box 1 Included in this series is the company history, promotional material, union contracts, correspondence, and information about the theater building including photos, sketches and seating charts, performance posters and architectural drawings.
- SERIES 2. PERFORMANCE MATERIAL Carton 1 and Box 2

Following a chronological listing by date of performance, this, the largest group of material is arranged alphabetically by title of the production. Usually two or more folders for each production. Programs and printed material are in one file followed by an envelope of photographs. in some cases there is additional material such as staging diagrams and cassettes of productions.
