Scope and Content:

During 1971-1972 Estes received a grant, took a sabbatical, and worked with the Asian American Study Center at UCLA on a project that aimed to gather primary source materials on the history of the Japanese American community in San Diego County and Southern California. This series contains the results of this work; most of it is Japanese language material such as diaries, memoirs and published selections from Japanese books and newspapers. Estes arranged for the translation of Japanese sources to English, and one or both version is included. The series includes directories of Japanese residing in San Diego, some with biographical information.
