BIOGRAPHY

Iris de Luce was born on April 17, 1903 in New York. She moved to San Francisco while still an infant and later in her childhood, she took interpretive dancing lessons from Ruth Griffith. She also studied dancing at the Anita Peters Wright School for three years; at the Hirsch-Arnold Ballet School for five years; and at the Muriel Stuart Ballet Studios in San Francisco and Hollywood for seven years. In 1928, when Stuart left San Francisco to dance with the Chicago Civic Opera Ballet, she turned all of her students over to de Luce.

De Luce turned to performing after Stuart's return in 1930. She studied drama with Hedwiga Reicher and Cameron Prudhomme and later appeared in motion pictures with Albertina Raasch's ballet company. Her training was enhanced through study in Paris with Egorova, who had been a contemporary student with Pavlova in the Imperial Russian Ballet, and also with Volinine, a former partner of Pavlova. While in Paris, she was chosen by M. Nicola Guerra to dance four of her original solos for a gala performance of the Opera Ballet in Deauville.

Upon her return to San Francisco, de Luce danced with the San Francisco Ballet under the direction of Adolph Bolm. From 1935-1936, she danced the role of Zobeide in the San Francisco Opera Ballet's production of <u>Scheherazade</u>. De Luce also taught ballet at the San Francisco Opera Ballet School and at Dominican College from 1937-1943. After her marriage to Fredrik Waiss, de Luce directed the Iris de Luce Ballet Studio in Sausalito from 1946-1956. Among her outstanding students numbered Francia Russell, Fiona Fuerstner, Carol Conrad, and Mollie Merrill.

SCOPE AND CONTENTS

These papers document the career of concert dancer and choreographer Iris de Luce. They include clippings, programs, and correspondence dating from her period of affiliation with the San Francisco Opera Ballet as a teacher and performer. In addition, the papers encompass examples of de Luce's artwork in the form of ballet sketches and costume designs.

Very little information is available in these papers on de Luce's teaching activities in Sausalito or on her studies in Paris with Egorova and Volinine. They focus primarily upon her performances in the San Francisco Bay Area.
