PHOTO ALBUM [Black]. Photographs taken by Jack Dougherty when he worked for the Coast and Geodetic Survey in 1934 and 1935 surveying in Montana and Arizona. Most of the photographs have notations on the back, written by Jack. A few pages have Jack's photo on them. I have put a piece of paper on those pages and written on the back of those photos. Several photos and several pages are missing photos. Includes first photograph he took of Tillie Quarelli, his future wife. There is snow and the women are holding armloads of it. ["What a good photographer he was; he continued to take photographs until he died. His daughter Peggy, his granddaughters Jojo and Jennifer, and grandson Sam are professional photographers. Following in his footsteps."]

Box 9:

Jack, "Dad", gave me his four diaries – 1935, 1936, 1937, 1938 - in the 1980's. Right away I read about Dad and Mom meeting and their visiting Mom's family in Winkelman, Arizona, and the days around my birth. I casually thumbed through the rest, and placed them on a shelf in the closet. This summer I have been reading the diaries, and am so sorry I didn't do it while he was alive, and I could share my reactions to his experiences with him. Although "just the facts" of a day on such a small page. I'm impressed with how he spent his time, what the weather was like, what was blooming, what he ate, (coffee, milk, milkshakes, hamburger steaks, turkey – later T-bone steaks - were the most frequent foods consumed), how many shows (movies) he went to, playing all kinds of card games and board games, hitching rides, how much driving was done, and how many letters he was always writing. All his life he was a letter writer. On every of his many later trips, he would send postcards to each relative (I hope I saved them – I'll see when I start going through other boxes), and frequently wrote letters to us (which I have saved). He also saved every letter we wrote to him. When he died we each received our file of letters. The Sparolini family is mentioned often.

1. DIARY 1935

Journal/Diary of Jack Dougherty for 1935.

Black soft cloth. 6" x 3 ½" x ¾".

Jack wrote in ink and pencil in this book, almost every day.

[“Companion piece to the photography album he made of this period, and the news-clippings scrapbook, both of which are part of the Dougherty Family Collection.”]

Jack lists: the people he worked with and where they were from while working for the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey until 31 May; the towns he visited during 1934 and 1935; some of the men he knew in the Hoover Vacuum Cleaner Company in San Francisco; and the men he worked with in the Soil Conservation Service in Watsonville and Vacaville. At the end of the book there are some financial notes for January and February, items to be bought, names for Christmas cards. At the top of each page he wrote the name of towns, stations he was in that day.

When the writing begins it is Saturday, January 19 and he is in Phoenix, Arizona.

29 January. While surveying in Florence, he falls into chollo cactus. (This is a story we heard about many times...When my nephew Adam was about 9 years old he fell in prickly pear cactus, and after comforting him we called Jack “Dad”, “Grandfather” so they could share cactus stories.)

2 March. Tucson. Jack meets “college coeds” [Tillie], his future wife, and my mom. (Very thrilling to read about their meeting and courtship and his enjoyment of and impressions of the Quarelli family and Arizona). From 3 March on she is mentioned by name, “...to the “Alka Hall” sorority to wake up fair damsels and remind them that its Sunday. Dried dishes for Tillie of big brown eyes, pug nose, and winning smile, while we laughed as if we had known each other for years. Good feeling.” 17 March he visits the Quarelli family in Winkelman.

10 March. Snow in Oracle. He photographed Tillie and her sister in the snow – (another story I had heard about many times)

7 May. Station Pimaco, Benson, AZ. “About twelve [midnight] a red star came out of the west, later to be the tail lite of a big mail plane. The pilot answered our flash lite signals, and we answered inquisitive farmers.”

26 May. Rode 5 hours on an air conditioned train.

31 May, ends 10 ½ months work with the USCGS in Arizona and Montana.

Looking for a job. Uncle Howard gives Jack a list of books to read, while looking for a job.

4 September – Hoover Vacuum Cleaner Company

10 October. Begins working for the Soil Conservation Service in Watsonville, the “Apple City of the West”.

2 – 4 November. Moves to Vacaville, where there are “prize cherries”.

24 December. Flew on an airplane from Oakland to Los Angeles to Tucson.

2. **DAILY REMINDER 1936**

Journal/Diary of Jack Dougherty for 1936

Soft red book, 5 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

["This journal is a good companion to the photo album I've included, which has a wooden cover with wooden cut out of a sleeping man and sombrero. Jack's work week seemed to be 8 – 4:30 and $\frac{1}{2}$ a day on Saturday. Then to diner, the gym or playing ball, then visiting and playing cards, and finally cookies or ice cream and coffee, and to bed. Playing checkers, monopoly, cards, listening to radio, picking and shelling walnuts, going to library and getting books, staying in auto courts, boarding houses, using the local high school for exercise, the gym, entertainment – science fair, theater. Time magazine is mentioned as must reading at the library.']

3 January. Listens to President Roosevelt address Congress.

16 February. Drank canned beer.

22 February. About spending the day in San Francisco "People are spending money every where. The depression must be over. Let's hope so, even tho it may cause Roosevelt's defeat he brought back good times."

19 March. "Blossoms are giving way to fruit, especially cherries, apricots and plums".

13 April. Jack was made project manager.

17 April. 1st cherries are ready to eat.

10 May. ". gaze in wonder at the towering bridges being erected across the bay" [Bay bridge].

14 May. Rattlesnake in Vacaville.

16 May. Ordered 6 – tube small radio;

20 May. 1st ripe apricot

21 May. "cars of apricots, cherries, plums being sent East.

26 May. Packard Bell.

28 May. Ordered a telephone

4 June. Drove 15 hours from Monterey to Blythe, Arizona.

6 June. Wheeled Tillie through town of Winkelman in a wheelbarrow, the custom of the town for a bride and groom.

30 September. Listened to radio programs, Gang busters, Calling all Cars, Gracie and Allen, Amos and Andy.

9 October. Looked at wrecked ship on the rocks at Golden Gate.

3 November. Roosevelt wins with an "avalanche of votes"

12 November. San Francisco Oakland bridge opened today

14 November. Crossed the Bay Bridge. "Went through the new American cutoff highway, then to Oakland and across the largest bridge in the world the new San Francisco Bay. It was grand, we blocked traffic to glance over the side, it was like looking out an airplane"

26 December. "Winkelman, Hayden, and Ray [Arizona] have become a beehive of activity with rise in price of copper. 1500 people have moved in to return to old jobs, closed during the depression. A million dollars to remodel the mills, and smelters. Quarelli's hotel full, the store paying all debts, maintain double of what is has been. Prosperity is still here."

27 December. "...Charlie and I drove by to one of Dads [Quarelli] shafts to get some ore for assay. The shaft is 125' deep and seems to have good possibilities in molybdenum. Tied Charlie to a rope in case the ladder broke. Afterward we looked at the Copper Creek Mine. Believe it or not Molybdenum not copper is mined at Copper Creek.

3. 1937 – Calendar - 1937

Jack Dougherty's journal.

Soft cover. 6 ½" x 4" x 1"

Such a busy work life and social life. Comments about Soil Conservation Service – engineers, surveyors, rain gauges, contour plantings, visiting farmers and ranchers to sign them up for demonstration techniques, beginning of safety meetings, pay, etc. "Dropping in", "paying a visit", potluck dinners, ice cream and cookies after ball games, ping pong, horseshoes, cribbage, bridge, reading the papers, listening to the radio - programs, ball games and news, taking baths (not a shower), writing letters, taking walks, taking a correspondence course in accounting, washing and waxing car, collecting and cracking walnuts, drinking coca cola, eating popcorn, going to the library, evening snacks - coffee and cinnamon toast - before going to bed. Reading Life Magazine, usually on Friday or Saturday, and Reader's Digest. Once I was born I was impressed how much Jack helped out – feeding me, getting up for the middle of the night feeding, doing the wash, hanging up the wash.

The back of the book lists birth dates of family and friends, restaurants in towns he visited. In Tillie's handwriting are some addresses, of her relatives in California, and a recipe for wine jelly. On the last page are Jack's and Tillie's measurements – for buying clothes.

6 March. Orchards in bloom.

28 March. Look at the poppies growing along the ocean in Pacific Grove.

13 May. "the big event of the year" – [probably Tillie's pregnancy with me].

16 May. Sausalito ferry [G.G. bridge not yet open]

22 May. "we stayed around the house reading and looking at the magazine Life, made up of pictures of current events".

30 May. Yosemite, stayed at Camp Curry. 1000 people watch the bears being fed. No fire falls this time.

1 August. Move to Ukiah.

14 August. New Greyhound bus.

22 October. 1:25PM, Margaret Mary is born, 6 lbs. 1 ½ oz. "She sure looked funny, but cute. Tillie came out of the chloroform right away..."

27 October. Grape harvest is now about over, and the new wine is starting to turn.

31 October. "...finished cleaning the house...then to the hospital to bring Tillie and Peggy home this afternoon.

7 November. [Peggy's baptism] "So to the church with little Peggy, she behaved wonderfully. Only a burp came out of her little mouth"

8 November. To show to see Shirley Temple in Heidi.

6 December. About his accounting correspondence course "sent my first assignment to the Walton School of Commerce."

11 December. Went to see Myrna Loy and William Powell in one of their grand pictures.

24. December. Today was declared a holiday by the President. So up at seven o'clock to start a ball rolling. Bought wood, kindling, and flowers. Purchased the grocery store. So to shell nuts and get everything ready for the evening.
